Approved rule providing of-tital grading of burley to-bace sold in sheets
The U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved a new rule providing farmers official grading of U.S. Type 31, Burley tobacco of-fered for sale at auction when displayed untied on burlap sheets. This rule con-tains the following provi-sions that farmers must comply with in order for

their tobacco to be eligible for a U.S. Standard grade:

1. The tobacco must be oriented. This means the leaves must be placed on the sheet in a round or square pile with all the butts toward the outside of the elie.

A lot or pile shall constitute only one sheet stacking one sheet on top of another will not be permitted.






