

# Appleman takes over reins

ketball." In 1981 he finished his master's degree in sports administration which enables him to be an athletic director.

Charlene Appleman taught at Northern Elementary while her husband coached at Pendleton County High School, but since moving to Rockcastle she has gotten a graduate assistantship at Eastern and is working on her master's in special reading.

The Applemans have rented a house in Brodhead and live there with Michael II, now in the fourth grade and their daughter, Amberlei, who's 5.

Appleman is finding Rockcastle County not too different from what he's been used to. "The people have been super," he said. "I feel like I'm going to be successful working hard at what I do."

Besides coaching basketball, Appleman is teaching five classes of general science.

Basketball practice started October 17 and is usually held five days a week. The team won't be decided upon until the football players who are also interested in basketball, have a chance to try out.

He gave his views about keeping boys on the team. "If I keep them and they get mad every game. But if I cut them they'll get made on time and hope will be a backer of the team because I was honest with them. I don't believe in keeping any dead weight or in stringing people along. I think you have to be totally honest with the boys from Day One."

When asked about his basketball style, he defined it in one word: "Fast". He said, "We'll be very aggressive defensively. They'll either be aggressive or they won't play. We'll fast break any chance we get and we'll play hard man to man defense."

"We'll also press a lot, and by pressing I'm going to have to keep boys in and out and using my bench."

Appleman is the head coach for the varsity and junior varsity teams, and Ryan Riddle is the assistant coach. David Riddle coaches the freshmen, but Appleman supervises all three teams.

"Ryan and I will work together," he said. "The main purpose of junior varsity is to develop boys for the varsity because that's the end result." As for playing time, he said, "The best will play the most. I don't dictate playing time—the players do. Playing time is earned, not given."

Although Appleman is

not too familiar with the competition in the area, he feels that his season schedule includes some very tough teams. There will be no Thanksgiving Tournament this year because of a ruling by the Kentucky High School Athletic Association won't allow schools who have football to play basketball until after December 1. The Rockets' first game will be at home on December 2 against Williamsburg.

What kind of season does he expect to have? "As far as wins and losses I don't have any idea. I do have high expectations, but I think any new coach coming into a new system would have high expectations. But in turn, I know I'm fighting one thing and that is teaching these boys how to win."

"They're working hard and I think we'll be exciting to watch," he said. "I'm going to play an entertaining style ball. One thing about it—they'll get out there and play with no loading. There's only one way to go and that's hard."

He went on, "If the boys think that the town and community and school are behind them we'll have a successful season. They've worked hard for me and they want the discipline."

"I look for good things to come in the future," Appleman said confidently.

From Front) Don Jones of Livingston asked for permission to answer Mr. Bullock's question and said that he was involved primarily because he had a daughter in the 6th grade last year who "colored pictures in Math". Mr. Jones said she had to spend her summers being tutored and while he and his wife would see to it that she did learn, he was concerned about other children whose parents might not be able to afford tutoring or have the interest.

Other discussion involved a comment by Charles Parsons, superintendent, about the two programs the school system will be involved in through the state Department of Education which he feels will be very beneficial to the system, the School Effectiveness program and the Certification program.

Mr. Parsons told the group that the School Effectiveness Program was one that several counties had already participated in and "those counties have pulled themselves up (in test scores)."

Mr. Parsons also said, for three days and will conduct a complete evaluation of the system.

Again, Mr. Parsons mentioned that one area the evaluation team would find Rockcastle County weak in would be in the area of teachers out of their field, i.e., not teaching in their major area of study.

Parsons said he understood that teachers in this position would have 3 years to return to school and complete requirements for the field in which they are teaching or to obtain a position in their original field.

Mr. Parsons was asked by Elmer Whittier, original organizer of the committee, if the school system would give high priority to a school drop-out program which he said was available from the state Department of Education on a volunteer basis. Whittier said there was money available for administration of the program and it had been shown to be very effective when tried in other school systems.

Parsons answered in the affirmative. Don't forget the next meeting date for the committee—the second Monday in December at 7 p.m. at the high school library.

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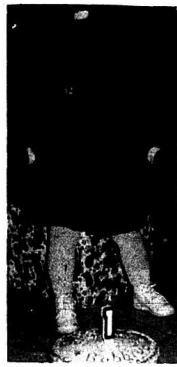

## Mike Appelman takes over reins as new basketball coach at Rockcastle County

Head Basketball Coach Mike Appelman's office is small and tidy, located right off the gym at the Rockcastle County High School. Besides the usual file cabinet, desk and scattered chairs, there's a wall clock that's a large replica of a Mountain Dew bottle cap.

On a bulletin board are posted several articles with titles like "Sportsmanship; It's contagious—catch it!" and "Al McGuire: A guy who is high on college basketball." There's a book on the desk by Dean Smith entitled "Basketball: Multiple Offense and Defense."

The blue carpet is new and the walls have been freshly painted blue and white.

Rockcastle County High School's new basketball coach has settled in.

Mike Appelman was finishing an after-school practice session when I met him for an interview. Wearing a

light blue skirt with NIKE, NIKE, NIKE on it, navy sweat pants and a leather tennis shoes, the 31-year-old coach seemed right at home on the court, instructing a group of boys trying their best to make the team.

Appelman began his year as head coach at RCHS in August, leaving a position as assistant basketball coach at Pendleton County High School in Northern Kentucky. After being an assistant for four years, he answered an ad in the Courier-Journal about a coaching job available in Rockcastle.

"I felt I was ready to be a head coach," said Appelman. "I had accomplished about all my goals I could as an assistant. Once I heard my goal, I was ready to move on."

He's no stranger to achieving goals.

Appelman grew up in Augusta, Ky. He's small, born of about 1,500 population near Maysville. He was the youngest child in a family

of two boys and two girls. He began playing basketball in grade school and then went on to play at August High School.

He explained how he became interested in sports, particularly basketball. "My father was a very good basketball player," Appelman got out a 1938 newspaper clipping that featured his father playing high school basketball. "My father worked with me a lot and built me a court."

He added, "My mother is a great basketball fan and the whole family, we live and breathe basketball."

After high school Appelman went to a community college, then dropped out because he didn't like it. But he lost his wife, Charles there and they got married, found jobs, and had their first child, Michael II.

Several years later Appelman and his wife decided they both wanted to go back to school. To do

A grant the City of Mt. Vernon has been trying to obtain since 1976 has become a reality as Mayor Roland Mullins announced the award of a \$901,335 grant from the Environmental Protection Agency at Monday night's regular meeting of the City Council.

The grant is for the design and construction for upgrading and enlargement of the existing wastewater treatment plant.

The \$901,335 grant will be matched with \$300,445 by the city and this money will reportedly come from the city's depreciation fund and bond interest and redemption fund.

The project, which is expected to be completed by 1986, will take care of the city's wastewater treatment needs for the next 20 years.

During the same meeting, the Council also received a report on upgrading the water plant from Jack Crawford of Crawford and Crawford Engineers.

The four-year project is cost estimated at \$383,900 and includes a new 12' x 12' tank from the water plant to City Hall on Richmond Street; a new 600,000 gallon ground storage tank; extending the 10" line from High Street to School Street on Richmond St. and extended the 8" line from Lower Drive (Carter Subdivision) to the tanks.

The project report was turned over to the water and sewer committee for study and they will report back to the full council in December with their recommendation on when to begin the project.

Thirty-eight more families will be receiving city water, the council decided Monday night. The council unanimously voted to lay about one mile of line on U.S. 25 south to the Pine Hill area which will serve 10 families and approximately 1 1/2 miles of line from the Sand Springs Road to the Cave Ridge area which will serve 28 families.

The new customers will have to pay the cost of materials and digging the ditch for the pipe, the council decided.

The city's garbage franchise was awarded to Clarence Hasty, Jr. and William K. Bullen, the only bidders, for a fee of \$1 for the five-year franchise.

Customers desiring this service will have to contact Mr. Hasty or Mr. Bullen on an individual basis.

The council also directed Matt Powell, Jr., Water Superintendent, to consider the laying of a sewer line from Quarry St. along Le-

cust Street as a top priority project.

Councilman Pete Hurd said he had looked the area over and thought the project was feasible. Powell suggested that the first step would be to hire an engineer to map out the project. He was given the go ahead to contact an engineer and report back to the council with the results.

Motorists coming from Ford Subdivision near the Library, will have the right-of-way over drivers on Joyce Street, the council decided during their meet-

ing Councilman Tom Welch said the present set up was creating a hazard, especially in the winter, for residents of the subdivision who often found it necessary to stop on a steep upgrade. So, a stop sign will be placed on Joyce Street in an effort to remedy the situation.

Powell was also directed by the council to approach the state Department of Highways concerning the installation of a caution light at the top of Fairground Hill.

### Schools have plans for coming inclement weather

As winter approaches, Rockcastle County Schools make plans for inclement weather.

In the event of inclement weather, primary consideration will be given to pupil safety. Weather and road conditions district-wide have to be considered.

The superintendent and his staff will evaluate weather and road conditions before 6 a.m.

Area radio station WRVK will announce the decision as soon as possible after 6 a.m. During the winter, school closing information will be broadcast over WRVK, Renfro Valley and WHAS, Louisville.

Parents and students are asked not to call the radio station or school staff members. Such calls tie up telephone lines and delay broadcast messages.

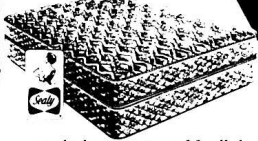

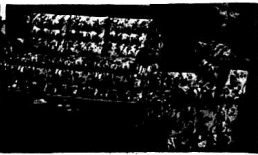

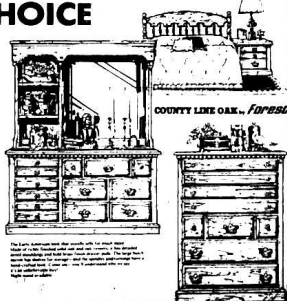

## FmHA helped 2,130 Ky. families buy homes in fiscal year 1983

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) made 2,310 home mortgage loans to Kentucky families in fiscal year 1983 that ended September 30, 1983, FmHA State Director Kendall L. Seaton announced today.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers and other rural residents who need credit but who cannot get it from private banks or other lending institutions. The loans are to be repaid in full, plus interest, to the U.S. Government. FmHA has more than 2,000 field offices throughout the country with 70 in Kentucky.

Periliminary figures show that nationally the Agency provided more than 60,000 loans to families across the country who were without safe, decent and sanitary housing. Another

20,000 families were afforded an opportunity at better housing through 1,000 loans that financed rental housing construction.

The total amount of the FmHA housing loans for the fiscal year was \$2.6 billion.

In Kentucky, FmHA provided 2,820 single family home loans and grants totaling \$78,397,190. Kendall L. Seaton said, "Thirty-six rental housing loans were made in Kentucky for \$29,618,680. Total housing loans for the year amounted to \$108,221,910."

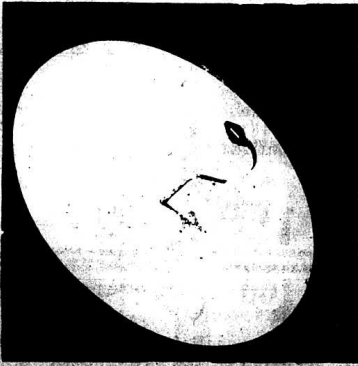

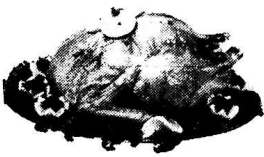

## Saved By Grace and Works

The Bible teaches salvation by both grace and works. There are different kinds of works referred to in the New Testament. Some are essential unto our salvation, others are excluded. Here are some kinds of works:

Works of the law of Moses (Gal 2:16)

Meritorious works or works that earn a reward (Eph 2:8, Rom 4:4, 5)

Works of man's righteousness (Rom 10:13)

Works of God (John 6:28)

Works of righteousness (Acts 10:35)

Which of these are essential unto our salvation? Which ones excluded? A reading of the references will show immediately that the first three are excluded and the last two are essential. The works of God would be those works which He has commanded, and this is said to be the "whole duty of man" (Eccl 12:13). Certainly, then, it is essential to our salvation.

The works of righteousness will also be those things God has commanded, for all thy commandments are righteousness" (Psa 119:172).

When we keep the commandments of God, thus do the works of God, or works of righteousness, we are not saved just by the work we do, but by the grace and mercy of God. Paul wrote of our salvation and of God and said, "He saved us?" How did God save us? "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us" (Titus 3:5).

When did He save us according to His mercy? "By the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost" (baptism).

Remember that our

Lord said, "When ye shall have done all those things which are commanded you, say we are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do" (Lk 17:10). Let us not think for a moment that because we repent of our sins and are baptized in the name of Christ that God is indebted to us or owes us salvation. And do not think that because one goes to church every Sunday gives of his money, reads his Bible regularly and tries to be a good moral life that God owes him eternal life or is in any way indebted to him. It is not so. If you are ever saved it will be by the grace and mercy of God. If I am granted an entrance into God's eternal city, it will be by the grace and mercy of my Lord, not because I have earned it. Thank God for His mercy!

Yes, I must do something in order to have forgiveness of my sins and the hope of eternal life! must work the works of God and I must work righteousness, keep His commandments, but when I shall have done all those things, I am an unprofitable servant and I must have the grace and mercy of God to be saved. Those works of God and works of righteousness are essential unto my salvation, but I am saved by the grace and mercy of God. Thank God for His grace!



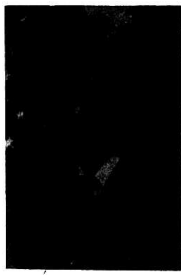
