

Last second field goal by Wildcats cost Rockets third loss, 15-14

A field goal with 37 seconds left in the game, gave the Lynn Camp Wildcats a 15-14 win over the Rockets Friday night.

The Rockets tried desperately to come back and almost die with the help of a clipping penalty against Lynn Camp and a 43-yard pass from quarterback Chris Cornelius to sophomore Greg Mink at the 10-yard-line. But, it was not enough as time ran out before the Rockets could get another play off.

The Rockets scored all their points with less than three minutes left in the first half and both were scored by very unusual plays.

The first score was set up by a fumble recovery by senior defensive end, Jeff Hangel, on Lynn Camp's 45.

Two penalties later - illegal use of the hands and clipping, both against the Rockets - made the going a little slow but on 3rd and 30, Cornelius found senior Greg Long open on the Wildcats' 15 and it was 1st and 10.

Senior Scotty Robinson got 4 yards, then the Rockets were penalized again (offsides). Robinson then picked up 6 more yards on two carries but it was still 4th and 5 when Cornelius tried to go around Lynn Camp's left end. He was stopped by a Wildcat defender and, down on one knee, Cornelius spied Robinson open on his right and shuffled the ball off to him. Robinson then took the ball into the end zone.

On the extra point attempt, Cornelius found Long all alone in the end zone and the Rockets were ahead 8-0.

Following the Rockets' kick-off, the Wildcats had to punt the ball away after three plays. It was a short punt with a wicked bounce. The ball bounced in front of Robinson, who hesitated but couldn't resist. He finally picked the ball up and returned it to the sideline for a 65-yard TD.

Time ran out while

Robinson was going in for the score but the Rockets, of course, got to try their extra point attempt anyway but this time it failed and the Rockets had to settle for a 14-0 lead at half-time.

The Rockets got the ball at the beginning of the second half but couldn't get a drive going and had to punt.

The Wildcats were also unable to sustain their drive and were in punt formation on their own 30-yard line with a 4th and 5 when the Rockets were called for offsides. Lynn Camp then elected to go for the first down.

They got more than a first down, however, as the runner broke free around his right end and took the ball into the end zone with 8:22 left in the third quarter. The extra point attempt was no good.

Following the Wildcat's kick-off, the Rockets had to punt the ball away and Lynn Camp began their next drive at the Rockets' 48-yard line.

The Wildcat quarterback found a receiver open and Long saved a TD on the play by knocking him out-of-bounds on the Rockets' 30.

A spearing penalty helped the Wildcats to the Rockets' 4-yard-line where it was 4th and inches. Then a facemask penalty against the Rockets gave the Wildcats a first down on the 1 1/2 yard line and, two plays later, the Wildcats went in for the score.

Again the Wildcats' extra point attempt was no good and the Rockets were still ahead 14-12.

Lynn Camp's final score was set up by a fumble between punter Greg Long and the center and the Wildcats took over on the Rockets' 26 yard line.

Lynn Camp moved the ball to the Rockets' 9-yard-line where a complete pass was good for a Wildcat TD but the score was called back because of an offsides penalty against

Lynn Camp. On the next play, Hangel got to the quarterback for a five-yard sack and it looked like the Wildcats might come up empty-handed since it was 4th and goal from the 14.

But, Lynn Camp was not through as they successfully put a field goal through the uprights.

Senior Jeff Hangel and junior Tim Roberts played great defensive games but they had plenty of practice during the game as the Rockets managed only one first down, the second half - on the long pass from Cornelius to Mink. The Rockets were penalized over 150 yards in the game compared to only 100 for Lynn Camp and Rockcastle ran 50 offensive plays in the game to Lynn Camp's 54. But, in the second half, the difference in offensive plays was 33 to 21 in favor of the Wildcats.

The Rockets have three games left, two of them district games. The next game, a district game, is at Cawood this Friday night.

The council also heard a request by Steve Midkiff, environmentalist for the Rockcastle County Health Department, that they pass an ordinance prohibiting the burning or storage of solid waste in the city limits.

Midkiff told the council that he had received several phone calls from residents of the city complaining about the practice of burning solid waste and said it did cause some health problems, including a concentration of rodents around these areas.

Midkiff presented the council with a sample of the type of ordinance he would like for them to pass but the council, with very little discussion, took no action on the matter, indicating they wished to put it off until a later date.

Singleton and Associates were the successful low bidder for the city's insurance.

Only two bids were submitted, the other from a Somerset agency. However, their bid was also twice as much as Singleton's \$5,761 bid.

The council also passed a

resolution to supply Western Water District with the amount of water needed for the Red Hill area if Western's present grant and loan application for funds to build water lines, to that area is approved.

On the same subject, the council heard from Barbara Begley, who requested the city look into the possibility of supplying water to the Pine Hill area.

Ms. Begley said there were six houses on the same road

that wanted water and told the council that the only water she had at present came out of a mind. Councilman Tom Welch responded, "This woman is drinking water that comes out of a mine. That is the kind of water supply we have in this county."

Welch went on to say that Western (whose water lines are already in that area) should supply the water or let the city supply them.

Called court meeting on jail facility cancelled

Last Saturday's special meeting of the county Fiscal Court, to decide on what type of jail facility to have, was cancelled because of not being able to get needed information from the state Department of Corrections, County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper said.

Judge Jasper said that a letter, sent to Jim Woodrum of the state Department of Corrections by County Attorney James Lambert asking for the court's alternatives in dealing with the problem of upgrading the present facility, was not answered and Mr. Woodrum could not be reached.

The court had also decided to ask Mr. Woodrum to attend the special meet-

ing to answer any questions that might arise in connection with the facility.

Jasper said Tuesday that he felt the court "might not ought to be in too big a hurry (to decide which route to go)" since he said he felt the legislature might lessen some of the new regulations when they convene after the first of the year.

As to the deadline the court is facing to make their decision, October 28th according to Jailer Henry Lee Abney, Jasper said he felt he might be able to "stall" for more time so the court could determine just exactly what their alternatives might be.

Bunning explains position on two major campaign issues

Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Bunning visited Mt. Vernon Saturday night, his fourth visit to the county, and during his half-hour speech, made his position on two controversial issues - gun control and a state lottery - very clear.

Bunning's stand on gun control was very popular with the majority of persons present - he promised to veto any gun control legislation to pass over his desk while governor.

But, his proposal of a state lottery, in aid of education, met with mixed emotions.

Following Bunning's speech, several people present said they did not approve of a lottery, equating it with condoning gambling, but the same persons agreed that it would be a much-needed financial boost for education and that the proposal by Bunning would not keep them from supporting him.

On gun control, Bunning said that the state's constitution guaranteed citizens the right to bear arms and said he felt "the only people hurt by gun control ... are low-abiding citizens."

Bunning also said he felt there was "more gun control than we need right now."

As for a state lottery, Bunning who said he had been accused of "dunking" the issue said "I will propose a state-wide lottery which will raise 70 million dollars a year and all that will be used to help educate our children."

Bunning also said he proposed to spend \$45 million to upgrade education and he felt that this amount could be made available under the existing budget. However, Bunning said he didn't feel this would be enough so he intended to propose the lottery.

Bunning said the proposal would be in the form of a constitutional amendment which, if the people felt it was morally wrong, they could vote against it. However, Bunning reminded the crowd that many people believed the sale of liquor to be morally wrong but taxes from the sale of liquor are used to support education.

Bunning also promised to do away with the weight-distance tax imposed on truckers recently saying this tax was "chasing truckers out (of the state)" and increased the price of coal to where it was not competitive.

PARENT-TEACHER DAY SET FOR FRIDAY

According to Superintendent Charles B. Parsons, Friday will be a county-wide Parent-Teacher Day (all all grade schools and the high school).

This will be a time, Mr. Parsons said, when parents may visit their children's schools and discuss their progress with teachers.

Regular school will not be in session and the day will be counted as an in-service day for teachers. Visitation hours at the schools will be regular school hours.

Road contract

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract to resurface 1.7 miles of road in Rockcastle County.

The Allen Co. of Winchester received a \$77,543 contract for the project.

The company will resurface KY 1912, Brush Creek-Orlando-Cruise Ridge Road, from Brushy Creek to KY 1797.

The project is part of the state's rural secondary road

He also told the crowd about two recent polls, one of which shows him 10 points ahead in his home territory of Northern Kentucky, which is 3 to 1 Democratic. And, Bunning said, a poll by Channel 32 in Louisville shows him only three points behind Mrs. Collins in Jefferson, Spivey, Oldham and Bullitt counties, traditionally Democratic strongholds.

The nominee told the crowd, "This thing (the election) is ours to grab and this district and you people can make it happen. You are the ones who need to do the work for the next three weeks."

During his speech, Bunning spoke at length on the state of education in Kentucky, saying that it had deteriorated badly in the last four years. "Our responsibility as leaders in this Commonwealth is to provide our children with an education system and jobs so they can stay here."

Bunning interspersed and ended his speech with a plea for help in the remaining three weeks before the election, saying "I am counting on the

5th District and Rockcastle County. I need your vote, help and prayers because come November 8th, if all fail to come together."

Following Bunning's speech, a banquet given by Congressman Harold Rogers state Senator Eugene Siler Bunning and Hagan Comer was auctioned off by state Representative Danny Ford.

The ball was originally auctioned off at a 5th District rally and bought by Mr. Comer for \$1,000. Comer donated the ball to be auctioned again and it was bought the second time by the Rockcastle County Republican Club.

This time, the successful bidder was Rockcastle PVA Elmer Hale who represented a group of county Republicans for \$100.

Hale then donated the ball to Cleton Savid, principal of the high school, to be placed in the school's trophy display case.

The money realized from the auction will be used to hire precinct workers election day, Ford said.

Rockcastle Co. is eligible for FmHA emergency loans

Rockcastle County is one of the 197 counties which has been designated as eligible for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) emergency loans by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block.

The designation was made because of general crop losses resulting from excessive rainfall and flooding during the planting season followed by drought and excessively high temperatures beginning in May. The effective date of this designation is October 7, 1983, FmHA State Director Kendall Seaton, said today.

Farmers have six months from the designation date (October 7) to file an application. Seaton said, farmers should visit the local FmHA county office to obtain the

necessary application packet. The farmer will need to file a written application which includes a financial statement and a loss certification form plus a written proposal for his 1984 farming operation including projected expenses. Seaton said, when these documents are completed, they should be returned to the local FmHA county office as soon as possible.

Emergency loan employees are now being hired to assist each farmer in the most efficient manner possible, Mr. Seaton said. Training sessions for these employees are to be conducted within the next two weeks.

 percent rate for the first \$100,000 was announced September 28 by the Secretary of Agriculture as a measure to help farmers whose crops and pastures have been damaged by the extremely hot and dry weather. A rate of 8 percent was also established for any amount to emergency loss loan over \$100,000.
 The 5 and 8 percent interest is available only to farmers unable to obtain credit from a private commercial lender, Mr. Seaton said. Farmers who can obtain credit from a private lender but choose to borrow from FmHA will continue to be charged the market rate of interest, currently 13.75 percent.
 Farmers qualifying for emergency loans can borrow up to 80 percent of their actual

production loss not to exceed a maximum of \$500,000 or that amount actually needed, whichever is less. Seaton said in qualifying for the Emergency loans, farmers will need to provide adequate collateral and substantiate repayment ability.

Rogers Pleased With Drought Relief For Rockcastle Farmers

Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers said he is pleased that Agriculture Secretary John Block has designated Rockcastle County as an agricultural disaster area because of this year's drought.

"As one of the first to call for this declaration, I am gratified that the Secretary of Agriculture, John Block, has agreed our farmers need help," said Rogers. "Hopefully, the assistance our farmers can now get in Rockcastle County will help these farmers deal with the financial burdens many of them are facing."

Farmers who are eligible will be able to get 5 percent loans up to \$100,000 from the Farmers Home Administration, and 8 percent loans for any amount over \$100,000. The money can be used to help

buy seed, equipment, or pay off other debts.

"Each farmer's eligibility depends on the crop loss at his own farm and his own financial situation," Rogers said. "I urge any farmer who believes he may be eligible to contact the Rockcastle County Farmers Home office."

Rogers said the declaration of disaster in 107 Kentucky counties came as the result of major crop losses in Kentucky this summer due to the hot, dry weather. Losses in some counties ranged from 35 to 80 percent.

"As a member of the Agriculture Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee, which oversees the activities of the Department of Agriculture, I will continue to

make sure that funding is made available for these disaster areas which are so vital to the farmers in Rockcastle County and elsewhere."

Farm & Home News

SOIL TESTING

What is soil testing? Soil testing is a scientific analysis of the cropping potential. In other words, measuring the approximate amount of soil nutrients. We say approximate because only a small portion of soil is analyzed and must represent a vast amount of soil throughout the field. This, however, is still a much more reliable way of making fertilizer recommendations than seeing a soil and saying it is good or bad, needs no fertilizer or a whole lot.

Since different fields and areas within the same field frequently vary in their availability of plant nutrients for crops, soil samples must be taken to represent these different areas. If an area can be limed and fertilized as a separate field then several samples should be taken to represent as many different types of land as are present.

Special tools aren't required. A soil probe or spade along with clean buckets are all you need. Once the field to be tested is chosen, start at one corner and walk from one side to the other in a zig-zag pattern taking sample as you work your way to the other end. Take samples from 8" to 12" within the plow layer. Depending upon the size of the field, samples at 15-25 locations are adequate. Larger fields will require more samples.

After enough samples have been taken to represent the chosen field, mix the collected soil thoroughly. Air dry about one quart and bring this into the extension office.

The cost is only \$2.25 which is much less than the cost of 1/4 a bag of fertilizer.

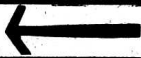

**Stock Your Freezer
While Meat Is On Sale**

Because of the dry summer and expected high cost of feeding cattle and hogs, some farmers are selling their stock earlier than planned. This bad situation for farmers has contributed to a temporary oversupply of beef and pork and prices are down at many supermarkets.

If you have room in your freezer, it's a good time to stock up on meat before prices go up later in the year as predicted.

"Since a half-empty freezer costs as much to operate as a full one, use the space to freeze and store meat purchased on sale.

Package meat in family size servings and wrap snugly with freezer foil, plastic film or paper. Place a piece of film or paper between chops or patties to make separation for cooking easier. Removing unedible parts such as bones and fat before packaging maximizes use of freezer space.

Prepackaged meat should be overwrapped with freezer film, since the plastic supermarket wrap is not air-tight.

Label each package with the date, kind and cut of meat, and weight or number of servings or pieces.

Meat retains its quality best if frozen quickly. Turn the freezer control to the coldest position and freeze no more than two pounds per cubic feet at a time. A 20-cubic foot freezer can handle 40 pounds of meat at a time. Larger

amounts should be frozen first at a locker plant.

Also, to freeze the meat rapidly, place each package in direct contact with a refrigerated surface and leave a little space between packages to allow cold air to circulate. Maintain a temperature of 0 degrees in the freezer.

Here are the recommended storage times for meat kept at 0 degrees: ground meat, 3-4 months; liver, 3 months; pork, 6-8 months; beef steaks and roasts, 8-12 months.

If stored too long, frozen meat loses quality and develops an off-flavor. Pork develops an off-flavor more rapidly than beef. So purchase only an amount that your family can comfortably use up within the recommended storage time.

Frozen food stored too long is not dangerous but it will not taste good. If the off-flavor is slight, it can be masked by using marinades and cooking the meat with strong flavors such as onion, tomato and herbs and spices.

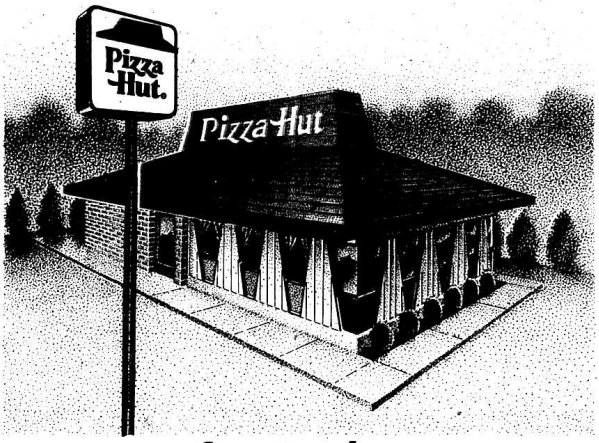

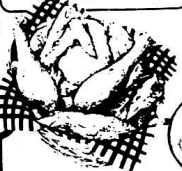

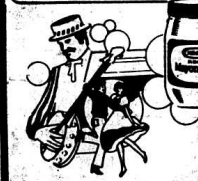
