





Calf Losses May Increase This Season

The systems of the conditions that have plagued cattle producers since last summer including the weather, dry pastures and the resulting low feed supplies may have another detrimental effect this spring through poor health of calves.

A weak-calf syndrom has been blamed for calf losses of up to 22 percent or ranches in the northwestern United States, according to Dr. Duane Miksch, Extension veterinarian at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Conditions which have preceded severe losses and extreme cold; some control and bacterial diseases and extreme cold; followed by wet and muddy calving areas. Those conditions sound much like what we've during the past several months. And, while there's no reason to sound, and alarm, cattle producers should be prepared for problems that may develop.

There are no single quick fixes for patient out of the contribute to early call mortiality and suggested some remedies.

Weak calves are to be expected from inadequately nourished cows. Underfeeding cows results in weak calves at birth, poor milk poolies in the colostrum. Energy deficiency often shows up in lowered productive performance. The quality of colostrum is probably decreased by Jess-than-adequate protein and vitamin a Produceral so is would take care to get enough vitamin A into the contribute contribute of the colostrum.


