Identify these by the UL Mark from Underwriters Laboratories. -Check each set of lights for broken or back whires and loose connections. Discard any of this equip-ment that is worn or brok-en. -Check labels of lights

en. Check labels of lights to be used outdoors to see that they are suitable for outdoor use. Never use in-door lights outside. -Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, walls, or other firm support to pro-tect them from wind dam-age.



See that each family member and your babysitter know at least two escape routes. -Avoid wearning loose flowing clothes-especially long, open sieeves-near the open flames of a fireplace, stove or candle-lit table. -Never burn candles near evergreens on a man-tilepice or table. -Burning evergreens in the fireplace can be dan-gerous. When dry, greens burn like tinder. Their filmes can flare out of con-

trol, sending sparks flying about the room. --Plan for safety. Re-member there is not substi-tute for common sense. Look for and eliminate po-tential danger spots near candles, fireplaces, trees and electrical connections.
