### A LETTER FROM PHILLIP K. WICKER

#### Former Circuit Judge for Pulaski and Rockcastle counties

Having served nearly seven years as circuit judge of Pulaski and Rockcastle counties I am acquainted with the tremendous responsibilities and burdens of the occupant of the office. The occupant must not only be totally dedicated to administration of his duties, he must be prepared to make personal sacrifices which take time from his family. The occupant of this high office must be concerned with the people he serves. Public confidence in the office can be maintained only by a mature, experienced and dedicated individual who is obligated to no one.

In my opinion — based upon my own experience in the office — Judge John T. Mandt is the candidate best qualified to conduct the office in a manner the citizens have the right to expect.

Judge Mandt is 50-years-old. He has 15 years experience as an able practicing lawyer. He has occupied the office of circuit judge for the past year. No one who has not held the office has any real conception of the duties and problems. Judge Mandt has conducted the office on the highest possible level. His decisions have reflected the highest ethical and professional standards. He recently ruled on the question whether a local option election should be held in one precinct in the city of Somerset.

The law has been confused in this area in recent years, and a less experienced judge could easily have been confused. Judge Mandt, however, took the time to thoroughly research all of the case law developed over many years and arrived at a decision based upon sound legal precedent. I am proud of this decision — not because I am a Baptist — but because of the legal scholarship that went into it.

Judge Mandt is not running for this office from the security of another office to which he was elected but in which he has not served a full term. He does not have an office to fall back on if he loses. He gave up a lucrative law practice to take on the responsibilities of circuit judge. He has thus demonstrated his willingness to make the heavy sacrifices required. His opponent could have demonstrated willingness to make a like sacrifice by resigning the office of district judge before asking for something else, but he has not made such a sacrifice and is not about to do so.

A file in the district court will not take up over two or three pages as a rule. Hundreds of traffic tickets can be handled in an hour. The cases in circuit court sometimes each generate yards of documents and every case takes at least a day to try. Some cases take weeks. The work of the two courts differs sharply and service in the one is no experience or qualification for the other. Then too there are two district judges to handle the less complex matters of the district court. There is only one circuit judge.

Judge Mandt has respect and compassion for the people of Pulaski and Rockcastle counties. He has not said, as his opponent has, that he believes Mt. Vernon is “30 years behind the times.”

It is without hesitation that I endorse John T. Mandt as the best qualified candidate for circuit judge based on maturity, experience and sound legal scholarship. Eight years is a long time and the people cannot afford to turn the office into a training ground in which one learns as he serves. There is too much serious business before the courts at this time. Judge Mandt has proven himself. I recommend giving him a full term in the office.

For the reasons indicated, I will cast my vote on November 8 for John T. Mandt for circuit judge.

al monies. But at the present we've worked out a budget and we have a contract with the county. We feel that, at the moment, we're financially stable and that in the near future we'll be able to improve upon this. Right now the fiscal court is subsidizing the ambulance service \$1,500 a month. With this subsidy and the improvement in the collection of the billing system, we're able to be financially sound and hopefully, to increase the number of personnel we have and improve the quality of their training. We also need to replace some of the present equipment.

Q. Who would a person contact if they were interested in volunteering for the ambulance service?  
A. Anyone who is interested in becoming a volunteer, whether it be for one day a month, or several days a month, should contact me at the hospital at 256-2195. As I said earlier, we have an EMT class set up and we're going to subsidize this so that it will not cost the volunteers of the program anything to take the training and to become members of the ambulance service. At the present, we're working on an incentive program to reward people who do give their time and efforts to the ambulance service. We feel very strongly that with enough good people in the community who are willing to donate some time, we can improve the quality of care that we're able to provide in emergency situations.

## Reports show 5th District is least educated in U.S.

The 5th Congressional District, which includes Rockcastle County, is the least educated in the U.S. and among the poorest as well, according to a story in Monday's Lexington Herald-Leader. The Leader story was based on information contained in the September 26 edition of U.S. News and World Report.

The magazine, using figures from the U.S. Census Bureau, said that only 37.7 percent of the district's adults, age 25 and older, were high school graduates.

Kentucky's 7th District, in the eastern corner of the state, was fourth lowest on the same list. Earlier census figures showed that Kentucky ranked last among the states in this category, with only 51.9 percent having high school diplomas.

Second to the fifth district was the South Bronx in the 18th Congressional District of New York—perhaps the poorest and most crime-ridden area in New York—was second with 40 percent. Texas' 3rd District, in suburban Dallas, had the highest percentage of graduates, 88 percent.

Census figures for the number of graduates in Rockcastle County, over the age of 25 with high school diplomas were not available, but Supt. Charles B. Parsons, said Tuesday that the number of freshmen who graduated high here said 67.8% of the freshmen at RCHS graduated, according to the latest figures released by the state Department of Education.

This figure is 2.1% less than Fairfax County and 13.5% better than Jefferson County.

Mr. Parsons said he felt the county's high attendance rate (usually 93-94%) contributed to the 67.9% figure.

The 5th District, represented by Republican Hal Rogers of Somerset, was fourth from the bottom in per capita income (\$4,470 a year) and had the highest percentage of families living in poverty (24.9 percent).

"I knew we were low, but I didn't know where we ranked," said Rogers who had seen the magazine article and did not dispute the figures.

Rogers said he was most concerned about the education figures. "I'm trying to get those figures ourselves and see what can be done," he said Sunday. "If we're doing better on the dropout

problem now, that's one thing, if it's still a problem, maybe there are things we can do to bring more attention to it."

"It's hard to say which came first—the low percentage of high school graduates or the low per capita income. They're connected in a vicious circle."

We have been trying to break it by encouraging new industries to locate here. The economic stimulation here in the 1970's may not have worked its way into the census figures. The percentage of high school graduates, for instance, may be getting better. But it will take a long time to bring that up."

Ranking lowest in per capita income was the South Bronx district with \$3,587 a year. New York's 15th District, the "silk stocking" district in Manhattan, was the wealthiest with \$15,887.

The South Bronx district also had the highest percentage of families living in poverty, 41.2 percent. Illinois' 3rd District, in the Chicago suburbs, had the lowest percentage, 2.1 percent.

Kentucky's 5th District was also mentioned in the article as having the seventh cheapest housing in the nation, with the median price for a home being \$25,000. Pennsylvania's 2nd District, in Philadelphia, had the cheapest, \$16,000. New York's 15th District, in Manhattan, had the most expensive, \$185,800.

Rockcastle County is particularly mentioned in the Mt. Vernon Signal indicated that the performance of our students ranked near the bottom on state-wide educational standards.

These facts and concerns about our schools urge us to bring together interested individuals from all groups in our county to work with the professional educators of our school system to better understand the causes of these problems and to identify the support and resources needed to correct these problems. Our goal is to have our school system do a more effective job of preparing our children for higher education, skilled workers and leaders and good citizens in our communities.

## No charges filed in Main Street shoot-out

No one apparently will be charged as the result of a shoot-out on Main Street early Saturday night, unless one of the reportedly several eye-witnesses can be prevailed upon to testify in court.

The Vernon Policeman Joe Howard said Monday that he was investigating the case and knew the names of some of the men supposedly involved. However, he said, they had denied the charges and, without someone who had seen the incident coming forth and saying so and being willing to testify to what they saw in court, he did not see how the men could be brought to trial.

According to reports, the men were in two cars that came through the cut, just south of Main Street, shooting at that time. They then stopped their cars on Main Street, one in front of the Signal office and the other in front of the barber shop.

One of the cars in front got out and shot three times toward the second car with an automatic pump shotgun.

One of the men in this car then, reportedly jumped out and ran behind his car and when the first man quit shooting, he began shooting at the front car with a pistol.

Two cars on Main Street at the time were hit in the windshield, one of them was being driven on Main Street at the time. The two occupants were unhurt. The other car was parked in front of the drugstore.

Four children, ranging in age from 2 to 6, were reportedly on Main Street near Ruby's Diner when the shooting started. However, they were quickly taken off the street to relative safety in a nearby

## Volunteer firemen provide vital service

You don't always know which building or property is burning when the fire alarm sounds in the county.

But you can be sure that a crew of volunteer firemen have rapidly donned their turnout gear, determined the location of the fire, and are on their way to the scene as quickly as possible.

That's reassuring. Especially if you or an acquaintance has called out at 1:30 a.m. because of a fire on the south side of Main Street and the potential to destroy the property on that side, including

our family business. Thanks to over six hours of hard, hot work on the part of Mt. Vernon's local firemen, it didn't.

Today's volunteers are continuing a service that began in 1837 when the Mt. Vernon Fire Department was first organized. The department became possible because the city had just put the water system into operation. The original crew started out with a trailer, hose and the Water Works' pickup truck.

Willis McKimzie was Mt. Vernon's first fire chief and he was followed by Claude McHargue, who was fire chief during World War II. William H. Cox took the job after him, and in 1972, John Cox, the present fire chief, assumed the position.

In 1963 the fire department tries to keep about 20 men as active volunteers to insure there will always be enough man

power available to fight local fires.

The current roster of firemen includes: Buddy Cox, assistant chief; Garry Hansel, captain; David Bales, captain; Eddie Moore, lieutenant; John Rush, lieutenant; and Mike Hopkins, secretary.

Other volunteers are Jim Cox, Dickie Collins, Walter, James F. Price, Gary Asher, John Chaliff, Randall Reynolds, Calvin Rader, David Craig, Mark Hopkins, Melvin Powell, Paul Hansel, Kevin Fletcher and Vester Maples.

To keep up the number of firemen, the department accepts applications from volunteers who are 18 years of age and older. A committee takes into consideration how responsible the interested person is and then votes on whether they would be a competent fireman.

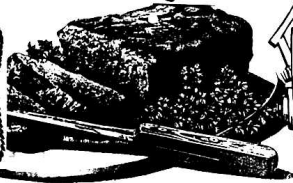

Mrs. Melberta McBee of Mt. Vernon was honored by members of the First Baptist Church last Sunday for her service to the church as pianist for the past 35 years.

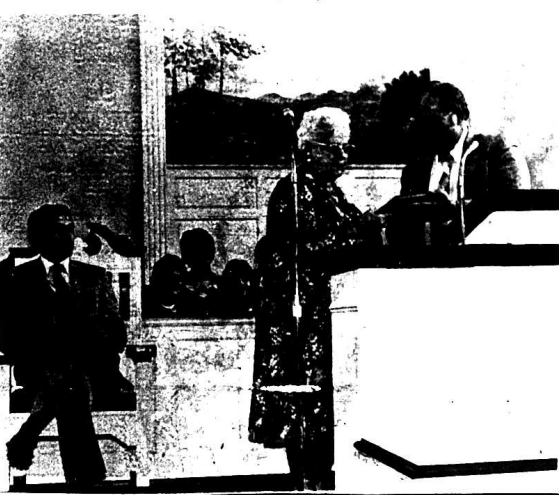

## Rattlesnake Rituals

On August 30, 1983 the Louisville Courier Journal carried an Associated Press article reporting that a Phelps, Ky. child died of a rattlesnake bite after a religious snake-handling ceremony in a church near the Kentucky-Virginia border. Mack Wolford was bitten about 2 p.m. but an ambulance wasn't summoned until 10:40 a.m. because the family was praying for his recovery from the snake bite. He was dead on arrival at the hospital.

Snake handling is a ritual employed in some churches as a demonstration of faith in the power of a Biblical passage in which the faithful are said to "take up serpents" yet not be harmed. (Mark 16:7)

One wonders how many precious, innocent lives it will require to end an end to these senseless rattlesnake rituals. It does seem that one life would be enough before the false teachers wake up. Do not these human lives mean anything to them? More importantly, what do their souls mean?

Now the man who died as an innocent victim of a false teacher. His faith was strong, but it was a false doctrine and application of Scripture (Matt. 7:15-20; 2 Tim. 2:15). It is unfortunate that those people whose souls have to lose the most precious gift that God ever gave them in the world, and their souls in the world to come. But how many more will have to die before people come to the senses?

and therefore no man today can do these miracles which the apostles did (Mark 16:20). The express purpose was to confirm the word of the apostles, as they spoke and wrote the Word revealed to them by the Holy Spirit. We have that word today, confirmed by those signs, in the written form of the New Testament. Once the word has been confirmed, it needs no further confirmation, and God's purpose has been served.

No apostle of Christ ever engaged in a rattlesnake handling service although they had the power of protection from any harm from these venomous creatures (Acts 28:3-6). In Mark 16:18 the Lord said, "Whoever shall take up serpents-it shall not hurt them." The Lord lied and did not keep his word if that promise applies today. But the Lord cannot lie (Titus 1:2). The apostles could lay their hands on others and impart into them spiritual gifts (Acts 19:6; 1 Cor. 12:1-10), but rattlesnake-handling was not one of them. No apostle ever PURPOSELY picked up a serpent so far as the record goes. The viper in Mark 28:3 was not purposely picked up by Paul; it came "out of the heat and fastened on his hand."

It cannot be said that the victim did not have faith. No man will pick up a rattlesnake doubting. So the modern day advocate of such miracles will have to come up with something else. No one can deny such strong evidence of belief. It is tragic, though, that men have to lose their lives and souls as a result of false teaching!

The sale of imitation milk beverages is legal in Kentucky and consumers may be hearing about brand names such as Meadow Fresh, Prim, Mellow Cream and Rich Valley Blend—all products of a company called Meadow Fresh Farms, Inc. They are being sold directly to consumers by individual sales representatives.

These products are imitation milk and must be labeled as imitation. Consumers should consider them a beverage choice, not a substitute for milk.

Ingredients used in manufacturing Meadow Fresh include sweet dairy whey, corn syrup solids, coconut oil, sodium caseinate and non-fat milk. The product also contains emulsifiers and flavoring ingredients and is fortified with vitamins and minerals.

The fat in Meadow Fresh is coconut oil which is a saturated fat. It replaces milk fat, also a saturated fat, but offers no health advantage. The calorie, total carbohydrate, vitamin A, riboflavin, vitamin D and vitamin B6 content of Meadow Fresh is essentially identical to that of nonfat dry milk.

Because Meadow Fresh and similar imitation-milk products are nutritionally inferior to milk, they cannot be used in place of fluid milk to meet the milk requirements of a child's nutrition program such as school lunch. They are also not allowed in meal programs for the elderly.

Because of the lower protein and calcium con-

tent of the product, Meadow Fresh should not be used as a substitute for milk in the diet, but imitation milk products are more nutritious than ades and soft drinks and their use may be beneficial as a snack.

But consumers should realize that what Meadow Fresh ads say about milk is unreliable. As part of its promotional literature, Meadow Fresh cites research findings by Dr. Kurt Oster, chief cardiologist at Park City Hospital in Bridgeport, Conn. He theorizes that the homogenization process of milk releases the enzyme named thione oxidase, which deposits itself along with cholesterol in the walls of arteries.

This theory points to homogenized milk as a major contributor to the development of heart disease. Dr. Oster's viewpoint is not shared by other researchers and his hypothesis is a link between thione oxidase and heart disease has not been proven.

tee, they are issued turn-out gear for a grace period of six months. They're not allowed some of the more major equipment until the end of the probation period. And they can't drive the fire truck until they've been trained.

Training and continual practice is a vital aspect of fire fighting and the Mt. Vernon Fire Department places emphasis on upgrading their skills. They devote three hours every first and third Monday of each month to meetings and practice drills. They also hold a school in the department once a year to get more in-depth training for all the firemen.

Fire Chief John Cox explained that they usually get instructors from the state for the school, which involves about 20 hours of sessions. "It's a must," he said. The school teaches such subjects as hazardous materials, initial fire fighting, rope, ladder and hose lays and hookups.

New volunteers attend the annual school and are also trained carefully by the experienced members of the department.

The fire department uses pagers to contact the firemen in case of a fire. The message can be sent to each volunteer by an encoder. The department's

four encoders are located at Cox Funeral Home, Garry Hansel's house, Buddy Cox's house and the fire department. The fire truck is usually to the fire in less than five minutes.

There is a policy that there must be at least three men on the fire truck before it leaves the firehouse so there will be enough men to set up once they arrive at the fire. Buddy Cox and Garry Hansel usually drive the truck, but the other firemen are covered by insurance if either of the men are not there.

How dangerous is it to be a volunteer fireman? "It's dangerous," conceded John Cox. "Getting to the fire with people getting in the way is always a danger. But danger is part of the job."

To prepare for accidents, the firemen learn the way to always have the ability to perform CPR. They don't call an ambulance unless they see that someone is hurt.

The Mt. Vernon Fire Department is equipped with a 1980 fire truck for first aid and most have a county truck that they use in January 1982. The policy had been in the past that the city truck couldn't be taken out of town. This left a lot of fires to burn uncontrolled out in the county and the firemen requested a truck that could be used outside

the city limits. The fiscal court bought the county truck on the condition that the fire department supply the man power and the equipment. The arrangement has worked well, but it has also increased the work load for the firemen.

Both the city and county trucks hold about 750 gallons of water, which will last about 15 to 20 minutes or until the hose can be hooked up to a hydrant. They also have a flotation pump that can be used in a pond or creek if they're out in the county. The firemen are especially excited about their new monitor nozzle that can put out a maximum of 1,200 gallons a minute. It can be set at a certain rate and left to surge water on one part of a fire while the firemen attend to another area.

The fire department is financed by contributions, city funding, and occasional claims paid by a person's homeowner policy when they put out a household fire. The city buys the main equipment, turnout gear and pagers. Each volunteer buys his own blue uniform and the red light and siren for his automobile.

The Brodhead and Livingston Fire Departments run on basically the same order as Mt. Vernon. David Cash is the fire chief at Brodhead and Bobby Wilson is the fire chief at Livingston.

All three departments follow the universal code of "mutual aid." In other words, if one department needs extra equipment or man power during a fire, they can call upon another department in the county to provide help. At the recent fire on Main Street in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead was asked to help and responded.

Buddy Cox, assistant fire chief, has been a fireman for 20 years. When asked why he spends his spare time in that manner, he said, "You know this thing about being thrilled by fire trucks as a child? Well, it's fulfilling a childhood desire."

Does his wife, Shirley worry about him when he's out fighting fires? "Probably," he said. "But she accepts that as being one of my foolish idiosyncrasies."

Garry Hansel, a captain of the fire department, has been a fireman for 18 years because he likes the feeling of helping others.

He said he really doesn't mind being called out in the middle of the night to answer a fire alarm. "It's our obligation to go," he said. "Also, I've got a house and I'd hate to think that someone wouldn't put it out if it were on fire."

"I never really think about the dangers," Hansel went on. "If I did, I probably wouldn't go. But it's something you get used to."

David Bales, also a captain for the department, has been fighting fires for 18 years. He mentioned one of the dangers of fire fighting that most people don't think of: poisonous gases. The main worry for him is the danger of cyanide gases from synthetic material and other gases given off by burning carpet and upholstery.

Bales figured that the volunteer firemen spend about 18 hours a month fighting fires and can easily spend as much as eight hours on one fire.

"I enjoy it," he said, "and I wish there were more people in it. We always need capable, responsible people to train for the job."

Bales added, "The fire department has come a long way in the past two

years." There must be something about performing a service for the public that makes volunteer fire fighting worth the time, energy and risk. And it's fortunate for the citizens of Rockcastle County that these firemen continue to endure the long hours, hot work and even poisonous gases to douse a dangerous fire with water to render it harmless. Perhaps John Cox put it best when he said, "Fire fighting gets in your blood."

## National Emergency Care Week honors RCH ambulance service

National Emergency Care Week is observed from September 21-28. The purpose of the week is to provide information to the general public on becoming skilled in emergency techniques, and to honor those who practice emergency medical skills.

A large portion of the emergency care given in this community is provided by the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service. The ambulance service has undergone several major changes in the past year, and Mike Barr, the director of the ambulance service, explained in an interview how the service is now operating.

Q Who are the members of the new Ambulance Service Board?

A There has been a board of trustees formed for the Rockcastle County

Ambulance Service and the members are Tom Welch, Ernest Stanley, David King and Roger Pence, who serves as chairman of the board. The purpose of the board being set up was to improve the ambulance service for this county and to assist the hospital in directing the ambulance service.

Q What does the board hope to accomplish?

A Some short and long range plans have been set up and the most important project we have now is to increase the number of personnel we have working on the ambulance service. We presently have three regular Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) working for the service.

Q Is the financial situation improving for the ambulance service?

A As everyone knows we've had a rocky and unstable time over the last year with the loss of subsidy from state and federal

employees. At the present we have an EMT class set up that has been approved and funded by the state of Kentucky so we can train as many as 30 people to work as volunteers.

Another project we're working toward which is a longer range is to set up a paramedic program in Rockcastle County. This would mean that advanced life support would be available at the scene of accidents and injuries. This project will take at least a year to set up and probably another year to accomplish.

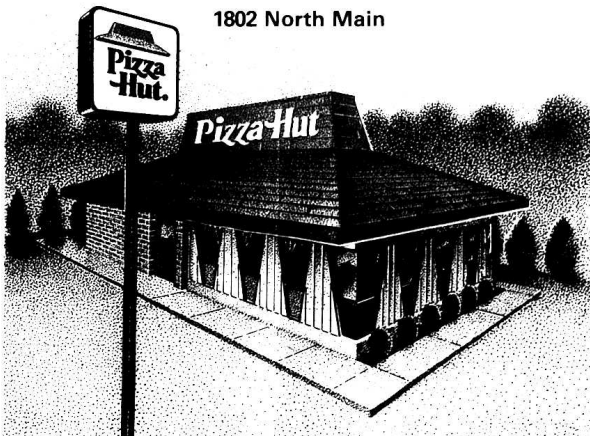

There in the center sat Sherman sitting on a chair playing a dulcimer musical instrument which he smiled happily at the crowd who did not know of the mail carrier's talent for this was unusual in the community.

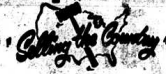

# Rev. Whitt retires after 40 years in ministry

Last Sunday marked the retirement of Rev. E.P. Whitt from full-time ministry. Rev. Whitt, 78, began his ministry 38 years ago at Locust Grove Church in West Virginia near Huntington. He retired as pastor of the Pine Hill Missionary Baptist Church.

A native of the West Virginia coalfields, Rev. Whitt didn't begin seminary school until he was 39, married and the father of five children. His wife, Sylvia, couldn't work with five children, ranging in age from 2 1/2 to 12 and the Whitts don't elaborate much on the trials and tribulations they faced while he was in school except to say, "It was hard." Rev. Whitt had given up a good job in a dry goods wholesale house where he was an assistant manager in the Virginia goods department and where he was slated to become manager of the department in about a year, to go into full-time study for the ministry.

Mrs. Whitt commented that their children were wonderful during this time, "they never complained," she said. The Whitt family, especially Rev. Whitt, was on the road a good deal while he was in the seminary. When he first enrolled at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, he was living near Huntington, West Virginia and, for several months, he drove back and forth on weekends. The family then moved to Louisville and later, Rev. Whitt took over two half-time churches in Casey County. The family then would drive there from Louisville every weekend. Rev. Whitt said he had a 1941 Ford which he managed to make us 10 years, even with the untold miles he racked up.

Bro. Whitt said his first ministry, in the mountains of West Virginia near the Pennsylvania border at Bergoo Baptist Church, came out in an unusual way. He said that a roommate he had while at the Seminary had married a girl from Bergoo whose father was superintendent of the coal mine and this man had learned of his first ministry.

Bro. Whitt said he was in the Seminary school. Bro. Whitt said he helped him out some financially during his schooling and arranged for him to give a trial sermon at Bergoo Baptist. The church called him to preach and he stayed there four years.

One highlight of Bro. Whitt's ministry there was the establishment of a mission at Camp No. 4, 7 miles away from a small house. Bro. Whitt said this was the first mission work he ever did and it was a "great blessing" because during his work there, just about everyone in the camp came to Christ.

Also while he was at Bergoo, Bro. Whitt said he had another unusual experience. The first hunting season after he went there, Bro. Whitt and a friend went hunting, for the first time for Bro. Whitt, and within a half-hour had a bear on his feet (with a borrowed gun). The next season Bro. Whitt ventured out, again with a borrowed gun, he brought home a Grizzly Bear. Townspeople were evidently so impressed with his hunting prowess that they chipped in and bought him a high-powered rifle.

Following his ministry at Bergoo Baptist, Bro. Whitt then ministered to churches in Kentucky and West Virginia.

A Gray (near Corbin), Rev. and Mrs. Whitt ministered to a congregation whose church had been destroyed by fire. When he went there, Bro. Whitt said the new church was just a hull and, during his almost four years there, the church was completely finished inside including stained glass windows. It was also at this church that the Whitts met Secretary of State Frances Jones Mills, who, along with her husband, was a member there and they have remained friends through the years.

The Whitts ministered in Mann, West Virginia and at Salyersville in Magoffin County; Belfry in Pike County; at Brohead

Baptist Church where their youngest son, Lawson, graduated from high school and met and married Linda Sowder, at New Salem Church at Pittsburg in

Laurel County (twice for four years each) and at Wallacetown and Bethlehem, both in Madison County. In addition to Lawson, the Whitts have four other

children, Samuel, a retired Lt. Col. from the U.S. Army who presently lives in Huntington, West Virginia where he leads the Junior ROTC program at Huntington High School. Mrs. Louise Dona of Lexington, an LPN at the University of Kentucky Hospital, E.P. Whitt, Jr., of LaCrescenta, California, who teaches manual training to special education children and Linda Clark who works at Sowder Nursing Home in Brohead. Lawson is an assistant postmaster at Brohead and a partner in the Built Well Development Corp. They have 18 grandchildren (one, Sirchi, died from cancer at the age of 11) and 5 great grandchildren.

Bro. Whitt speaks fondly of his four years in the U.S. Navy in the mid 20's. After completing boot camp in Virginia, he was assigned to Adm. Laws Barge and, in 1928, was chosen as one of the five sailors from the entire Navy to tend Major General Douglas MacArthur's yacht during the Olympics in Amsterdam, Holland. He was then serving on the USS President Roosevelt during his tour of duty with the Navy. Rev. Whitt visited several foreign countries including England, Ireland, Spain, France, Germany, Norway and Sweden.

After being married over 51 years, Bro. Whitt said the greatest thing that ever happened to him

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personally, "was meeting and marrying Sylvia. And speaking of his ministry, he said, "Nearly every place (he was called to minister to), there has been something that I felt in my heart was the reason the Lord sent me there. It has been a great blessing to me just to look around and see the people who have been saved and to see their children still serving the church."
