Cash feels strongly about continuing education for teachers and administrators, and would like to see a requirement that these professionals take classes at least every three years to keep up with new trends and progress.

Cash concluded with two final suggestions. "We need to have active participation by parents and community in education through the parent-teacher associations and organizations. And teachers need a very salary increase in line with other professions in order to maintain qualified personnel."

Albright has been a magistrate on the county's fiscal court since January 1983. "One thing I need for the county is a landfill," he said. "It wouldn't hurt to have more industry. A lot of people go out of the county to get jobs. The factories have been a big improvement. Rowe has also been a magistrate on the

school system. Those present were asked to fill out a membership card which included a committee preference and... Whittier said that about 45 percent of the people joining the Committee were also asked for a small donation to help offset minor expenses of obtaining data and typing and copying expenses.

The committees those present were asked to choose from ranged from the Coordinating Committee, which will guide the work of all other activities, making conclusions from reports, publicize findings and make recommendations... Improvements to an Advisory Committee; Evaluation Committee; Standards Committee; Curriculum Committee; Teaching Committee and Administration Committee.

In a brief interview after the meeting, Whittier said that the committee was not related to his position at the University of Kentucky where he works at the Martin Center for Public Administration as a policy analyst. He said it was a "personal concern of someone living in the county and planning on living here the rest of my life."

Whittier also said that he would like to see members of the PTO and PTAs in the county involved and that the committee does not intend to duplicate their efforts. "These organizations (PTO and PTA) are more concerned with individual schools while the Committee's concern will be more broadly based toward education as a whole in the county."

The next meeting of the committee will be on Tuesday night, October 25th at 7 p.m. in the lunchroom at the high school. At that time, committee assignments will be made.

fiscal court since January 1982. He's interested in seeing the county roads improved and maintained on a regular basis. He's been glad to see the county library organized and Rowan thinks the county is attracted to Renfro

Valley benefit the county. One thing he would like to see in Rockcastle is more recreation for young people.

Martha Cox is a housewife, mother and businesswoman. She's also on the board of the Rockcastle Council for the Arts, which is going into its second year. "One thing I see that needs improving is the cultural aspect of the county," she said, "because I think that the county as a whole has failed." Mrs. Cox pointed out that people in the area have to entertain the county for entertainment and culture.

The Rockcastle Council for the Arts raised money and held the county fair. The county was matched by government funds from the Kentucky Arts Council. This money helped finance a play produced this summer by local residents. "BY HENR" was performed at Renfro Valley, but was not as well attended as she felt it could have been.

"I think it would be great to see community leaders here that everyone can take part in. You one can take part in. You can't imagine what the kids get from it."

Mrs. Cox also thinks that the tourism generated by Renfro Valley is a sign of progress for the county. "But don't think we've taken advantage of it," she said. "We've never tapped that resource as we should have."

Floyd Owens is the project director of the Mt. Vernon Revitalization Program. Revitalization is a three year program now in its second year.

Owens said, "I think the main strait modernization is a vital thing that will get merchants interested in their own business and will keep business here instead of letting it go elsewhere. Right now it's being partially funded by government grants, the Small Business Association, and a \$3,100 grant from the Kentucky Historical Society. This goes into a revolving loan fund of \$25,000 that merchants can borrow at 3% interest to upgrade the exterior of their buildings."

Wayne Stewart is a local merchant and the chairman of the board for the Rockcastle County Hospital, Inc. He commented, "Probably the thing that turned the county around first was Lake Linn, which was a good starting point for the county to make progress. And that probably led to the industrial park."

He went on, "I'd like to see more industry for more jobs. So far the industrial park has created about 205 new jobs and as long as we can keep a good type of industry then we can keep the people working here in the county."

"The next five years, maybe all the federal (people) financing and assistance from such places as Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation will work and we can attract more industry. I think another attraction of Rockcastle County is its location close to I-75."

Stewart also noted the progress the hospital is making. "I think the hospital has reached the

point where it can grow and the Skilled Nursing Facility, due to its ventilator program, is now known all over the United States. Because of the advancement of the hospital, we'll see new physicians come into the area... expecting about four physicians during 1984."

Wayne Stewart has lived in Rockcastle County all of his life and he's optimistic about the future of the area. To sum up his feelings about progress in the county, he said simply, "I think we've just broken the surface of what we can do."

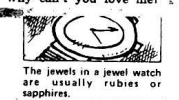

Fumbles and officiating cost Rockets 2nd District loss at Bell Co.

The Rockcastle County High School Rockets are now five and two on the season after a district loss to Bell County Friday night at Pineville by a score of eighteen to twelve. Some mistakes by the Rockets such as two fumbles and very poor officiating figured heavily in the loss.

Both Rockcastle fumbles led to Bell County scores in the first half and gave Bell an advantage of twelve to zip at the midway point.

Head Coach David Hansel said his team was sort of overlooking Bell County in the first half of play and this resulted in the half time score difference but Hansel said in the second half it was a totally different game.

Although Bell County scored first in the second

half to run their advantage to eighteen, Rockcastle came back strong.

About the middle of the third quarter, junior running back Garry Fain scored on a thirty-five yard run from scrimmage to pull the Rockets to within twelve at eighteen to six.

Rockcastle's defense held and the Rockets got the ball back. Some good running by senior back, Scottie Robinson and some excellent blocking by the Rockcastle offensive line enabled the Rockets to get to the Bell County five yard line. However an injury to a Bell County player resulted in about a fifteen minute delay and caused the Rockets to lose their momentum. On four tries, the Rockets were held and Bell County took over on the one foot line

Rockcastle held and at the beginning of the fourth quarter, Bell had to give the ball back.

A fine return by Robinson set up another Rockcastle score, again by Fain, and Bell's advantage was only six points. Bell gained a couple of first downs on the ensuing series but Rockcastle finally held and took over on their own thirty but, it should have been the forty-five, as the referees were the only ones who missed a facemask call against Bell County on the punt.

This is when things really started going bad for the Rockets. It seemed that Rockcastle would get a first down and the referees would then call a penalty against them. Although Rockcastle was penalized sixty yards on

this series of plays they still managed to get the ball to Bell County's eighteen yard line with about three minutes to play.

Bell County held the Rockets on this series but it was quite obvious to the fans in the stands that even if Rockcastle had scored the referees would have taken it away from them. It was the poorest officiated game the Rockets have played in this year.

Even with the loss, Rockcastle had some very bright spots. Garry Fain, who was offensive player of the week in the Casey-

Rockcastle game, gained one hundred twenty six yards on six carries and senior Jeff Hansel, who was shaken up in the first half, played an excellent game both on offense and defense.

Defensive player of the week in the Rockcastle-Casey game was David Glover.

Bell County was a district game and now, according to Coach Hansel, the Rockets must beat Knox Central and Cawood to have any chance at the playoffs.

Rockcastle will play Lynn Camp this Friday night at home and, according to Hansel, it will not be an easy contest.

County gets grants; one is for \$651,640

Three grants for the county have been announced by Cong. Harold Rogers' office.

The major grant involves the partial financing of a joint venture between the Mountain Road and Mt. Vernon Plastic Association for Community Economic Development in Berea (MACED) and Mullins Log and Lumber Co. at Climax.

The grant of \$651,640 from the Department of Health and Human Services will help create a trading company which will buy higher grades of lumber from small sawmills, sort, grade and dry it and then resell it in large lots on the national market.

According to Cong. Rogers' office, the investment will help generate jobs in Rockcastle County and at smaller sawmills in surrounding counties.

A \$118,100 grant from the Economic Development Association has been ap-

proved to the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority.

This money will be used to build a rail spur to the industrial park which will provide access to Mt. Vernon Plastics in particular.

These funds are part of the Jobs Bill legislation passed this spring by Congress and which Cong. Rogers voted for and supported.

It is anticipated the building of this rail spur will help retain 105 jobs and ultimately lead to 75 additional jobs for Rockcastle County.

The third grant announced is from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for \$12,000 to the Housing Authority of Mt. Vernon.

This money will be used for roofs, storm windows and insulation on existing government housing in the area.



Elmer Whittier of Climax conducted the first meeting Monday night of the Committee for Educational Excellence in Rockcastle County. Over fifty persons attended.

Turn-out is good for first meeting of Committee for Educational Excellence

Approximately 50 persons attended Monday night's first meeting of the Committee for Educational Excellence in Rockcastle County.

Elmer Whittier of Climax welcomed the group, which had among it a large contingent of teachers and administrators and a fair representation of parents and other interested citizens.

Mr. Whittier began by telling the group that he was "encouraged to see this many people from the school system (at the meeting)." However, he added, "in future meetings, it would be more encouraging to see more parents who are not employed in the school system come because they are concerned about the kind of education their children are getting."

Saying that he hoped one of the accomplishments of the Committee would be "to mobilize people to express their concern," Mr. Whittier called for comments from the group and this brought several comments from various parents concerning such areas as a concern for the limited number of courses offered at the vocational school, the absence of an honors program for upper grades at the high school, the lack of involvement by parents and the disregard for recommendations and suggestions of parents by teachers and administrators.

One parent, Gary Cromer of Mt. Vernon, said he felt one of the reasons parent involvement might be lacking was because in other organizations when parents get involved they find it to be of little use since "final decisions are cut and dried with none of the recommendations (made by parents) taken into consideration."

Mr. Cromer also said that he had received notification from his daughter's school several times "saying if he would be willing to serve on various committees and had always responded favorably but had never been asked to serve."

Deborah Newland of Brodhead reinforced Mr. Cromer's comments and said that she felt that recommendations and suggestions made to teachers and administrators concerning problems children might be having would often cause the problem to be "blown over" since no one seemed to want to make the effort to solve them.

And, one parent expressed her concern with the lack of an honors program at the high school, saying that she felt the Humanities program instituted in the school system this year didn't fulfill all the needs of the children, especially those with almost equal ability but not included in the program.

Asst. RCHS principal Charles T. Baker responded by saying that with taking the children out of the grades for the Humanities program, it didn't leave an adequate number of students available to warrant the honors program. However, Supt. Parsons said later that he was going to recommend to the high school that the honors program be put back into the curriculum for next year.

Several suggestions were offered toward how to improve the quality of education and several of them concerned increased spending per pupil; however, one parent, David Ballinger of Orlando, suggested that it might be better for "first look at how the system's present resources were being used to make certain that the most is being obtained from them before looking at ways to increase resources."

Whittier said he felt that data should be compiled from other school systems in the 5th District to see how Rockcastle compares with them and to look at system across the nation to see how they have improved their system. Whittier said, "School systems that are already doing a good job seem to be expressing the most concern about improving."

He added that an improved school system would benefit the county by helping to attract more industry, saying that industries moving into an area look for a good system for two reasons (1) for their own children's benefit and (2) as a source of skilled future employees.

When asked by Gary Mink of Livingston if he felt this type of organization might have any "negative effect" on the system because of possible interference with teachers, Whittier replied that if the Committee became "burdensome" it might have a negative effect but that any negative effect would have to be weighed against how effective people (teachers and administrators) can be if they are just "hearing their own drums" and not hearing what people want from the

Community members speak out on progress in County

Rockcastle County is making progress.

This progress is evident every time you drink purified water from a can in Linville, attend a ballgame at the consolidated county high school or drive by the industrial park in Berea.

Rockcastle County was organized as the 52nd Kentucky county in 1810 and steady improvements followed over the next 150 years. But with the 21st century only 17 years away, one wonders what the future holds for Rockcastle. Will the county continue to progress or fall hopelessly behind in a computerized, technological world?

I interviewed eight members of the community and asked them what kinds of progress they would like to see in Rockcastle County. Several important areas were noted as needing improvement. But overall those who answered seemed to be optimistic about the county's future.

Since 1973 Roland Mullins has been the mayor of Rockcastle County. During his term he has seen the population of Mt. Vernon rise from 1,600 to 2,500 and there have been improvements in many things that have benefited the county.

He was glad to see the elderly housing projects come into the area and to see jobs generated through the urban development of the industrial park. He said that City Hall and its storage and parking areas have been improved and updated to

last until the year 2000. The Mt. Vernon Fire Department has also been improved and will be operational until the turn of the century.

Other areas he was pleased to see improved were the recreation facilities at Lake Linville, the upgrading of the streets throughout the city and the revitalization of downtown.

A project already in the works is the renovation of the city's sewer plants to update them for the next 25 years. Mayor Mullins hopes to see this completed in 1983.

There is also an authorized study being done on water treatment to determine what will be needed to carry the area through the next 25 years.

But Mayor Mullins' biggest priority is jobs. "It's the industry, such as the service industry, that we'll be able to recruit in the next 10 years."

Bob Jasper has been the county judge since January 1962 and has lived in Rockcastle for 44 years. He said, "I think that most of the things that have come into the county, such as the new lake, sewer system and two factories, have been good for the county."

"I'd like to see more industry and better roads. A landfill is an immediate need and we think we might have that in the near future."

Ronnie Cash is an assistant principal at the Rockcastle County High School. From his experience in the county's school

Dear Editor,

I feel compelled to write regarding the article on the front page of the September 28 edition entitled "Reports show 5th District is least educated in U.S."

This is a very alarming statement, and I'm sure many people were shaken by it, as I am. However, let's be sure we do not draw wrong conclusions from the report. This is not necessarily a reflection on our school system or on our dedicated teachers. Here are some of the reasons.

1) "Least educated" in the report based on the percent (37.7) of 5th district (27 counties) adults age 25 and older, who are high school graduates. The percent for Rockcastle County was "not available," so it may be higher or lower than this average for the state.

2) Our school superintendent, Mr. Parsons, has reported in the same article that 67.9% of Rockcastle County freshmen do go on to graduate from high school. This is 30.2% more than the 37.7% figure, assuming this district average is correct for Rockcastle County. Where are those graduates?

3) Our citizens of Rockcastle County could tell you where many of them are. They are, "uncle Sam's" sons, grandsons, cousins, sons and daughters who graduated from Rockcastle County schools, and are now leaders in other communities. They have taken their talents, which were nurtured here in our schools, and gone where opportunities for them were available. Cities such as Lexington, Louisville, Cincinnati, Dayton, and Detroit have large numbers of our most able former students! For 30 years or more we have been producing a good by-product to them each spring as they set out, high school diploma in hand, to make a life for themselves. Those cities are richer for getting them and we are poorer for losing them.

We do want and need to improve our schools, but no matter how much we improve them, we will continue to be "least educated" by this measure until we manage to provide opportunities here for our high school graduates.

I would also like to comment on another recent report in the Signal, which cited the low ranking on standardized tests scores achieved by Rockcastle County students: 162nd out of 180 districts in Kentucky on the average achievement of the students. Those who work in our schools know that we have many fine students who rank in the top 10% of students nationwide. Let us hope these will not be among those who leave us in years to come.

Those students who do poorly in school and contribute to the low average achievement are a result of many factors. Probably, no factor has a greater effect on students and teachers than the large class sizes with which our teachers must contend. Many of our classrooms have groups as large as 35 or 40 students. No matter how competent, dedicated and hardworking a teacher is, he/she cannot give students the personal attention they need and deserve in groups this large. Student-teacher ratios are usually quoted much lower than this because all teaching personnel are included in the ratio whether they have a regular classroom or not. For example, in elementary school the figure would include librarians, music teachers, speech teachers, Chaper, reading teachers, special education teachers and physical education teachers who take groups out of regular classrooms for short periods of the day. In high school, some of our teachers have 175

to 180 students per day. If an English teacher assigns students to write 1 paragraph each, she will spend hours analyzing 180 paragraphs. Yet, writing is one of the best ways to improve English skills.

It is wonderful to see people becoming interested in improving our schools. We can do this, however, only if we look for real causes and not for someone to blame, and only if we understand the problems behind the facts and figures so glibly reported. The problems have not appeared overnight, and they will not be easy to solve. They are not problems that belong only to our schools, but are rather problems of the whole community. We need to tackle them from that broader perspective.
