Council splits on vote for more water to Western

After the Mt. Vernon City Council had reviewed the plans showing the proposed water line expansion by Western Water Association, it looked as though the approval for supplying more water to the association would be dealt with almost routinely.

Mayor Roland Mullins called for comments from the councilmen and started with Councilman Ernie Tolle who said, "If we have the water, give it to them as long as it won't put us in a bind."

Weich left no doubt in anyone's mind how he felt about the question. Weich said, "There are a lot of things we don't understand about this water situation and I make a motion that we get an FHA representative in here to discuss with us what to do before we get into voting."

Mayor Mullins asked Weich to hold his motion until all the councilmen had had a chance to comment and then asked councilman Joel "Buster" Gentry for his thoughts.

Gentry said, "I think we have the water if we just have the facilities to pump it. It has been dry and there is still plenty of water out there (in Lake Linville)." Gentry asked Water Superintendent Matt Powell, Jr. for confirmation of this statement and Powell agreed by saying "I've even with the prolonged dry spell the county has faced this summer, the lake has only dropped 8 to 10 inches."

However, Weich reported that there were a lot of people in this county who don't have water and "I am not going to sit in this chair and vote for people in Lincoln and Pulaski Counties to get water and let my people go."

Weich was referring to the fact that Western's planned expansion route

will be going into Pulaski County and one major line will be laid along 150 into Crab Orchard and then left along 39. And another line will be laid in Lincoln County which will double back and provide water to residents along Bowling Ridge—the only way these people could get water service, according to spokesmen for Western.

Western's attorney Jerry Cox and Buford Parkerson, a director of the association, said the roads were chosen along the most feasible routes in order to insure approval of the needed grant and loan.

However, Weich disagreed saying, "I bet FHA would come here and tell us that they (Western) have some leeway to choose their expansion route."

Weich also implied that the feasibility of a road was determined by other reasons occasionally saying, "If you have 14 friends down that road it's feasible. If you don't, it's not feasible. If you have land in Pulaski or Lincoln counties, it's feasible. If you don't, it's not feasible."

Cox replied that had Western known that the council wished to talk to an FHA representative, it could have been arranged. However, Cox said, "We are running out of time and would appreciate your urgent attention to the request."

Weich then asked Cox why Pulaski County could not supply their own people water, saying "Pulaski County has more water than we have, a lot more money, a lot more land, a lot more of everything than these people in Rockcastle County."

Cox answered that, "One of the problems with outlining lines is that they drop down to smaller lines as they reach the end of it and to serve a large number of people would require a lot of line laying."

Weich retorted that another reason might be that people in Pulaski

County would rather pay the cheaper rate Western can charge because of the low rate charged Western by Mt. Vernon for the water Weich said, "If I lived in Pulaski County, I would like to buy water cheaper than they (Pulaski County) can furnish it."

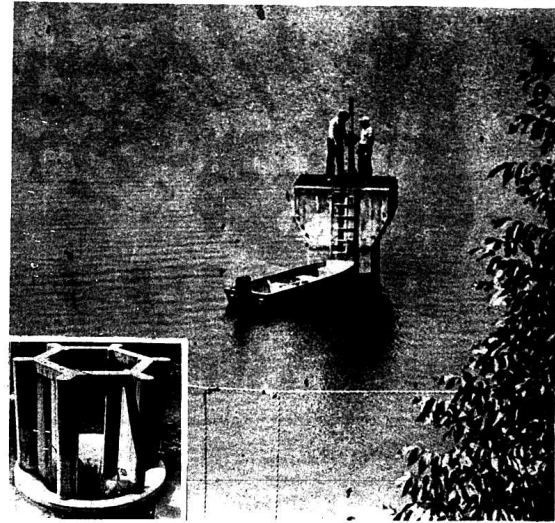
According to Weich, Pulaski County charges its districts and associations \$129 per thousand while Mt. Vernon's charge for the same amount is 84 cents.

Mullins asked Mr. Cox and Mr. Parkerson if they have discussed with their association the possibility of establishing a board from representatives of Western, Northern, the City of Mt. Vernon and Brodhead to plan further expansion of water lines in the county. Parkerson replied that although the district has not yet been discussed with officers and directors of Western, he personally felt the board would be receptive to the idea. Parkerson added that he thought it would be the establishing of a representative board, "be a good way to discontinue some of the confusion there had been before," and promised to bring up the idea at the next meeting of Western's board.

Mullins then asked Councilman Weich if he wanted to put his original motion, to have a representative of FHA come to a council meeting, on the floor. Weich did but the motion died for lack of a second.

Councilman Roger McClure then made a motion to approve more water for Western which was seconded by Councilman Ernie Tolle. However, Mayor Mullins asked McClure if it would be permissible with him to have included in the motion that the permission would be subject to the establishment of a board to discuss any further expansion and that out-of-county expansion would be prohibited until further notice. The vote passed 3-2 with Councilmen Hurd and

City employees Burgess Mullins and Billy McFerron were busy recently checking out the standpipe at Lake Linville. A valve was opened to a 24-inch pipe on the bottom of the lake which caused the lake to drop about 8 to 10 inches over a three-day period. Speculation now is that state employees may have inadvertently left

the valve open after repairing the pipe last Wednesday. The photo inserted at left shows the spillway at the lake which takes excess water into Renfro Creek. As can be seen, there is no excess water at the time though there doesn't appear to be any need for worry about the lake's capacity.

Lake drops about 8 inches after valve is left open last week

Residents near Renfro Creek began noticing a strange odor late last week, and alerted water department employees. The source of the odor was quickly discovered but not so quickly was the problem solved, according to Matt Powell, Jr., water superintendent.

The problem was that someone (or more than

one) had managed to open a gear mechanism on the standpipe which opened a 24-inch pipe on the bottom of the lake and this allowed the water to flow into Renfro Creek at a rapid rate.

Powell said the lake dropped approximately 8 inches during the time the pipe was open. It was

quite a task to close the pipe because a valve crank which operates the gear mechanism is kept by the state and it took until about 8 p.m. Saturday night to locate the state engineers who have the tool. Powell said the city does not even own a wrench that would work the mechanism.

The valve had not been operating properly, Powell said, since last fall when the 24-inch pipe was torn up, apparently while a private contracting firm was at the lake to make some repairs. After the damage was discovered, the contractor denied all responsibility and, last Wednesday, the state sent in a team of divers to repair the pipe. Between that time and Saturday is when it was decided the lake needed draining.

Powell added that he was mystified as to who would feel they had anything to gain from this act of mischievousness but that city police have been asked to patrol the area more often to avoid a future incident like this.

Powell went on to say that, to date, the lake has only dropped about two feet, in spite of the dry weather that has been experienced all summer and the opening of the valve.

Lake to get needed improvements

The Lake Linville Critical Area Treatment Measure is being sponsored by the Rockcastle County Conservation District and the City of Mt. Vernon.

The measure will include roadbank seeding and the drainage to establish vegetation on critical eroding areas.

Approximately 7.5 acres of critically eroding land will receive vegetative treatment, according to David Sidner, SCS.

The Lake Linville area includes about 4 miles of

surfaced access roads, 3 ballfields, playgrounds and tennis courts, all of which receive heavy use by the public.

The lake area is completely within the City of Mt. Vernon.

Measure implementation will be in two phases, scheduled to begin in the Fall of 1963. When completed, this measure will help to decrease soil erosion as well as provide better recreational use of the Lake Linville area.

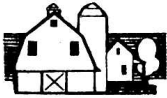

Farm & Home News

Keep Farm Children
Out of Harm's Way
Kids growing up on a

farm are probably subject to more life-or-limb threatening hazards than are their friends in cities or country subdivisions.

For one thing, the tools of farmwork are just outside the back door—the tractors, chemicals, livestock, silos, power tools, the pond. Parents in other occupations usually leave home to do their work and their families are not endangered by hazards they face on the job. But farming parents must be aware of all home place hazards and try to reduce risks of their children's safety.

Kids are more precious than any commodity we raise on the farm, but sometimes we can forget their safety when we're busy trying to get work done. This year's Farm Safety Week, to be observed across the nation, September 18-24, offers a reminder of the importance of children's safety with its theme, Safeguard the Future. The National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture are sponsoring the observance, which focuses on

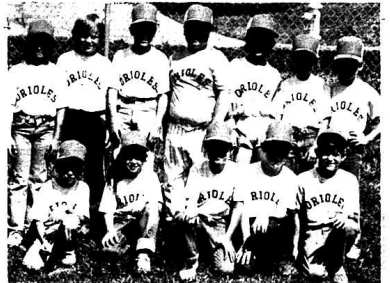
protecting and training the younger generation. Adopting safe work habits at an early age will result in lifelong benefits.

First, recognize the hazards inherent in farm equipment. Nearly four out of five agriculture accidents involving young people also involve tractors and machinery. About three-fourths of these accidents occurred from tractor overturning or passengers falling off. Four out of five passenger victims are under 16 years old. Per hour driven, young people have four times more likelihood of an accident than do their parents when driving a tractor on public roads. To minimize risks of tractor or machinery accidents, parents should make sure children are physically big enough and mature enough for the task.

A child has to be big enough to reach the controls, and to react quickly in an emergency to stop the tractor.

Other suggestions are: Have a tractor operator only policy. Do not allow riders on tractors or other machinery since that is an unnecessary risk.

Youngsters should operate only tractors equipped with cabs having roll-over protective structures (ROPS). The structures offer protection if tractor

turns over.

Keep safety shields in place, especially with young operators, to give as much protection as possible.

Educate children on safe tractor and machinery operation and encourage them to participate in tractor driving and safety programs such as those sponsored by 4-H.

Setting a good example is important in encouraging children to use safety precautions. Training is essential. Remember that kids don't have much experience with equipment or in potentially dangerous situations, so they don't automatically know about the hazards and precautions. As a final precaution, parents should supervise young workers closely until they're sure they understand the job, the hazards and what to do in an emergency.

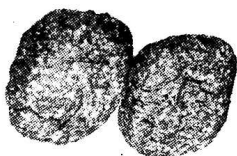

Kentucky: black bass fair casting plastic worms off points and over stump beds; catfish fair still fishing cut bait over channel drop-offs; good, in tailwaters, catfish good, clear, stable at three feet below summer pool and 79 degrees.

Barkley: black bass slow casting crank baits around shoreline cover; white bass slow in the jumps; in tailwaters, catfish fair, clear, stable at three feet below summer pool and 79 degrees.

Barren: black bass fair to good casting spinner baits, crank baits and plastic worms off points; white bass fair in the jumps and by trolling medium runners; clear, falling very slowly, one foot below summer pool and 82 degrees.

Nolin: crappie fair to good over submerged cover (6-8 feet deep); black bass fair on plastic worms off points; bluegill slow off steep banks; clear, falling slowly one foot below summer pool and 84 degrees.

Rough River: crappie slow over submerged cover; black bass slow off plastic worms off points; clear, stable at 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 81 degrees.

Herrington: black bass fair at night on plastic worms off points; hybrid catfish fair in the jumps near the dam; clear, stable at 11 feet below summer pool and 82 degrees.

Cummins: crappie good over submerged cover and drop-offs; bluegill good along steep banks; black bass fair at night on plastic worms and spinner baits over drop offs and along shoreline cover; clear, falling slowly, 2 1/2 feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

Cumberland: black bass fair to good still fishing

crawfish off points during the day and casting plastic worms at night; crappie fair to good in holes of creeks and over submerged cover; bluegill fair to good in lower lake drift fishing at night; bass, trout excellent; clear, falling, 38 feet below the timberline and 82 degrees.

Dale Hollow: black bass good on plastic worms off steep banks at night; crappie slow around steep banks; bluegill fair off steep banks; clear, falling, six feet below normal pool and 81 degrees.

Laurel: black bass fair to good casting crank baits off points and around cover; crappie fair over submerged cover (10-12 feet deep); bluegill fair drift fishing along steep banks; clear, stable at eight feet below power pool and 80 degrees.

Cave Run: musky fair on medium to deep runners around shoreline cover; black bass fair on plastic worms along shoreline cover; clear, stable at eight feet below summer pool and 79 degrees.

Buckhorn: black bass fair casting crank baits off points; bluegill slow around steep banks; clear, falling slowly, 3 1/2 feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

Grayson: black bass fair on medium runners and plastic worms along shoreline cover; crappie fair over submerged cover; clear, falling, three feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

Dewey: crappie slow over submerged cover around stick ups (6-8 feet deep); clear to murky, stable at 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 76 degrees.

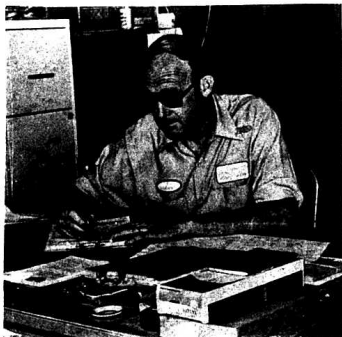

Welch voting no. Even though Cox pointed out that Western's present contract calls for the city to be able to raise their rates by producing documented evidence of increased costs to produce it, the council stood firm behind the Mayor on this matter with the general voiced agreement being that they did not intend to get in the same hassle they had before with Western when the city raised the association to its present rate.

Cox and city attorney Carl Clontz both reminded the council that this amount would not leave any cushion for the association. Council says "yes"

The council also insisted that Western agree that if anything on the map shown the council changes, except for water lines dropped outside the county which are to be brought back inside the county and laid on the most feasible roads, then Western must come back before the council. And the council decided their 84 cents per thousand rate be for only one year with the rate to be negotiated once a year.

Western's two representatives agreed to the city's demands with the understanding that any contract entered into with the City by Western will have to be approved by the federal government.

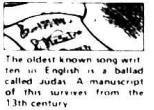
Following the meeting, Mayor Mullins said his interest primarily was that the expansion of water lines mainly outside the county, didn't grow unchecked.

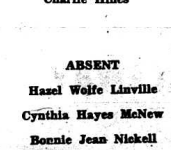

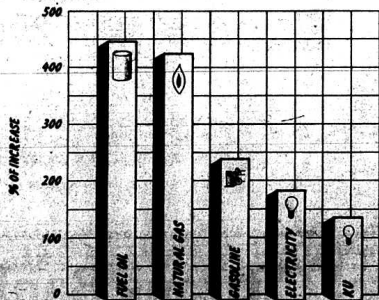

Diversion channel makes a good management practice

A Diversion Channel is simply a ditch constructed on the contour above a cropland. A Diversion Ditch is constructed to stop excessive amounts of water during heavy rainfall from causing damage to open croplands.

Many croplands in Rockcastle County are located in bottoms or on ridge terraces. These fields receive large amounts of runoff when the heavy spring rains occur. It is

estimated that when constructed properly, a diversion channel will save between 10-15 tons of soil per acre. The soil is saved from forming into gulleys caused by concentrated runoff. The Diversion safely delivers the excess water to a point away from the cropland. The local Soil Conservation Service and the local ASCS Office can provide assistance to landowners at their request. Anyone wishing assistance can reach the Soil Conservation Service Office at 256-2541 in Mt. Vernon. Please see adjacent picture story.

Mt. Vernon area anglers qualify for Red Man All-American tournament

Ron McClure of Mt. Vernon and Matthew Poynter of Brodhead are among the top finishers in the Mountain Division of the Red Man Tournament Trail, earning a berth in the bass fishing circuit's year-end championship which offers \$120,000 in prize money.

McClure, 34, and Poynter, 21, earned two of the 24 qualifying spots by compiling a high point total during the six Red Man Tournament Trail events which began last spring.

Ronnie Grant of Columbia, won the Mountain Division title and with it a check for \$1,000 contributed by Evrindre motors and Johnson outboards.

The Red Man Tournament Trail, organized for nonprofessional bass anglers through its low entry fees, features 10 divisions of competition in 11 states. The top 24 fishermen in each division qualify for the Red Man All American

Tournament, scheduled for October 18-22 at Kentucky Lake/Barkley in West Virginia.

At the All American, the 24 Mountain qualifiers will fish against each other for two days. The winner of this round earns a new bass boat, while the second and third place finishers receive cash prizes. All three will then move to the finals, along with the top three competitors from each of the nine other divisions.

The final field of 30 will fish one day. The angler with the heaviest catch will earn \$50,000 in cash. Second and third place winners also earn major cash prizes. All of the qualifiers will receive a cash award.

In addition, the fisherman who catches the largest single bass of the All-American wins a 150 hp Mercury Black Max outboard motor. The Red Man Tournament Trail returns 100 per-

cent of entry money in the form of cash awards. Prizes are guaranteed by 100 fishing sponsors, Stroh Brewery Co., Hummelbird by Technomic, Mann's Bait Co., and Ryobi America Corp.

Red Man tournaments are organized by crews from Operation Bass, the fishing organization to which all competitors belong.
