# 4-H News

### TALK MEET

The county 4-H Talk Meet will be held on Tuesday, November 15, at 7:00 p.m. at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School. Just as last year, the contest will be held in cooperation with the schools, allowing each grade, 4th grade and up, to send a certain number of representatives.

Youth will be competing eight categories: Nine, ten, eleven, twelve and thirteen year olds will be the five junior categories. The three senior categories will be fourteen, fifteen and sixteen-nineteen year olds. Each participant will receive blue, red and white ribbons. First place winners in each category

will receive a trophy. First and second place in each category will be able to compete in the area 4-H Talk Meet on Saturday, December 3. Area winners in each category will compete at the state level in June in Lexington.

Speeches for the event may be on any subject. Talks by 9-13 age youth are to be 3 to 5 minutes long. Talks by 14-19 age youth are to be between 5 to 7 minutes long. Speakers will be judged on their appearance, clarity of speech, presentation and knowledge of the subject.

Youth interested in participating in the county talk meet should contact their classroom teacher, English teacher or the Extension office. To register for the competition, call the Extension office at 268-2403 by Wednesday, November 8th.

...How long has it been in business and where has it been located?

...What is its record? Call the Better Business Bureau and the Consumer Protection Division of the Kentucky Attorney General's office to ask if complaints have been registered against the company.

...Ask for a written financial statement, references and names of investors. Contact the investors and determine their satisfaction.

...Consider the product: Is it a fad or luxury item?

...Will the price be competitive and still earn you a profit?

...Is the market limited, such as in animal fur?

...If the product is a name brand, have you seen proof that the manufacturer has given permission for use of the product?

Read the contract. Does

it differ from what you were told? Don't accept ver-

bal assurances. Get promises in writing. Have an attorney evaluate the contract.

After you invest, heed these warning signals: There is a delay in receiving inventory.

Checks bounce. Other investors complain.

The company becomes unresponsive. Refunds are postponed.

The Kentucky Business Opportunity Act gives you the right to cancel your business opportunity for any reason prior to midnight of the 15th calendar day after signing your contract.

You must give written notice to the company, explaining why you wish to break the contract. Send your notice by certified mail and keep a copy. Within 15 days after you have mailed your notice, the seller must return your payment and terminate all financial obligations. You must return any inventory you received in it order to cancel.

So producers cutting back too much on feed-and nutrition-will likely cut their income. Cull cows usually will weigh loss and will sell for less, and small calves mean fewer dollars. But a little planning can help producers prepare for their herd's nutritional needs and avoid excess feed expense. Sample and test harvested forages for their nutritional value so you can supplement forages correctly and efficiently. Many times early-cut grass lays and grass-legume mixtures may need only mineral or vitamin supplementation to meet the needs of dry pregnant beef cows.

After you take inventory of how much feed you have and how good it is, plan to allocate it to cattle on the basis of need. All beef cattle do not have the same nutritional requirements. Grouping cattle with similar needs and feeding accordingly will make winter feeding more economical. Feeding all cattle the same means you'll overfeed and underfeed, and will waste feed dollars. For example, feeding dry cows and lactating cows together results in overfeeding the dry cows. Most herds can be split into two or three groups. Young calves should have first

#### If It Sounds Too Good To Be True, Guess What?

Unemployment, bankruptcy, inflation-these economic times are hard on many people, but one business certainly is thriving: the con business.

Con artists deal in extra income schemes. According to the Kentucky Attorney General's Division of Consumer Protection,

fraudulent business opportunities consistently rate in the top 10 of all complaints received each year.

Before you invest in a business, take some time and research the company.

Has it been registered with the State Division of Banking Securities? If so, the business has met some minimum standards, which give consumers some protection.

#### Feeding the Beef Herd Through Winter

As winter moves in upon us, beef producers begin a balancing act. They have to try to hold down winter feed costs-which is one of the biggest expenses in maintaining a herd-and at the same time provide their

cattle with adequate nutrition at the most critical time of the year.

Cows can usually survive the winter on poor nutrition, but there may be long-term effects on productivity. Some effects are apparent right away, but others may now show up until two or three years later, in terms of reduced calf numbers and lower profits. Inadequate nutrition, especially through the winter, can result in poor reproductive performance. Thin cows rebreed more slowly, replacement heifers and first-calf heifers often skim a year before calving, and the time between calves increases. Health problems also increase, since animals may have vitamin deficiencies and may become more susceptible to internal parasites and respiratory ills. Lower-than-minimum nutrition also may mean lower weaning weights. Undernourished cows produce less milk and calves may have to be weaned early.

priority, lactating heifers next, then lactating cows. Mature dry cows can use lower-quality roughage. Consider reducing the size of your herd, since you can't afford to feed poor-producing or non-pregnant cows. If you have kept production records such as the cow's age and weaning weights of calves on each cow in your herd, you easily can identify non-pregnant cows and examine your animals for soundness. Cull cows that have lost their teeth, or that have feet and leg problems, bag eyes or unsound udders.

Use storage and feeding methods that make the most of your hay. Improper storage and feeding, especially of large round bales, can result in losses up to a third or more. Store round bales adequately spaced on a well drained site. Feed hay on top of grass or in hay racks, not in mud. Force cattle to clean up before you make more available. Feed lowest quality hay first so that the best hay is available during late winter when the cattle really need it.

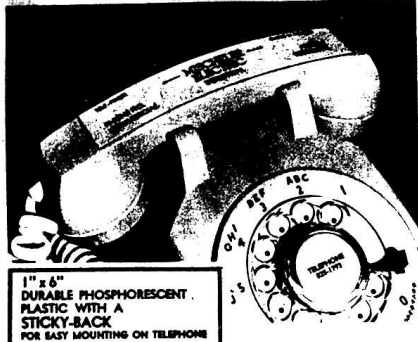

## Cromer named chairman of group's coordinating committee

At the last meeting of the Excellence in Education Committee meeting, Gary Cromer of Mt. Vernon was named chairman of the coordinating committee and Charles "Tuck" Baker, assistant principal at the high school, was named vice-chairman.

Other committee heads elected were: Evaluation, Shirley Long, chairman and Jack Morris, vice-chairman. Standards, Janet Rader, chairman and Shelly Mullins, vice chairman. Curriculum, Bige Towery, chairman and Carol Jones, vice chairman. Teaching, Preston Parrett, chairman and Don Jones, vice-chairman. Administration, Charles P. Parsons, chairman and Perilna Anderkin, vice-chairman. Private Support, Jack Morris, chairman and Lafayette Seals, vice-chairman.

Named to the advisory committee were William K. Bullen, Jess Bullock and Virgil Mullins.

Approximately 60 persons showed up for the meeting at the high school which was covered by WLEX-TV in Lexington. Segments of the programs were broadcast on three different newscasts over channel 19.

Upon accepting the chairmanship of the important coordinating committee, Cromer told the group that he appreciated their vote and confidence and said, "I promise to make every effort to see that this committee is kept going."

During the meeting, Elmer Whittier, who organized the formation of the committee, handed out some information concerning the way Rockcastle stacks up against other school districts in the state such as annual current expenses per pupil, average annual salaries for teachers, percent of attendance, percent of 9th graders graduating, cost per pupil instruction, etc.

A story on these comparisons will be printed in later stories in the Signal.

Whittier also supplied the group with a breakdown for grades 3, 5, 7 and 10 on basic skills as compiled by the state Department of Education for all 181 school districts.

Discussion among the group at the meeting centered primarily on the need for parents to become involved and concerned with their children's education. Cleston Saylor, high school principal, pointed out that only about 50 parents showed up at the school on parent-teacher day recently at a school with an enrollment of about 1,000 students. One teacher said she didn't feel that having the parent-teacher day during school hours caused attendance to be lower since records that she had kept indicated that attendance was not greater when the program was held during the night.

## Toll-free lines available to contact legislators

Citizens will have two toll-free phone lines available to leave messages for their legislators and to check on the current status of bills during the 1984 General Assembly, according to State Representative Danny Ford.

A message line—1-900-372-2985—may be used by anyone wishing to contact individual legislators.

A bill-status line—1-900-372-2993—will be available for persons wishing to check on the progress of specific pieces of legislation.

Both lines will open January 3, the day the 1984 session convenes in Frankfort.

"The toll-free lines are a tremendous asset to the legislators and the general public," Representative Ford said.

"Kentuckians have shown a keen interest in the work of the General Assembly and we have found the toll-free lines to be useful tools for an involved and informed citizenry," Ford explained.

## Rockcastle schools picked for School Effectiveness program

The Rockcastle County Board of Education has been notified by Raymond Barber, Superintendent of Public Instruction, that the local school district has been selected to participate in the School Effectiveness program.

Mr. Parsons, who made the announcement to the board Tuesday night at their regular monthly meeting, said he was pleased by the selection since he felt it would be a positive contribution to helping upgrade the school system.

The school is also scheduled for a complete analysis in February when the state's accreditation evaluation team will be in the county to look at every aspect of the school system. Parsons told the board, "I am anxious to have them come and think it will be a challenge to implement some of the things they recommend."

The team scheduled to come in February will determine the school accreditation for a period beyond 1984 for which the board has already been notified that they have been accredited. Mr. Parsons said the one area where there might be a problem was in the area of teachers not teaching in their field.

He said the state department had always approved teachers, who were qualified to teach at the secondary level, to teach in the 7th and 8th grade level. Now, under new state guidelines, teachers must teach in his/her major or minor field. However, he said, he understood that teachers caught in that position (teaching out of their field) will have three years to go back to school and become qualified for the subject they are teaching or to work themselves into the system in the fields they are already qualified for.

In other business, Mr. Parsons recommended to the board that they approve a fiscal ability feasibility plan to determine the district's bonding potential for new construction.

Mr. Parsons requested this approval so that it might be determined if the bonding potential was such that at least the first phase of a new school building at Mt. Vernon Elementary could be built. He told the board that this construction had been kicked around for some time but had always been put off before because of a lack of money in reserve to make a decent start on the building.

Parsons said at this time the school district had about \$600,000 in reserve and that at least half of this could be used toward the building which is expected to cost between 4 and 5 million upon completion. The other half, Mr. Parsons said, needed to be kept in reserve for emergencies which might arise.

As to the most urgent construction need at the school, Parsons said there was some difference in opinion. He said, in his judgment, a new cafeteria and kitchen should be built with any additional money available being used for new classrooms. However, some would rather see a new gymnasium be built in order to get the present gym out of its central location in the school and thereby cutting down on the noise levels in classrooms from activities in the gym.

The board authorized Mr. Parsons to contact Fred Dupree, whose firm handled the district's bond issue for the new high school, and ask him to give the board a report on the amount of bonding potential the board would have to begin at least one phase of the construction.

Donald Ambrose was the high bidder on the board 1983's tobacco base poundage at 87 1/2¢ a pound. There were four bidders for 1,436 lb. base with the bids ranging from a low of 51¢ a pound to the successful 87 1/2¢.

In other action, the board: Authorized the sale of the old tobacco barn located on the Noe farm by sealed bids at the board's next meeting.

Approved the purchase of one additional Apple II E computer for the math department at the high school with the school to pay one-half the cost.

Approved the advertising for bids for workers compensation insurance and luncheon food and supplies.

Approved a contract with Owens Chevrolet Co. in Stanford for a driver education car at a cost of \$350 per day.

Approved new and revised school board policies.

Approved a change in the board's custodial contract with Nancy Bradley at Broadhead School—a change from 10 1/2 months per year, 4 hours per day to 8 1/2 months per year at 3 hours per day the same rate of pay of \$3.75 per hour.

Employed Patricia Agnew of Lanesboro as substitute teacher, subject to certification.

Approved a fund-raising project by the athletic department at Roundstone School, selling tumblers, with proceeds to go toward the purchase of new uniforms.

Approved the purchase of a tire changer from Cromer's Tire Service for \$600. Employed Debbie Cash as regular teacher at the high school for World of Work and Connie Riddle as business teacher at the school, both effective November 1 and

Authorized Mr. Parsons to investigate the cost of substantially upgrading the P.A. system at the high school.

During the meeting, Mr. Parsons circulated a report to board members which showed the amount of interest collected by investing the district's excess funds over the past several years.

The figure was impressive—over \$400,000. However, the figure for the first quarter of the 1983-84 school year was only \$8,303 which will wind up considerably less than the \$102,000 collected last year for approximately the same amount of

Editor's Comment

Following the last meeting of the Excellence in Education Committees, it was brought to our attention several times that Mr. Parsons had reportedly attempted to get Elmer Whittier fired from his job at the University of Kentucky by telling his superiors there that Mr. Whittier was claiming that the committee was University connected.

We contacted both Mr. Whittier and Mr. Parsons and this is their comments on the subject.

Mr. Whittier said he was contacted by his immediate superior who said that Mr. Parsons had called the Dean of the Graduate School and made the charges and asked him (Whittier) if they were true. Whittier said he responded negatively and, for support, was able to show the Signal which contained the story on the first committee meeting. In that story, Mr. Whittier was asked straightforwardly if there was any connection and he answered no, that it was a "personal concern of someone living in the county and planning on living here the rest of my life."

Rumors continued to fly thick and fast as to Mr. Parsons' intent in calling the University so, at Tuesday night's board meeting, I asked him for his comment on the subject.

Parsons said he called the University on his own, talked with Dr. Royster, who is Dean of the Graduate School, and told him about the committee and

It is distressing that a committee of this nature stands a chance of being disrupted because of a misunderstanding from two important people connected with it. We can only hope that this incident can be laid to rest and the work of the committee continued.

We, along with other parents in the county, are primarily concerned with obtaining for our children the best education possible by the maximum use of funds available to us.

We believe Mr. Whittier when he says that his only motive in forming the committee was to find out the reasons why our children are lagging behind other districts' in important test scores and what can be done about it.

We also realize that in Mr. Parsons' position, he feels he has to be completely informed whenever anyone feels the need to offer their services to the educational process in the county.

Mr. Parsons reportedly made the statement, in his call to the University, that Mr. Whittier had failed to seek the approval of the board of education before forming the committee and Mr. Whittier agrees with this statement.

But, we feel that the board members had the same opportunity as everyone else to attend the meeting, which was well-attended, and that their approval

was not necessary prior to the formation of the committee.

### "Money Does Grow On Trees"

Fall is a good time to get out and plant trees on those idle or abandoned fields. Idle land is like having money in the bank and not drawing full interest on it. For example, land left unproductive for 50 to 60 years will not be worth much more than its appraised market value. Although the market value of the land may have increased during that time period the lands rate of return on productivity has not fully been utilized.

Although some view tree farming as a long term investment, there are a number of advantages in growing trees. The following are just a few advantages in

considering tree planting as a good investment:

1.) Once the forest is established, little time and effort are required to care for it. This makes it desirable for people with idle or marginally productive land to put it into productivity with a minimal amount of time and effort. Absentee landowners should also find tree farming attractive.

2.) Recent provisions in the federal tax laws allow for amortization over 7 years of 100% of forest establishment costs, and allow for a 10% investment tax credit on these costs.

3.) When timber is harvested, it usually is eligible

for capital gains tax treatment in the year in which it is cut.

4.) There is government cost share assistance that will reimburse landowners up to 65% of the site preparation and tree planting costs.

Tree seedlings are available from the State Division of Forestry. There are 5 kinds of pine and 10 different species that can be ordered now and delivered to Kentucky landowners from late November through mid-December. Most species cost only 4 cents per seedling when bought by the thousand.

from the Kentucky Council on Higher Education that explains the new Kentucky Pre-College Curriculum now available at Kentucky's high schools.

The Pre-College Curriculum will be a minimum requirement for admission for students who want to enter one of Kentucky's public universities beginning in the fall of 1987. To make sure that every student who will be affected by this new requirement understands it, the Council on Higher Education is providing copies of a brochure on "Kentucky's Pre-College Curriculum," and has mailed them to over 1,000 middle school and high school counseling offices for distribution.

The Pre-College Curriculum brochure explains to the students and their parents the value of the Curriculum as a preparation for success in college after high school, and tells why the Council on Higher Education decided to adopt such a course of study as a minimum requirement for admission to Kentucky's public universities. (The requirement does not apply to students applying for admission to Kentucky's public community colleges.)

A special feature of the brochure is a planning schedule card for the entire four years of high school, which the students can fill out in cooperation with their counselors. The schedule gives the students an overview of the 11 courses that are required as well as the main areas from which they are encouraged to select 9 elective units.

Kentucky's Pre-College Curriculum brochure also includes a message from Harry M. Snyder, executive director of the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, addressed to students, counselors, and parents. Snyder stresses the essential importance of the Pre-College Curriculum in Kentucky's commitment to upgrade its educational program for all its citizens and prepare its college-bound students for success in their higher education career, at whatever college or university they choose.

The Pre-College Curriculum brochure was devel-

oped as a standard program planning document for counselors statewide, according to Snyder. "The guidance counselors play a major role in helping eighth and ninth graders shape their plans for the future," he said. "The counseling these students receive now can have a significant impact upon the quality of their preparation for a productive future."

Snyder also noted that the Pre-College Curriculum is the minimum entrance requirement to the public universities, and some of the universities may require an even stronger academic preparation. This is another reason why the students must look to their counselors for guidance, he said, so that they will prepare properly for the specific university they want to attend.

"The hope for a new day for higher education in Kentucky," Snyder said, "lies in large measure with the success of curriculum-strengthening programs such as the Pre-College Curriculum. And the success of this program is in the hands of the middle school and high school counselors. We must all do everything possible to help them prepare our young Kentuckians

field in shortleaf pine at an 8x8 foot spacing, seedlings costs would average approximately \$106.00. The plantation could then be expected to produce an average income per acre per year of \$12.59 for a total gross yield of \$3,147 over a 50 year rotation. These returns, of course, assume that the stands receive periodic commercial thinnings from local pulpwood, post and pole markets. On more productive sites black walnut could be planted which would provide for even higher returns on investments.

Of course there are other reasons for planting trees on idle lands. Besides producing salable products-pulpwood, sawtimber, Christmas trees, fuelwood, and others-the trees and shrubs you plant today will halt erosion, help clean up streams, and provide wildlife benefits. Planting trees can also aid in noise abatement, improve esthetics, and if handled properly, build an estate for your heirs.

There are professional foresters available to provide assistance in forest management and tree planting from your State Division of Forestry at no charge. There is also government cost share assistance available from your county ASCS office to help pay for the cost of tree planting.

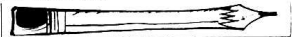

Dear Citizens of Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties.

I have put off writing this letter for several weeks because of the obvious problems I face as a lawyer in a race for circuit judge, especially when both candidates are personal friends. However, I have come to believe that what I have to say is important enough and my interest in our judicial system is great enough so that I have to speak out.

There seems to be a lot of misunderstanding about the qualifications of the candidates and the qualifications needed to be circuit judge. I do not believe a person can be a good circuit judge unless or until he has tried a great many cases in circuit court. The knowledge and practical experience gained in trying a variety of cases in circuit court is vital and, in my opinion, absolutely necessary for a circuit judge.

Jack Mandt has tried hundreds of cases in circuit court, including automobile accidents, insurance disputes, declaratory judgment actions, boundary line disputes, condemnation cases, domestic relation cases, election contests, criminal cases, and a variety of other types of cases. Dan Venters only real trial experience in circuit court is criminal cases.

Dan Venters has been a judge in District Court for four years and people assume this qualifies him to be a judge in any court. I do not believe this to be true.

District Court only handles minor cases. In fact, the jurisdictional limit of district court is \$2,500.00, whereas there is no limit in circuit court. In addition, there are no real property disputes handled in District Court, nor are divorce cases handled in District Court and these cases, alone, make up a great percentage of the caseload in Circuit Court. Finally, the majority of the District Court docket concerns traffic offenses. In fact, no serious criminal offenses are handled in District Court since only misdemeanors, crimes punishable by less than one year in jail, are legally handled in District Court. All felonies, the more serious crimes, are handled in Circuit Court.

To put it bluntly, comparing District Court to Circuit Court is like comparing apples to oranges. Being a District Court Judge does not, in my opinion, qualify a person to be judge in Circuit Court.

I have practiced law in this area for over ten years and during that time have practiced in approximately twenty-five counties before at least thirty-five different circuit judges, district judges and federal judges, including both Judge Mandt and Judge Venters. I can honestly say that Jack Mandt is the best Judge I have ever had the privilege to practice in front of. Jack's knowledge of the law, his ability to implement the law and his common sense approach which enables him to apply the law are unequalled. But above all, Jack's honesty and integrity are above question.

Nothing contained in this letter should be taken to reflect adversely on Dan Venters. Dan is a good, honest man and a fine district judge. However, I believe we have the best circuit judge in this state on our bench and I hope we keep him there.

to make the right choices." The Pre-College Curriculum was developed under the auspices of the Council on Higher Education, which has the responsibility under Kentucky law for establishing the minimum admission requirements for Kentucky's public institutions of higher education, which include eight universities and 13 community colleges. Representatives of higher education, secondary education, and the general public took part in its formulation, as well as in its review in a series of regional forums held throughout Kentucky before it was established in its final form by the Council.

The Pre-College Curriculum will be required for students applying to Kentucky's public universities beginning in the fall of 1987. It requires 20 units of academic courses in the four years of high school, and includes 4 units of English, 3 units of mathematics, to include algebra I or algebra II, geometry and an additional course; 2 units of science, to include biology I or chemistry I or physics I; and an additional course; and 2 units of social studies, to include world civilization and U.S. history. It also recommends that elective courses be selected from the arts, foreign languages, computer literacy and additional courses in science and mathematics.

Students and parents who have questions about the Pre-College Curriculum after reading the brochure can seek assistance from their school's counselors and principal, from the Kentucky Department of Education, or from the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, Snyder said. ## Rockcastle County Hospital has installed computer

Rockcastle County Hospital is keeping up with modern technology. He gave several reasons for the installation of an IBM computer system to use in admitting patients, keeping medical records and in billing. The purpose of the computer is to ensure that patients at Rockcastle County Hospital receive quick, efficient service.

Steve Estes, the hospital's controller, is responsible for seeing that the computer is an asset to the facility. He gave several reasons for the installation of the new computer system.

Basically, we decided to install a computer for three reasons," said Estes. "Changes in Medicare reimbursement, first of all. The changes affecting us this year are the most radical since the inception of the Medicare program. Also, we are changing the manner in which we bill. Because of an all-inclusive form, the UB-82, which is being used by all third party payers and intermediaries, we think the computer will help us in billing.

"And thirdly, by increasing our efficiency, we think we can pass the savings along to the patients. I also feel that we're on the leading edge of hospitals converting from the manual systems to data base here in Eastern Kentucky."

The computer will have terminals in several areas of the hospital. "The terminals will be used in admitting, the business office, with insurance, in medical records, and hopefully, at a date no later than the middle of 1985, terminals will be used in inventory control in pharmacy and central supply," explained Estes.

Estes said he feels that the biggest misconception people have about computers is that they will replace manual labor. "That is not true in most cases," he said, "as the input required and the other job functions, such as filing and record keeping, in-

crease. However, data processing enables us to keep more complete and better records in an industry where statistical record keeping is a necessity."

Does Estes think computers will play an increasingly important role in health care? He said, "Com-

puters are already doing some clinical functions in health care and are responsible for much of the record keeping. I think, that in the not too distant future, all hospital personnel will work with computers in some manner."


