layed as a result of a mix-up with the Department of Finance at Frankfort, and that the second year program included "Design Criteria and Guidelines" in which the city will have a coordinated architectural character and will develop and implement a set of design criteria for both signage and building renovation.

The L.D.C. will ask the City Council to pass a sign ordinance for downtown Mt. Vernon.

The second part of the program will be "Retail Merchandising and Assistance Program" in which a complete plan for physical treatment in hope to strengthen the retail sector, to provide technical expertise to downtown business owners to upgrade their marketing approach and improve the interiors of their business and their displays. The firm of Proctor-Davis-Ray of Lexington will be hired to conduct this and some of the other programs.

The third part will be "Individual Design and Rehabilitation Assistance" whereby the property owners will be advised of the historical aspects and characteristics of their buildings, what possibility for the structure, and the advantages and disadvantages of the rehabilitation program. The property owners will be provided with drawings of what the end product of structural and signage rehabilitation will be.

The L.D.C. also plans to print and provide brochures and pamphlets on the methods of proper rehabilitation without damaging the historic character of the buildings. Proctor-Davis-Ray will assist in this part of the program.

The fourth part will be the "Mobile Workshop" in which members of the L.D.C., city council, civil leaders and property owners will visit other towns which have similar downtown revitalization programs, to talk to people who have been involved in

other revitalization programs. This part of the project was scheduled for early summer but had to be delayed due to financial mix-up.

The L.D.C. is made up of business and professional people with Tommy Hodges as president, Billy Hiett as vice president and Karen King as secretary/treasurer.

School system is locating handicapped

Albert B. Chandler Medical Center. HCOP's aim is to help minority and disadvantaged students become more competitive, as well as to have the opportunity to be admitted to and succeed in medical, dental or pharmacy schools.

The program's objective is to select undergraduate minority and disadvantaged sophomore, junior and senior students who are interested in evaluating medicine, dentistry and pharmacy as a career choice, and who have the academic potential for completing the educational program in one of these areas. The schedule of experiential and retention activities will represent an important component of the total program to recruit, admit and retain minority and disadvantaged students in health professions.

Curriculum includes meeting and working with medical, dental and pharmacy faculty and students. Study skills instruction, problem solving sessions, life planning and enrichment classes in biology, chemistry and mathematics are included in HCOP.

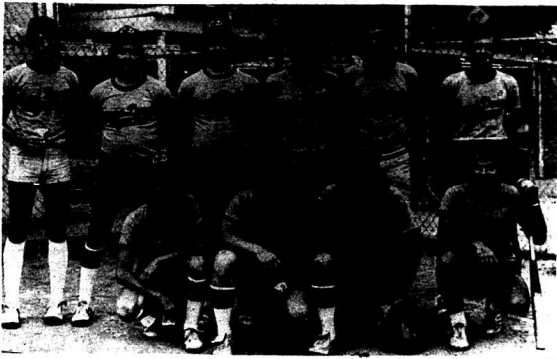

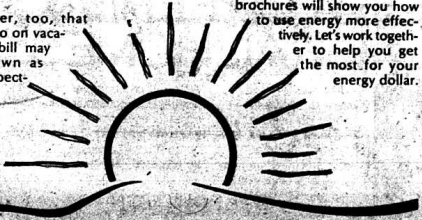

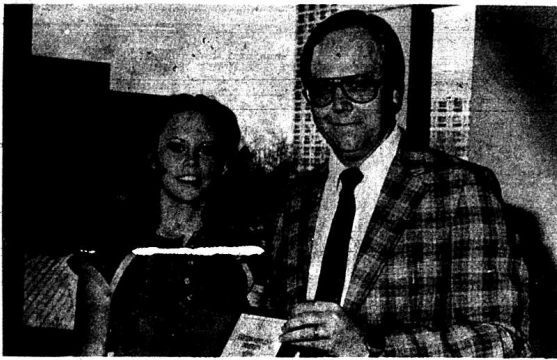

Job placement program recruits aid from students

As the job search for college graduates becomes more demanding, Eastern Kentucky University's Division of Career Development and Placement has come up with a pilot project known as the Student Ambassador Program that utilizes the help of student volunteers in "developing" employer contacts. The program's theme could appropriately read, "Students Helping Students."

Art Harvey, assistant director of CD & P at Eastern and whose idea it was to undertake such a project, said a group of 20 trained student volunteers contacted approximately 100 employers last spring. "We feel the program has gotten off to a tremendous start and will be a great boost to our employer contact campaign," said Harvey.

The program has caught the attention of others in the placement field. The ambassador program received the 1983 Kentucky College Placement Association's Award for Innovation.

"We designed this program to provide a face-to-face forum for the exchange of information between placement offices and employers. The development of an effective employer contact campaign is a difficult task for college placement offices due to constraints on funding and time," he said, "but with this ambassador program we can physically

call on many more employers than would be possible for the placement

staff."

Harvey explained that upperclass student volunteers, who have been selected through faculty nomination and who have completed a training program, schedule an appointment with employers in their home areas. Each ambassador contacts at least five organizations during a visit to their home. He said the student provides information about university services and programs that compliment the needs of a particular organization.

will be serving as ambassadors during the 1983 fall and spring terms. Details of the program will be compiled in a work-book that will be available to the KCPA membership at the 1984 annual conference.

"We hope the development of this pilot project will serve as a model to increase the effectiveness of employer outreach activities in Kentucky and hence serve both placement offices and recruiters alike," said Harvey.

Stephen Trebolo recognized for woodland management

A Rockcastle County woodland owner was recently presented with a certificate of recognition from the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times "Tom Wallace Farm Forestry Contest" according to Kenneth M. Thompson of the Kentucky Division of Forestry. A certificate of recognition for having carried out woodland management programs with definite objectives and having protected and improved his woodland was presented to Stephen Trebolo at his farm in Brodhead.

The Farm Forestry Contest, sponsored each year by the two Louisville newspapers, seeks to pro-

mote good forest management by recognizing those Kentucky and Southern Indiana woodland owners

who are doing outstanding jobs in managing small woodland tracts. The contestants are nominated annually by foresters and compete for \$1,000 in prize money for the top three winners. Besides cash prizes all county nominees receive recognition certificates and district winners receive specially designed plaques.

Items considered in judging nominations include carrying out definite management plans for forest fire protection, protection from grazing by livestock and forest insect and disease protection. Also included is woodland management accomplishments such as timber stand improvement, tree planting, products harvested, erosion control, wildlife habitat enhancement and recreational development.

Mr. Trebolo began his

woodland management program in 1978, when he purchased the Kentucky Division of Forestry about some assistance in developing a forest management plan. This plan outlined the need to have some overmature timber harvested, so in October of 1978, Mr. Trebolo had the Kentucky Division of Forestry mark these trees for sale.

After the harvest, Mr. Trebolo went over the woodland and cut the worthless trees and grapevines from his stand of 40 acres under the supervision of the Kentucky Division of Forestry. Since then the woodland has been fenced to exclude livestock, food and cover plants have been planted for wildlife, and a hiking trail has been constructed for recreation. Even now, Mr. Trebolo is planning to plant steep erodible areas in trees this fall.

In the past five years, Mr. Trebolo has gone a long way in improving his woodland for maximum all-round use. He has improved his potential timber production, increased wildlife habitat and increased the recreation potential of his woodland. Rockcastle County can be proud of his accomplishments as recognized by the Tom Wallace Farm Forestry Award presented recently.

City council applies for grant to upgrade Fairground Hill area

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted unanimously to apply for a \$650,000 grant that would be used to upgrade the Fairground Hill section of the city, at the council's regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Jennifer Bush, a representative of Will Lender and Associates, an engineering firm out of Berea, was present at the meeting to tell the council that she would submit the application which, if granted, would be used to put in new streets, guttering and sidewalks and just generally upgrade the area as a whole.

The city has applied for the grant several times in the past but it has been turned down each time. Mrs. Bush told the council that if they did not receive the grant this time that her firm would

not receive any money. Leroy Brown of the Ky. Department of Transportation was at the meeting at the request of the council to discuss the many accidents that have occurred in front of the West Gate Shopping Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon.

Councilman Tom Welch told Brown that the council wanted a 35 mile per hour speed limit and a no-passing zone. Brown told the council that he needed to see reports of the accidents that had already happened and that after he reviewed the reports he would make a suggestion to the state.

"Do we have the facilities at the water plant to pump water for more customers," asked Councilman Ernie Tolle, during the meeting. Tolle was referring to the grant that

the Rockcastle Western Water District had received to add some 200 customers. "We're pumping water 23 or 24 hours a day now and I don't see how we can pump anymore," Tolle said.

In response to Tolle's question Mayor Roland Mullins appointed Councilman Welch to head a public hearing for the purpose of providing water for people that don't have it. Some of the 200 customers that will be receiving service from western water are in Lincoln and Pulaski counties.

In other business, the Council voted to buy a fire department monitor to go on the city's truck for a price of \$1,500. The purchase will be made from Bluegrass Fire Department Supplies.

Hospital accepts contract to run ambulance

An Ambulance Service Board has been formed to supervise the operation of the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service. The board met on August 2 to elect officers and to establish by-laws.

The county's fiscal court originally supervised the ambulance service, but after a tax for the ambulance service was defeated in last November's election, they asked the board members of Rockcastle County Hospital if they would assist in upgrading the program.

The hospital board decided that the best way to improve the program would be to establish a separate, independent board for the ambulance service that would be subject to the supervision of the hospital's board members.

They looked for qualified, interested individuals who were willing to volunteer their time to help improve and develop the ambulance service for the county's needs.

The chairman of the Ambulance Service Board is Roger French, who is the administrator of Rockcastle County Hospital. He will relay and coordinate information between the Ambulance Service and Rock-

castle County Hospital Board.

David King, a local merchant, has been elected vice-president. Ernest Stanley, a retired member of the community, was chosen secretary. And Tom Welch, a member of City Council and a retired member of the community, will act as treasurer. Mike Barr donated his time to be the director of the service.

The purpose of the first Ambulance Service Board meeting was to establish the formation of the board and to approve the by-laws, which had already been accepted by the hospital board.

One of the major goals of the Ambulance Service Board is to make the community aware of the ambulance and what it offers. The board members are also considering methods of improving and developing the service to better accommodate the needs of the people in the county.

At the present time, the ambulance service employs three and a half full-time emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) who are responsible for providing 24-hour, seven day a week response. The technicians get in four to eight hours a day at the Ambulance Service Building doing maintenance on the ambu-

lance and checking supplies. The rest of the time they are on call. Hospital employees are also available to back up the ambulance crew.

The Ambulance Service Board would like to use volunteers to help man the ambulances in the near future. Volunteers for the service must be individuals who qualify by learning CPR and basic first aid, and passing a driving test. They would always be accompanied by at least one EMT during emergency runs. The volunteers would be recognized, but unpaid employees.

The board would also like to appoint individuals to serve as ex-officio board members. These persons would benefit the ambulance service by supplying information and attending board meetings.

An upcoming expense that concerns the board members is the need to replace the existing ambulances, which cost in excess of \$20,000. The board is hoping that the present ambulances will last until July 1984, the end of the ambulance service's fiscal year.

The Ambulance Service Board has approved the budget for the 1983 fiscal year. The Rockcastle County Ambulance Service is a

Armed intruder shot to death at Mullins Station Friday

An apparent attempted armed robbery has resulted in the death of a Rockcastle County man. John Dale Griffin, 20, of Livingston, was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County deputy coroner Roy Martin around 8 a.m. Friday morning.

According to Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor, Griffin was shot by Gracie Edenhelm around 5 a.m. Friday at her home in the Mullins Station section of Rockcastle County.

The details that led to the shooting are as follows.

Griffin apparently went to the residence of Burt and Gracie Edenhelm around 5 a.m. Friday morning and knocked on the door asking for gasoline and saying his name was Virgil Mullins.

Taylor said that the Edenhelm's did not answer the door. The first knock and Griffin knocked again. Mrs. Edenhelm then opened the door about a foot and Griffin kicked the door the rest of the way open, according to Taylor. Taylor said that Griffin stuck a 12 gauge shotgun in Mrs. Edenhelm's face and told her to give him all of their money or he was going to shoot her.

The sheriff said that Mrs. Edenhelm then opened fire with a 38 calibre pistol shooting four times at Griffin and striking him once in the throat.

Transportation Cabinet Accepting Bids

The state Transportation Cabinet will accept bids August 19 for repairs to bridges in Pulaski, Rockcastle and Russell counties.

An overlay, a waterproof surfacing, will be applied to the decks of the bridges to protect them from weather and winter salt. The overlay extends the life of the bridge.

The bridge in Rockcastle County to be repaired under the project is the one over Crooked Creek on Ky. 1004 (the Brush Creek Road).

Griffin then walked out of the house and fell into a nearby ditch where, according to Mrs. Edenhelm, he yelled for help. Mrs. Edenhelm said that she did not know how many more people were outside so she reloaded her gun and waited for the sun to come up.

According to authorities, Griffin was apparently pulled from the ditch by three boys, Tim, Marvin and Melvin Smith and placed in the backseat of a 1974 Maverick car.

Police said that the boys then drove about a mile back down the road to the Sinks area of the county and pulled the car into the head of a creek that runs along side the road.

Taylor said that the three boys then walked from Sinks to the home of Billy Renner at Pine Hill. Renner apparently drove the boys to the Rockcastle County Jail where they notified authorities of the shooting.

The Rockcastle County Ambulance Service was dispatched to the scene but by the time that ambulance attendants reached Griffin, he was dead.

Deputy Coroner Martin said that a preliminary

autopsy report revealed that Griffin died of a single .38 calibre gunshot wound to the neck, which caused internal hemorrhaging. Martin said that Griffin lived only about 10 minutes after the shooting.

Sheriff Taylor said that no charges had been filed in the case but that Trooper Marc Dailey, the investigating officer for the Ky. State Police, was still working on the case.

Taylor said that the matter would be taken before the Rockcastle County Grand Jury so that they could make the final decision on whether or not any indictments would be returned.

Griffin was born in Madison County on July 11, 1963, the son of Mattie Griffin and the late John Pigg.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Mattie Griffin; Johnnie, a son; Donna, Griffin, and one brother, Gary Griffin, all of Livingston.

Funeral services were held Sunday, August 7, at the Morning View Holiness Church by Bro. Billy Medley and Bro. Jasper Gantner. Burial was in the Red Hill Cemetery.

Funeral arrangements were by the Dowell and Martin Funeral Home.

Motorcycle accident claims life of local

A 20-year-old Rockcastle man died Saturday after the motorcycle that he was driving collided with a car, driven by Anthony Rader.

The victim, Douglas Eugene Stallworth of Mt. Vernon, was pronounced dead at the scene by county coroner, Bill Dowell.

The accident occurred at 2:55 p.m. at Pine Hill in Rockcastle County on U.S. 25, about four miles south of Mt. Vernon.

Stallworth lost control of his 450 Honda motorcycle and both he and the bike skidded about 80 feet on the roadway before striking a car.

Stallworth, who was not wearing a helmet, died of massive head injuries. Stallworth was alone on the motorcycle at the time of the accident, the coroner said. None of the passengers in the car was injured.

Stallworth was born

in Madison County on June 22, 1963 and was a member of the Sunrise Baptist Church.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. Fannie Renner; Stallworth of Mt. Vernon; five brothers, Wendell Renner of Route 1, Orlando, James P. Carr of Ft. East, Virginia; Frank Stallworth of Route 2, Orlando, Jack E. Stallworth of Route 1, Brodhead and Charles Stallworth of Mt. Vernon; four sisters, Mrs. Jean Huff of Richmond, Mrs. Mary Gilliam and Mrs. Betty Russell both of Mt. Vernon and Mrs. Judy Mullins of Route 1, Orlando.

He was preceded in death by one brother, Jerry Stallworth.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, August 9, at the Sunrise Baptist Church by Bro. Bradley Gantner. Burial was in the Elmwood Cemetery.

Mt. Vernon begins work on downtown revitalization

Another phase of the Downtown Revitalization project is now underway on the corner of Main Street, with the laying of new sidewalks on both sides of the street.

Matt Farwell, Jr. and Burgess Mullins are overseeing the project which includes new concrete, with a row of brick next to the business places, a row of brick next to the curb and brick enclosed tree wells that will have 10 trees on each side of the one block of Main Street.

In addition to the new walks, trees and brick beautification, new street lights will be added.

After the Main Street project in the one block area is completed, plans are to extend the trees, and brick part the Courthouse and along the new parking lot across from the courthouse.

The property owners are being asked to pay for the concrete in front of their business places. Other improvements are being financed by a \$4,700 grant and the City of Mt.

Vernon will help pay on part of the project. The City will furnish labor to install the concrete with the property owner to pay only for concrete.

Mr. Jeff Stampler of Rockcastle Nurseries has been awarded the contract to supply the trees and tree wells. Joe Hansel has been hired in care of all brick decorations.

Floyd Owens, Project Director, stated that the City local Development Corp. had been awarded another grant of \$3,100 to go into the Revolving Loan Fund, whereby the business property owners can borrow from this fund at a three percent interest rate and can be matched with a loan from the Bank of Mt. Vernon at the present interest rate.

The provision that the loans will be used to upgrade, repair and fix up the exterior of their businesses.

Mr. Owens also stated the second year program will start soon, adding that the project was de-

Hunting seasons open soon

It's hard to believe that it's time to start thinking about hunting again, but several seasons are just around the corner. Kentucky's statewide squirrel season opens August 20 and will run through October 31, with the second phase of the split season set for November 17 through December 31. The daily and possession limits remain at six and 12. Biologists are predicting higher squirrel popula-

tions than last year in Western Kentucky, but numbers should be lower in both the central and eastern regions of the state. These predictions are based on the 1982 mast crop, which was below par except in the west. A good crop of mast (seeds and nuts which provide important wildlife foods) will mean a lot of squirrels the next year, while low mast production leads to low populations. Overall, the mast crop was rated as light to moderate, so it looks like (Cont'd to P-8)

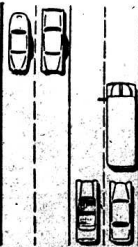

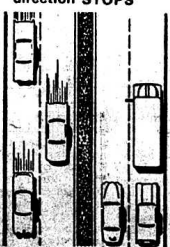


Every school bus is a 'STOP' signal

The bright yellow school bus, laden with children going to or from school, is a familiar sight on Kentucky highways.

It travels in the early morning, at midday, during afternoon rush hours, and, all too often, after dark. Whenever it travels, however, you, the motorist, must exercise special caution to protect the lives of its young passengers. A bus loading or unloading children will display a STOP sign and flashing red light.

If you meet a school bus loading or unloading children on a highway that is not divided by a median, you must stop - no matter which direction you are going - and wait until the bus moves on. On a divided highway, you must only stop if you are going in the same direction as the school bus; if you are across the median going in the opposite direction, you may proceed with caution. A painted area in the middle of the road is not a median and cars going in both directions must stop.

The STOP sign that swings out from the side of the school bus places the safety responsibility squarely on your shoulders. So be careful - the child you save may be your own.

Kentucky Revised Statute 189.270 states:

"Whenever any school bus or church bus used in the transportation of children is stopped upon a highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers, the operator of a vehicle approaching from any direction shall bring his vehicle to a complete stop and shall not start up or attempt to pass until the bus has completed receiving or discharging passengers and has been put into motion; provided, that this stop requirement shall not apply to vehicles proceeding in the opposite direction from a church or school bus which is stopped upon a highway where multilane roadways providing for opposite directions of travel are separated by a raised, depressed, mountable or non-mountable median."

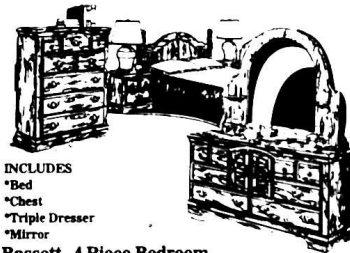

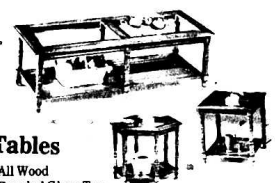

Water-Drink It Up This Summer

During extremely hot weather, water is a necessary and very important nutrient. Strenuous exercise or work in intense heat increases the need for water.

In case you didn't know why it's so important, water is a part of every cell, even the solid tissues that form bone. It accounts for approximately 50-60 percent of adult body weight and is needed for the various chemical reactions that occur in body. Specifically, water is necessary for:

- Transport-moving nutrients and oxygen to cells, waste products out of the body, enzymes to reaction sites, and blood to cells throughout the circulatory system.

Temperature Control-cooling the body through perspiration, allowing heat to escape when water evaporates on the skin.

Since water does so much for your body, make sure you drink enough.

Adults require approximately two quarts of water daily. Actual amounts vary with body size, diet, the amount of physical activity, temperature, and humidity. For example, besides hot weather and strenuous activity, consuming large amounts of protein or salt also increases an individual's need for water.

As a general rule, adults should get the equivalent of six to eight glasses of liquids daily to assure enough water for bodily functions.

Your body obtains water not only from beverages but also from food and internal metabolic processes. Although beverages furnish the greatest share of our water needs, solid and semi-solid foods provide a surprising amount of water.

Plain water is a refreshing thirst quencher in hot water as is a cold piece of watermelon. Try these recipes for other delicious sources of water this summer.

- Gaspacho**
- 4 stalks celery, cut into 1" pieces
 - 1 green pepper, quartered into 1/2 inch cubes
 - 1/2 medium cucumber, cut in half lengthwise
 - 3 large tomatoes, peeled & quartered

- 1 Tablespoon fresh parsley leaves
- 1 clove garlic, peeled
- 3 cups tomato juice
- 1/4 cup tarragon-flavored white wine-vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon hot sauce

Position on chopping plate cover on top. With processor running, quickly drop half of celery, half of green pepper, half of cucumber, 8 tomato quarters, onion, parsley and garlic through food chute. Process until finely chopped (stop processor and scrape down sides, if necessary). Remove mixture to a large bowl, add set aside.

Position blend in processor bowl. Add remaining celery, green pepper, cucumber, and tomato. Pulse 2 or 3 times or until vegetables are coarse-

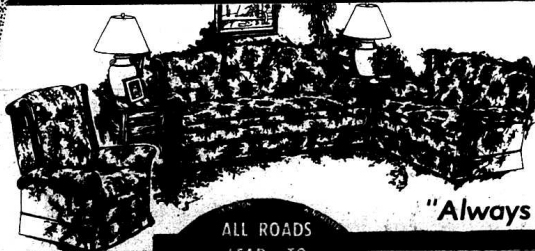

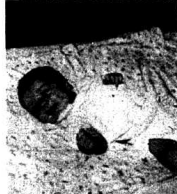

squirrel hunters are going to have to hunt a little harder this year.

The first phase of the dove season will open September 1 and will continue through October 31. The second phase is scheduled for December 3 through December 11.

Dove limits remain at 12 daily and 24 in possession, but there have been changes in the shooting hours, which now extend

from 11 a.m. until sunset. In the past, shooting hours for doves have been from noon until one-half hour before sunset.

These longer shooting hours should benefit the late-season hunter, who doesn't have much daylight in December. But hunters should remember that "sunset" isn't necessarily when the sun dips behind the horizon, but is a specific time which changes daily. You'll still have to check the newspaper or other source to find the

official sunset time—the one that the conservation officer is using.

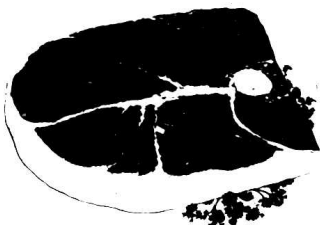

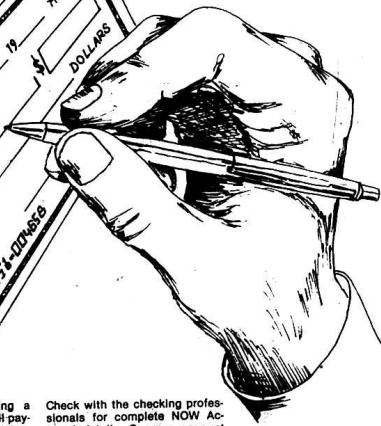
