The record high dividend was made possible because of improved interest earnings on the insurance funds' investments.

No application for the annual dividend is needed, Caudill said. Each policyholder will receive the dividend in the month of the anniversary of the individual policy.

In Kentucky 530 World War I veterans will receive \$127,000 in dividends; 28,830 World War II veterans will receive \$6,000,000; 4,154 Korean War veterans will receive \$497,000, and 1,411 veterans holding Veterans Reopened Insurance policies will receive \$277,000.

Dividends differ under each program depending on the amount of insurance age, plan selected and length of time the policy has been in force.

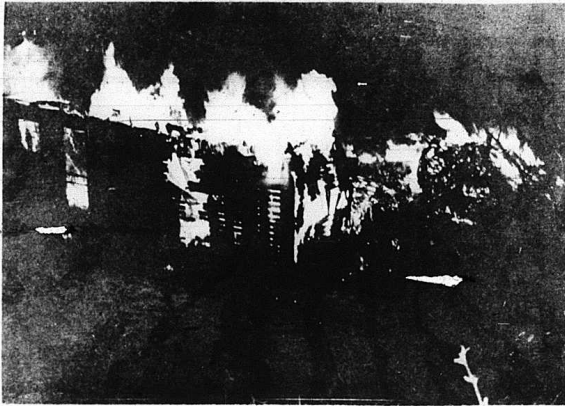

The Sheriff also said that two accomplices waited outside the store during the robbery. Following the robber's demands, asst. store manager Dwight Pingleton gave the robber all of the money in the cash register drawers, the Sheriff said.

Taylor said the three then left on foot.

Penalty, interest to be added to expired license plates

If you do not renew your license plates during your birth month, interest and penalty will be added, according to County Clerk Irene Bales.

Mrs. Bales said that a 3% penalty will be added for the first 30 days and a 10% penalty after 30 days. In addition, the clerk said, interest on all taxes and penalties due will be figured at 15% per annum.

Mrs. Bales also urged vehicle owners to not wait until the last day of the month to renew their registration and pay the property taxes. "Avoid the lines and renew early," Mrs. Bales said.

Over 1,000 applied for home heating aid

Over 1,000 persons applied for home heating aid under the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Linda McCauley, field service supervisor for the Department of Social Insurance.

Ms. McCauley said that 395 applicants in December under the aged and disabled part of the program and most all of these applications were approved. Another 650 applied under the crisis component part of the program on January 18th and these decisions on these applications should be made within the next two weeks, Ms. McCauley said.

"The state" received almost \$17,000,000 for the entire program from the federal government, and McCauley said that over 100,000 applications were received state-wide. Two parts of the program were closed in two days because it was apparent that the funds had been spent.

Applicants on a first-come, first-served basis, had to meet eligibility requirements of income and resources. The resources

part meant that applicants could have no more than \$5,000 in liquid assets to qualify. Income limitations varied by household size from \$500 a month for one person to \$800 a month for 4 or more.

The amount allocated also varied depending on income and the type of fuel used with users of propane gas, fuel oil, electricity and kerosene being granted a one-time payment from \$225 to \$300 and natural gas, coal and wood users granted a payment of \$175 to \$250.

Ms. McCauley said that the number of applicants "from last year and she said that, while she felt certain the extremely cold temperatures so far had contributed greatly to the increase, she felt it was more just the general economic conditions that were applying for a crisis component fee that we haven't seen before," Ms. McCauley said.

Ms. McCauley also stressed that no more applications for the program are being accepted and have not been since January 17th.

Prospective pricing changes Medicare payment system

Medicare patients (those 65 and older or permanently disabled), may have noticed some changes made recently in the way the government determines their medical reimbursement.

Beginning October 1, 1983, the government dramatically changed the way it pays hospitals for services to Medicare patients. Under the new system, known as prospective pricing, each Medicare patient is assigned to one of 468 "diagnosis related groups" (DRGs), based on the nature of the illness.

Each DRG carried a specific rate of payment. If the hospital treats the patient for less, it can keep the excess funds; if treatment costs more, the hospital must absorb the loss. Thus, hospitals have an incentive to keep costs down.

Under the old system, the hospital submitted a bill to the government for the costs of care given to Medicare patients and then were reimbursed for the amount. The government considered "Reasonable." This led to higher costs and the probable bankruptcy of Medicare's fiscal insurance trust fund by the mid-1990's.

At the Rockcastle County Hospital, DRG's went into effect on November 1, 1983, the start of the facility's fiscal year. DRG's apply only to Medicare patients who receive acute care. The Skilled Nursing Facility gives long-term care, and is not under prospective pricing.

Fern Stapleton, acute director of nursing and DRG coordinator, stressed that the new system will not affect the way bills are

paid for the patient. She said, "The only way it will affect patients is when the patient is well enough to be moved home or to a lesser level of care, they will have to go there as quickly as possible."

Mrs. Stapleton went on, "Our hospital's survival depends on being cost-effective without altering our quality of care. The hospital's quality of care will not change because of the DRG's."

Serena Stratton, director of social services, and

discharge planner, said, "The rate paid for the DRG's is not made up by individual hospitals, but by the federal government. Rockcastle County Hospital is required to abide by federal regulations."

"Our four physicians on staff are working with the DRG coordinator and myself. We have made changes as smoothly as possible while taking care of patients the best way we can."

County students are now six days behind schedule

As of Tuesday, Rockcastle County students were faced with six make-up days due to inclement weather which would put school out on Tuesday instead of May 15th as first scheduled, according to Supt. Charles Parsons.

Parsons said Tuesday that students had actually missed 12 days of school (1 because of the excessive heat out on Tuesday and snow) but 5 of the days are "snowbank" days which the school has accumulated by extending the length of the school day by 15 minutes over the entire school year. And, one has been taken out on Tuesday service day which doesn't have to be made up.

However, Mr. Parsons said that the "talk" is now, on the state level, that the school systems will not be allowed to accumulate these five days next year.

doing volunteer work. 4-H work is included as a type of volunteer work which can be deducted since it is a non-profit organization and has IRS tax-deductible status.

The types of expenditures that 4-H leaders and volunteers may wish to deduct are:

- direct gifts of money to 4-H.
- parking and tolls.
- cost of supplies donated in project groups.
- telephone bills.
- entertainment, refreshments or meals given to 4-H'ers.
- costs of meals and lodging, if away overnight.
- automobile related expenses (above per diem allowance).

The types of expenditures that cannot be deducted are:

- value of volunteer's time.
- dependent care expenses.
- own meals (unless away overnight).
- own entertainment.

Items for which 4-H leader or volunteer receives reimbursement for may be deducted only to the extent that actual expenses exceeds the amount of compensation.

Individuals and businesses who donated to the swimming pool last summer should be sure to take advantage of this tax deductible status.

Homemakers Study Ways To Deal With Depression
If someone told you that you don't have to be

depressed, would you believe the what you would think if someone said that you are in control and you can decide whether or not you are going to be depressed?

In some cases of depression, medicine and the expertise of a psychiatrist or other professional are required for a cure; but in most cases, a person can cure himself of depression, according to Robert J. Fetsch, Extension Specialist in Human Development and Family Relations at the University of Kentucky.

Rockcastle County Homemakers are studying the subject of depression during their January meetings.

Most of the depression that we experience is reactive depression. We get depressed in reaction to events such as the loss of a job, loss of a loved one, listening to negative comments of others, or by comparing ourselves unfavorably with others-there's always some one thinner, richer, smarter or more attractive than we are.

If you or someone you know is depressed, some of these signs will be present. However, sometimes these same signs accompany an illness or infection. If you suspect you are suffering from depression, contact a nurse, physician or other health care professional.

If you are experiencing

severe mood swings or are thinking for an extended period of time about committing suicide, or if you are planning ways to commit suicide, you should seek professional help. Physicians, clergymen, marriage and family counselors, and the Comprehensive Care Centers are good sources for professional help.

All of us feel depressed at times. But we do not have to let depression get the best of us. We can learn ways to change our depressed moods-and let them go.

Most of the depression that we experience is reactive depression. We get depressed in reaction to events such as the loss of a job, loss of a loved one, listening to negative comments of others, or by comparing ourselves unfavorably with others-there's always some one thinner, richer, smarter or more attractive than we are.

However, depression is not something that just happens to you one morning totally outside of our control. Depression is primarily an emotion inside us that comes from our negative thinking. Much depression is self-caused. Therefore, many times the cure is self-help.

Fetsch advises us to "see the positive in everything you do and experience-find the good in it. Allow no more negative thinking. If you lose your job, instead of focusing on the negative thoughts of you and your family being penniless, focus on your new opportunity to work at what you really want to do." If someone tells you that you are fat, don't let it depress you; start thinking about your good qualities.

There are many ways to deal with depression. Some

Farm & Home News

Time Determine Quality

For Best Results
Most farmers recognize the need for maintaining proper soil pH through the use of lime. However, as many have discovered, recommended lime applications may not always give predicted results. The problem, as defined by soils specialists at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, is partially due to the difficulty in determining the actual quality of the lime to be used.

The quality of Kentucky limestone varies widely due to its purity and fineness. Under present law in Kentucky, samples from operating quarries are analyzed for purity and fineness. Both can be combined into one value for the purpose of determining the portion of aglime that is effective as a liming material. This is called the neutralizing value and is an estimate of the percentage of aglime that will be available to neutralize acidity over a four-year period.

Kentucky lime users and producers are protected to some degree by the present state regulations which required that aglime be at least 80 percent pure and that at least 90 percent pass a 40-mesh sieve and 35 percent pass a 50-mesh sieve. However, large fluctuations of effective limestone can exist within these

standards, if a limestone met the bare minimum of Kentucky law, the RNV would be 50.

With the use of the results obtained from measuring these standards, a reliable fineness factor (percent of lime available based on fineness) can be determined. The neutralizing value calculated is called the Relative Neutralizing Value (RNV).

At present, lime recommendations made by the UK College of Agriculture are based on the premise that all the lime is two-thirds effective (RNV 66.7 percent). Soils specialists say if the aglime to be spread has an RNV substantially above or below this, then the recommendations should be adjusted.

UK Extension soils specialists also recommend using RNV's to compare lime prices, because limestone from one quarry may cost less per ton than lime from another quarry but provide fewer pounds of effective lime per ton. A cost comparison can be especially important when lime is hauled long distances. Limestone with higher RNV's reduces the cost since less lime is required because more of it is effective, and the hauling cost is reduced since less lime will need to be hauled.

Contact the County Agriculture Extension Agent to obtain a list of the quarries in Kentucky and their RNV's as calculated from samples analyzed by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, Division of Weights and Measures. Each lime quarry also will have information on its samples and RNV's can be calculated using an equation available from county agents.

A publication, "Determining the Quality of Aglime: Relative Neutralizing Value (RNV)," explains the equation as well as the methods for adjusting lime

recommendations and comparing lime prices. This is also available through the Extension office.

One final reminder: Even though you have good quality lime available locally, good results cannot be expected unless you use adequate amounts and apply properly.

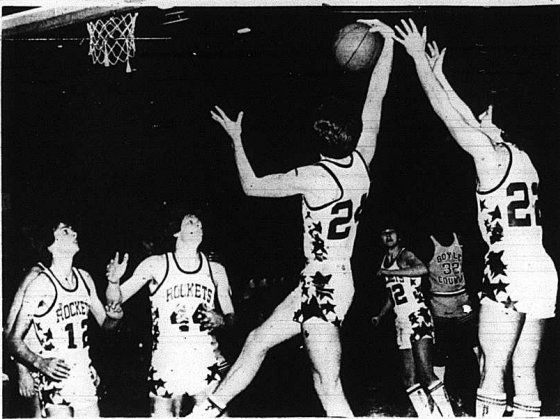

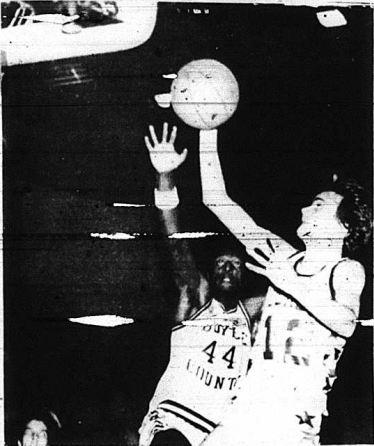

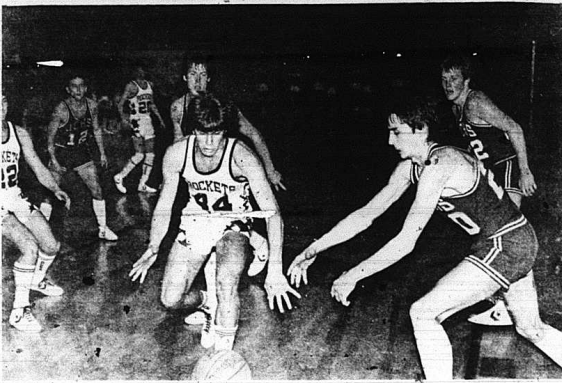
