April 15 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for corn, grain sorghum and tobacco in Rockcastle County, according to Richard Derringer, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildfire, earthquake, or fire.

"Three coverage levels (50, 65 or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Derringer.

"To assist producers," the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation will cost-share up to 30 percent of the cost of carrying insurance. For more information about the program, producers should contact an authorized crop

insurance agent," says Derringer.

To select an agent, producers should check the list of agents available at their county should be submitted to the sales agent no later than April 15.

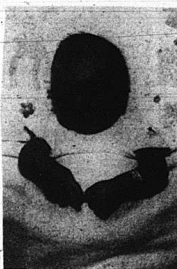

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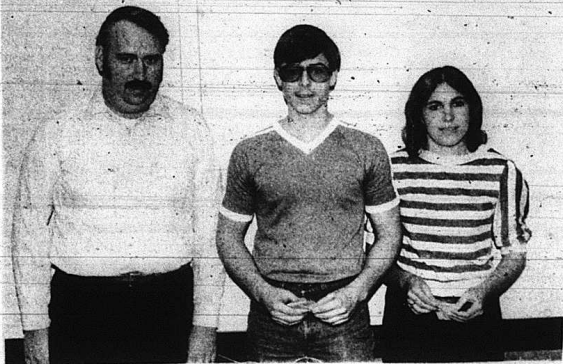

burst and let blood pass out with the urine.

The doctors aren't sure how long Bussell has had the disease, but by the damage to his kidneys, they think it must have been quite awhile.

As time passed, Bussell's urine function got less and less. He became tired and nauseous and began passing some blood in his urine. Although the disease was slowed down with medication, it quickly picked up again.

"At first, in the hospital, the nephrologists said there was no cure and I would have to go on dialysis and eventually get a kidney transplant. They didn't know exactly when it would be — next year, two years, five years."

He added, "It was a let down because I knew what dialysis was and that I'd have to live off a kidney machine. I knew it was going to be a different life-style. At first I was down and out, but I knew it could

have been worse. We had a man here in Brodhead who died of cancer at the same time. So it wasn't like not being here at all."

Nancy Bussell explained how she was feeling at that time. "The worst thing of it was that Derrick was due to be born the 15th of April, the day Jim came home from the hospital after finding out what was wrong with him. I was in Richmond and I called Jim at the hospital in Lexington to tell him it was a boy and that he got here."

"That was rough!" When Bussell found he was to have a transplant, every member of his immediate family went to the University of Kentucky Medical Center to see who would be the best donor. Each one had a tissue type done and his sisters, Mary Ann and Teresa, were both perfect matches. But Miss Bussell has hypertension problems, so Mrs. Childress got the job.

Mrs. Childress said, "I was glad. It was a special feeling to know I would be able to help in that way. I

kind of had the feeling all along it was going to be me."

"Mrs. Bussell interjected, "Mary Ann's always been that way about Jim. 'They look alike, you know.'"

Mrs. Childress continued, "Everybody has always been sick. He was born the 15th of April, the day Jim came home from the hospital after finding out what was wrong with him. I was in Richmond and I called Jim at the hospital in Lexington to tell him it was a boy and that he got here."

"That was rough!" When Bussell found he was to have a transplant, every member of his immediate family went to the University of Kentucky Medical Center to see who would be the best donor. Each one had a tissue type done and his sisters, Mary Ann and Teresa, were both perfect matches. But Miss Bussell has hypertension problems, so Mrs. Childress got the job.

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Bussell was fortunate. He had to live to experience the dreaded dialysis once two days before his surgery on Feb. 15, 1984, at the U.K. Medical Center.

When the time came for the transplant to be performed, Bussell and his sister were placed in adjoining operating rooms. One surgical team removed Mrs. Childress' kidney and then handed it to another surgical team which placed it in Bussell's groin area without removing his two damaged kidneys.

"I said they left his original kidneys because it takes longer to recuperate if they're taken out. Their only purpose now is for hormone secretion. Although Bussell's surgery took longer than his sister's, she is more sure than he because the doctor had to permanently remove one of her lower ribs to safely take out the kidney."

Mrs. Childress noted that her remaining kidney will grow a certain amount to compensate for the loss of the other one.

She was in the hospital for eight days during the surgery, and Bussell was released 17 days after the transplant. He thinks he broke a record at the medical center. The projected time to stay in a transplant is 30 days. They had let some people go home at 21 days, but never at 17 days.

Doctors warn patients to expect some type of rejection within a 30-day period after a transplant. The symptoms of rejection are pain in the donated kidney, increase in body weight and blood pressure.

and decrease in urine output. "So far, I haven't noticed any type of rejection, slight or severe," said Bussell. "I've had no problem at all and the doctors have really been pleased." He will continue to have check-ups on a regular basis.

Because his job as a supervisor involves no lifting, Bussell was able to start back at his job for three days a week the third week after his surgery. Mrs. Childress' job as a nurse aide at Sowder Nursing Home in Brodhead does include lifting, so she won't get back to work for three months.

How has the experience affected them emotionally? "I've never been real religious," Bussell said, "but it made me think of dying and made me appreciate things more. As for Mary Ann, there's no way I'll

ever be able to pay her back. I'll live 90% of a normal life and being able to get back into a normal life-style is something that's hard to put a value on."

And "Mary Ann?" "I prayed a lot," she said. "We're real fortunate I was able to be a donor. I feel like our prayers were answered."

I asked Mrs. Bussell what she thought about all of it. She smiled and said, "I didn't have that much to do with it. I just sat back and watched and had the baby."

Bussell added that his whole family now realizes how important it is to donate organs upon one's death. "I think everyone in our family has put out their drivers license that we'll donate our organs." He laughed. "I'll be sending kidney foundation Christmas cards."

Although kidney transplants are a common thing now, the Bussells remember someone at the medical center saying that the oldest working transplant is only 17 years old. Bussell recently reading an article that said for every 50,000 kidney transplants needed each year in the United States, there are only 25,000 donors.

He has donated blood for research on IGA nephritis to U.K., which is the regional transplant center for several surrounding states, to the University of Alabama. Although there's a possibility of the disease going into his new kidney, doctors don't look for it since it spreads so slowly.

It was obvious from the potted plants in the Bussells' living room that they hadn't been forgotten during their experience. The family is amazed at the calls, cards, plants, visits and prayers that have been given in behalf of Bussell and Mrs. Childress.

Their mother, Mary Bussell, has her own point of view. Speaking of his recovery she said, "I think

it's great. It took the Lord and the doctors, and it's a great relief to know he feels so much better. As for the surgery, it was a nightmare having two in there."

Mary Bussell added happily, "They ate dinner here yesterday, and they both looked great — they just lit up to me."

"When Mary Ann sees Jim she'll ask, 'How are you feeling, Jim?' and he'll say, 'Fine.' And then he'll ask, 'How are you feeling, Mary Ann?' And she'll say, 'Just great!'"

Holley pleads guilty to lesser charges

Denver Earl Holley has pleaded guilty to three lesser charges in connection with an automobile accident on Interstate 75 last May, pleaded guilty to three lesser charges of second degree manslaughter Tuesday morning.

The guilty plea came on the day that Holley's trial was scheduled to begin in Pulaski Circuit Court. Holley's attorney, Warren Scoville of London, and Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham negotiated Holley's sentence for more than a week before coming to an agreement.

Holley, 37, who was out of jail on bond on another charge when he hit a Rockcastle County family head-on on I-75, agreed to a sentence of 31 years. He not only pleaded guilty to the three manslaughter charges, but also pleaded guilty to first degree assault and theft by unlawful taking over \$100 and to five misdemeanor charges: fourth degree assault on an arresting officer, driving while intoxicated, operating a motor vehicle without a license, escaping from custody and public intoxication.

Sentencing will be April 27th in Rockcastle Circuit Court by Circuit Judge Dan Venters. Until then, Holley will remain in the Rockcastle County Jail under a one million dollar cash bond, the same bond set by Venters following Holley's arrest.

The guilty plea by Holley resulted from the traffic accident which claimed the lives of Pamela Mullins Burke, 32, and her two children, David, 5 and Cindy, 3. Also hurt in the accident was Jerry Burke, the fourth family member in the car. The Burkes were on their way home from a family reunion in Berea at the time of the accident.

The incident stirred such an outrage among residents of the county that defense attorney Warren Scoville asked for a change of venue to Pulaski County because of the "overcrowding" of the county's motion. "Holley could not get a fair trial in Rockcastle County."

Newly-elected Circuit Judge Dan Venters granted the change of venue primarily, he said, because of a survey in the county, instigated by the defense only a few weeks after the accident, which reportedly

showed that the majority of county residents had already made up their minds as to Holley's guilt.

The 31-year sentence means that Holley will be eligible for parole in just over six years; however, Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham said he conferred with Mr. Burke, Pam's husband and father of David and Cindy, before he agreed to take the plea for the 31-year sentence.

Ham said the reason Holley would be eligible for parole in about 6 years was because the Kentucky parole schedule was set up on a 20% basis or 1 year for each 5 that a person is sentenced to.

The Commonwealth Attorney said the reason the murder charges were reduced was because murder would have been hard to prove, since this case involved vehicles. "Only in extreme vehicular accidents can murder be proved and if Holley had been found guilty of murder, he would have still gotten only 40 years and been eligible for parole in 8 years," Ham said. "This way, the family will not have to go through the ordeal of a trial and the defense will not be able to appeal it."

On that tragic Sunday afternoon in May, the events that led up to the accident were as follows:

Kentucky State Trooper Marcus Daly answered a report of a fight on the Interstate, approximately 6 3/10 miles north of Mt. Vernon, around 5:30 in the afternoon. When Daly arrived at the scene, the first fight was already over but Holley was highly intoxicated. Daly arrested Holley, handcuffed him behind his back and placed him in the rear seat of his police cruiser. Daly then went back to the car to arrest another man, also for public intoxication.

While Daly was arresting the other man, Holley managed to lower his handcuffed hands beneath his legs and pull them up in front of his body. He then crawled over the front seat of the cruiser and drove away with the handcuffs still on. Holley drove approximately 3/10 of a mile down the northbound lane of the Interstate before crossing the median into the southbound lane where he continued to travel north for approximately 2.6 miles until the cruiser collided with the Burke's Datson station wagon.

Mrs. Burke and Cindy were dead at the scene and David died on the way to the Berea Hospital. Mr. Burke was taken to the U.K. Medical Center where he remained in serious condition for four days.

Rep. Danny Ford files for House of Representatives

The 80th district is composed of Rockcastle County and parts of Lincoln, McCreary and Pulaski counties.

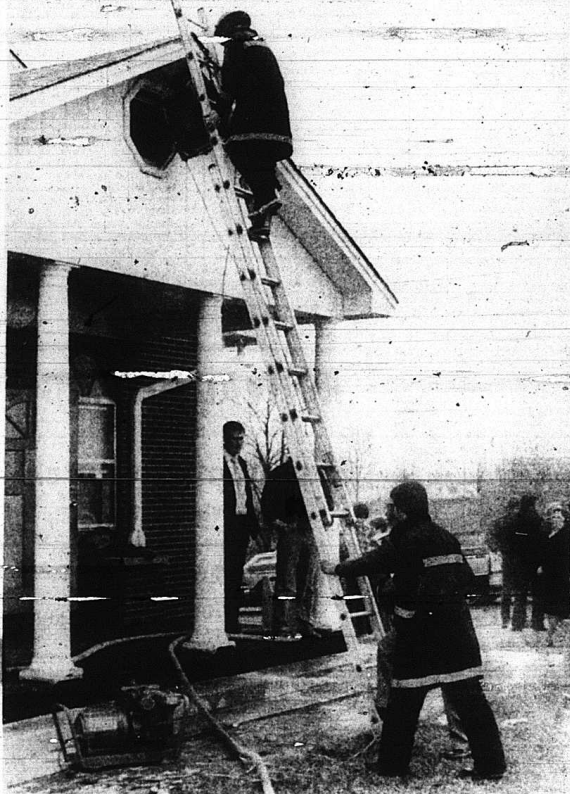

Taylor found guilty of murder

A Rockcastle Circuit Court jury found John Harvey Taylor guilty last week of the August 10, 1983 murder of Bentley "Mutt" Furmon.

The jury recommended a life sentence for Taylor. A sentencing hearing is scheduled for April 6 in Pulaski County where Taylor is being held in jail.

In the only other criminal cases tried thus far, two indictments were dismissed against one defendant and

another defendant was found guilty on a reduced charge stemming from the same case.

A charge of third degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking against Randy Graves was dismissed on recommendation of the Commonwealth Attorney's office because of insufficient evidence.

The charges stemmed from a December 2, 1983 break-in at The Attic in Mt. Vernon.

Charged in the same case was Marie Muse, who was found guilty of a reduced charge of receiving stolen property with a value under \$100.

Ms. Muse was fined \$100 and cost.

Other cases set for trial during this session of Circuit Court include: Jeff Prewitt, March 27, child abuse, Jack Potter, April 2, receiving stolen (Cont. to 15)

Jim Bussell overcomes rare kidney disease with help of "rare" family

When I called to ask Jim Bussell for an interview about his recent kidney transplant, his wife, Nancy, answered the phone.

"Jim's out in the backyard flying a kite with the kids," she said. "It's unreal. The Bussells' story is not only unreal, it's also unusual. And touching."

The first half of the story involves the 33-year-old Bussell finding out that he needed a kidney transplant because of a rare, incurable kidney disease. The second half belongs to the members of his immediate family, each of which offered to donate a kidney, and to his sister, Mary Ann, who ultimately became the donor.

The interview was a family affair. When I got to their house in Brodhead, Nancy Bussell, 33, was fixing fried chicken for supper and Derrick, their 11-month-old son, was happily eating an orange slice in his high

chair. Their daughter, Angie, 11, was also there, as was Bussell's 15-year-old brother, Barry, and 22-year-old sister, Mary Ann. Children.

They were later joined by their oldest son, J.D., who is 8 and by Mrs. Childress' husband, Rick. Not present were Bussell's other sister and brother, Teresa, 27 and Rick, 31.

Jim Bussell came in from work a little after 5 p.m., looking remarkably well and remarkably like his sister, Mary Ann. It wasn't obvious that one of them had been a kidney donor and one a recipient less than a month before.

He met his wife, Nancy,

at Eastern and they married after their junior year. She now teaches English at the Rockcastle County High School and he is a supervisor with the Kentucky Department of Strip Mining, Reclamation and Enforcement in London, Ky.

Bussell described himself as an outdoors type, saying he played a lot of sports, particularly softball and he liked to hunt and fish. Until a year ago, he was hardly ever sick with anything but a cold.

He said, "In February of 1983, I thought what had was the flu and I couldn't get rid of it. When I went to our family doctor, Finley Hendrickson, he gave me a physical and some of the tests showed I had kidney related problems."

Hendrickson sent Bussell to a specialist in Lexington who put him into the hospital for tests that Bussell has a very rare, incurable kidney disease that is called IGA nephritis.

"As far as they can tell it's hereditary," explained Bussell. "It's only been found in eastern Kentucky in six families. They've traced it to the 1600 and 1700's when most of them migrated from the state of Virginia. And it happens that one of my family members was from the Virginia area."

His wife commented, "Someone called and asked for one of our past history."

Bussell elaborated, "One of my great, great grandmothers had died of a kidney disease and in the old days, they had diagnosed it as Bright's Disease, which is blood in the urine. Other than that we've not had any problems in the immediate family."

IGA nephritis causes problems by trapping protein in the kidney where it's not supposed to be. The kidneys try to filter out the protein and eventually destroy themselves when the sacs filtering the system (Cont. to 20)

Anyway, we hope to provide you with more in-depth coverage in this manner and we are always open for constructive suggestions on even a little vindictive criticism if you feel like it.

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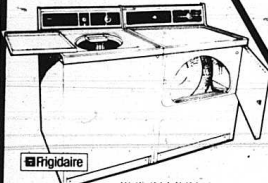
