Kentucky 4-H Celebrates 75th Birthday

Nineteen eighty four marks the 75th year of 4-H in Kentucky. Programs and events in the upcoming year will be planned to celebrate this momentous birthday.

In honor of this celebration, the Mt. Vernon Signal plans to feature pictures and excerpts from 4-H in the past in Rockcastle County. Anyone who has old pictures or newspaper clippings concerning their 4-H work, please contact the extension office.

4-H has undergone quite a few changes over the past 75 years. The first club was in Fayette County and was

known as a corn club for boys. These corn clubs began farming around the state and before long, "big clubs" and "poultry clubs" were also teaching boys better farming methods. Soon girls began joining these clubs and by 1912 a few "canning clubs" had been formed for Kentucky Farm Girls.

By 1921, local community clubs began to form which included all project groups, whether animal or household related, into one club. Many of these clubs planned a year-round program of activities which were run by club officers much like today's club meetings.

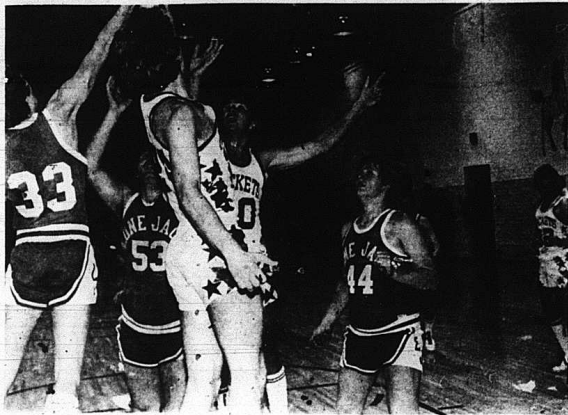

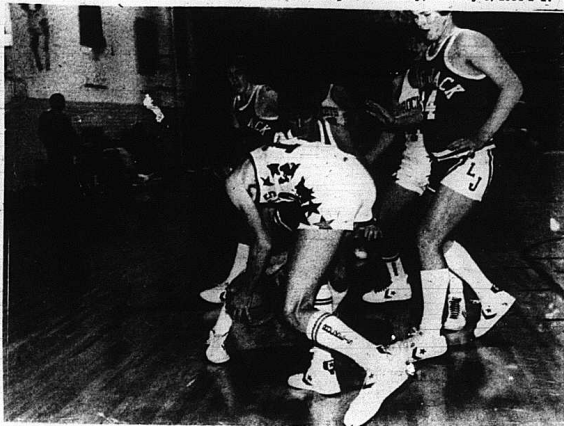

Bernheim hunt regulation is approved; hunt is Feb. 3-6

Governor Martha Layne Collins signed an emergency regulation last week authorizing deer gun hunting on Bernheim Forest Refuge and

adjacent private lands in Nelson and Bullitt Counties. The hunt, necessary to reduce the overcrowded herd in the area, is sched-

uled for February 3-6. Approximately 1,200 hunters will be selected by a random drawing for the Bernheim Forest Refuge hunt. Hunters in the refuge may use only muzzle- or breech-loading shotguns from ten through 20 gauge firing single projectile (slug) ammunition.

Those wishing to apply should write their name, address, telephone number and age on a 3x5 index card and mail it, along with a self-addressed, stamped envelope, to Deer Hunt, Dept. of Fish and Wildlife, 41 Game Farm Road, Frankfort Ky. 40601.

Those wishing to apply as a partner should mail their cards together in a single envelope. Parties may not contain more than five hunters.

Applications must be received no later than 4:30 p.m., January 13, to be eligible for the drawing. More than one application from an individual will disqualify that applicant. Specific hunting dates (one day per hunter) and hunt locations will be assigned at the time of the drawing.

No advance application will be required to hunt on the lands surrounding Bernheim Forest Refuge. However, hunters must obtain permission from the property owner before hunting on private lands. Any firearm legal for deer hunting may be used on the surrounding private lands.

The open area of Nelson and Bullitt Counties will be between the Bernheim refuge boundary and the following roads: In Bullitt County from the Nelson County line north on State Route (SR) 61 to I-65, north on I-65 to SR 480, east on SR 480 to SR 1604, south on SR 1604 to Deatsville Rd. south on Deatsville Rd. to the Nelson County line. In Nelson County from the Bullitt County line south on Deatsville-Cedar Grove Rd. to SR 523, west on SR 523 to SR 245, south on SR 245 to US 31E, south on US 31E to US 62, west on US 62 to SR 61, and north on SR 61 to the Bullitt County line.

In addition to 1984 hunting license, all hunters

participating in these hunts must have a valid 1983 deer permit.

Biologists say that it is necessary to reduce the herd in the area by 60 percent so the forest can recover from over-browsing and so the remaining deer will have sufficient food to make it through the rest of the winter. Officials say that this hunt should give all parties a few years to work on a long-term solution to the deer population on Bernheim.

The Ballard Quota Zone is in the Northwestern portion of Ballard County, bounded by U.S. 60 and KY. 147, 358 including the Ballard County Wildlife Management Area. Goose season in the por-

tion of Ky. outside the Ballard Zone will continue as scheduled. Duck season throughout

the state, including the Ballard Zone, will continue as scheduled through January 20th.

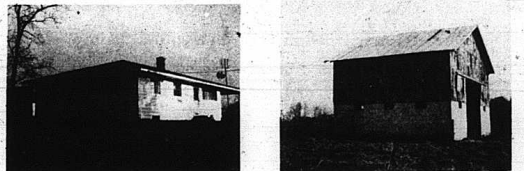

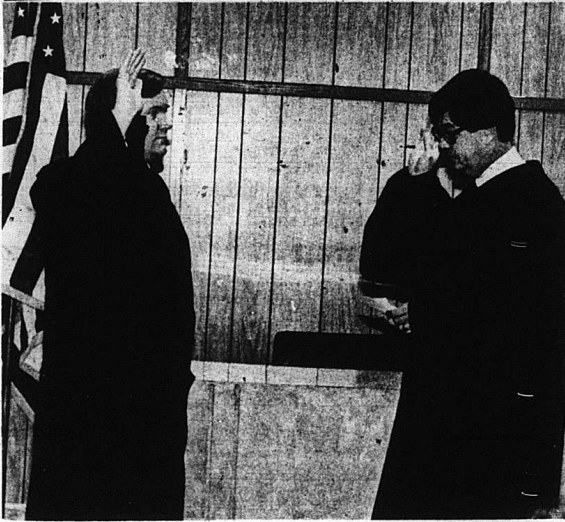

Venters sworn-in here Monday as Circuit Judge

In a major break with tradition, Circuit Judge-elect Dan Venters took his oath of office in Rockcastle County Monday in the Circuit Courtroom of the courthouse.

This was the first time in the county's history that a circuit judge had chosen to be sworn-in in Rockcastle County.

The former district judge, who received a mandate from the voters of Rockcastle and Pulaski counties in the November general election, was administered the oath of office by state Supreme Court Justice Calvin Akers, himself a former district judge for Rockcastle and Pulaski counties.

Akers, now assistant Chief Justice and second in seniority on the 7-man court, called the occasion an "honor and a privilege" and said "this is where it all began for me" and said his election to the state Supreme Court started a "sequence of events" which revealed the opportunity for Venters to be elected Circuit Judge.

After receiving the oath of office, Venters addressed a few remarks to the crowd and, in effect, revealed his reasons for choosing Rockcastle for the swearing-in ceremony.

Venters first expressed his appreciation for being in Rockcastle County for the ceremony and then said, "I

got my start practicing law here (in Rockcastle County) a little over 8 years ago and I have always appreciated the encouragement, kindness and support the people of this county have given me over the years."

Venters concluded his remarks by saying, "it is an honor and I want to thank you for the opportunity you have given me in the

past to serve as your district judge and now circuit judge."

Following the ceremony, a reception was held in the judge's chamber and another reception was scheduled in Somerset later in the day.

To date, no decision has been made as to who will be appointed to fill the vacancy of district judge, created by Venters' election.

Court rehires Hansel; names head mechanic

At Tuesday's meeting of the Rockcastle Co. Fiscal Court, County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper asked for a motion to renew county road supervisor Paul Hansel's contract for two more years, at the same salary.

The request also included the hiring of Doug Bishop as head mechanic at \$4.50 per hour and Carl Pittman as assistant mechanic, to work when Bishop does not, also at \$4.50 per hour.

Magistrate Bill Wren immediately made the official motion to hire Hansel but said he didn't believe the court could legally hire another mechanic since they had just laid off one (Delno McClure).

However, Judge Jasper responded that at the time of the lay-offs, Charles Buswell was still on the payroll as a mechanic and that since that time, he had handed in his resignation.

County Attorney James Lambert was asked his opinion of the legality of hiring Bishop and he expressed the opinion that the court had broad powers to manage personnel in about any manner they want to.

On the vote, Wren's motion was seconded by Magistrate Joe Clark. Magistrate Alex Albright, without comment, voted no; Magistrate Donald Rowe voted yes and Magistrate Tom Denney, saying he would vote to hire Hansel but would vote no if it was all put in one motion, also voted no.

Rowe then asked the Judge what the procedure was to get road gravelled. Rowe said there were roads in his district that had not been gravelled in two years and he wanted to know if Hansel could rock a road without the Judge's permission.

Judge Jasper responded that the usual procedure

was for the magistrates to contact him and then for him to contact Hansel.

Rowe said that some people in his district were "hurting bad." And, he said the people were requesting quarry rock instead of railroad rock or creek rock. Rowe said that quarry rock might be more economical to use in his district, because of the location of the quarry, then to bring in the railroad rock or creek rock from the "backside of the county."

The "hurry" line to Rowe's questions seemed to be that he wanted to know who to tell his constituents to contact when they ask about getting their road fixed.

The court accepted a bid from Mt. Vernon Produce for culverts. It was the only bid submitted and ranged from \$83 for a 12" x 20' long culvert to \$319 for a 48" by 20 ft. culvert.

Wren made the motion to approve the bid and all magistrates voted yes except Rowe, who voted no. The magistrates, Albright and Denney, also voted no on a motion to extend, for another month, the payment of the landfill fee at Lily for holders of the local garbage franchise.

Albright did not comment on his no vote but Denney said he felt "if we have any money to spend, it ought to be on rock since the roads are in terrible shape."

Deputy Sheriff Clarence "Jibb" Hasty, one of the franchise operators, responded "Tom, it would tickle me if the county would take it (garbage franchise) back."

Denney answered, "I haven't got a thing against you but I just feel like the county ought to take care of the roads."

City's commercial district entered in historic register

The Mt. Vernon Commercial District has been entered in the National Register of Historic Places, according to a letter from Mary Cronan Oppel, director of the Kentucky Heritage Council and State Historic Preservation Officer to Mayor Roland Mullins.

The district included in the designation is Main Street from Church to Richmond Streets.

The Register gives recognition that the site has historical, architectural or archaeological significance within the context of the community, state or nation.

Benefits include limited protection against adverse action by federal agencies and eligibility for federal tax benefits for depreciable historic structures as specified in the Economic Recovery Act of 1981.

Light agenda results in little action at school board meeting

With the coming of winter and the school recess, the Rockcastle County Board of Education usually has very little of interest to do at their monthly meeting and last Tuesday night was no exception.

Besides the usual payment of the monthly bills, the main item on the agenda was the hiring of five new employees.

Zandell Hasty, Billy Adams and Jerry Makin were all hired as substitute bus drivers and a teacher was hired for the new special education unit at the Family Life Center.

The teacher, Mrs. Catherine Dotson of Lexington, was one of five applicants for the job. None of the local teachers on the list awaiting jobs were qualified for the position, Supt. Charles Parsons said. "There are two teachers in the county that are qualified for that position but neither one of them wanted to leave the class they are teaching now," Parsons said.

The school board made an agreement with the life center at last month's meeting to provide a teacher and the necessary equipment to teach another special education

unit. The Life Center has had several children move in at the center who need this type program and there simply was not room at any of the grade schools, Parsons added.

At the request of Industrial Arts teachers Larry Hammond and Jerry Makin, the board gave their approval for Parsons to purchase a new wood planer for the shop department at the high school. "If we are going to have these departments, we need to keep the best equipment we possibly can," said Board Chairman Rudolph Burdette. Hammond told the board that the plane being used at the present time was six or seven years old and that it was no longer of any use because of its poor condition.

The new plane will cost approximately \$52,000 and, according to Hammond, should last about 20 years.

The board also voted to purchase 45 new window shades for the Brothead grade school at a cost of \$2,412.52. Parsons said the old shades had been in part of the school for around 15 years.

The fifth employee hired by the board was Dalha Haar of Richmond, who was hired for 10 hours a week at \$3.75 per hour to be

an aide at the hearing-impaired unit at Eastern Kentucky University, in which the local school system is participating. Miss Haar is a student at Eastern and is majoring in this field, Parsons said.

Parsons also said that Ms. Haar is already volunteering her services to the program and had applied for the part-time job when she found out the board was going to hire someone for the unit.

Baptism Now Saves Us

The purpose of baptism is a point of disagreement among the various religious denominations. The majority of these agree that one should be baptized, but they do not agree upon WHY one should be baptized.

The reason for baptism is found in many passages of scripture: (1) it remits sins-Acts 2:38; (2) washes away sins-Acts 22:16; and (3) Peter says it "now saves us"-1 Peter 3:21. These scriptures allow a connection between the act of baptism and one's salvation. Peter tells us plainly that this saves us; c.f. K. 16:16.

How does baptism save us? Not by the physical act of washing. If this were the case, everyone who goes swimming would be saved when he dives into the water. No, the saving value of baptism is in the submissive obedient spirit of the penitent believer. It is the yielding up of one's self to God, making His will supreme in our lives that works for our salvation.

There is a type, image or figure connected with the flood and salvation of eight souls and our salvation today. Peter says that "eight souls" were saved through water; which also after a true kindness doth now save you, even baptism" (1 Peter 3:20-21).

It has been stated that they were saved from drowning by staying out of the water, but it is extremely foolish to say that any one was saved

by water! Not drowning in water! But what is the figure—the true kindness of their being saved by water and our being saved by baptism?

The water transported them from a world of corruption into a world made pure by water; and so baptism takes us out of a life of sin and corruption into a state of righteousness-out of the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of Christ. Their being saved from drowning was not the type at all; if so, it could not be said they were saved BY water.

Noah was not saved by water from drowning; the ark saved him from that. That is not the salvation Peter had in mind. However, Noah was saved from something by water, and Peter said there is a likeness between his salvation and ours. What did the water do for Noah? Before the flood he was in a world of corruption. WATER CHANGED HIS ENVIRONMENT—put him into a new world, so to speak. After a true likeness baptism does the same for us today.
