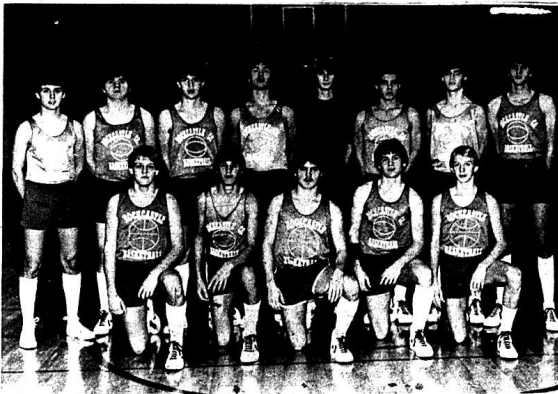

The state now has a collection percentage of less than 75 percent of people who pay the taxes on their cars.

Under the new collection method approved by the 1982 General Assembly, the state should take in an additional \$16 million a year and local governments \$15 million more.

At least for the first year of the new collection method, each vehicle owner will be notified by mail how much motor tax is due. Notifications will be sent out in December on each vehicle to owners who have to pay in their birth month of January and then notices will be sent out a month before the due month for other taxpayers. The

state will review this notification process the middle of next year and decide if it should be retained.

Unlike the present system of paying motor vehicle taxes, there will be no discounts for people who pay their tax bill early.

But, there will be penalties for late payment. If the tax is not paid on or before the last day of the month in which the registration is required by law, the tax becomes delinquent. Additional charges of 3 percent will be applied for the first 30 days, 10 percent after 30 days and 15 percent per year interest on all taxes and penalties due.

The new collection system will not be tied to delinquent bills for years before 1984, Coffee said. "Those bills will have to be paid but this new method will start only with 1984 registrations."

If a person sells a vehicle before registering it and paying the taxes, the new owner will have to pay before the clerk will register the vehicle. If a vehicle owner thinks the assessment on his property is incorrect, he can file an appeal with the local board of assessment appeals, Coffee said.

The state will hold sessions across the state the second and third weeks of December to train county clerks how to collect motor taxes on the state's centralized computer system, Coffee said.

fee said. A refresher course is scheduled for the last week of the month, he added.

County clerks will receive a 2 percent fee for collecting the tax, Coffee said. "We will ask the 1984 state legislature to up that collection fee to 4.25 percent, the amount sheriffs have been receiving," he said. "I made an error in setting the fee at 2 percent. I didn't realize at that time that was not enough to compensate clerks for their additional work."

Sheriffs were "willing participants" in the new collection system, said Coffee, noting that the state has increased their real estate collection fees by 0.25 percent to 4.25 percent.

"It also will take more paperwork off their backs and give them additional time for law enforcement," Coffee said.

Jefferson County Sheriff Jim Greene, head of the Kentucky Sheriffs Association, said sheriffs would lose money under the new collection system "but we feel it is a good thing for state government since it will provide tighter collection of the tax."

Hospital modifies emergency room rates to lower costs

In a continuing effort to lower health care costs, the Rockcastle County Hospital has changed its minimum Emergency Room rates from \$25 to \$18. The \$7 decrease will save county residents \$20,800 over the next year, as determined by an estimated 2,943 visits to the Emergency Room.

The purpose of the modification is to adjust Emergency Room rates so they will be based on the injury and complaint of the patient. For example, a person with a cold will not be charged the same fee for an E.R. visit as someone who is treated for a severe heart attack.

There are now four categories into which Emergency Room patients fall. Category #1 is for routine, non-emergency cases, and will have an \$18 fee. Category #2 remains at \$25, and is for major emergency cases. Category #3 is for critical,

major emergencies, and Category #4 is for life-threatening emergencies.

There will be a hospital fee as well as one for the physician who treats the patient. The staff physicians set their own fees. However, the hospital does the billing for the weekend Emergency

room physicians, who are employed by the facility and are in the hospital from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Sunday to ensure continuous weekend coverage. Any extra supplies and treatment needed by Emergency Room patients will be charged accordingly.

New vehicle tax law goes into effect in January

Beginning Jan. 1, all Kentucky vehicle owners must pay the property tax on their motor vehicles to the county clerk at the same time as they register them.

Failure to pay the tax will mean no license tags for the vehicles. County Sheriffs now collect the motor vehicle tax, real estate tax and tax on tangible property such as stocks and bonds. Starting next

year, they will collect the real estate and intangible taxes, but the county clerk will collect motor vehicle taxes.

"The idea behind this new method of collecting the vehicle tax is to ensure that every vehicle owner pays his fair share," said Bill Coffee, the state's property taxation commissioner.

Annual Notification To Parents

In accordance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act, parents shall have the right to inspect and review all education records relating to their child by making request to the principal of

each school or other designated official. This right shall be passed on to the student at age 18.

Written policies have been developed which describe the types and locations of these records and the specific procedures available to parents for the review of records, the amendment of or hearing concerning education records believed to be inaccurate, misleading and otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of the child, and for the disclosure and destruction of records. Copies of these policies and procedures may be obtained upon request from the office of the principal or of the Superintendent.

In accordance with federal regulations concerning the release or transfer of educational records, it is the policy of this school district to forward education records, if the student seeks or intends to enroll. Parents may obtain upon request copies of the records transferred and an opportunity for a hearing. Directory information may be released by the schools on individual students unless specific instructions not to do so are presented to

the principal or Superintendent in writing by the parents of a student on or before September 15th of each year. Directory information shall include the student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent education institution attended by the student.

Parents shall have the right to file complaints to the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act concerning any alleged failures of the district to comply with this act.

Parents of a child who had graduated or otherwise left the district and who was formerly enrolled in a program for exceptional children may request the destruction of any personally identifiable information in the education record of their child which was collected, maintained, or used for the identification, evaluation, or placement of the exceptional child. Such requests shall be addressed in writing to the principal or Superintendent.

Sowing and Reaping

In Galatians 6:7,8, "Whoever sows to himself will also reap." For he that sows to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that sows to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap eternal life.

To sow to the flesh is to act in accordance with the impulses of the flesh; the harvest is corruption or everlasting loss of the soul. To sow to the Spirit is to be guided or directed by the Spirit. This direction is to be found in the Scriptures. One sows to the Spirit when he preaches the message of the Spirit, and is rewarded with everlasting life.

God's natural law is that every seed reproduces "after its kind" (Gen. 1:11-12), and His spiritual law is the same. Mary seems to endorse the idea that they can sow to the flesh and reap spiritual blessings. That is no more possible than corn seed and reaping wheat.

In fact, it is "mocking God." Unless natural law is distorted, seed produces after its kind. This principle shows why there are so many different religions in the world. Man has been sowing something other than the Word of God. The true church exists only if the same gospel message (seed of the kingdom) is preached (Luke 8:11). Farmers have learned that twisted, germ-free seed is worth extra cost. So is the certified gospel (Gal. 1:8-11).

We reap in proportion to the amount of seed sown. A lady planted some okra in her garden but it

was slow in coming up. She forgot she had planted it so she planted some more. She had a terrible time getting it "turned off." The Bible teaches that if we sow bountifully we reap bountifully (2 Cor. 9:6,8), and that some actions will reap a hundred fold (Mk. 10:29-32). This is a great blessing if one is doing good, because good works may multiply until the judgement (Rev. 14:13).

The harvest comes only in "due season" (Gal. 6:9). It is amusing to watch an impatient child who has planted his first seeds. He sits, he watches, he waters, he fertilizes it until he drowns it and burns it up. He prods beneath the surface of the soil, anxiously looking for growth. He may say, "Grow! Grow!" But it will not grow until "due season" and his impatience and interference may delay the growth. So it is with the gospel. Only that which brings forth fruit with patience will reap the harvest (Lk. 8:15).

Are you sowing to the flesh? Compare your life to the works of the flesh (Gal. 5:19-21). Are you practicing any of these works? If you have been sowing to the flesh, you need forgiveness which is freely offered by Christ if you believe in Him, repent of sin and be baptized (Acts 2:38). Life on earth is sowing time. Eternity is reaping time.

Cumberland District Health Department observing National Home Care Week

The Rockcastle County Home Health Agency has announced that National Home Care Week will be celebrated this week all across the county. The week has been set aside to pay tribute to the thousands of dedicated individuals throughout America whose efforts allow more than two million elderly, infirm, disable or dying to receive the health and social services they need in the comfort and privacy of their own homes.

Nationally home care has grown in recent years, spurred by Congressional and regulatory recognition of its humanitarian approach and its cost effectiveness. As of early 1983 there were nearly 4,000 home care agencies which met Medicare standards, almost four times as many as fifteen years ago. Medicare records also show that home care costs less than institutional care. Data from the National Association for Home Care in Washington, D.C. shows that the average annual cost per Medicare beneficiary in 1982 was \$819, compared to \$1,170 for nursing home care and \$3,875 for hospital care. But more important than its economic value is the value home care places on the concerns of the individual. Congressman Claude Pepper has stated, the providers of home care services place "dignity and respect on human life, and human health and happiness, as their primary goals."

Rockcastle County has selected a theme for this year's home care week celebration that they say sums up the most distinct advantage of home care over other forms of health care. "Our theme is 'There's No Place Like Home', and we think most people really believe that."

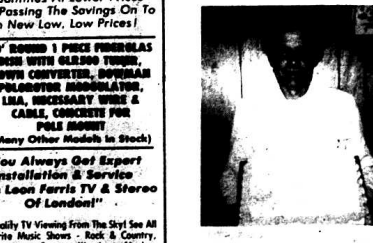
