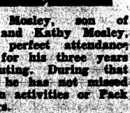

Fire guts Main Street building

An early Monday morning fire completely gutted a building on the south side of Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

Assistant Fire Chief Bud Cox said the fire apparently started about the middle of the upper level and probably caused by overloaded electrical wiring.

The building, which housed a pool room on the first floor, is owned by Billy Ray Moore, who, along with his wife and child, escaped from their upper level apartment without injury after Mr. Moore awakened to a smoke-filled bedroom about 1:45 a.m.

John Cox, Fire Chief, told the council Monday night that without the current nozzle (which sets on the street and puts out an arc of water to the roof of the building), the whole south side of Main Street would have been in danger.

The nozzle was purchased about a month ago by the city for the first department at a cost of \$1,500 and this was the first time it had been used, Cox said. The nozzle is capable of putting out 1,200 gallons of water per minute.

The building had formerly housed the post office, a bank, restaurant and bus station.

Tenants of the adjoining Mt. Vernon Hotel building left the building as a safety measure, Cox further said.

New vehicle title law now in effect

Effective September 6, a new vehicle title law went into effect in Kentucky, according to County Court Clerk Irene Bales said. The new law differs from the previous one mainly in that before the title could be issued at the same time as the registration for a car/truck bought or transferred.

Mrs. Bales said, the buyer and seller, for a private sale, must both come into the clerk's office and fill out an application for a title which will ask for such information as liens, actual mileage, etc.

However, car dealers will have the applications in their office and will fill out their portion of the application there so that a buyer will not have to bring the application into the clerk's office, Mrs. Bales said.

Council waiting to approve more water for Western

Jerry Cox, attorney for Western Water Association, and Buford Parkerson, a director, met with the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night to ask the council to approve the sale of more water to the association for the addition of 210 customers they plan to add.

Before the council discussed the matter, Mayor Roland Mullins asked Councilman Tom Welch to summarize the public meeting held two weeks ago concerning the problem some county residents are encountering in being provided service.

In his summary, Welch noted, that Western failed to ask the council, before applying for their grant and loan, if the city would be able to supply the additional water - estimated at a minimum of 25,000 gallons per day. Welch also said that Western is already exceeding their contract for 2 million gallons of water per month by using over 4 million now and he said that the city didn't know at this point, whether they could furnish all the water promised.

Welch said the primary reason for the public meeting two weeks ago was because he felt the city was being blamed for not supplying water to all residents who wanted it and he wanted them to know that it was not the city's fault.

The public meeting referred to by Welch was one at which Western was asked why they would be supplying out-of-county customers with water, under the planned expansion, when there were people in the county who had paid the \$75 meter charge - some several years ago - and were still not being serviced by the association. At that meeting, the engineer for Western's expansion project reportedly told the crowd of about 250 persons that only 25% of the 210 customers to be added would be outside the county.

However, Mullins told Cox and Parkerson Monday night that he had now learned the figure would be around 40% and he asked the two men if they would be willing to let the city purchase water for the 88 out-of-county customers from a water supplier in the county where the lines would be located.

Mr. Cox said this was not a realistic possibility since the expense would be prohibitive for Pulaski or Lincoln counties to supply water to the outages of their counties where the new lines would be laid.

Mullins said the same thinking could be applied to Rockcastle but Cox pointed out that theoretically, if the city is selling water to Western at a profit, then the expense to the city to supply these areas through the association is no greater.

Welch then reminded the council that people living near Mt. Vernon - particularly on the Sand Springs and Chestnut

Ridge roads are not even being supplied and Sand Springs Road could supply at least 20 customers on the one-mile stretch and 25 customers could be signed up in the same distance on Chestnut Ridge Road.

City Attorney Carl Clontz told the council that when an association, district or city goes after federal monies for grants and loans, they have to show that the projects can pay for themselves. There has to be so many customers to make the project feasible and so, when the lines are drawn, the route of the lines is drawn through areas with the highest population density. Thus Clontz said some areas of the county get priority over other areas - even though some of the areas not serviced are crowded with numbers of customers per mile.

Clontz also pointed out that the Red Hill road that is in the project the first two times the association submitted their expansion proposal, and both times the project was turned down. The problem, Clontz said, is that the

Red Hill area has to have a standpipe and thus the expansion up so high that the project becomes not feasible. The third time the project was submitted the Red Hill area was not included and the project was approved. Clontz added that he would ask the council if they were going to deny 122 people in the county water because it was not feasible to run lines on certain roads in the county. He said the feasibility of the project is what you have to have to sell it to the government to get the grants and loans.

Clontz also pointed out that the cost per mile differed over the county because of the terrain and number of potential customers on the lines for every road and he said they (Western) can't serve everyone in the county so you do the best you can to

The council decided to hold off on approving the request for additional water until they have a chance to see the proposed expansion routes and Cox (Cont'd to P-14)

Only the incumbent commissioners of Livingston have filed thus far. They are Todd Mink, Danny Bullock, Michael Robbins and Curtis McHargue.

These are the only caucuses which will be on the ballot in November since there is no school board election this year.

The November ballot will include state-wide races from Governor on down.

Resurfacing contracts awarded for 7.1 miles

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded two contracts to resurface 7.1 miles of roads in Rockcastle County.

G&G Kentucky Construction Co. of London received a \$93,712 contract to resurface 4.2 miles of Ky. 70, Brohead-Eubank Road, from the Pulaski County line to KY 1650.

The Allen Co. of Winchester was awarded a contract for \$44,824 to resurface Ky. 1912, Brush Creek-Orlando-Cross Road, from Ky. 1004 to the Brushy Creek bridge, a distance of 2.9 miles.

The projects are part of the state's 1983 resurfacing program for Rockcastle County.

Low interest rate mortgages to be available

Banks in 15 eastern Kentucky counties will be making a combined total of \$30 million in single family mortgage loans at 11 1/4% under the new mortgage revenue bond program which has been jointly approved by the counties.

Issued under the name of the Combined Counties of Kentucky, \$31.2 million in bonds were issued on August 30, 1983 and the funds will be available shortly. A total of

\$30,025,000 will be available for mortgages. In addition to the low interest rate, mortgage affordability will be enhanced by the 30 year term to maturity on the mortgage loans, which will sharply reduce monthly payments, and by the minimum down payment requirement of only 5%. These mortgages can be made for new homes or for the purchase of existing homes. The 15 counties include Carter, Casey, Clark, Clay,

Harlan, Laurel, Lawrence, Lee, Madison, Martin, Montgomery, Morgan, Rockcastle, Rowan and Russell. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds will provide the funds for the mortgages to be made by participating banks in these counties. (The Bank of Mt. I have read your paper for many months, thanks to a very good neighbor, Mrs. Arthur Walker, who lives across the road. More recently my brother, Dan Cook, brought me some recent copies. I get so much pleasure reading "Disputants", written by a person I knew when she was very small, Hilda Payne Gabbard, from 1912 to 1916, my father, Sherman B. Cook, had the con-

tract to carry the U.S. Mail from Climax to Boones Gap, Disputants and Rockford. I carried the route for about two years through 1914 and 1915, my mother being terminally ill. Sherman had to be at home with her. He received permission for me, from the fourth assistant Post Master General for me to carry the mail. I was only 16 years old at the time. O.M. Payne was postmaster at Disputants. As I remember, I arrived there at 9 a.m. before the General Store opened usually Mrs. Payne would bring the small children with her when she came up to open up. I would hand her the mail bag, she would set the little one on the counter top, then unlock the mail bag, taking out any mail for that post office, then insert the mail going out from Disputants. I would then mount my horse and head for Rockford and Boones Gap.

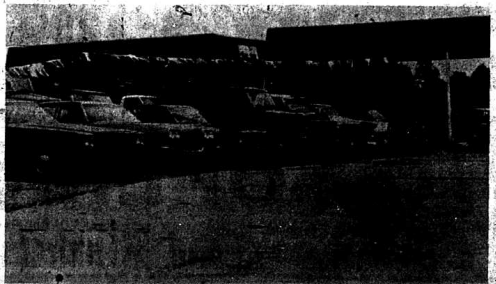

Tobacco Black Shank

Now is the time to identify black shank potential for the 1984 crop. The first step in black shank control for the 1984 crop is to determine how much black shank is present in this year's crop. Now is an excellent time to handle that chore because most phases of the disease are easily observed. Black shank has three distinct phases: (1) Root rot (hidden black shank), (2) Stalk or shank rot and (3) leaf blight. Hidden Black Shank is very common in Kentucky and this phase is difficult to recognize most years. However, the symptoms are very obvious this year. Affected plants appear stunted, die badly with some scalding or wilting in hot dry weather. The stalk or shank rot phase is easily detected because the plants wilt rapidly. Yellowing is extensive with burley. The lower part of the stem becomes charcoal black and the pith area inside the stem becomes hollow or separates into disks. The root system has usually rotted from the earlier hidden phase of

the disease, but not always. Leaf blight black shank is most common this year due to the extended dry weather, but some foliar blight has appeared following the recent rains. Symptoms of foliar black shank appear as large greenish-brown lesions with concentric rings. Usually, these lesions are on the bottom leaves where rain splash moved the fungus from the soil to these leaves.

If black shank infested plants are identified on the farm, the potential for significant damage in 1984 is great unless control strategies are implemented. Affected fields should be sown in grass to prevent erosion of soil infested with black shank fungus. Next year's field should not be located where heavy rains or flash floods would bring in black shank fungus. Equipment and tractor tires should be cleaned with a clorox solution to prevent the fungus from spreading to other fields. The Variety 17 which is somewhat resistant to black shank and use of Ridomil is recommended on farms which positively identify black shank.

Raising clean plants can be the key to keeping black shank off your farm. Most instances of black shank occur from outlying infected transplants or using setter water from infested creeks. Black shank has not been a problem in Brodhead, however, in the last two years, two fields have been with a majority in one community. Farmers in Central and Western Kentucky consider black shank as one of the most damaging diseases, and early prevention is necessary to prevent the spread locally.

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Rockets Lose To Clay Co

Head football coach David Hanson blamed Friday night's loss to Clay County primarily on mental factors — a couple of needed key breaks and the injuries and illness of several of his key players.

Hanson said Tuesday, "Clay County didn't slip up on us. We knew it was a hard game because they wanted revenge badly for their loss to us last year when they were also 3 and 0."

If we had been 100% healthy, the game would have been a toss-up because Clay County didn't run the game and we didn't know they had," Hanson added.

Hanson said that senior running backs Scott Robinson and Jeff Hanson had both had to go to the doctor twice between the two county and Clay County games and that the game was played with a temperature of over 100 degrees. And, James "Bozie" Kirby, also a starter back who had been plagued with back problems most of the year didn't even get to dress for the game.

Hanson didn't take anything away from the Tigers, saying they are a very good club and had a lot of good players. He also said their coaching staff had done an excellent job of preparing them, for the game and the team was really psyched up.

Prior to the Clay County game, the Rockets were ranked 8th in the Triple A standings. After this week's game, Clay County advanced to 5th and the Rockets dropped to 7th, Hanson said. But, he said the ratings are determined mainly on point spread and that was why Clay County didn't make any substitutions during the entire game.

Very few changes will be made in the Rockets' game plan, following their loss to the Tigers, Hanson said. He said they would like to make some changes because of the scouting reports and game films getting out to the other teams but he said basically the Rockets were a sound team.

On Friday night's game against the Berea Pirates, Hanson said the Rockets even though the Pirates are 1 and 3 at present, he has told his team not to look over them because in a rivalry game, records

don't mean much. He said the boys have worked hard this week and if their mental attitude lined out, they'll be okay.

The Tigers won the tonight's Friday night game and, as it turned out, the game as they took James Poynter's opening kick-off on their 3-yard line and returned it 91 yards for their first touchdown. program, borrowers who have an annual household income of under \$20,000, will be eligible for a substantial additional reduction of their monthly payment.

Under this "buydown" plan, a borrower's monthly payment of principal and interest will be initially reduced by a minimum of 12% and up to a maximum of 20% if necessary and the borrower will afford the mortgage. This buydown assistance will be gradually phased out so that after a period of years, the borrower will be making the fully monthly payment based on the 11 1/4% rate. However, the mortgage revenue bond program is a project of the Eastern Kentucky Bankers Consortium for Mortgage Lending. This consortium consists of 94 banks in a 46 county region, which includes the 15 counties participating in the bond issue. A total of 27 lending institutions are participating in the mortgage revenue bond program.

The consortium was originally formed in Jun, 1982. Its purpose is to promote the availability of more affordable mortgage loans by increasing the capacity of its member banks to use tools to facilitate the making of low interest, long term and low down payment financing. In an earlier initiative of the consortium begun last year, the consortium has worked closely with the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (commonly known as Freddie Mac), a Federal agency which purchases mortgage loans made by banks and other lenders. As a result, the number of consortium banks which are approved to do business with Freddie Mac has more than tripled from 6 to 12. The consortium has also achieved success in its initiative to reform the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) insurance program, by opening up the possibility for small rural banks to use the FHA's new simplified processing procedures.

The Mountain Association for Community, Economic and Development (MACED) has been serving as the coordinator of the consortium's activities, and is serving as the program Coordinator of the mortgage revenue bond program. MACED also has a direct financial role in the bond issue. MACED has made a cash grant of \$250,000 to the Program in order to support the special buydown program for borrowers with incomes under \$20,000. In addition, MACED has purchased \$1.1 million in subordinate bonds to cover the up front expenses of the bond program, thereby reducing the up front "cash outlay" required to be paid by the banks and the borrowers.

Federal law imposes purchase price limitations on homes financed by mortgage revenue bond programs. Generally, for the counties covered by the new bond program, these limits currently are \$79,080 for new homes and \$59,520 for existing homes. In Laurel County, the limits are \$79,490 for new housing, and \$54,560 for existing housing.

In addition to the 15 counties which have banks receiving allocations to make mortgage loans, there are five additional counties (for a total of 20 altogether) which are participating on a deferred basis. These five deferred counties are Floyd, Johnson, Boone, Campbell and Kenton counties. These counties all have existing mortgage revenue bond programs outstanding and thus are not in a position to participate in the new program at this time. However, as a later date, lenders in these counties will be eligible for reallocations that may occur.

water at one point. He said, "I am tickled to death with your (Western's) 1.2 million dollar project and your 22 county customers and I'm happy about Lincoln and Pulaski counties, but I just wish you could buy water for your customers (outside the county) somewhere else."

After some discussion concerning private haulers already operating in the city, the council directed City Attorney Carl Clontz to prepare an ordinance creating a franchise for the council's permit at the next meeting. If the council approves the ordinance, the next step would be for the council to advertise for bids on the franchise, Clontz said.

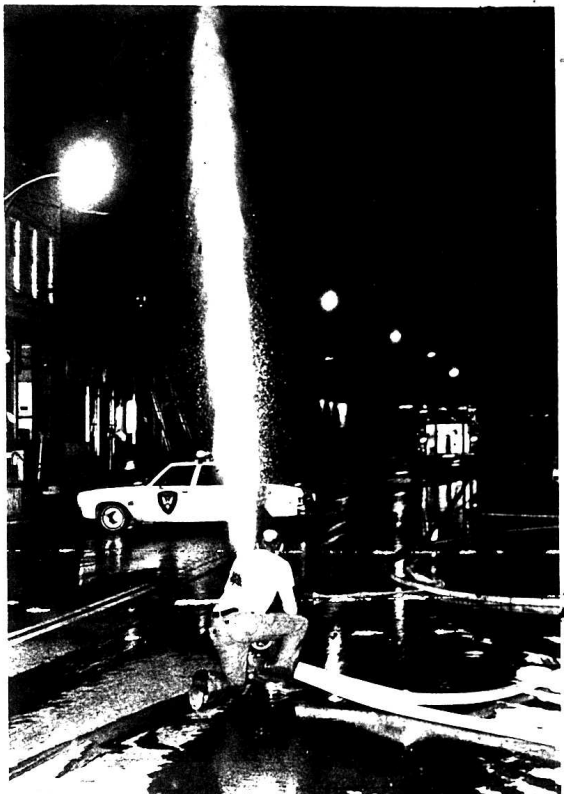

'INSTANT' DEER HERD

Knott County is going to get an "instant" deer herd in an experiment to see if a massive stocking effort is the answer to establishing deer in Eastern Kentucky.

According to plans now being developed by biologists with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, 500 deer will be transported to Knott County and released. It will take between two and four years to stock this many deer, according to John Phillips, Kentucky's deer program coordinator.

"Our usual stocking practice has been to stock 50-75 deer in an area and let the herd expand slowly from there," Phillips says. But this technique hasn't worked in Eastern Kentucky, where deer populations remain low even after repeated stockings.

"We believe that there is a certain 'threshold' level below which the herd just won't increase. In East Kentucky, a low reproductive capacity caused, we think, by the low nutritional value of the available deer browse, has held populations below this threshold level," Phillips says by stocking 500 deer over a relatively short period of time, biologists hope to boost the herd rapidly past the threshold to the point where natural reproduction will cause rapid growth in deer populations.

Knott County is closed to deer hunting this year and will remain closed for several years as biologists monitor the growth and condition of the transplanted deer.

If the experiment is successful, other Eastern Kentucky counties will be stocked in the same manner, which Phillips describes as like "picking up an entire deer herd and moving it." The deer will be captured from locations around the state with surplus deer populations.

"But in this method doesn't work, I'm afraid we'll have to conclude that further deer stocking of any kind in East Kentucky just isn't biologically feasible," Phillips says, adding that it's important that these stocked deer not be poached or molested.

Even though we are stocking a lot of deer, a legal harvest could still cause the program to fail," he says. "Like any other wildlife restora-

tion project, this one will succeed only if the local people support it and our efforts to curtail illegal poaching."
