This has had to be done in order to pay the cost of our water supply. The City of Mt. Vernon made the choice to double the cost of our water supply this past summer. Due to this high increase, the City of Brodhead can no longer meet our expenses on our current income.

ORDINANCE CITY OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY

An ordinance of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, amending provisions of existing laws as to water rates, water connection charges, deposits, billing, collection, penalties, disconnection and reconnection of water service.

The commissioners of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, do ordain as follows:

That Sections 2, 15 and 16 of an ordinance of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, enacted June 7th, 1971 and amendments thereof be amended as follows:

SECTION 2: WATER RATES

Number of Gallons of Water Per Month	Monthly charge to properties within city	Monthly charge to properties outside city
For first 2,000 gals. or less	\$7.80	\$10.40
For next 8,000 gallons	\$2.60/1,000 gals.	\$3.45/1,000 gals.
For next 40,000 gallons	\$2.90/1,000 gals.	\$2.65/1,000 gals.
For next 50,000 gallons	\$1.40 per 1,000 gals.	\$1.85/1,000 gals.
All over 100,000 gals.	\$1.00/1,000 gals.	\$1.35/1,000 gals.

B. Monthly Sewer Rates

The charges for sewer service shall be seventy-five percent (75%) of the monthly water bill as determined in Section 2 A above.

Section 3: Water Connection Charges

Customers shall pay a charge for connecting to the water system, the amount of \$25.00 plus actual expenses for connecting said service.

Section 15: Deposits

Deposit shall be required of all applicants for water service as follows:

3/4 inch meter for property owner	\$25.00
3/4 inch meter for rental property or trailer	50.00
1 inch meter	40.00
1 1/2 inch meter	50.00
2 inch meter	60.00

Section 16: Billing, Collection, Penalties, Disconnection and Reconnection of Water Service

That the rates or charges aforesaid for water service shall be billed monthly on or about the first of each month, and all bills for such service shall be considered due and payable twenty days after rendition. If a bill is not paid as aforesaid within such twenty day period, there shall be imposed a penalty on each bill not so paid, in an amount equal to ten percent (10%) of the charges (other than sales tax) shown on the face amount of said bill not so paid. Also, if a bill is not paid within said twenty day period after said due date the charges shown on such bill shall be deemed delinquent and the Superintendent of the waterworks system, after furnishing 24 hours written notice to the delinquent water user, shall thereupon, if such delinquency continues, turn off the water of such user according to the current practices existing at the time of the turn-off for water delinquents and may further enjoin use of the water facilities of the City by said customer until payment in full is made. Customer or User as used herein shall include all members of said household being served at the time the delinquency occurs. If the deadline date falls on a Sunday or legal holiday, such deadline shall not expire until the next secular day thereafter. If such water service is cut off by the City, reconnection of such service shall not be made until the owner or user pays all charges and penalties owed plus the amount of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) as a disconnection charge.

That all provisions of the Water Rate Ordinance enacted by the Commissioners of the City of Brodhead on December 7, 1970, except to the extent amended herein, are hereby ratified and confirmed; all City Ordinances, Orders, Resolutions, Motions or parts thereof, insofar as same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed; and this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its enactment, approval and publication as provided by law.

Future direction for the elderly

What would be your response if you were told that Americans 65 years of age and older outnumber teenagers for the first time in American history? At the turn of the century, one out of every 10 people was 65 or older. That proportion is now one out of nine. By the year 2020, it is predicted that one out of every five individuals will be over 65 years of age.

One important fact we face is that all of these older people can't retire. Some won't want to retire. That means much of our work force will, of a necessity, be the "older generation" those 55 years of age and up.

The past 24 years, the American Legion has sponsored a National Employ the Older Worker Week (NEOWW) the second full week of March each year that week will be observed March 11 through 17. Over recent years, efforts of the American Legion, with Congressional support, have resulted in expanded employment opportunities for Older Americans.

Another group dedicated to helping promote and enhance opportunities for the over 55 generation is the Green Thumb program. Green Thumb is a nationwide program sponsored by National Farmer's Union under Title V of the Older Americans Act. Since 1965, the program has trained and enrolled for new jobs, improved their old job skills and placed a percentage of them in the private-for-profit workforce.

Green Thumb has 494 enrollees working in 46 rural counties in Kentucky with 63 employed in 11 counties in West Virginia. Throughout the state, they are busily engaged in providing service to their community through assistance to libraries, extension offices, county courthouses, senior centers, day care centers and aid to the elderly and handicapped. Workers include both men and women over 55 retired or disabled living on a minimum income.

Rockcastle County has 9 Green Thumb enrollees working in a variety of positions.

The majority of Green Thumb enrollees do not consider themselves frail or vulnerable and thoroughly enjoy "second career" training.

The American Legion, Congress and Green Thumb have worked diligently to promote the Older Worker. Many more like them could be helped through a greater public awareness and through private enterprise. It's up to the employer to make use of the talents and

ing at each school during the regular season. Under the new plan, the 7th and 8th grades would be divided into two teams thereby giving more boys an opportunity to play.

Coch Appelman's complete plan is as follows:

The proposed plan also calls for all grade teams being required to play outside to man defense during the regular season and in any tournaments and for all boys to be able to complete their senior year of eligibility at the high school.

A written evaluation to the coach on all 8th grade boys to the head basketball coach at the high school at the end of the regular season is also required. It is the requirement for all county coaches to attend 5 coaching meetings.

The junior high schedule would consist of a minimum of 14 games, with each Jr. High playing a round-robin schedule within their district (home and home). The remainder of the schedule would be played with opponents outside the district at the coaches' discretion and principals' approval.

Appelman told the board that he talked with all the grade school coaches and they all had expressed their support of the majority of the program. He also stated that his action on the plan but seemed to express their support of it. Mr. Parsons did say he felt he should be taking action called which would include the principals so the program could be thoroughly discussed.

Appelman said he did not know whether girls coach Preston Parrett would be in favor of using the same program for the girls' teams.

The coach also asked the board to purchase a jump squat machine which is primarily to improve the vertical leap and the cardio-vascular system.

Appelman and his assistants expressed great enthusiasm for the machine which will cost \$950, including shipping costs.

The board is not to take any action on the machine request but Mr. Parsons did agree to talk with the company representative and Appelman said that the board would do "what we can to help out."

and one of the few in the nation.

Pybas explained that the use of polygraph has spread in private businesses because of employee theft and dishonesty. Experts estimate that 60 to 75 percent of the \$4 billion stolen annually from American business and industry is employee-related theft.

Basically, polygraph is used in three types of situations in the private sector. "We test the whole gamut of people," said Pybas. "One type is with defense attorneys who need to verify if their client is telling them the truth or not so they can prepare an accurate defense."

Another situation that uses polygraph is the pre-employment examination to determine if employees are honest before they are hired by businesses. There are also periodic checks of employees to see that they remain honest.

"Polygraph testing is probably the best control in this day and age of keeping honest people honest in ap-

plication to business," said Pybas. "Until I got into polygraph I've thought about things from an employee's standpoint. It was a rude awakening to discover so much employee dishonesty. It's hard for me to accept that so much goes on and that it gives people the benefit of the doubt."

The third type of examination is the specific kind, which is used to determine if specific crimes a person has been suspected of.

To perform a polygraph test, an examiner uses a polygraph instrument. Pybas owns one of the advanced models on the market, which cost about \$3,200. The instrument has the ability to measure certain identifiable physiological reactions such as respiration rate, pulse rate, skin resistance, and galvanic skin response.

"How does the equipment work?" Pybas answered. "The background behind the whole gaggle is that from research and experimentation we know the 'fight or flight' reaction which occurs when we are put into certain situations. Our body has a protective system and that will react with changes in these physiological changes take place automatically. You need to understand how reactions in someone being nervous and in someone lying. Generally speaking, a healthy person who isn't completely worn out will react with changes in recordings, you can determine."

Pybas likes for people to be at ease during a polygraph test. He pointed out that the exams are given only on a volunteer basis, and no one will react with fear from the results of a polygraph test.

He said, "I review the questions I'm going to ask the person with them before I attach them to the instrument. To be hooked up, a person is attached to a pressure cuff, GSR components with fingertip electrodes are put on, and a pneumograph with tubes attached to the upper and lower parts of the chest check respiration. The attachment is completely painless. Pybas usually asks each person being examined 10 questions. The first questions are often unrelated to the issue at hand and serve to relax the person. They can be compared to the last two questions, which deal with the suspected crime. The purpose of the first type of questions is to give the examiner a basis for comparison."

What happens if he gets a negative result? "I'm going to try to get the job done," said Pybas firmly. "If it indicates they're being dishonest then the content them about the stimulus their body has put on the charts."

On question by Mrs. Bullock, Hasty said he bid on the contract because it was his understanding at the time that the county would have a landfill in about 30 days. Hasty said his two original partners in the venture had quit and he was "left holding the bag."

Magistrate Donald Rowe expressed the opinion that "we're talking about two different baggages. His (Hasty) is county and yours is private."

County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper also expressed the opinion that the county has an obligation to help Mr. Hasty since he was, in effect, picking up garbage for the county.

Magistrate Joe Clark seconded Wren's motion to pay the dump fees for another month and Rowe voted yes. The motion carried with Magistrate Alex Albright voting no and Magistrate Tom Denney abstaining.

Shortly after the court decided this matter, Denney brought up a subject which is evidently a sore point with the motion carrier, stalking angrily from the meeting before his conclusion.

Denney told the magistrates that he had requested gravel for the road to the Tom Kirby graveyard over a year ago and hadn't received it yet. Denney strongly pointed out that he had never gotten his share of the use of the county's gravel since another agreement about its use was made by the court just a few months ago. And, Denney said the court had voted to cut out the gravel from the road.

Without waiting to see if his motion about the cemetery road was approved, and it was, Denney stalked from the courtroom saying, "I don't do a (expletive deleted) but I'm going to come here so I'll see you."

Brodhead PTA in process of fingerprinting children

The Brodhead PTA has begun their student fingerprinting project, a project that will take a little more work and time than most projects they have undertaken but they feel it's definitely worth the extra effort.

The Kentucky Task Force on Exploited and Missing Children has organized a state-wide effort to protect our children's safety through fingerprinting. It was made available to Brodhead PTA with the help of our county organizers, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Lambert.

Each year, hundreds of thousands of innocent children leave their home because they feel threatened or unloved. Most return home within 48 hours. But, many never return. They are forced to survive on the streets, often through drugs, prostitution or pornography - almost always at the encouragement of an adult who profits from criminally missing the runaway child.

Abducted children are even more vulnerable. Frightened and helpless, they can offer little resistance to an adult who abuses the child sexually and then commits murder. A reported 50,000 children a year simply disappear from their home. A child who is

young as 8 or 9 can be abducted by pimp, beaten, addicted to drugs and put on the streets as a prostitute. We feel an obligation to take precautionary actions.

This program was intended to be voluntary. Each parent was given the right to object if they did not wish to have their child fingerprinted. A letter of full explanation was sent home with each child to be returned only if the child were not to be printed. The response was terrific, very few papers were returned. It must be understood that one and only one copy of your child's prints will be taken.

The single copy will be placed in an envelope and sent home to the parents to be put in a very safe place. No one else will have a copy of your child's prints. Therefore, extra effort to care for these prints are important.

The Kentucky Task Force and the PTA would like to offer other suggestions to protect your child:

1. Watch your children closely at all times. Don't leave them alone in the car when you are shopping or running errands, alone in the yard or unattended in a store or other public place. Know where your children are at all times.

2. Understand that placing your child's name on posters, photos, books, clothes or bicycle puts a potential abductor on a first-name basis with your child.

3. Have your child fingerprinted and keep the prints at home in a safe place along with a recent picture of your child. If your child ever turns up missing, this may be your best best to locate your child.

4. Encourage your neighbors to participate in a neighborhood self-help program-for example, by establishing a safe home where kids can go for help.

5. Encourage your school principal to notify immediately parents whose children don't report to school. If the principal claims that this is too much of a burden, offer to form a volunteer group to help notify parents.

6. As a parent, teach your child how to react in case of an attempt to abduct him (her). The child should respond as loudly as possible for help and kick and fight back as hard as possible to create as much disturbance as possible to be noticed and possibly rescued.

If your child is ever missing, call your local police department and tell them that your child had been fingerprinted. It may be helpful to them in locating your child. We share the blame for the safety of your child.

A state highway official who asked not to be identified said Metts' claims are "inaccurate."

"There's no way she's

(Collins) got as much money as he had," the official said. He said that a "slight increase" the state got from the federal gas tax was offset by a decrease in state coal severance tax revenues, and added the weight-distance tax didn't raise as much money as was expected.

Metts assured a Somerset assessor in October 1981 that \$20 million was set aside to improve the narrow, winding Somerset-Mt. Vernon connector road and

the money would "stay there to fund the project" as long as he stayed in office.

Metts said the Commonwealth Journal Friday that the money did indeed stay in the bank to fund the project.

Asked if the money was still available for the project when he left office in January, Metts said it "absolutely was."

Present administration officials have said they know nothing about the \$20.2 million allegedly set aside to improve KY 461 and have also said the administration of Gov. Martha Layne Collins doesn't have more roadwork money than its predecessor.

School board gives Parsons contract for four more years

The major item of Monday night's meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education was the renewal of Supt. Charles B. Parsons' contract for four more years, effective July 1, 1984.

At the bottom of the agenda and generated very little discussion by board members. Board member Willie Taylor made the first comment by saying "I think you are doing a good job and we should give you another 4 year contract."

Mr. Parsons expressed his appreciation for this comment and then left the room while the board took action.

Mr. Taylor put his sentiments into the form of a motion which was seconded by Kenneth Adams and it passed unanimously.

Mr. Parsons will receive a 5% increase under the new contract which put his year-end salary at \$89,000.

On his return to the board room, Mr. Parsons expressed his appreciation to the board and said, "I will do everything in my power to make the improvements we feel are necessary."

He said that he then discussed with the board the recent visit to the school system by state department officials, including a facilities survey team.

Parsons said the team would come down and go over the final report with him. He then asked the board to discuss the report with the board, possibly in April.

Parsons did tell the board that he was "pretty pleased" over all with the preliminary report as were the principals and teachers.

The biggest problem, Parsons seemed to be teachers teaching out of their field.

He said that district-wide, the system's pupil-teacher ratio was very good in the K-3 grades, averaging about 1 to 25.3 or 4, barely over the 1-25 approved level.

He also reported that the facilities survey team had moved away from the middle school concept and agreed to stay with the 8-4 plan.

The facilities survey, Parsons said, would mainly point up some sub-standard classrooms at Livingston

School, but, he said, these would be taken care of by the new addition being built.

And, he said, the facilities survey team again noted that Mt. Vernon school should be given priority for capital outlay funds for new construction either in phases or a complete new building.

Coach Mike Appleman was before the board to present them with his evaluation of the primary grades and junior high basketball program.

Appleman, accompanied to the meeting by his assistant coaches, Ryan Riddle and David Riddle, told the board that when he was hired, he was asked to take the first year and evaluate the basketball program.

Appleman said he had

looked at the elementary and junior high basketball programs extensively and that he didn't "think what is being done is good."

Appleman presented the board with a two-page proposal that would do away with the competition schedule for the 5th and 6th grade teams, substituting an instruction league for these grades which would meet every Saturday morning.

EMT Course

Are you interested in becoming an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)? The Bureau of Vocational Education, through Region 14 Vocational educational and in cooperation with the Kentucky Department of Human Resources, is planning to conduct basic courses for training Emergency Medical Technicians.

The basic EMT classes are planned to start March 15, 1984, and will be held in Somerset. The specific location will be given at a later date. The classes usually meet on Monday and Thursday nights for five hours a night, and will run for approximately three months.

Enrollment in the class is limited to 30 persons. Successful completion of these program leads to certification as an EMT/A or EMT by the Department of Human Resources, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Applications for the EMT class are available in the public relations department at the Rockcastle County Hospital, and must be sent to the Region 14 office by no later than March 13, 1984.

Landfill fee payment sparks Fiscal Court controversy Tuesday

A controversy developed at Tuesday's meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court after Clarence "Jibb" Hasty filed the court to assist him financially with the expense of hauling garbage from the county to the landfill at Lily.

The court has been paying for a load, at \$15 a load, to be dumped at the Lily landfill since there is no landfill available in the county.

However, at Tuesday's meeting, Mrs. Betty Sue Bullen, who, along with her husband, William K. Bullen, owns and operates a private garbage collection service in the county, asked the court to pay them an equal

amount for their extra expense involved in hauling garbage out of the county. "I'm just asking for that's all," Bullen told the court. "The contract for the garbage franchise was not voted on the way it was advertised."

Mrs. Bullen said she let that go. But if the county is able to pay for Mr. Hasty's dumping fee, you (the county) should pay my dumping fee."

Hasty responded that "it's up to the court, but mine is household and yours is commercial." And, Hasty pointed out that when Mr. and Mrs. Bullen had the garbage franchise, the county would use their

backhoe and trucks to clean up the dump sites and "that wasn't in the contract."

Magistrate Bill Wren said he would pay the dumping fee another month for Hasty and told the court, "surely they (Mr. and Mrs. Bullen) are getting enough out of theirs to pay theirs (since) they are charging the people."

However, Mrs. Bullen pointed out that Mr. Hasty was "getting enough money out of the county and should be able to pay his (fee) too."

A second to Wren's motion was quiet a while in coming and, during that time, Hasty told the court, (Cont. to 18)

Hwy. 461 improvements in jeopardy

The latest word from state Transportation Cabinet officials on the fate of improvements to KY 461 is that the improvements are still being considered, although they stressed that does not mean the project will be funded.

According to a Tuesday, March 6 story in the Commonwealth Journal, officials also once again claimed no knowledge of the whereabouts or existence of \$20.2 million allegedly set aside for the project by former Transportation Secretary Frank Metts, saying that the state road program has

a "serious money problem." However, according to an earlier story in the Commonwealth Journal, a \$2.6 million contract was awarded to K & K Construction of London on Nov. 4 to build the first section of the project, a 2.3 mile section of road from Wadd in Rockcastle County to U.S. 150.

D.J. Garland, 8th District Highway Engineer, said those improvements will continue because a work order was issued before the moratorium. The proposed improvements to KY 39 won't be delayed for the same reason.

Transportation Cabinet Division of Budget Director Bob Henson said this morning that program specialists with the state highway department are currently doing a proposed two-year construction schedule on the project, as well as a proposed four-year additional preconstruction schedule.

"The project is still being considered," Henson said.

However, he added, that does not mean it will be funded. "That will be up to the Legislature," Henson said.

RCHS band director has unusual sideline

The story goes that when George Washington's father asked him who killed that beautiful little cherry tree in their garden, George answered, "I can't tell a lie I did it with my hatchet."

Unfortunately, not everyone is as honest as George Washington. But the 20th century has come up with an almost infallible instrument that is used to measure a person's honesty, or dishonesty, as the case may be.

It's called polygraph testing, or in simpler terms, lie detecting. And it's something that Bob Pybas of Mt. Vernon does in his spare time. Most people know Pybas as the band director for the county schools, not as a part-time polygraphist.

Pybas prefers to call the process "truth verifying" instead of "lie detecting," and he wants to dispel the misconception that people have about polygraph testing. "Hopefully, people will become more knowledgeable about what polygraph is,"

said Pybas. "It's not a mysterious black box that's going to do them wrong or that might say they're dishonest when they're honest. You see grown men weep down and cry because of what they've been told about polygraph tests."

And Pybas doesn't like to see that happen.

In fact, most of the satisfaction he gets from being a polygraphist is clearing the names of people who have been wrongfully accused.

Pybas grew up in Trenton, Tenn., which is located near Memphis. After teaching for five years in Tennessee he came to Kentucky in search of a better salary and eventually ended up in the Rockcastle County school system. His wife, Carol, teaches at Roundstone and they have two children, Natalie, 15, and Robert Boone, 13.

Pybas became interested in polygraph testing about 10 years ago when he was looking for something to do for extra income. He explained, "My dad had been connected with law enforcement

for several years, as the sheriff in the county where I was raised and as a special investigator for the district attorney in Tennessee. He and I were talking one day about polygraph examiners, who at that time were uncommon in the private field. The Tennessee Bureau of Investigation examiners were quitting government work to go into the private sector. The knowledge that demand caused me to check into the possibilities of going to school myself.

During the summer of 1973 Pybas enrolled in an accredited polygraph school in Atlanta, and got his diploma two months later. The screening for admission into polygraph school is very intense, and out of the 35 to 45 people who applied at the same time he did, only 16 were accepted. To get into the school you must have a college degree or 10 years of investigative training and your background is checked thoroughly.

After completing polygraph school he did two years of free apprenticeship

before getting his license from the state of Kentucky. He noted, "Surprisingly, Kentucky has the oldest polygraph licensing laws in the United States. Several states, Ohio being one, don't have licensing laws."

His polygraph license has to be renewed every year.

"Polygraph first began in the late 1920's as an experiment. Then military investigative agencies, such as the CIA and FBI, began to use it. It spread into the larger police departments and then about 10 years ago into the private sector."

Since getting his license Pybas has spent about two weekends a month and much of his summers doing polygraph testing. He often travels to different parts of Kentucky after getting an assignment from the firm he works for in Lexington, Polygraph Associates, Inc.

The president and owner of Polygraph Associates is Agnes Benfield, who went to polygraph school with Pybas and was the first female examiner in Kentucky.

Judge Jasper is an honorable man and we honestly feel no subterfuge was intended; however, we do feel it would be a better policy to avoid an occurrence of this in the future and to also be sure all magistrates are also notified of any meetings. pma

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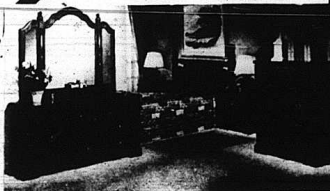
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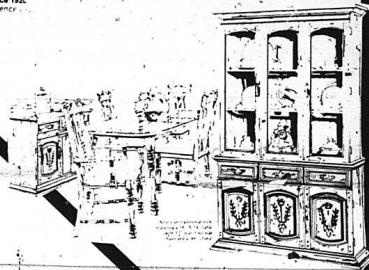

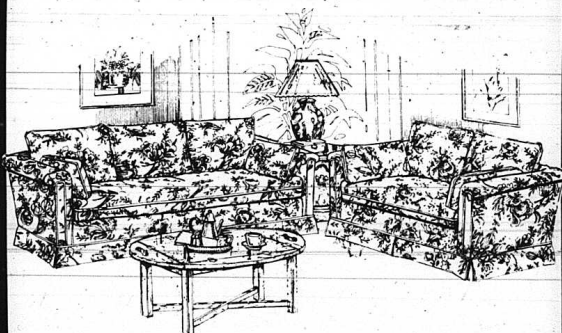

I watched Glenn and observed the kindness in his voice as he dealt with a youth who came to the door and interrupted our conversation. "I've brought you a Valentine, Mr. VanWinkle, the boy said in a shy voice. Glenn's attention and consideration of the student was as courteous as he talked to me.

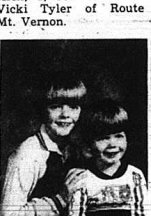
