year "there are over 50,000 children abducted by strangers and 100,000 young people stolen by non-custodial parents across the country. Many of these young people later get involved in prostitution, pornography and drugs."

McConnell said that kidnapping by non-custodial parents is also a real threat to a child's well-being. "If the courts did not give that parent cus-

lody, you can pretty much figure there was a good reason for that decision," he explained.

"According to McConnell, the Task Force will be holding its seventh and final public hearing in England in early September. "After that," McConnell said, "the group will issue a final report that will include its findings and a series of legislative initiatives it will recommend to help protect Kentucky's children."

Sheriff's department confiscates half million worth of marijuana

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department has confiscated the largest single field of marijuana in the county's history. A half-acre of the illegal weed was discovered growing in the Quail section of Rockcastle County recently and last Monday evening, the sheriff's department took appropriate steps to destroy the patch, according to Sheriff William Taylor.

Taylor said the approximately 4,000 plants confiscated had a street value of around \$500,000 and that most of the plants were from 5 to 8 feet in height. He said the crop appeared to be about 6 weeks from harvest and that the half-acre had been set with a tobacco setter and cultivated with a tractor. The land the mari-

juana was found growing on is being leased at the present time by Charles D. (Cont'd to P-17)

County sets 'Tax Rate' for coming year

Rockcastle County's property tax rate is higher for 1983 despite an almost two cent drop in the county's rate on personal property from last year. The Fiscal Court approved the tax rate at a special called meeting last Wednesday. Taking advantage of

the 4% increase that is allowed by law each year, the court raised the tax rate for the general fund from .082 to .084 per one hundred dollar assessment on all real estate for 1983. Following the court's lead, the health department raised their rate from .025 to .027; the library upped their rate from .010 to

.011; the agriculture department raised their rate from .013 to .016 and the Soil Conservation Service took the biggest increase, going from .015 to .020. However, the SCS did not set a rate for personal property. The county's total tax levy for 1983 is 14.0 compared to 13.15 for last

School heads respond to achievement test rankings

"It was the worst our students have ever done on these tests," instructional supervisor Doug Hamm said Monday, "but, if we don't improve next year, I'll say I don't know what else to do."

The school system is pinning its hopes of improving the scores on two main additions to its school program - (1) the addition of another instructional supervisor to work full-time in the elementary classrooms and (2) the development of a Skills Continuum for each grade.

According to a statement, prepared for publication by Superintendent Charles Parsons, and which addresses the problem, the addition of another full-time instructional supervisor will help alleviate the problem as principals not being able to spend the required amount of time in the classroom because of other pressing duties.

The Skills Continuum sets out what skills students will be expected to learn before being promoted to the next grade.

Other parts of the report, which Mr. Hamm said he concurred with fully, deal with new strict time schedules; limiting all classroom interruptions; better use of test scores; encouragement to parents to keep children in school every day possible and asking teachers to assign meaningful homework. The statement lists many plans for the list system and reads, in full, as follows:

Why Were Test Scores Low This Year?

It is very hard to an-

swer that question I do not know specifically why the scores were low this year. We have all the mechanism in place for a good school program. We have:

a. Well-qualified teachers in every classroom many with 5 years of college training.

b. The pupil/teacher ratio is within state guidelines.

c. Every student has the required textbook.

d. The teaching materials furnished are above state requirements.

e. The daily schedule contains over the required 6 hours of instruction time.

f. We transport every student not in reasonable walking distance.

g. We have a qualified supervisor who works county-wide.

Any student who has the desire and the motivation to learn will do well in the Rockcastle County Schools.

Despite the ranking I am proud of our school system. Our graduates are competing well with their peers. However, we have set some things in motion to improve the test scores next year.

For one thing we are short on supervision. We have one supervisor who works county-wide. He cannot cover all the schools properly. Principals are supposed to spend 50% of their time supervising the instructional program. However, principals carry out the classroom because of other pressing duties. Consequently, supervision suffers.

To remedy this problem, I plan to recommend to the school board to employ one additional instructional supervisor to work full-time in the elementary classrooms to help teachers carry out the elementary instructional program.

B. We have developed a Skills Continuum for each subject taught at each grade level. Students will be expected to learn the prescribed skills before being promoted to the next

Lack of rain has caused severe crop damage

Bentley Sparks reflects upon 83 years in and around Mt. Vernon

If you want to trace the progress made in Mt. Vernon during the century, Bentley Sparks would be a good man to talk to. When Sparks was interviewed on his 83rd birthday, he had a lively answer for every question asked.

Sparks was born in Livingston on August 10, 1900, and moved to Mt. Vernon with his family in October, 1907. Although he has left Rockcastle County on several occasions to pursue work elsewhere, Mt. Vernon is the place he considers home.

Sparks was 7 when he moved to Mt. Vernon and he soon learned that living in town had its advantages. A short while after settling here, his family was visited by a woman and her 7-year-old daughter. It was love at first sight. "I said then I was going to marry her," remarked Sparks and laughed at the thought.

But he kept his promise and on June 20, 1920, they were married. Christine Davis was the little girl who has now become his wife for 63 years. Their marriage produced three children: Jane Davis, Alfred (now deceased) and Ann Logan. They also have eight grandchildren and seven great-grand-

children.

Sparks began his education at Brown Memorial, a private Presbyterian School that was located near where Convenient is now. He had to pay \$1.50 a month to attend. It wasn't until 1913 that Brown Memorial was made in a public school. He went there through his freshman year, but after that he was finished with formal education. "I got too smart," he said.

The W.J. Sparks Company owned all the quarries in the county in the early 1900's. Bentley Sparks' father, A.B. and his uncle, W.J., were partners in the company that provided the L&N Railroad and highways with stone.

The first quarry to be opened up in the county was at Mullins Station in the 1860's. Sparks Quarry was opened up at Burr around 1900 and the Mt. Vernon Quarry opened in 1908. Bentley Sparks worked as foreman at both the Sparks and Mt. Vernon Quarry. At the age of 19 he was responsible for managing 75 to 100 men at the quarry at Burr.

Sparks was the first man to operate the first steam shovel in the county. That was in 1923 and the shovel could load three-fourths yard of rock.

When W.J. Sparks died in 1928, the company sold out to Kentucky Stone and Bentley Sparks became what he called a "globetrotter".

As a globe-trotter, he followed construction work and was an operating engineer for large shovels. He worked for awhile in southern Tennessee, and then moved on to Cincinnati, Ohio in 1941.

The farthest he went for work was Costa Rica in 1948. Mrs. Sparks and their daughter Ann Logan went with him and they stayed there over two years while he worked on the Pan American Highway. That was a time when their family was scattered. Alfred was stationed in the Pacific in the Navy and Jane was finishing a degree at Phillips University in Oklahoma.

The Sparks family found things very different while they lived in Central America, but they consider that trip one of their best experiences. While they were there they stayed in an American Colony. About 30 American couples were in Costa Rica at the same time during the building of the highway and each family had a house built by natives.

Although they had modern conveniences, they

were located inland, so they had to make the hours in a half flight to San Jose whenever they needed supplies.

Sparks was forced to return in 1958 when an accident left him unable to work. Horses are his hobby, and in 1959, he turned that hobby into a livelihood. He went in with a partner and they bought a ranch in California. They bought and sold horses there for about 11 years and made a pretty good thing.

By about 1970, though, Sparks got homesick. "I was ready to come home," he said unabashedly. When he and his wife returned to Mt. Vernon they moved near the house where Sparks had grown up - the building that is now Dowling-Martin Funeral Home.

For six or seven years, the two of them traveled to Florida to spend the winter in a trailer, but they haven't done that for the last three years. "I have three awful smart children who decided I was too old to pull a trailer and stopped me," he explained.

Just this year he has ridden on four rides with them.

Sparks enjoyed reminiscing about how things used to be and has an uncanny memory for dates.

He remembered a baseball game that was played at the old fairgrounds in Mt. Vernon in 1921. Of the nine members of the team,

Rockets win opening game over Pulaski County 24-15

The Rockets won their opening game last Friday night at Pulaski County, 24-15, but it was a hairy situation for a while with the Rockets repeatedly penalized in critical situations and a safety and a touchdown called back because of penalties.

Offensive player of the week was senior running back Scotty Robinson, who gained 179 yards in 26 carries, scored all of the Rockets' touchdowns and all but two of the extra points.

The Maroons drew first blood on a drive set up by a back snap to the Rockets' punter which sailed over his head and was recovered by Pulaski County on the Rockets' 20 yard line. Three plays later, the Maroons quarterback connected with a receiver in the end zone for the touchdown with 5:37 remaining in the first quarter. The extra point kick was good and the Maroons had the lead 7-0.

The Maroons threatened again in the first quarter, when another poor Rocket punt gave PC the ball on the Rockets' 40 yard line. However, senior Burley Burkhardt caught the Pulaski runner behind the line of scrimmage and a short pass for an eight-yard pick-up and two incomplete passes, gave the Rockets possession of the ball on their own 35-yard line.

With 5:39 left in the second quarter, the Rockets got on the scoreboard on a touchdown set-up by a 32-yard run by quarterback Chris Cornelius. Cornelius hadn't intended to run but couldn't find an open receiver so he just tucked the ball away and scrambled desperately, and gained the 32 yards needed for the first down on the Maroons' 16. On the next play, Robinson shook loose for the TD and then scored the two extra points.

Shortly afterwards, the Rockets threatened again after senior Greg Long intercepted a Maroons' pass on the Rockets' 47 yard line. Robinson picked up 17 yards in two carries and then was stopped for no gain and he had the ball 1st and 10 on the Rockets' 49 yard line but, one of the few penalties against the Maroons in the game, a 15-yarder for a personal foul, and good pass defense by junior Mike Bryant, put the Maroons in a 4th and 20 situation and they had to punt.

The Maroons took the Rockets' kick-off and returned it to near mid-field and they were helped in their cause by a face mask penalty on the play. The Maroons then had the ball 1st and 10 on the Rockets' 44 yard line but, one of the few penalties against the Maroons in the game, a 15-yarder for a personal foul, and good pass defense by junior Mike Bryant, put the Maroons in a 4th and 20 situation and they had to punt.

Pulaski began their drive from their own 49 yard line and, on the first play, Burkhardt separated the runner from the ball on the first play from scrimmage. He and Robinson claimed it for the Rockets and it was 1st and 10 for the Rockets on the Maroons' 49 yard line.

Fain picked up a first down for the Rockets to Pulaski's 38 yard line. Then, Robinson was stopped for no gain, one of the few times during the game,

and, on the next play, he recovered a Rockets' fumble only to be slugged for his efforts by a Pulaski player who was ejected from the game. The rest of the third quarter was spent with the Rockets gaining yards on the ground only to see a lot of them taken away by penalties. However, they did manage to gain more than that. A penalized and, just before the quarter ended, the Rockets were on PC's five-yard line with 2nd and goal.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Robinson went in for the score and then tacked on the extra points and it was 16-7. Then, on the Rockets' kick-off, the Pulaski County player tried to bring the ball out of the end zone but was tackled by a Rocket. Two of the referees signaled a safety and the score went up on the board but another of the referees decided the ball was dead before the hit was made and the Rockets suddenly found themselves without the score. Coach David Hansel protested loudly and strong but to no avail.

The Maroons moved the ball from their 20-yard line down the field and with the help of a pass interference call against the Rockets, wound up with the ball on the Rockets' 14-yard-line with a 1st and 10. Cornelius saved a touchdown on the next play with a tackle on the four-yard line and Burkhardt and Robinson stopped the runner the next time. But, again, the Rockets were hit with a penalty for too many players on the field and it was 1st and goal on the 2 for the Maroons.

PC went in for the score on the next play and then passed for two extra points, putting them within one point of the Rockets at 16-15.

The Rockets showed great guts and determination on the next series. After beginning their drive from the 20, Cornelius picked up 15 for a first down to the 35. There was a fumble between Cornelius and the back on the next play but Cornelius recovered the ball and gained two yards, making it 2nd and 8. Robinson then picked up 6 and senior Jeff Hansel got within inches of the first down. Cornelius kept on the next play and got the first at the Rockets' 47.

However, this score was nullified by an offside penalty against the Rockets and it was 1st and goal again but from the 9 yard line this time. Robinson picked up three on the next carry and then went in for the touchdown on the next play after displaying an incredible determination. He was hit twice hard before reaching the goal but managed a surge over for the score with 3:30 left in the game.

Cornelius then kept the ball and ran it in for the extra points for the final score of 24-15.

Senior Bozie Kirby was named defensive player of the week by Rockets' coaches for his 6 individ-

ual tackles. Burkhardt was credited with 4 and several other Rockets were credited with 2 and 3 individual tackles each.

Other leading gainers in the contest were Jeff Hansel with 80 yards on 11 carries, Kirby got 35 yards in 4 carries, Fain racked up 30 yards in 8 carries and Cornelius got 73 yards in 8 carries.

Lineman of the week honors went to Elmer Robbins.

After the game, Coach Hansel said that his team was going to have to get their punting game straightened out or it would lose them some ball games. He credited Friday night's win over Pulaski primarily to the Rockets being in better shape.

Hansel also said, "Friday night's game at Whitley County is critical. They have 17 returning seniors but we have to win it since it is a district game. If we win this one, we may go undefeated for the season, if we don't, we may not win again until Casey County."

Last Friday night, Whitley County lost to a strong Everts team 26-2.

dar. This is the primary E. raising program for Little League and a good response is needed to assume a good football season.

The calendars will be of special interest to the community as it will contain the birthdates and wedding anniversaries of each family who buy a calendar. The calendar will begin with the month of January 1984 and will have a picture of the football team on the front.

On Thursday, August 25, after school, all players who wish to participate in a Little League football this year, should report to their respective school for registration. The fee this year will be \$15 per player.

C. We have established new and strict time schedules allotting more instructional time for the basic subjects of reading, math, science, etc. The new supervisor will work this year also.

D. Principals are to limit all classroom interruptions such as ballgames, assembly programs, visits, etc., announcements and

other types of disturbances that interfere with teaching time.

E. Better Use of Test Scores: A new supervisor will help teachers study the current test scores to see where each pupil's weaknesses are and provide lesson plans to strengthen the weak areas.

F. I am asking all parents to keep the student in school every day (90% attendance). The teachers can't teach the child if it is not in the classroom. Parents should not come to the school and pull their students out of class early because every hour of instruction is important. All these factors affect test scores.

G. Home Work: I am asking teachers to assign meaningful homework and to grade it and return it to the pupil. I know many parents frown upon homework, but for a good quality education, the 6-hour instructional day is not enough. To cut the homework, short is to cut the child's education. When we cut the child's education short, for any reason, we can expect lower test scores.

We think the test scores will look much better next year if everyone will work together to carry out these objectives.

HOME FROZEN SLAW IS CRISP WHEN THAWED

Make some frozen slaw from that bountiful cabbage crop. Served immediately after thawing, it's crisp and good.

- 1 cup vinegar
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 medium head of cabbage (4 or 5 cups) and 1 carrot. Add 1 tablespoon of salt and let stand for one hour. Squeeze out all liquid. Cover shredded cabbage and carrots with vinegar mixture and toss. This will keep 6 months or longer at zero degrees in your freezer. After thawing, it will keep several days in the refrigerator.

"They liked to have hung us for that," said Sparks. "But we didn't have any money to build street."

He also remembers when the first stock law was passed in Mt. Vernon. The year was 1908 and when the first cow got loose, its owner was fined \$5.00.

Has Bentley Sparks mellowed in his old age? "Of course, everybody does," he said. "Old people aren't as mean as young people. I used to be a little hateful, but I'm not now. As for my wife, she isn't as mean as she used to be."

He was a little more serious when he said, "I've had two or three pretty close calls. The Lord would not have taken care of me. I thank my stars every day, several times a day, how good the Lord has been to me. He runs the show. He does it all."

Sparks qualified everything during the interview at one point when he said, "Part of that could be lies, but there isn't anybody living that could dispute it."

"And I believe Bentley Sparks would have an answer ready if they did. He mellowed a little, but at 83 he's still not a pushover."

"TAXES"

Hale said the biggest reason this year's assessment is low is that the Homestead Exemption was raised from \$12,900 to \$15,000 by the state.

"There are a lot of people in that county that won't have to pay any property tax this year due to the exemption," Hale added.

The Rockcastle County School Board, which is also on real estate in their rate each year, followed suit with the county and raised their rate on real estate from .068 to .077. However, the board's rate on personal property is the same as last year at .095.

"Although the county's rate on personal property last year was 10.1, this year property owners are getting a break. The county set this rate at 8.2. All the other county departments' rate for personal property stayed the same, except the library, and the total tax levy on personal property for 1983 dropped from 18.22 to 14.27."

"I was on the town board from 1927 to 1929," he went on. The county had only raised a little over \$3000 from taxes during that time, so the town board put in two pool halls to raise money. They also passed the first occupational tax for business places. The town residents weren't pleased with the tax.

is going - then wonder no more, the state of Kentucky is getting it. The state rate on real estate is 22.1c and 15c on personal property. A rate of 25c was set by the state on intangible property and 45c will be raised on tangible personal property.

The county's total assessment on personal property for 1983 is \$38,180,261, up by almost three million dollars over last year.

The Fiscal Court set their tax rate at 19c on bank shares while the state gets a whopping 85.5c.

Anyone who owns private forest land will be charged an additional 3c per acre for fire prevention.

The County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper and the Fiscal Court Magistrate Donald Rowe, voted for the next tax rates.

"RAIN"

By the local ASCS office to allow farmers to use land set aside in the Conservation Use Acreage program (PIK).

Harold Ballinger, ASCS office manager, said the request had never proved but farmers would have to come into the office and ask to use the PIK acres for acreage. Ballinger said that the set-aside acreage could not be cut for hay.

According to the report, the drought started in the county the latter part of May and has gotten continually worse.

Normal rainfall expected in May was 5.4 inches and, over the entire county, only 2 inches fell; in June, 3.8 inches fell and 6.2 inches is the normal expected; in July, 3 of an inch fell out of 4.1 inches expected and, through August, only 2 or an inch has fallen in a month when 3.3 inches is the normal amount of rainfall.

"There are a few areas that have fared a little better, such as lower Wilde and some parts of the Quail Creek area," Ballinger said you could go a mile in either direction from these areas and it would be as dry as anywhere in the county. Some farmers are going ahead and cutting their tobacco immediately after topping it as an effort to salvage at least part of their crop, Ballinger added.

Private water supplies are also getting low with some sources already dried up, Ballinger also said.

Temperatures Are High;

Rainfall is Short
Local weather records keeper Roy Cox reports that August of 1983 is, so far, the hottest, driest one on record since 1979. The high temperature recorded thru August 21 was 102 degrees on Sunday, August 21.

So far, only .85 of an inch has fallen and only 21 days in August, 14 recorded temperatures of 90 degrees or above. However, the county, the Ottawa section received about two inches of rain.

In August of 1979, total rainfall was 4.99 inches and the highest temperature recorded was 92 degrees.

It was hotter in August of 1980, and drier. The high temperature recorded was 98 degrees and only 3.72 inches of rain fell. There were only 24 days out of the month when the temperature climbed to 90 degrees or higher.

August of 1981 was pretty comfortable with a high temperature recorded of 88 degrees and 4.49 inches of rain.

Last year's August was also not too bad. High temperature recorded was 91 degrees and 8.33 inches of rain fell. On only three days was a temperature of 90 degrees or better recorded.

Some observers reported that on Sunday, August 21, the time and temperature machine in front of the Barren County Courthouse showed a high recording of 100 degrees. Mr. Cox said this was possible due to the difference between the temperature reading mechanism.

Telephone bills increasing again

Customers of the Continental Telephone Co. of Kentucky will soon be seeing an additional charge on their telephone bills.

The Kentucky Court of Appeals in June ordered the state Public Service Commission to add a temporary surcharge to the bills of Continental's customers. The surcharge, which was effective August 1, will raise local service bills by 3.95 percent. It will appear on the bills for about a year or until the amount ordered by the court is collected.

The surcharge comes from a rate case the commission decided in September 1980. In its order in the case the commission approved a \$2.2 million increase. The company had requested \$4.5 million.

After having a request for rehearing denied, the Continental appealed the decision to the Franklin Circuit Court. The company claimed that it received \$114,000 in toll (long distance) settlements. The commission said the amount received was \$241,000, or \$127,000 more than the company claimed.

The circuit court, in a December 30, 1981 order, set aside the commission's adjustment and ordered a surcharge that would yield an additional \$241,000, plus interest.

The commission and the Attorney General's office appealed the decision to the Court of Appeals claiming, in part, that if a surcharge had to be approved it should be for \$127,000, not \$241,000.

Initially, the appeals court affirmed the circuit court order, but with conditions that the commission could have denied additional revenue. Later, the court vacated its order and adopted the circuit court order as its own.

The 3.95 percent increase comes from the \$241,000 plus taxes and interest for a total in additional revenue of \$585,000. The commission serves approximately 58,000 customers in all or parts of 20 counties in various parts of the state.

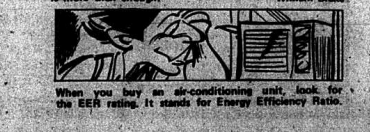

White Grub Damage

To Lawns
Those large dead patches on your lawn might not be the result only of all this dry weather we've been having. They could be the result of something much more harmful—white grubs. White grubs are the major insect pests of lawn grasses in Kentucky, according to Dr. Rudy Schelbner, Extension entomologist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

White grubs are the larval stage of several kinds of beetles, including May beetles, masked chafers, green June beetles and in some areas, Japanese beetles. They are C-shaped, chubby worms, white with brown heads and are 1/2 inch to 2 inches long when mature.

The grubs cause extensive lawn damage by eating the roots off grass, which reduces the grass's ability to take up enough water to withstand the stresses of hot, dry weather. As a result, large dead patches develop—some 5 to 20 feet in diameter. The sod on these dead patches is not well-

per square foot can be tolerated by a lawn that is well-watered.

A thorough soaking of the lawn every two weeks during dry weather is much more beneficial than frequent light waterings. However, counteracting white grub damage by watering may not be feasible if the turf area is very large, or if lawn irrigation is locally banned because of critical water shortages.

If natural controls or cultural practices are not enough to prevent extensive turf damage, then insecticide controls are necessary. For best results with insecticides, mow your lawn and rake out the dead grass and thatch before applying spray or granules. This will allow the insecticide to penetrate better, and will prevent much of it from becoming chemically bound to the organic matter.

The insecticide should be watered in immediately after application to the soil where the grubs are feeding. This is especially important for spray applications which may dry on the foliage and may not be washed in by later drenchings.

Granular insecticides may be easier to use, since the timing of irrigation is not so critical. Watering is best done with a lawn sprinkler. The soil under the sod should be wet to a depth of about one by the drenching. If you can apply the insecticide just before a good rain, so much the better.

Your best bet is to treat the lawn in early to mid-August, before large numbers of grubs infest your lawn. The grubs are causing noticeable lawn damage and there is less likelihood of being able to take advantage of rains. With the exception of milky disease spores, most insecticides have a relatively short life, so your application has to be more critically timed.

State entomologists warn that it is not worthwhile to use milky spore disease treatments unless you are sure the grubs are Japanese Beetle grubs since milky spore disease is effective only against the white grubs of Japanese beetles. The most prevalent white grub in Kentucky lawns is the masked chafers. In areas where adult Japanese beetles are a problem.
