Conservation District test plots to be maintained two more years

The Rockcastle Conservation District will be maintaining the forage test plots at Quall for an additional two years. The test plot area was established in April of 1982 by the Conservation District with assistance from several local businesses and in-

with assistance from several local businesses and individuals.

The forage test plot has a capacity of two acres and is divided into four parts. Each part contains a different legume and grass combination. The manner of the second contains and different legume and legumes (such as clovers) produce under good management. The test plots are clipped for hay at proper intervals and all lime and fertilizer is applied in accordance with soil tests.


