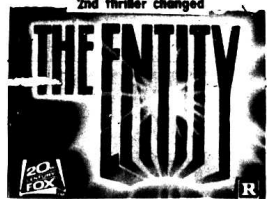

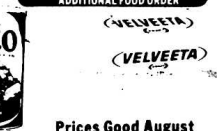

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Foster children may also be eligible for these meals. Families with foster children should contact the school for information regarding benefits. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be verified at any time and at a minimum each school district must verify 25 of all applications. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A statement of current income, names of all household members, and social security numbers of all adult household members are required plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct. Households receiving meal-benefits are required to report increases of income of \$50 per month or \$600 a year or a decrease in the household size.

If a household's income decreases or if household size increases during the school year, the household should contact the school to file a new application since such changes may make the children of the household eligible for meal benefits if the income is within the income guidelines.

Under the provisions of the policy a school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the determination, he/she may contact either orally or in writing the following official:

Western tour to N.E.H.C.

Three women from Rockcastle County made the 17 day Western Tour to the National Extension Homemakers Conference in Laramie, Wyoming, July 22 to August 7, 1983. The women were - Norietta Thompson, Gladys and Elizabeth Mullins. They joined 137 other women from all over Ken-

tucky that met in Lexington to board four Greyhound Charter Buses. The bus took them through Indianapolis, Indiana, through Illinois to Davenport, Iowa for their first night on Friday, July 22. On Saturday, July 23, they traveled across Iowa into South Dakota, after visiting the Herbert Hoover National Historic Site in Westbranch, Iowa. The birthplace cottage, the blacksmith cottage, the Friends Meeting House, and the school were all opened to the public.

On Sunday, July 24, they had a Christian Service by those on the bus, before stopping in Mitchell, South Dakota to examine the World's only Corn Palace, formerly called the "Corn Belt Exposition". The annual re-decoration costs about \$30,000 and requires between two to three thou-

sand bushels of corn, grain and grasses, all of which are in their natural color making beautiful giant murals. One farmer wife on the bus exclaimed, "Just think how many cattle that could be fed with all that corn!"

On through the Badlands, a wonderland of bizarre, colorful spires and pinnacles massive buttes and deep gorges. The forces which carved these features have not only created a unique topography, they have given a strange beauty to an almost desolate land. The Indians named this area the Badlands because they made it hard to get to their hunting grounds. A stop was made at the Wall Drug. It promised free ice water, dusty motorists and coffee for 5 cents cup. Merchandise ranges from the usual drugstore items to steer skulls, cowboy boots, Sioux-made moccasins, snake bit serum, Levi's and leather chaps. And yes, you can still get a prescription filled. Gladys Burgess ate a buffalo burger here. They spent the night in Rapid City, South Dakota where they saw S.D. Black Hills covered by dark, dark, green pines.

Monday, July 25, they went to Mount Rushmore National Memorial where they viewed the famous granite carving of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt before proceeding to Cody, Wyoming. That night they enjoyed the "World's Capitol of great rodeo's in Cody. Some of the group visited Bill Cody's Museum.

On Tuesday, July 26, they went into the oldest, largest and best-known park in America - Yellowstone National Park. They enjoyed a guided tour and saw "Old Faithful" the most spectacular of all geysers. We left this sight to travel to Jackson, Wyoming, located in the heart of the Grand Tetons, that rise to over 7,000 feet above the valley that has a landscape that is unique in America.

Wednesday, July 27, they took a 10 mile ride down the rapid Snake River, and best-known prepy, a mother Canadian duck and babies and a bald eagle on the top of the tall pine trees surveying his domain. The front rapids gave us thrills and closer sight of the Grand Tetons topped with snow. Norietta Thompson exclaimed, "I wish the Snake River had been more rapid!"

They traveled in covered wagons pulled by huge horses up a canyon to a campsite located on the bank of a clear mountain stream to a "West coast" and Wild West Show by the Bar-T-Five, descendants of pioneers of the early wild west. Thursday, July 28, they left for Salt Lake City, Utah, where they toured the Historic Temple Square covering

a ten acre site in the hear to fite city. They were lucky to hear their world famous choir rehearse Thursday night. Friday they had a half day guided tour of Salt Lake City, ending up at the Great Salt Lake, where bathers floated easily on the salty waters, one of the world's wonders!

Saturday, July 30, they traveled to Laramie, Wyoming, where they spent the next six nights and five days, attending the National Extension Homemakers Club Conference.

The 2000 Homemakers at Laramie had representatives from each of the U.S.A.'s 50 states. These homemakers will use information learned during the week-long conferences to improve and enhance programs in their states and local clubs.

On Wednesday night, Wyoming homemakers featured numerous exhibits and demonstrations with booths, tents, etc. around a one acre grassy lot on the University of Wyoming Campus. A chuck-wagon supper followed this exhibit for the western-dressed homemakers.

50-year homemaker members were honored at a luncheon on Thursday. An Indiana bus driver

drove a bus load, of 50 year or more members down the ramp into the center of the "Dome on the Range" the university's arena. There they received their honors from the U.S.A.'s Homemaker's president, Marge Griffin. They saw the Western Style Show, also. Elizabeth Mullins took part in the 50 Year Member Recognition.

The Kentucky Group had a total of 162 at the N.E.H.C. Conference, the largest state group attending!

Before leaving this vicinity, they visited Estes Park, the Rocky Mountain National Park in Colorado. The views, on the way, were spectacular!

On Friday, August 5, they started their homeward journey, driving to Lincoln, Nebraska for the night.

Saturday, August 6, they went south to Independence, Missouri and visited Harry S. Truman's presidential office and area. Elizabeth Mullins almost reached over the rope and played a one finger tune of the Missouri Waltz on Harry's piano, but was told not to cause a riot!

Mr. and Mrs. W.J. McKinley of Kansas City, Kansas came to Crown Center in Kansas City, Missouri for a 2 hour visit

with Rockcastle friends while they shopped where surprises never end. The last night was spent in Columbia, Missouri. Then on Sunday, August 7, after devotions on the bus, they viewed the Gateway to the West and stopped at Mt. Vernon, Illinois for lunch. They arrived in Lexington, Ky. at 7:15 p.m., feeling that the cost of this tour was well spent.

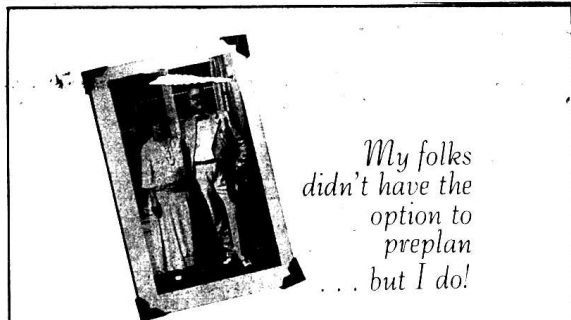

Five Common Faults Of Homemade Pickles
Soft, shriveled, hollow, too dark or pale and whitish-what happened to your homemade pickles to make them turn out that way?

Taking a loot at jar after jar of pickles that failed, here are some of the possible reasons why it might have happened:

Soft pickles: you used too weak a brine, or you didn't keep the cucumbers or other vegetables covered with brine, or you over processed them, or the seal was faulty, or you used moldy (old) garlic or spices.

Shriveled pickles: you put them in too strong a solution of brine, vinegar or sugar; or you overcooked or overprocessed them.

Hollow pickles: You let them stand more than 24 hours before brining, used poorly developed cucumbers, or too strong or weak a brine during fermentation.

Darkened pickles: you used hard water instead of soft, ground spices instead of whole, too much spice, or iodized salt. (Use coarse salt only).

Pale, whitish pickles: You didn't brine the pickles properly.

Doing It Right
Having your pickles turn out well every time means going back to some of the fundamentals. It means using fresh, firm fruits and vegetables and high-quality ingredients, following an up-to-date recipe, and then processing the pickles in a boiling-water-bath canner for exactly the number of minutes given. It means making sure the seals are

tight and then storing them in a dark, cool place and using within a year.

Usually, you should start counting processing time when the water comes back to boiling after the jars are put in the canner. However, with fermented cucumbers and fresh-pack dills, you should start counting as soon as the jars are first placed in the actively-boiling water in the canner. This prevents a cooked flavor and loss of crispness in these pickles.

- Bread and Butter Pickles
- 1 gallon sliced cucumbers
- 8 small white onions, sliced
- 2 green peppers, shredded
- 5 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons turmeric
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 2 teaspoons mustard seed
- 2 teaspoons celery seed
- 5 cups vinegar
- 1/4 cup coarse salt

Mix sliced cucumbers, onions, shredded pepper

and salt. Cover with cold water (ice water, is possible) and let stand 3 hours. Drain well.

Bring vinegar and spices to boiling. Add vegetables, reduce flame, and simmer for a few minutes, but not until cucumbers are soft. Pack in hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Adjust jar lids. Process 5 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner. Makes 7 pints.

- Mixed Vegetable Pickles
- 1 qt. small cucumbers
- 2 c. pickling onions
- 2 c. small pieces of cauliflower
- 2 c. carrots, cut in 1/4" circles
- 2 c. string beans
- 1/4 c. coarse salt
- 1 qt. water
- 1/4 cup white mustard seed
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 qts. vinegar

Cover vegetables with a brine made from the salt and water. Let stand overnight. Drain, cover

vegetables with clear water, and let stand for 2 hours. Drain, cover with mixture of sugar and vinegar, and let stand overnight.

Drain off the vinegar and heat it to simmering. Then add vegetables and simmer 15 minutes. Pack in hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Adjust jar lids. Process 10 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner.

Drought Stress Corn

The corn situation is very critical in several areas of Kentucky with many fields having little or no grain development. When corn is in a severe heat and drought stress condition, the formation of an ear shoot and silking is suppressed and delayed.

How should this corn be handled? The best way to use this corn is for silage and not as a forage crop. The corn should be left in the field for silage until it reaches 35% dry matter. This will be longer than you think because drought stressed corn will have more moisture in the stalk than when it appears. Leaving it in the field a long as possible will allow more dry matter production. When cut as silage for the silo cut as low to the ground as possible for most tonnage.

What is the feeding value of drought stressed corn? Basically, it is a good feed. The energy level is nearly as high as normal corn silage. The protein level may be even higher. TDN and digestibility may be a little lower than normal silage but the little extra fiber will probably be needed by the animal. Get a forage test and balance the ration.

What is the danger of nitrate poisoning? The highest potential for nitrate poisoning is when this corn is fed as green chop, grazed when green, or cut and baled for feed. There is almost no danger of nitrate poisoning from feeding properly ensiled corn silage. The nitrates are dissipated during the ensiling process. However, the silage should not be fed for at least three weeks after ensiling. DANGER: Dangerous gases are produced in the silo during the ensiling process. Do not enter the silo until it is well aired out.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF MT. VERNON,

SECTION ONE: The entire budget document is hereby adopted for fiscal year, 1984 and the revenue to be received is appropriated for the following expenditures in each fund as summarized in this section:
