



Beginning October 1, 1983, the government dramatically changed the way it pays hospitals for services to Medicare inpatients. Under the services of the ser

lated groups" (DRG's), based on the nature of the illness.

Each DRG carried a specific rate of payment. If the hospital treats the patient for less, it can keep the excess funds; if treatment costs more, the hospital have an incentive to keep costs down. Under the old system, the hospital submitted a bill to the government for the costs of care given to Medicare patients and then were reimbursed for the amount the government considered "Reasonable." This lead to ligher/costs and the Medicare's hospital insurance trust fund by the mid-1990's.
