If grant is approved

Council plans to hold organized summer activities at playground

If all goes according to plan, an organized summer of activities will be sponsored by the Mt. Vernon City Council at Lake Linville, according to Mt. Vernon Mayor David Mullins.

Mullins said during the council's regular monthly meeting Monday night that the city had applied for a \$50,000 grant from the federal government which would allow them to put lights up at the two ball fields at the lake.

"If we get that grant for those lights and get the drain tile laid in the ball fields on time, we will hire a director and hold organized activities down there," Mullins said. "If not, we will have the summer program at the Mt. Vernon Grade School," he added.

David Stipes, Soil Conservationist for Rockcastle County, met with the council to update them on his efforts to get the drain tiles installed in the ball fields at the lake.

"The project should be completed by the last of May," Stipes said. "We are getting ready to publish the bid notices for the items we need and then we can get on with the project."

Stipes told the council that the tiles would be laid 50 feet apart and that approximately 6300 feet would be needed. "The project will be paid for 70% federal money and 30% local money," Stipes said. He went on to say that his of-

ice would supply the seed, fertilizer, straw and a net to cover the fields and the city would be responsible for seeing that it got put on the fields. Stipes also said the city would have to spend from \$1700 to \$2000 for a tile machine to put the tile in but that money would be all of the actual cash outlay the city would have to spend on the project. "We are getting our bid notices ready to publish and then the bidders' will have twenty days to submit their bids," Stipes said. "I hope we can buy this fertilizer, seed and straw locally," he said.

Several residents of the

Sand Springs area were present Monday night to discuss the possibility of getting water lines run to their property. Binbo Evans and Rufus Wheat were among two of the people who told the council that there were about 25 people willing to pay for the line.

Mt. Vernon Water Superintendent Matt Powell told the council that he estimated that it would take approximately \$11,000 to run the line from Julian Bullock's residence on the Sand Springs Road to Cave Ridge and that was if they did not hit any rock.

Education Committee votes to change set-up of English classes

Don Jones conducted his first Excellence in Education meeting Tuesday night as Coordinating Committee Chairman and, as one of the first items of business, called for discussion of questions pertaining to the school system which had been given to the Coordinating Committee.

From that drew the most discussion concerned the present practice of promoting freshmen from the reading class (a class required for freshmen scoring below the 6th grade level in reading at the end of their 8th grade) onto English II, bypassing English I entirely.

Jones expressed his own opinion that it seemed that these students were missing a step in the English department entirely by skipping reading on to English II, III and IV. High school principal Cleston Saylor defended the practice on the grounds that the grammar taught in all four years of English at high school is basically the same. He also said that the free textbook program was one reason for this practice since any other way would cause an overload of students in English I, II and III.

However, Mrs. Don Jones pointed out, "If they (students) who have had reading their freshman year can't read, what's the point in taking British

This sentiment drew strong support from most parents and teachers present and brought on a suggestion by Shirley Long, a teacher in the Lincoln County school system and a parent of children at Rockcastle County High School, who suggested that more diversity in classes should be made available to RCHS students, such as the offering of advanced classes for students able to master them.

And, Director of Transportation Elige Towery, pointed out the other side of this comment when he asked, "Are you going to keep them (reading students) grouped all the way through high school? Because there's no point in putting them in classes they can't achieve in if they are still having trouble with basic reading."

After quite a lengthy discussion, Jones suggested a committee be appointed to discuss whether or not to recommend changing the practice but Saylor interposed with the suggestion that the group present be polled as to their opinion.

Mr. Jones concurred and put the question to the group in the form of "those of you favoring freshmen from Reading to English II, raise your hand." The response was nil and, when asked for a vote in favor of promoting freshmen from Reading to English I and following up with English II and then English III, their senior year, the vote in favor was practically unanimous.

Another question discussed by the group was the selection of a favorite teacher in each school by students, under the direction of school board members, if they (board members) concur with an earlier recommendation that they make regular visits to county schools to observe.

This question also drew considerable discussion

among the group as several teachers and administrators questioned how the project could be carried out to keep the process from becoming a popularity contest.

Supt. Charles Parsons told the group about the Kentucky Outstanding Teacher Award recently established by the state Dept. of Education.

The criteria for teacher nominations include:

- 1) Concern for and interest in students.
- 2) Ability to teach and communicate with students.
- 3) Philosophy of teaching.
- 4) Knowledge of subject taught.
- 5) Professional image as projected to school and community.
- 6) Professional involvement and growth.

Under this program, one teacher would be selected from each school in the county and would then be entered in state-wide competition.

Sheriff's Dept. requesting aid to purchase radios

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Dept. is in the process of purchasing a county communication's radio for each state trooper in the county and are asking for donations from citizens to help defray their cost.

In support of this request, Sheriff William Taylor recently released the following statement:

"In the past, the city police in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston and the Sheriff's Dept. have had no contact with the State Trooper on duty.

Therefore, when they need assistance from them or a "back-up" in an emergency, they have to radio the county jailer. He then has to call London from where the trooper is dispatched to the scene.

With a county radio in their car, the state officer could immediately be called upon for help by the city

police or sheriff's department. This would also be the case if the situation were reversed and the trooper were in danger and needed help.

These radios are needed and will help stop more crimes and may save the life of one of our law enforcement officers or that of a citizen.

We have asked the fiscal court to help us pay for these radios but they refused on the basis that they have no money. We are, therefore, forced to ask the citizens of Rockcastle County to help us by giving donations. Any help we receive will be greatly appreciated.

These donations will be accepted at the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office from 9 a.m. to noon, Monday through Saturday and from 1 to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday."

Members of the First Church of Jesus Christ at Sand Springs may not be as comfortable attending church services as they have been in the past.

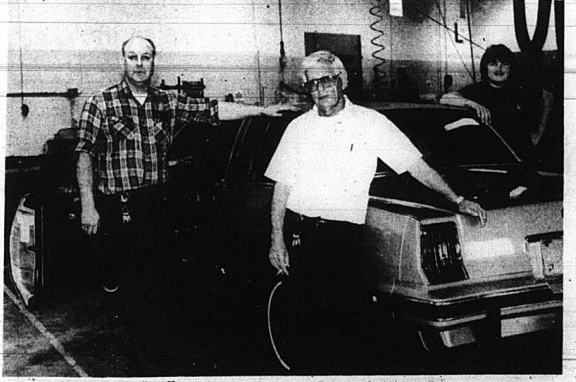

Economically speaking, snacking can be expensive.

A National Food Consumption Survey showed that 24 percent of our food money is spent away from home, part of this money is spent on snacks.

But are all snacks as unhealthy as we are sometimes led to believe? Actually, snacks or small meals, when combined with breakfast, lunch and dinner can be a healthy way of fulfilling daily food requirements. But, remember, it's your total food intake that's important.

A nutrition snack is one that contains more than just empty calories; that is, it provides some of the nutrients needed daily, such as protein, vitamin and minerals as well as energy or calories. Good snacks come from the four basic food groups:

Vegetable and fruit; bread and cereal; milk and cheese; meat, poultry, fish

and beans.

This does not mean you should never have a soft drink or potato chip or that you should always pass up sweet desserts. However, it is important to remember that foods which contain large quantities of sugar or fat fall into the fifth or "other" food group, which supplies little more than calories.

Snacks to Prepare

Fruit juices - Grapefruit and orange juice are good choices because of their high vitamin C content. Tomato juice is also fairly high in vitamin C. Some juices, such as grape and apple, have little natural vitamin content and should be enriched. Aides, drinks and punches contain large amounts of sugar and/or

water and have less nutritional value.

Mix 1 part juice (orange, grapefruit, etc.) with 1 part soda water or ginger ale. (Save calories with soda water). Serve over ice.

Dried fruits, such as raisins, prunes and apricots are high in iron but also high in calories.

Crunchy Bananas

4 ripe bananas
1 cup orange juice
1 cup wheat germ or chopped nuts

Roll bananas into 1-inch pieces and dip in orange juice. Roll in wheat germ or nuts and serve on toothpicks.

Try whole-wheat snack crackers with cheese or a nutritious dip.

Popcorn isn't high in a lot of nutrients but is low in calories - about 40 calo-

ries per cup popped in a small amount of oil. Do not add butter or salt if you need to limit fat and sodium.

For children, cut a circle out of a slice of whole wheat bread. Spread with peanut butter and sprinkle with sesame seeds. Make a smiley face by forming eyes and mouth with raisins.

Graham crackers are tasty as well as full of fiber and B vitamins. Try them plain or spread with peanut butter or cream cheese. Or, layer graham crackers and applesauce. On top of the third cracker, spread some whipped topping. Refrigerate for 20 minutes.

Yogurt alone or with additions is a filling snack. For lowest calorie and fat content, use plain, low-fat yogurt and add your own ingredients, such as fresh fruit slices.

Kids love carrot-shaped cheese. Simply soften 10 ounces Cheddar cheese. Form cheese into small balls. Shape miniature carrots and make tops with parsley.

Ice cream is one of America's most popular foods, but it's high in calories. Ice milk is a little lower in fat and calories. Try vanilla topped with crunchy cereal.

Cheesy dips are great for snacks if they are made of nutritious ingredients and served with the right foods.

Cottage Cheese-Herb Dip
1 cup low-fat cottage cheese
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons low-fat milk
1/2 teaspoon farragon leaves
2 tablespoons chopped green onion
1/4 cup chopped parsley
dash pepper

Mix all ingredients in a blender until smooth and creamy. Serve with raw vegetables. Serves 8 to 10. Note: This dip is high in protein and calcium while lower than most in fat and calories.

Peanut butter is a substitute for meat and it costs less. Read labels to find a brand with a low sugar and fat content or make your own by grinding peanuts. Spread celery ribs with peanut butter and dot with raisins.

Peanut Butter Balls

1/2 cup peanut butter
1/4 cup nonfat, dry milk
1 teaspoon honey
finely chopped nuts.

Combine peanut butter, milk and honey. Mix until smooth. Form mixture into small balls. Roll balls in nuts. Eat immediately or refrigerate.

MARCH National Nutrition Month

Nearly everyone eats between meals at one time or another. A recent survey on the eating behavior of over 2,000 parents, students ages 9 to 18 and nutrition educators showed that snacking is a common practice for all groups. The types of snacks those surveyed chose were sweets, followed by raw fruits and vegetables and chips and snack crackers.

Other studies show that most of us eat or drink something at least six times a day and that some people eat up to 20 times a day.

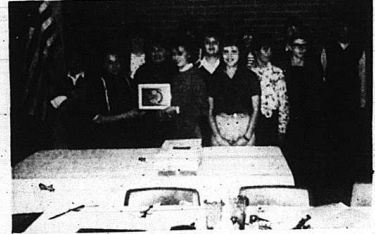

State Legislature

Kentucky's Constitution requires the state legislature to convene for sixty days every two years.

The sixty days are legislative days, meaning days which the House and Senate are in session.

At the time of this writing, March the 9th, there are seventeen legislative days remaining for the 1984 session of Kentucky's General Assembly.

The House of Representatives has seen 1,021 bills and 115 resolutions introduced and the Senate has introduced 417 bills and 65 resolutions.

By most accounts the 1,021 bills introduced in the House of Representatives is the most ever introduced in a single session of the state legislature.

The House of Representatives has passed 181 bills and resolutions, the Senate has passed 153 and 132 have been passed by both Houses. And, of that number the governor has signed 56 bills into law.

Although the 1984 session has been very busy, with only seventeen days to go, there are many very important issues still to be addressed by the legislature.

For example, the state budget has yet to be voted on by either house. Also, still to be addressed are several education reform bills and the governor's ever changing revenue proposals.

Obviously, the pace of the next seventeen days will be hectic and the legislature must take actions that will serve the best interests of the people of Kentucky.

Clontz told the group that they would have to get signed contracts stating that the law would pay for the line and those that didn't want to pay would have to sign an easement so that the lines could be laid through their property.

Clontz also said that once the line was laid by the city through a resident's property, the owner would have to allow these people to hook up to the line at a later date, if they so desired.

Evans told the council that he did not want this to happen. He said that he did not want a few people to bear the cost of laying the line and other people waiting until the line was paid for and then deciding to hook-up.

Clontz said the only way this could be avoided would be to form an association in that area and collect their own bills. However, the members want to do this and decided to discuss the matter further and make a decision at a later date. If twenty-five people would agree to the project, it would still cost each individual about \$625 to get hooked-up.

In other business, the council voted to buy three new radios and three new chargers for the police department at a cost of over \$1,400. The department had requested five new radios but the council decided that three would be enough.

Police Chief Ronnie Hurd told the council that juveniles had been swinging on the hand rails on the sidewalks on West Main Street and they had almost completely been torn down.

The council advised Superintendent Powell to replace the rails with bigger ones that would not bend as easily.

Councilman Pete Hurd made a motion that Lake Linville boat dock operator Ed Jackson be required to build a flue at the dock building or quit using his stove.

The general consensus of the council was that Jackson was creating a fire hazard by having his stove pipe running out of the building.

Hurd's motion carried unanimously.

TO THE CITIZENS OF BRODHEAD

The March 8, 1984 edition of the Mt. Vernon Signal carried an ordinance advertisement relative to an increase in your water rates.

In the introductory paragraph, the reason was stated for increasing your rates "Because the City of Mt. Vernon has doubled the cost of the City of Brodhead's water supply."

What the ordinance failed to mention was that (1) The City of Mt. Vernon sells the water at 84¢ per 1,000 gallons. Figures we find among surrounding water suppliers is \$1.05 per 1,000 gallons and (2) The proposed minimum bill is \$7.80 for 2,000 gallons. The rest for that 2,000 gallons is \$1.00, a 364% mark-up.

While we are in no position to question the rates proposed by your City Council, we do feel that the introductory paragraph in the ordinance might leave the wrong impression, since all details were not clearly presented.

The Mt. Vernon City Council has worked diligently to keep costs down, and we will continue to do so in cooperation in the interest of continued growth and development. This is impossible when divisiveness is fed or encouraged.

Medicare general enrollment

Most people 65 and over have come to recognize the importance of Medicare coverage and have signed up for both parts of the program, hospital insurance and medical insurance—about nine out of ten people 65 and over. However, there are still some who have yet to sign up for medical insurance, which covers doctor bills and other medical bills not covered under hospital insurance.

People who failed to sign up for Medicare's medical insurance when they had an opportunity to do so, or who dropped out, re-enroll through the end of March. Coverage will be effective July 1, 1984.

There are a number of reasons a person may not sign up for coverage under medical insurance, which unfilled the payroll tax-financial hospital insurance.

requires the payment of a monthly premium. Some people may feel they can't afford the basic monthly premium, currently \$14.60. Others may not feel they need it. Some people drop the coverage for one reason or another.

In addition to doctors' services, medical insurance covers outpatient hospital care, outpatient physical therapy and speech pathology services, home health care and many other health services and supplies not covered by hospital insurance.

Some 28.2 million persons are currently covered under medical insurance, including people who have been receiving Social Security disability benefits for 2 years or more, and those with permanent kidney failure. Contrary to popular perception, 25 percent of the cost of the program is financed through the monthly premiums; the rest comes from Federal general revenues.

This is one reason why it would be difficult for the average person to match the coverage from private sources for the same cost.

Another good reason people should sign up for Medicare's medical insurance when they are first eligible is that it costs more later—10 percent for each year they could have had medical insurance but did not enroll.

People 65 and over who are not entitled to Social Security or railroad retirement benefits can get Medicare hospital insurance by enrolling and paying a monthly premium of \$155. People who buy hospital insurance must also sign up for medical insurance and pay the monthly premium.

Deer, Small Game Seasons Set

The state Fish and Wildlife Commission yesterday approved deer and small game regulations for 1984 which are very similar to those of recent past years.

The statewide gun deer season will open the first Saturday in November (Nov. 3) and will run for three, five or 10 consecutive days, depending upon the hunting zone. The deer bow hunting season opens Oct. 1, runs through Nov. 1, reopens Nov. 14 and continues thru December 31. Crossbows may be used only during the November 17 thru November 26 portion of the archery season.

Squirrel season will open the traditional third Saturday in August (August 18), while quail, rabbit and

group seasons are set to begin on the equally traditional third Thursday of November (Nov. 15).

Squirrel season will continue through October 31 then reopen November 15 and continue through December 31. Rabbit season will run through January 31; quail season through February 10 and grouse season through February 28.

Small game and deer bag limits remain unchanged from last year, but another deer hunting zone was added, bringing the total number of zones to seven.

In zone one, gun hunters may take antlered or antlerless deer for the entire 10-day gun season, zone two hunters are limited to antlered deer for eight of the 10 days, while those hunting in zone three may take antlered or antlerless deer for the entire day of the season.

In zone four, hunters are limited to bucks only for all 10 days, while those hunting in zones five and six (which includes Rockcastle County) are limited to bucks only.

Zone seven, which includes Knott, Knox, Magoffin, Letcher, Perry and Floyd (except the Dewey Lake wildlife area) counties, is closed to all deer hunting.

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
