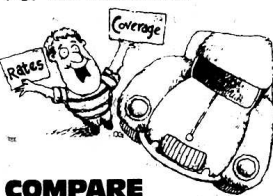

## ORDINANCE NO. 343

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1 That Clarence Hasty, Jr. and William K. Bullens, the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representative, successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser", subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, is hereby granted an exclusive franchise to operate a garbage collection business in this City and to use the streets and public thoroughfares within this city to conduct said business.

SECTION 2 The purchaser shall indemnify and save the City harmless from any damages, judgments, costs and expenses, including attorney fees, which the City may suffer by reasons of the conduct of this franchise.

SECTION 3 The purchaser shall furnish reliable garbage collection service for all residents of the City and may make such lawful contracts for the provision of said services as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and its customers.

SECTION 4 The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.

SECTION 5 This franchise and all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall be in full force and effect for a period of 5 years from and after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.

SECTION 6 This franchise may be transferred by the purchaser.

SECTION 7 The collection fees charged by purchaser shall be reasonable.

the highest trust in what the newspapers were telling them. # Farm & Home News

## Supplements Allow Maximum Use of Forages

Most Kentucky beef producers depend heavily on winter pasture and hay to get through the cold months. To make the most efficient use of forages and assure maximum beef production, the wise use of supplements is necessary. A good supplement is especially important this year because this summer's drought has lowered the quality of feedstuffs available for livestock.

A supplement is normally defined as being a concentrated form of a nutrient that is added to provide energy, protein, vitamins or minerals. Supplements also may contain other feed additives, such as antibiotics or buffers. To determine whether a supplement is needed and at what level it should

be fed, these questions must be answered:

1. What is the quality of the forage (hay)?
2. What type and size animal will be eating the forage?
3. What stage of production is the animal in (early pregnancy, growing, lactating, etc.)?

The first question is best answered by getting a forage analysis. In general, high quality hay is cut an early stage of maturity, and is leafy, green, pliable, free of dust and has a pleasant odor. Poor hay is stemmy, late-cut, brown, moldy and may contain weeds or foreign material, and while it is undesirable to have poor hay, it can be useful

if properly supplemented.

In explaining the question of bulls, calves and cows all have different nutrient requirements and different supplement needs. If you look up the requirements in tables, you will see that there are different tables for all types and sizes of beef animals. This often means that cattle of different types must be fed separately if your feed is to be efficiently utilized.

Stage of production also is considered important. Mature cows in early pregnancy fed a good quality hay probably will need little energy or protein supplement, but probably will require phosphorus and Vitamin A supplements. In contrast, yearling replacement heifers should be gaining 1.0-1.5 pounds per day and need to be eating about 1.5 pounds of protein and 10 pounds of total digestible nutrients (TDN). If an average quality hay is fed to these heifers, they probably will require an additional 3.4 pounds of grain to reach a desirable breeding weight at 14-16 months old. Vitamin A and phosphorus supplementation probably is necessary, too.

Many types of feedstuffs can make up supplements. Corn is the ideal energy supplement, but other grains may be used if the price is right. Soybean meal is the most commonly used protein supplement. Distillers and brewers byproduct feeds also are widely used. Non-protein nitrogen sources, such as urea or anhydrous ammonia, also may be used in many feeding situations. But, remember to follow directions carefully when using non-protein nitrogen, allowing an adjustment period when starting to feed it, and avoiding its use with calves under 500 pounds.

Phosphorus supplements are most often made of bone

meal or dicalcium phosphate although other forms may be used. These products also contain calcium which often is another needed supplement. The phosphorus-calcium mix is normally fed along with trace mineralized salt. It may be fed in complete supplement mixes. Supplements may be mixed on the farm, or bought as sacked meal in bulk, pelleted, in blocks or as a liquid. To decide the best, first consider the cost per unit of nutrient that you are buying. Blocks and liquid supplements are usually more expensive but more convenient.

A total of 226 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these, 162 were property damage only accidents, 60 were personal injury accidents, there were 4 fatal accidents, 99 persons were injured and 4 persons were killed.

185 criminal investigations were made resulting in 93 criminal arrests. 2,990 persons attended 44 safety programs conducted by the KSP.

### UK's Lock a jewel

When Robert Lock, a 6-11, 215-pound center from Fresno, Calif., announced last week that he will play his college basketball at the University of Kentucky, it should have come as a most pleasant surprise for UK fans.

Off his high school reputation, Lock looks like UK's best "big man" since Sam Bowie chose the Wildcats over Kentucky. Lock is the Lexington school five years ago. And Lock has already been compared favorably with Dan Issel, UK's all-time leading scorer.

According to one publication he averaged 23 points and 13.5 rebounds per game last year at Reedley High School near Fresno. On a club that finished 15-8, Lock had a game-high 42 points and 27 rebounds. The magazine rated Lock behind only two other big men prospects: 6-11 Chris Washburn, who signed with NC State, and 6-11 Danny Manning, Kansas.

Beyond his numbers, Lock is reportedly blessed with other talents: top-notch excellent foot speed, good post-up play and excellent "court sense," which was a trait Issel used so effectively throughout his college and professional career. By adding Lock to its roster, UK completed another sparkling recruiting campaign, at least the first half of it, since coach Joe B. Hall has said he may sign three to four more players next spring.

Lock joins high school All-Americans 6-7 Richard Madison and 6-2 Ed Davender, along with 6-7 Todd Ziegler and 6-9 Cedric Jenkins.

### Sam Bowie

UK's senior center will be in the starting lineup Saturday when the Wildcats play Louisville at Rupp Arena and Joe Hall is optimistic too.

The coach told an Associated Press reporter last week that "if he (Bowie) is only 80 percent, he's going to make a tremendous difference in our offense and defense. Sam is not just a jumper and a

rebounder and a tall person on the floor," Hall said. "He's a very intelligent player. He understands our offensive and defensive philosophies and plays well within those philosophies."

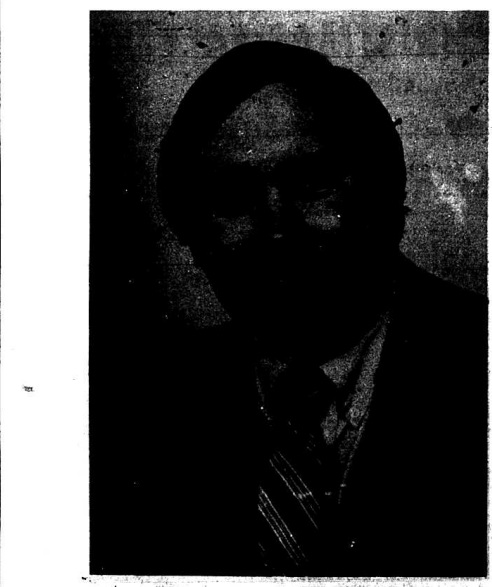

## Board approves almost 6 million dollar budget for 1983-84

The Rockcastle County Board of Education expects to receive \$5,983,598.60 for fiscal year 1983-84, an increase of only \$30,869.08 over what was actually received in 1982-83. This year's cost estimate budget was approved by the board at the October meeting and has also been approved on the state level. Part of the increased revenue is expected to come from general property tax, estimated at \$13,523, up from \$23,325.71 from last year. The budget for the foundation program, the board expects to receive \$3,604,288.98, up \$145,982.99 (this money is mostly of first-time budget and administrative salaries). However, the budget only includes an estimate of \$50,000 from interest income on approximately \$697,000 in investments as opposed to the \$102,028.19 actually received last year.

Another area where the budget shows a lower estimate than last year is Chapter 1 of the School Food Service down to \$368,338 from last year's receipts of \$491,656.00. This reflects a 15% cut in the program by the federal government. Supt. Parsons said. On the expenditure side, there is an increase of \$12,151,277 in total fixed charges (over last year's actual expenditure of \$4,050,185.78) made up primarily of first-time budget allotment of \$289,990 for contingencies, an item Parsons said the state Department of Education was asking local districts to include in case the state should cut funding in some areas.

The figure amounts to a little more than 3% of the total budget and, Parsons said, if it is not needed, the money reverts to the general fund at the end of the fiscal year. Other expenditures, with last year's totals in parentheses, include: \$98,000 for administration (\$88,181.12); \$3,219,000 for instruction (\$3,044,470.92); health services, \$30,000

(\$27,897.10); pupil transportation, \$560,000 (\$535,073.33); operation of plant, \$300,000 (\$288,528.75); and maintenance of plant, \$90,000 (\$74,287.19).

Expenditures for general fund capital outlay are listed at \$16,032.96 which includes an allocation of \$48,032.96 for new buildings and additions and \$75,000 for remodeling.

School finance director Lloyd Shuts said the \$48,032.96 was included in the budget for the year in addition to the present heating

system of a new one is needed to take care of the addition at Livingston Elementary School. The \$75,000 is an estimate for replacing a number of windows at Broadhead School and any other projects for which the need might arise.

The normal outlay fund budget totals \$343,319.02 and the three major items to be paid from this budget are \$150,000 for the addition at Livingston School, \$75,000 for redemption of revenue bonds and \$72,700 for interest on revenue bonds.

## 56 respond to final blood drive of the year

On November 8, 1983, the Rockcastle County Homemakers sponsored the third and final community blood drive of the year at the Bank of Mt. Vernon. Not as many people attempted to donate as the Homemakers expected, however 56 people donated. The three community blood drives in 1983 yielded 138 pints as compared to 170 at the three drives during 1982. The community blood drives productively decreased, yet blood drives at the Rockcastle County Hospital and good response from Rockcastle Manufacturing and Mt. Vernon Plastics helped achieve a total of 212 pints for the year. Rockcastle County residents have achieved blood assurance with Central Kentucky Blood Center residents.

The Rockcastle County Homemakers thank everyone who helped recruit blood donors, the Bank of Mt. Vernon for providing the mobile site and to Druther's Restaurant for donating food coupons to all blood donors.

Community blood drives for donors are scheduled 13, 17, 19 and November 6, all at the Bank of Mt. Vernon. ## Reflecting on Thanksgiving

It's about Thanksgiving when you realize that the year is winding down. There are those few, brief days between the glory of October and the rush of Christmas when you naturally pause to take stock of the past 11 months. It's time to count your wins and losses. Were your expectations met? Or are you disappointed with the outcome of another year that has gone, too, too quickly. Perhaps 1983 brought the unexpected, the unexplained, the unforeseen. But no matter what it brought, we feel obligated to continue the tradition that gives meaning to Thanksgiving: Counting our blessings. Easier said than done, huh? Looking back, it seems this year has been full of overwhelmingly bad news. The Signal has had to report an unusual number of tragedies. There have been too many fatal and near-fatal accidents, too many deaths of well-known coun-

ty residents. It hasn't been any better on the national front. The country suffered a heat wave this summer that brought death to some and serious drought to others. Recently, over 200 American families mourned the loss of their sons who were senselessly killed in Lebanon while on a peacekeeping mission.

And internationally? The same. The Soviets downed a Korean airliner with 267 persons on board and none survived. The awesome effects of nuclear war were graphically depicted by a television movie called "The Day After," and viewers were stunned at the unthinkable circumstances that would result from a nuclear attack. And we are to count our blessings? I give a resounding "no." The very tradition of Thanksgiving is founded on being grateful in spite of losses. After all, the Pilgrims were so excitedly grateful when they came together on the day of the first Thanksgiving—they

were just grateful to have survived in a wild, new country.

Perhaps the purpose of this particular day is to be thankful even in the face of disappointment and loss. We are still left with those elemental things that have sustained humans since the beginning of time: Earth, family, life, work and hope. We have to patiently wait for all of it, the pain and the joy, the ugly and the beautiful, to mesh together into a plausible, compelling reason to exist. In the meantime, we must learn, however slowly, to accept.

## Transportation Cabinet sets road clearing priorities for county

When "Old Man Winter" arrives in Rockcastle County with snow, the state transportation crews will be out to clear the roads.

To help motorists plan their winter driving, the Transportation Cabinet has announced which roads will be cleared first.

State crews will clear I-75, U.S. 150 from the Lincoln County line to I-75 and U.S. 25 from Mt. Vernon to I-75 first.

The next roads to be cleared are Ky 421, Ky. 461 and the remainder of U.S. 25.

Other state-maintained roads will follow.

The roads are cleared as soon as precipitation becomes significant. Crews set

out with salt or plows to clear the top priority roads first. The priority system is based on the traffic carried by the road.

Top priority roads include interstates, parkways, urban expressways and other state roads with exceptionally large volumes of traffic.

Second priority roads are state primary roads, by-passes and roads with slightly less traffic.

State secondary roads, rural secondary roads and other routes with equal traffic fall into the third category.

Remaining state roads are cleared after these categories have been treated.

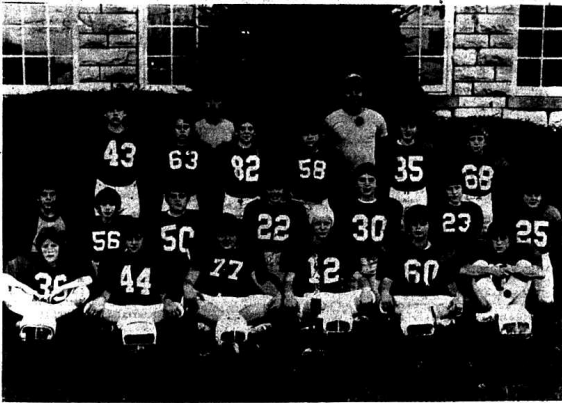

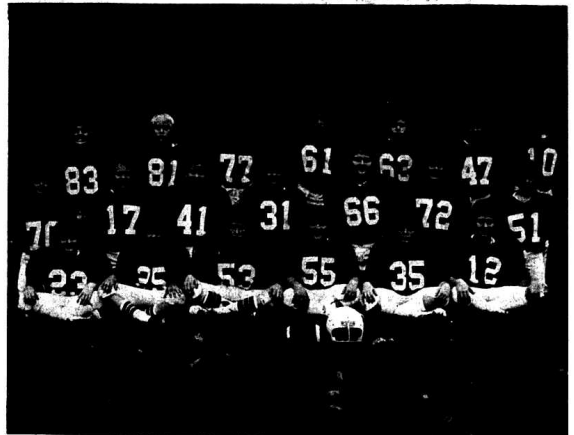

## State Legislature

By Sen. John Rogers

Kentucky's state legislature is in the process of winding up its 1982-83 interim committee work and taking aim at the 1984 session of the General Assembly.

A majority of the issues which will garner attention during the upcoming session have already been

reviewed by interim committees. As a result 180 bills have already been prepared for the session.

Activities of the 92 committees and subcommittees authorized by the Legislative Research Commission officially concluded on October 31st.

Of course, many of the profiled bills are ideas that have been floating a-

round the legislature for several years.

For instance, one profiled bill seeks to create a new section to the Kentucky Constitution to permit the legislature to establish qualifications and training requirements for coroners.

Another profiled bill seeks to permit sheriffs to succeed themselves in office.

It is interesting to note that of the thousands of bills and amendments to bills which will be considered by the 1984 General Assembly, there is one bill that is more important than all the rest.

The single most important responsibility of the state legislature, as required by the Kentucky Constitution is the enactment or passage of a two-year state

budget

The legislature, as always, must enact a budget to fund the whole of state

government for two years. The 1982-84 budget totaled in excess of \$10 billion.

**Freezing Cooked Turkey**  
Bone and freeze leftover turkey as soon as possible after the meal. Pack the pieces of meat tightly to

prevent it from becoming soggy. To keep it as moist as possible. Otherwise an off-flavor may develop. Package in freezer bags or freezer wrap.

A good way to freeze small pieces of cooked turkey is to cover it with broth or gravy. Leave 1 inch of headspace in quart containers and 1/2 inch in pint containers.

Plan to use cooked turkey within a month if packed separately. If packed in broth or gravy, however, it will keep well up to 6 months in your freezer.

#### Freezing Broth, Gravy

If you want to freeze broth separately, remove bones, skin and excess fat, then cool broth for 30 minutes by setting the pan in another pan of cold water or ice water. Pour into freezer containers, leaving 1 inch headspace for quarts and 1/2 inch for pints. Use frozen broths or gravy within 6 months.

Cool gravy in the same manner before freezing. Allow same amount of headspace. The thawed gravy won't be as thick as it was originally.

#### Freezing Stuffing

When you freeze leftover stuffed turkey or chicken, be sure to take out the stuffing and freeze it separately. Use it within 6 months.

#### Date the Packages

Be sure to write the date frozen on the package label. That will help you to remember to use the turkey, broth, gravy or stuffing before it goes over the recommended storage time and loses some of its quality and flavor.

#### Refreezing Turkey

If raw or cooked poultry thaws, you can refreeze it if it still contains ice crystals. But thawing and refreezing will lower its eating quality, so it would be better to use it in a meal right away instead.

#### Timesavers

You might want to make up a casserole with the leftover cooked turkey

and freeze it for a quick meal on a busy day this winter. Plan to use within 6 months.

Another idea would be to make turkey sandwiches and freeze them. You can tuck these frozen sandwiches into a lunchbox in the morning and have them thawed and still safe to eat at noon. They'll keep in your freezer up to one (1) month.

Frozen broth is good in soups or for making gravy.

#### Thawing Turkey

When you thaw turkey, stuffing, broth or gravy, do it in the refrigerator. Don't thaw it at room temperature because that gives food poisoning bacteria a chance to go to work on it.

You can pop a frozen casserole into the oven and heat it without thawing. Just be sure to start with a cool oven.

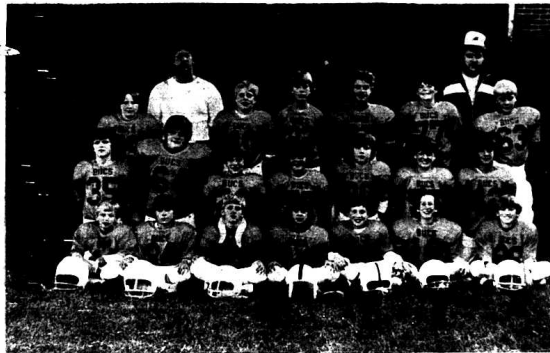
