Versatile Pumpkins Make  
Jack-O-Lanterns and Pudding

Pumpkins are great for

Jack-o-lanterns or front step decorations at Halloween. They are also great for cookies, pies, breads and puddings, or served plain as a vegetable.

The first step in any pumpkins recipe is to cook the pumpkin and prepare mashed pumpkin, unless you prefer to use canned pumpkin.

To cook it in the oven, wash the pumpkin and cut it in half, crosswise. Remove the seeds and strings. Place the pumpkin in a shallow pan, cut side down and bake in a 325 degree oven one hour or until tender. Scrape the pulp from the shell and mash with potato masher or mixer.

For cooking in a saucepan or steamer leave the skin on and cut the pumpkin into small pieces. Boil or steam it for 15-20 minutes or until tender. Run cool water over it and the skin peels away easily. Mash pumpkin with potato masher, mixer or blender.

**Pumpkin Pudding**

- 3 cups mashed cooked pumpkin
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 2 T. brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon finely shredded orange peel
- 1 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp Dash pepper
- 4 egg yolks
- 4 stiffly beaten egg whites

In large mixing bowl, combine pumpkin, butter or margarine, brown sugar, salt, orange peel, nutmeg, and pepper. Beat till fluffy. Add egg yolks, beat well. Carefully fold pumpkin mixture into stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into 1/2 quart souffle' dish. Bake at 350 degrees till set, 55-60 minutes. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

**Frozen Pumpkin Dessert Squares**

- 1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup margarine, melted
- 2 cups cooked pumpkin
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream, softened

Mix crumbs with margarine. Press into bottom of 9" square pan. Combine pumpkin with brown sugar, salt and spices. Fold in ice cream. Pour into crumbled pan. Cover, freeze until firm. Take out of freezer about 20 minutes before serving. Cut into squares, garnish with tablespoon of whipped cream, if desired. Yield 9 servings.

Separate strings from seeds and wash seeds in several changes of water. Rubbing seeds together between your hands will help remove bits of pumpkins. Drain Bowl seeds in salted water for 15 minutes. Drain. Place seeds in shallow pan and roast in 350 degree oven 30-45 minutes until seeds look toasted. Stir once or twice during roasting. Boiling the seeds first makes them easy to shell.

A report was made on the Foster-Essey Contest currently being sponsored by the District. It was reported that all schools are participating and approximately 1000 Conservation Materials have been delivered to the schools. Roy Brown gave a report on the Test Plots at Quail and stated that progress was very good. David Stipes of the Soil Conservation Service gave a report stating that approximately 90% of construction work had been completed for 1983. David also stated that the practices of waterways, diversion channels and ponds were generally in good vegetative cover despite

KET, with the cooperation of Kentucky War on Drugs, Inc., has produced two programs to precede each of the national shows. "The Chemical People: Kentucky Edition," takes cameras around the state for interviews with young people and their parents, and will seek to provide some answers at the local level. These programs will be aired at 7:30 p.m., on November 2 and November 9.

KET plans to bolster these programs with two telecasts of its own. A statewide wrap up is scheduled for November 12. On November 3, "The Quiet Place," will be aired. The teleplay concerns the death of an adolescent from a drug overdose and how this affects his family, girlfriends and friends. "The Quiet Place" is co-funded by KET and the Kentucky War on Drugs.

The town meetings scheduled for this area are representative of the more than two hundred scheduled to be held in Kentucky. Ultimate coordination of these events is the responsibility of the Kentucky War on Drugs through the fifteen regional Development Districts.

Each town meeting will facilitate the viewing and discussion of "The Chemical People" broadcasts. Several thousand similar gatherings are expected to take place across the nation. The people at these meetings will then form task forces in their individual communities to better meet the needs of our young people.

For Rockcastle County, the energies of the private citizens, social organizations such as the Jaycees, Lions, Junior League and Kiwanis have joined forces to address the pressing issue of drug and alcohol abuse among the young.

**KET to present  
"The Quiet Place"**

On November 3, at 8:00 p.m., E.T., Kentucky Educational Television (KET) will present "The Quiet Place," as a part of "The Chemical People Project."

"The Quiet Place" is based on the 1982 winner of the Kentucky Drama competition sponsored by the Kentucky High School Speech League. It involves the affects of a drug related death upon the family and friends of adolescent male. In particular, the storyline involves the personal issues faced by the deceased's girlfriend in dealing with peer pressure and drug usage.

Eddie Kennedy is the author of "The Quiet Place." An undergraduate in English College, he received his graduate training from Eastern Kentucky University. An educator with twelve years experience, he is director of the theatre and television curriculum for the Berea Community School System. Among other works is the play "Just One Day" which won Best Play and Outstanding Performer in Kentucky State Competition in 1979. The play was also honored a Corporation For Public Award in January, 1981.

The cast of "The Quiet Place" are students and residents of Berea, Kentucky. Much of the filming was done in Berea. Its premiere will be at the Hyatt Regency, in Lexington, at the first board orientation of the Kentucky War on Drugs, which co-funded the film with KET.

"The Chemical People" is a nationwide broadcast through the National Public Broadcasting System (PBS) with Nancy Reagan as host. In Kentucky, "The Chemical People" is co-sponsored by Kentucky Educational Television, the Kentucky War on Drugs, and Channel 15-Louisville. The project employs two-one hour broadcasts which confront school-age drug and alcohol abuse. More than two hundred town meetings are planned on the nights of the telecasts.

Throughout Kentucky, members of local service organizations, elected officials,

educators and interested citizens have joined forces to establish these assemblies. Each town meet-

ing will facilitate the viewing and discussion of "The Chemical People" broadcasts. Eventually, these community task forces

will become the local centers of a statewide coalition concerned about drugs and alcohol prevention.

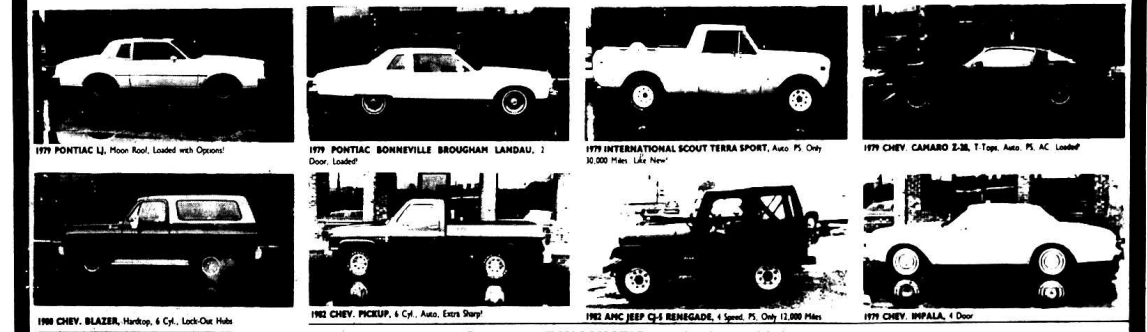

Anyone interested in participating in the parade should contact Mike Manship at The Bank of Mt. Vernon.

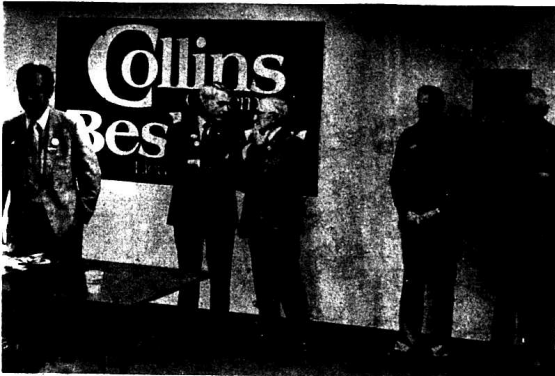
Applications are also being accepted for Santa Claus (see application form on inside page).

## Brown Memorial Award presented to John Houston

The Rockcastle Development Council presented the Everett C. Brown Memorial Award Monday night, posthumously to John Houston, a leader in civic and

agricultural areas in the county throughout his lifetime.

Accepting the award was his widow, Mrs. Margaret Houston, his son,

Johnny Houston of Midland, Ohio and his daughters, Mrs. Linda McNamee of Lexington and Doris Robinson of Pleasant Plains, Ohio.

In making the presentation, Clay Colson, vice president of the Improvement Council, listed some of Mr. Houston's contributions which included: being one of the original organizers of the Soil Conservation District in the county in 1944 and serving as a member of the board for 40 years and its chairman for about 9 years; chairman of the Area Conservation District Supervisors for 4 years which covered the surrounding 11 counties; president of the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau for 10 years and highway maintenance foreman for years.

Mr. Houston was also one of Rockcastle's biggest and most outstanding farmers. As a "Grade A" dairyman, he was a promoter of improvements in dairy cattle, housing and milking facilities, better pasture and hay and better markets. The first Dairy Field Day was held on his farm.

A great influence to this area was his introduction of Ky. 31 fescue. He also had the first combine in the county and by saving seed from his first 5 acres of fescue, he aided in its spread quickly to many more farms. He also had

the first self-propelled combine.

Mr. Houston also had many other attributes as a

## Ohio man killed instantly in accident

An Ohio man was killed instantly Thursday night in a single-car accident on Interstate 75 after he lost control of his car and slammed into an embankment.

According to Deputy Coroner Roy Martin, Curtis B. Mason, 20, of Cincinnati, Ohio was traveling south on the interstate about 8:10 p.m. when, according to his wife, he pulled into the median and began traveling at an excessive rate of speed.

Mason reportedly attempted to pull back onto the interstate but lost control of the vehicle and it slammed into the right-hand embankment. Mason and his wife's five-month-old baby

were both thrown from the vehicle on impact. However, Mrs. Mason and the baby were not seriously injured in the accident and were released from the Rockcastle County Hospital on Friday.

The couple had reportedly just been married on Thursday and were enroute to Cincinnati, Ohio.

The body was taken to Lexington for an autopsy. Martin said, to try and determine the cause of the "erratic behavior" Mrs. Mason said her husband exhibited just prior to the accident.

The results of the autopsy have not been released.

## Ronnie McClure is big winner in bass tournament

Ronnie McClure of Mt. Vernon won the Mountain Division of the Red Man All American Tournament held at Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley recently.

For winning this division, with a total two-day catch of 28 lbs., McClure received a Ranger bass boat, valued at \$10,000. He also won the Big Bass award for catching the biggest fish of the tournament, a 7 lb. 1 oz. Bass. The prize with this award was a 150 hp Mercury outboard motor.

On the last day of competition, the top three winners from each of the 10 divisions, competed for the big money. McClure's total catch for that day weighed 2 lbs. 10 oz. which gave him a 22nd place finish the final day.

Each contestant had to take an observer with him to the tournament and McClure chose his father-in-law, Ernest Stanley of Mt. Vernon. Mr. Stanley fished with McClure the first two practice days of the tournament, and was then placed with another fisherman for the actual competition. Out of 240 observers in the tournament, Stanley ranked 10th in total catch.

Top winner in the \$127,000 tournament was Dean Starkey of Peru, Indiana, who won \$50,000 for his Saturday catch of 17 lbs. 6 oz. Second was Tom Snow of Calvert City, Ky., who won \$15,000 for a total

catch of 13 lbs. 15 oz. and third was Don Carrow of Imperial, Mo. who received a \$10,000 prize for his total catch Saturday of 12 lbs. 1 oz.

The All American Tournament was comprised of the top qualifiers in the Red Man Tournament Trail, a circuit designed for non-professional bass anglers. About 240 qualifiers, representing 10 divisions of competition in 11 states competed in the All American finale.

In 1984, the Red Man Tournament expands to 30 tournaments in 29 states, covering roughly the eastern half of the U.S., including Texas.

"This expansion will offer more recreational fishermen the opportunity to participate in top competition at tournaments close to their homes," said Mike Whittaker, president of Operation Bass, the organization that manages the Red Man Tournament Trail.

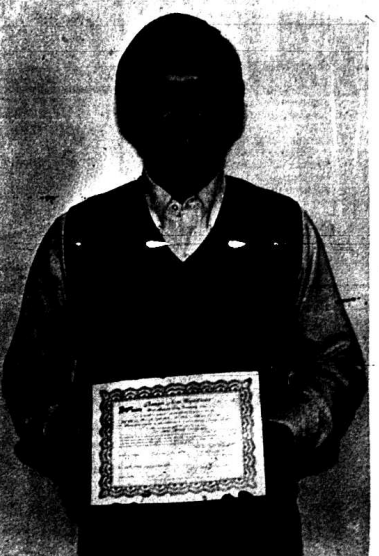
Nearly 10,000 amateur fishermen competed in the 1983 Red Man Tournament Trail. Membership in Operation Bass next year is expected to exceed 25,000, Whittaker said.

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

I have no answer; however, I'm hoping we can elect a judge that can do a better job than this.

People, please consider this election closely and ask yourself, "Do we want a judge who will turn someone like this man back in the public among our children and family."

Consider my brother's little children who are left without a father, think if it was in your family and see if you wouldn't feel as I do.

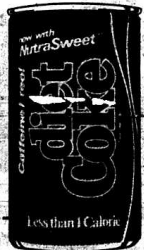

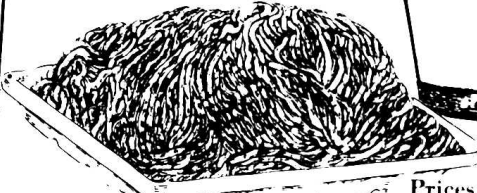

Approved rule providing of-ficial grading of burley tobacco sold in sheets

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved a new rule providing farmers official grading of U.S. Type 31, Burley tobacco offered for sale at auction when displayed untied on burlap sheets. This rule contains the following provisions that farmers must comply with in order for

their tobacco to be eligible for a U.S. Standard grade:

1. The tobacco must be oriented. This means the leaves must be placed on the sheet in a round or square pile with all the butts toward the outside of the pile.

2. A lot or pile shall constitute only one sheet - stacking one sheet on top of another will not be permitted.

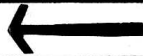

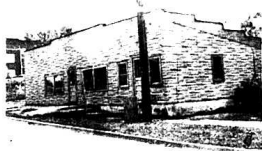

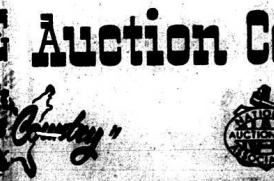

# Rockets beat Cawood 34-26; next game will determine play-off

It all came together for the Rockets Friday night as they downed the Cawood Trojans in the first of two games they must win to play in the state play-offs.

The Rockets played their best game of the season, both offensively and defensively, with senior running back Scotty Robinson gaining 251 yards and scoring 4 touchdowns in the process.

The Rockets wasted little time in putting points on the board as James Poynter's opening kick-off was a short one which hit a Trojan who could not handle it and junior Garry Fain recovered the ball on Cawood's 39-yard-line.

On the Rockets' first play from scrimmage, Robinson picked up three yards and a facemask penalty was called against the Trojans.

The Rockets picked a first down on Cawood's 23. The Rockets then moved the ball to Cawood's 20-yard-line where it was 4th and 7. Quarterback Chris Cornelius then connected with senior end Greg Long, who made a great catch in the end zone, and the Rockets were on the scoreboard with 9:59 left in the first quarter.

Senior James "Bozie" Kirby, who saw action for the first time since the opening game of the season because of a back injury, tried for the two extra points but was stopped short.

On the Trojans' first series, the Rockets held on 4th and 3 and took over the ball on their own 37-yard-line. But, Rockcastle could not get going and had to punt the ball away. Long's first punt was to Cawood's 35-yard-line but was called back because of an illegal

procedure penalty against the Rockets and Long had to back up five yards and try again. This time, the Trojans managed to block the punt and this set up their first score of the game.

The Trojans began their drive from the Rockets' 17 yard line and, four plays later, went over from the three-yard-line for the score. Their extra point attempt was good and the Trojans led 7-6 with 3:22 remaining in the first quarter.

The Rockets scored again on their next possession, with Robinson going over from the one yard line with 2 seconds gone off the clock in the 2nd quarter. The drive was aided by a 27-yard reception by Long and a facemask penalty against the Trojans.

Again, the Rockets failed to convert on their extra point attempt but they were ahead 12-7.

Following Poynter's kick-off, the Trojans could not come up with a first down and had to punt the ball away.

Fain returned the punt to the 50-yard-line and the Rockets picked up three first downs, enroute to their third score of the game as with 7:04 remaining in the second quarter, Robinson went over from the 10-yard line.

Cornelius' short pass to Fain, all alone in the end zone, was good for the two extra points and the Rockets were ahead 20-7.

The Trojans took Poynter's kick-off on their own 12-yard-line and returned it to the 29 where it was 1st and 10. A completed pass to the Rockets' 35 yard line gave the Trojans their fourth first down of the game.

Things went bad for the

Trojans on their next three plays as they picked up three off-sides penalty and senior Jeff Hansel caught the quarterback in the backfield for a 5-yard-loss making it 2nd and 20. But, after a 5-yard-gain, the Cawood quarterback kept the ball and broke loose for a 56 yard gain to the Rockets' 14-yard-line. One first down and five plays later, Cawood scored from the one. However, their kick for the extra point attempt was wide and the Rockets still had a 20-13 lead.

The Rockets threatened again in the first half after Long made a great catch, which had first passed through the hands of a Cawood defender, on Cawood's 31 yard line. Hansel and Robinson then ran the ball twice, and it was 1st and 10 on Cawood's 19 yard line. But, the Rockets couldn't move the ball from there, and following a sack of Cornelius on 4th and 8, the Trojans took over on their own 26.

The Rockets didn't play a good third quarter, and Cawood scored twice—once on a touchdown set up by another blocked punt and the other one set up by a Rockets' fumble.

After taking Cawood's kick-off to open the second half, the Rockets picked up, a first down on the 50-yard-line. But, on their next series, the Rockets had to punt the ball and again, a Cawood defender managed to block Long's punt and the Rockets took over on the Rockets' 35-yard-line.

Five plays later, the Trojans scored from the 7-yard-line. Cawood faked an extra point kick but the pass into the end zone for two extra points was no good and the Rockets maintained a slim 20-19 lead.

The Rockets were moving the ball on their next possession, Robinson had picked up the first down on the 45 yard line when the ball squirted loose and was immediately pounced on by a Cawood defender. This gave the Trojans a 1st and 10 on the Rockets 45 and, four plays later, they went in from the 23-yard line for the score. This time, their extra point kick was good and the Trojans were ahead 26-20 with 6:26 left in the third quarter.

The scoring could have ended right there, because the Rockets didn't have anything to be ashamed of. They had played an excellent game but Cornelius had suffered a partial separation of his left shoulder on one of the plays just before Cawood's fourth touchdown and things were looking grim. But, they were a "never say die" team on Friday night and they regained their momentum.

The Rockets took Cawood's kick-off and returned it to their own 34-yard-line. Robinson picked up 8 yards and a facemask call against the Trojans gave the Rockets a 1st and 10 on Cawood's 45. The Rockets were called for off-sides and clipping on the next two plays and it was 1st and 25 when a pass from Cornelius to Long was picked off and returned to Cawood's 30. The coaches and fans thought the officials missed a clipping call against the Trojans and got upset for the first time during the game but it wasn't called and Cawood had the ball back.

But, David Glover and Hansel combined for some

### "Shooting from the hip"

One off-the-cuff remark by a well-known and often controversial government official has brought down the wrath of political writers, the liberal press and environmentalists upon a dedicated and effective public servant. And has now been the source of enough clamor to force him to resign his office.

At a September 21 breakfast meeting in Washington, Secretary of the Interior James Watt told the audience, "We have every kind of mix you can have. I have a black, I have a woman, two Jews and a cripple. And we have talent." The liberal press in its reporting often left out the last sentence in Watt's remarks. "And we have talent." They also failed to report the context of his comments.

Watt was not ridiculing blacks, women, Jews or the handicapped. He was deriding the federal government's quota edicts. HE was making fun of our outrageous and unconstitutional quota systems and other egalitarian, humanist edicts Big Brother uses to regiment us.

The comment was the

result of Watt's frustration over dealing with members of Congress "that don't seem to be concerned about the future supply of energy in America," he said.

Watt was especially angered by a vote taken the day before in the Senate to place a moratorium on his department's coal leasing program. He later apologized to the one handicapped member of the commission, Richard Gordon, a coal policy expert at Pennsylvania State University.

"We are struggling to meet the consumer needs, to keep America's jobs and factories moving," Watt said. "Some of us are struggling to explore and inventory the great wealth or potential wealth of this country—and yet (we) are rebuffed repeatedly by those persons who do not want us to inventory (or) explore on our outer continental shelf."

Watt cited statistics he claimed the media have ignored. He said 85 percent of the crude oil to be discovered, refined and delivered to American consumers will come from the outer continental shelf.

"We don't know what that potential is, but it had better be great. If the outer continental shelf is not

great in producing oil and gas, we will then need to go to all the alternatives, such as nuclear and coal and every other conceivable energy source to get us through the short-term in the next 50 years," he said.

Watt said, "It's easier to explain why we have oil rigs off the coast of California than it is to explain to the mothers and fathers of American boys on the sands of the Middle East. That's realism."

He continued, "That's what the battle is really about. Will we have the internal fortitude in this country to prepare for the future? Or will we simply be so self-centered and so selfish that we will not face up to meeting the demands for the future?"

Watt's frustration in dealing with the press was evident in his address that morning in discussing recent coal sales his department sponsored, he compared them to previous sales in previous administrations, and said, "Most of these facts are facts you never heard about. The press is not interested in facts. They don't even print facts or show facts. They're interested in sex, and controversy and scandal."

When later questioned about his remarks and the possibility they might reflect the attitude the administration doesn't care

about the plight of the handicapped or minorities Watt said, "Oh, it shows you don't have a sense of humor if you can't laugh at yourself, I guess. I have the ability to laugh, and if you can't laugh in this job, you ought to get out. We've come at it from every conceivable angle. The interesting thing is that we've selected talent. And if that your criteria, you get talent."

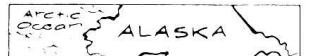
"If you can't joke about this," he concluded, "you shouldn't be in Washington."

Unfortunately, Watt was the butt of the liberals' idea the only thing worth mentioning about government service is whatever dirt and controversy can be revealed. Many times if there is no dirt to throw around, they'll create litigation it's there.

The frustrations of being a public servant are many. The Watt resignation over such trivia is a classic example of what can happen when a few special interests are out to get you, at any cost. In this case, the entire nation lost the service of man who was dedicated to doing what was right, and needed. And not interested in only pleasing a few who

scream the loudest. Not the cry, but the flight of the wild duck, leads the flock to fly and follow. (Chinese Proverb)

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# U.K. and Louisville will play in 1 month

The Kentucky-Louisville basketball game is a month away and roundball fans might have expected a bit of a war of words to emerge between the two rivals. It has happened, but UL fans will be surprised to learn who has fired the first volley — something that would show up on the other team's "locker room bulletin board."

Louisville coach Denny Crum certainly not UK's Joe B. Hall.

How about UK's usually outspoken Bret Bearup or UL's straight-talking Lancaster Gordon?

If you guessed any of the above, give yourself a zero.

Answer: Robbie Valentine. The bubbly sophomore spoke with The Cats Pause publisher Oscar Combs at UL's press day Oct. 21 and here is some of what he said.

"Playing UK last year was a great feeling. I knew we were going to win the game all along. After they beat Indiana (in Knoxville) all I could think about was Kentucky. Even when UK tied us at the end of regulation time, I knew we were going to come back. (Jim) Master scared me there for a second because he was so hot, but that only sent the game to OT."

What about pressure in the upcoming game Nov. 26 at Rupp Arena?

"Oh, it's all on them," Valentine said, "because everyone picked No. 1 and they're known for playing good early and then having a slump in January. We usually start slow and then get good at tournament time."

Valentine, noting that he is the only UL player to have played previously at Rupp Arena—the 1980 and 1981 State Tournaments—said he intends to impress on his Cardinal teammates that the key to beating UK next month is "keeping the fans out of the game."

Comment: Louisville Denny Crum might have preferred Valentine had kept his mouth shut. But the UL sophomore is right on all counts.

**Loke Kelly**

UK assistant basketball coach Lake Kelly told a radio audience in Hardin County last week, "we hope by November we'll be able to sign four or five kids and pretty well wrap up our recruiting season. We feel like we're very strong with some great players."

It was a "delicious" surprise to recruiting buffs, Kelly's disclosure that UK might have an early Christmas.

However, because of NCAA rules he declined to name the prospective signees. Fans will have to wait until Nov. 9, the first signing date.

Who are UK's top prospects? A few guesses. Under "write it down, expect Kentucky to sign 6-2 point guard Ed Davender from Brooklyn, N.Y., rated by some scouts as the premier guard in the east, and 6-7, 205-pound forward Richard Madison from Memphis, Tenn.

Trying to find replacements for Sam Bowie and Mel Turpin looks to be futile with the shortage of big men this season. So, UK is after the next best thing—big forwards.

The recruiting list includes:

- Cedric Henderson, a 6-9 power forward from Marietta, Ga. His list includes UK, Georgia, Tennessee and Louisville. Favorite? UL is the "heavy" front runner.

- Craig Jackson, 6-8, from Denver Colo. is considering UCLA, UK and Notre Dame. The favorite? Notre Dame.

And, 6-8 Steve Miller of Lexington Henry Clay? UK may not be "as tight" with Miller as some fans believed. The presence of Winston Bennett, Kenny Walker and Bret Bearup, plus UK's current recruiting thrusts, may have soured Miller on UK.

Guards/swing men Kentucky is courting: 6-4 Del Ray Brooks, from Michigan City, Ind., 6-3 Gary Grant from Canton, Ohio, and 6-4 Troy Lewis from Anderson, Ind.

What about speculation that 5-7 point guard LeRoy Byrd, now at Somerset Community College, is headed to UK next year? "Could be, but it looks like a waste of a scholarship to me."

This year's high school senior crop? Lake Kelly reported the state's basketball crop is a good one and "there are six or seven outstanding forward prospects in Kentucky," he said.

One of them is 6-7 Todd Zeigler of Jeffersontown. "We're very much interested in Todd and he's visited our campus," Kelly said.

**Bret Bearup**

After his first two seasons at UK questions arose about the 6-9 junior's intensity, "killer instinct." Kelly hinted that this season could be crucial to Bearup's future. "Bret's a fine player, but whatever he accomplishes is really up to him right now. He has to decide."

Despite the talk with moonshotosis, Bearup could be "urged" to fulfill the stardom predicted for him three years ago by two of his teammates, Winston Bennett and Kenny Walker.

**Winston Bennett**

How many times has the Louisville Male graduate been asked about the upcoming UK/UL game Nov. 26? "A lot," Bennett said last week. "It's something we're going to approach in the right frame of mind."

What about pressure for a freshman arriving on UK's talent-deep squad? "I don't feel any pressure, not at all," Bennett said. "I have everything to gain and nothing to lose. I love pressure and it's something you have to be able to rise to when the time comes I just want to go in and do the best I can and help the team."

How about the academic adjustment to college work?

"There really has been no adjustment," Bennett replied, "coming from Male High School, it really hasn't given me a problem."

**Hall's staff**

The 1983-84 season will be the most pressure packed for coach Joe B. Hall since the 1978 NCAA championship club, some writers believe it will be tougher than that.

But Hall will counter with a solid and seasoned coaching staff.

Leonard Hamilton and Jim Hatfield will handle recruiting duties while Lake Kelly will work closely with Hall and the team.

"Lake will be a right hand man for me on the bench," Hall said recently.

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## What would county residents do in case of nuclear attack?

Since the recent soviet downing of a Korean airliner with 269 civilians on board, the world has been rudely reawakened to the vulnerability of those living in the Atomic Age. If handled improperly by international governments, it's possible that nuclear war could be triggered by a single act of one country destroying another country's civilian jet.

Although Rockcastle County would not be a primary target during a nuclear attack, it's important to raise the question: What would Rockcastle countians do in case of nuclear attack? Gary Asher is a local source for information on civil defense. Asher has volunteered his time for two years to serve as the county coordinator for Disaster and Emergency Services (DES), and familiar with procedures that county residents will follow in the event of a nuclear attack.

When asked who would feel safe if the United States was attacked with nuclear weapons, he answered bluntly, "I don't think anybody would feel safe. I think we would have to try to survive the best way we can. Pre-planning is the best defense."

"In peacetime, civil defense is something you don't think about or want to use. The people that live with it are the people that believe they can and prepare ahead of time."

The public can feel secure in knowing that the Rockcastle County Nuclear Crisis Relocation Plan that was drawn up in 1982 and is reviewed annually.

It is also a nationwide civil defense system that exists in the United States. This system is being improved constantly.

Another encouraging fact is that people should have sufficient time to take

protective actions because a nuclear attack on the United States would most likely be preceded by a period of international tension and crisis.

If an international crisis erupts into nuclear attack, local television and radio stations would relay a warning to the residents of Rockcastle County. When a warning is issued, Rockcastle County will be sharing fallout shelters with a percentage of Fayette and Madison County residents. Asher explained, "We are a host county for Fayette and Madison counties which are known target areas. Rockcastle will be providing care for approximately 10,000 outside residents."

The 10,000 relocatees would combine with approximately 13,400 county residents to make a total of 23,400 persons who would be sheltered in Rockcastle during a nuclear attack. But space is not a problem. "We have adequate shelter space in the county," said Asher, "providing we have adequate food and water."

The purpose of a fallout shelter is to save the population from fallout radiation, which is radioactive particles produced by a nuclear explosion. The first 24 hours without fallout begin to settle would be the most dangerous to county residents. And, in most cases, the fallout level in the area would decrease quickly enough that full-time shelter occupancy would not be required for more than a week or two.

A fallout shelter doesn't have to be a special type of building or underground room. It can be any space that has walls and a roof thick or heavy enough to absorb many of the rays given off by the fallout particles.

One choice that county residents will have in case of nuclear attack is to pre-

pare a shelter in their own homes. A permanent basement or outside shelter can be built ahead of time, or such areas as a storm cellar, basement, crawl space and a ground floor can be used for an improvised shelter. Even a boat with an enclosed cabin could be utilized.

Information on how to prepare home fallout shelters is printed in a free booklet called "In Time of Emergency" that is published by the Department of Civil Defense. A copy can be obtained by calling Gary Asher at 256-2195.

Another choice area residents will have is to go to a county fallout shelter. These shelters will be located in school buildings, churches, business places and designated underground areas. The location of county shelters will be made public in emergency broadcasts during a time of crisis or warning about nuclear attack.

What about food and supplies? Asher said, "In people's homes, they need to have a sufficient supply of food and water." Other supplies to have available include sanitation supplies, medicines and first aid equipment, cooking and eating utensils, clothing, bedding, general equipment and tools, and infant supplies for families with babies.

"At the present, there are no stocked public shelters in the county," said Asher. "Local, state and national agencies will be available to provide supplies to residents during a nuclear attack. The supplies will be sent to the county high school and rationed to county residents and relocatees who need them. But those who go to a shelter should take all the supplies they have with them."

There are now 77 card-carrying Disaster and Emer-

## More foster parents are needed

Kentucky's foster care program has established a good track record but we need more runners. That's according to Steve Fox, Director of Field Services for the state Department for Social Services. "We have outstanding foster parents and a nationally recognized program to support them, but we're frustrated because we just don't have the numbers we could use."

In Rockcastle County, local foster care supervisor Mike Bryant agreed, "We only have 9 foster families in our community, and foster families are private people, people who value home life. Most people in the community don't hear about our program unless something goes wrong. They

usually are not aware of all the things going right. One local example of things going right is the case of Jody and Judy Harman who have been foster parents for over sixty child ren over the last 10 years here in Rockcastle County. "We have always felt that the family is the centerpiece of what's good in America," Mr. Harrison said. "And with all the concern about what's happening to families in this country, we wanted to do something to contribute in a positive way." He added, "Being a foster parent increases the challenges and the pleasures of being a parent. It isn't a burden or another mouth to feed. It's another person to love."

The Harrison family is just one example of the type of foster home needed in Kentucky. "Maybe we haven't talked enough about our program but the improvements we've made, the enjoyment foster families get from it," Fox said. The program has been substantial increases in boarding care rates, better special-

ized services, and wider availability of training-points which may have gone unnoticed in many Kentucky communities, according to Fox. "Our foster families feel they have a great deal of support now, not just money but also appreciation of what they are doing for these special children," he said.

Mike Bryant said the process for being approved as a foster family a process of training and evaluation is not as difficult as some would believe, adding that twelve hours of training are available to Rockcastle County foster families this coming year. "We want to talk to people who want to enrich their family lives," said interested Rockcastle Countians may receive more information by calling 256-4415 between 8:00 and 4:30 Monday through Friday. Bryant concluded, "Like Steve Fox said, our track record is good and we have many dedicated staff and foster parents. We just need more."

## Meetings scheduled for Chemical People Project

A nationwide action campaign to combat school-age drug and alcohol abuse, combining the power of television and people-power at the community level, will be launched Wednesday, November 2, on KET.

First Lady Nancy Reagan will host the two-part national series, "The Chemical People," with the second part airing the following Wednesday, November 9, at the same time. Joining Mrs. Reagan as co-hosts will be Bill Bixby, Bruce Weitz, Rita Moreno and Michael Landon. Baseball player Willie Stargell will also co-host the second program.

The first program, "The Chemical Society," on November 2, presents an overview of the widespread use of drugs and alcohol by young people. Professionals in Atlanta, Minneapolis, Washington, D.C. and Los Angeles acknowledge four stages of drug abuse: experimental, regular use and misuse, early abuse and finally dependency. Each stage is substantiated by young stars who actually have experienced it.

"Community Answers," airing November 9, depicts communities and groups of men and women working together to set up task forces. Viewers are shown how to take forces obtain information about treatment centers and learn about intervention through case histories, examples and inspiration. 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# Twenty county 7th graders selected for TIP program

The Talent Identification Program at Duke University was started on the premise that the future of this country depends greatly upon the fullest development of our intellectual resources. Therefore, the objectives of the Program, stated simply, are to identify the very brightest of our young students, to assist in developing and nurturing their abilities at the present and in the future, and to develop a research effort to better understand these bright individuals.

This is the fourth talent search by Duke University and it involves only seventh graders in 16 states. To qualify, a student must score 97% or higher on the math, language, or total battery of the CTBS (our yearly achievement test).

Last year was our first year to participate. We had fifteen seventh-grade students who were eligible at that time. They were: Brodhead: Sonya Bullock, Darren Cole, Randall Hayes, Amy Hamm, Andy McKinney and Leslie Norton; Livingston: Angela Goodson; Mt. Vernon: Kim Bullock, Tammy Cummins, Joe Gregor, Pat Hansel, Tim Hodges and Julie Shepherd; Roundstone: Tracy Burdett and Ginger Robinson. This was five percent of our seventh-grade enrollment. However, only seven of these students opted to take the SAT.

This year we have 20 students, or eight percent of our seventh-grade enrollment who are eligible. They are: Brodhead: Stacy Craig, Casey Hargason, Stephanie Morris, Alan Purcell, Charles Shields, Alison Sowder, Melissa VanHoes; Livingston: Heather Jones, Audrey Youdel; Mt. Vernon: Sara Anderkin, Nathan Kerr, James Kirby, David Owens, Leslie Scalf, Paula Thomas; Roundstone: Arthur Anderkin, Adam Coleman, Tonya Durham, Tim Isaacs, Melora Wright.

These students have the option of going to Berea on December 3 to take the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). This is the same test college-bound high school juniors and seniors take. Of course, the seventh graders who scored on appropriate norms.

Participating students will have a realistic appraisal of their mathematical reasoning, verbal reasoning and English composition abilities relative to the ablest seventh graders in the TIP talent search region, as well as the high school students who regularly take the SAT. A national committee, located in Cincinnati, Ohio, selects a portion from the Bible, called the text, for all of the teams to study during the year. Monthly meets are held during that year of study for the teams to test their knowledge with other teams studying the same text. All of the teams this year are studying the books of Romans, I and II Timothy, Hebrews and James, a total of 44 chapters.

All study is taken from the King James Version of the Bible. The two teams from Mt. Vernon study together three hours each week in addition to the study each member does at home alone. At the end of the year, state and national tournaments are held to determine which team can compete best with the knowledge they have gained over the year.

There are also Bible College tournaments each year, where teams are able to win scholarship money to that college if they win the tournament.

The teams from the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon belong to the Central Kentucky Bible Bowl League where they meet with approximately forty other teams from around the state.

The first meet was held last Sunday, October 23 at the Gardenside Christian Church in Lexington. The "A" team from Mt. Vernon placed eighth in their division and the "B" team won all seven of their games, going undefeated and earning the right to compete in the tournament to be held next month at the Kentucky Teens for Christ Convention, to be held in Lexington.
