Joe Clark makes motion to bar T.V. camera from meeting

Even before the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court's regular meeting got underway last Tuesday morning, a controversy arose.

County Judge Executive Bob Jasper and 5th District Magistrate Joe Clark were strongly opposed to a television camera being set up to film portions of the meeting.

Channel 18, a Lexington based television station, sent reporter Tim Weldon to the courthouse to cover the court's April meeting but, before he was able to proceed with his intentions, the state Attorney General was called in on the matter.

After Magistrate Clark made a motion to bar Weldon's camera from the meeting, Judge Jasper sent County Attorney James H. Lam-

bert to call the Attorney General's office and ask for his opinion. While Lambert was gone, several of the magistrates, as well as Weldon, had comments concerning the matter.

Weldon told the court that he was a personal friend of the Attorney General and if he (Lambert) did not answer the question he would call him himself.

"He has a right to be in here," said First District Magistrate Donald Rowe. "I think we should bring this to a vote," he said.

Second District Magistrate Tom Denny expressed similar sentiments. "What have you got to hide Joe (Clark)," Denny said. "I don't think that two or three people should decide something for the whole court." Denny declared, "let's bring this up for a

vote." "He, (Weldon), may be right, I just don't want to do nothing illegal," said Clark.

Weldon then told the court that he had covered about twelve fiscal courts across the state and approximately 50 city councils and this was the first time that his camera had been barred.

"It will look kind of bad on you all when I go on the news tonight and report that I was barred from the Rockcastle Fiscal Court meeting," Weldon said.

"You weren't invited," Clark retorted. However after Clark said this, he was asked if he had invited any of the 30 or so people in the courtroom and he responded by saying, "Well, no, I guess it's an open meeting."

While all of the discussion between Weldon and

the court continued, Judge Jasper sent for local attorney Carl Clontz.

When Clontz came into the courtroom, he told the judge and the magistrates that, in his opinion, the "Open Meetings Law" was not clear as to whether or not a television camera could be present during court proceedings. However, Clontz said he felt a court could vote to make a reporter leave his camera outside but they could not bar the reporter.

But, when Lambert returned to the meeting from talking to the Attorney General's office, he had in his possession an opinion and a copy of KRS 61.840. "Statute 61.840 says that all court proceedings shall be open to the media, including television cameras," Lambert said.

"The only way that you all can keep him from causing chaos at disturbing the meeting," Lambert said.

Weldon was apparently at the meeting to do a story on the asbestos situation in the courthouse since that is what his news story Monday night concerned.

Fairgrounds

Once all of the confusion concerning Weldon was over, the court finally began the meeting.

Brian Bussell met with the court concerning the fairgrounds at Brodhead.

Bussell, his dad Billy, Frank Martin and Bill Gentry are the fairgrounds at Brodhead each year and conduct a fair.

Bussell told the court that the four men's contract with the county stated that no horse show could be put on three weeks prior to the fair. He said that there was a horse show scheduled for July 13 and that was in direct violation of their contract.

Judge Jasper told Bussell that the persons responsible for the horse show would be contacted and told to change the date.

Bussell also reminded the court that they had agreed to remove about thirty-three stumps from the fairground. Bussell said he had talked to a contractor who was working in the Brodhead area who had said he would remove the stumps for \$30 each.

Magistrate Rowe said he

thought the county could use their own equipment and remove the stumps cheaper than the \$900 and the rest of the court agreed with Rowe.

Fire Protection

Bussell, who is a member of the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Dept., then asked the court if the fire department was going to get any help from the county in purchasing a fire truck for their department to fight county fires in Western Rockcastle County.

"We've been providing county fire protection longer than any other department in the county," Bussell said. "If we don't get some help from you all pretty soon, we are going to have to discontinue the service to Western Rockcastle County," he warned.

"We want an answer from you right now about what you're going to do," Bussell said.

"If we have to be on phones ringing when there is no fire service, it's going to be yours," Bussell added.

"If we have to, we can use the fire truck we already

Parsons makes suggestions for improvement of schools

Rockcastle County Superintendent Charles B. Parsons made his recommendations for educational improvement in the school system last Tuesday night, during the board's regular monthly meeting.

Heading Mr. Parsons' two-page list of improvements that he feels are needed in the school system, is the establishment of performance expectations for teachers and administrators.

The Superintendent explained that these expectations would be in written form and clearly defined so that teachers and administrators would know exactly

what is required of them in the performance of their duties.

Another recommendation is the requirement that all principals spend at least half their time in supervisory and evaluation of the teachers in their respective schools. "I feel this is the most important thing to be done down in the system," Parsons told board members.

He went on to say that it will be difficult for principals to do this with the limited amount of help they have in their office so he recommended to the board that they consider hiring another secretary for the schools that don't have an assistant principal. He said the new secretary would be mainly concerned with the

lunch money and her salary would be paid through the lunch program.

Parsons had four parts to the supervision recommendation which included evaluation of new teachers at least three times a year, evaluating non-tenured teachers at least twice a year and evaluating tenured teachers and administrators at least once a year. The evaluation of administrators is to be carried out by Parsons.

Another recommendation also called for the development of a new and improved evaluation instrument for teachers and administrators.

Other recommendations included the development of a plan for teachers to use in tracking pupil mastery of

Ruth McFerron still has 'zest' for life at age 88

It was a chilly, overcast day in late March, but Ruth McFerron's spirits didn't seem to be affected by the weather.

The 88-year-old retired schoolteacher was at her home in Mt. Vernon, surrounded by the things she loves. Her piano was against one wall of the living room, and her books were in a wood-framed glass case that lined the other.

She showed me four Chinese prints that she recently had framed and brought my attention to three of her aprons laying on the couch. "I'm a be-longer," she explained.

She was wearing a navy suit with a ruffled cream blouse and she sat comfortably in a chair in front of her fireplace. Although she's almost 90, "old" is not a word that could be used to describe Mrs. McFerron.

She talked easily, telling her story in a strong, pleasant voice. "I was born in Livingston on Jan. 8, 1896," she said. "We moved to Mt. Vernon in 1903 and it has been my home ever since." She is the daughter of Terry D. and Lucy E. Mullins and is a middle child. She has three older brothers and three younger brothers and a younger sister. All of her brothers are now dead, but Mrs. McFerron is close to her sister, Grant Riddle, who also lives in Mt. Vernon.

Her father, grandfather and great grandfather were all ministers.

Her grade school years were spent at Brown Memorial, a private school in Mt. Vernon, which later changed ownership and became Mt. Vernon High School. There were only two in her graduating class and she was the first girl to graduate from Mt. Vernon after it became

independent.

"I taught in 1916 after I graduated. At that time, we had to take a county examination. I got a certificate to teach, and I taught in the grades at Mt. Vernon and later on in the high school." She taught English and music, and was in charge of the Glee Club, and did a lot of play coaching. The last 14 years of her teaching career, she was a librarian at Mt. Vernon and still taught a few English classes.

Mrs. McFerron began her college education at Eastern, Kentucky University,

and then graduated from the University of Kentucky with a double major in English and library science and a minor in music. She added, "I studied voice at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music for a short time, but my musical education was mostly what I did myself."

She preferred teaching high school over the grades. "I like the adolescent group; they were so unpredictable! I kept a piano in my room, and when the children became noisy or rude, I just marched down

Former Brodhead Mayor Dan Gray, dead at age 87

Radio-A-Thon to raise money for new ambulance

It's only two days until the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service radio-athon which will be held Saturday in front of The Bank of Mt. Vernon from 9 a.m. until noon.

County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper has proclaimed April 1-7 as the first annual Rockcastle Ambulance Service Contribution Week. This year's donations will help purchase a badly-needed new ambulance that will replace one of the old ones which has 175,000 miles on

it. The only other ambulance belonging to the service has 30,000 miles on it.

The new ambulance is being custom-built by Horton Manufacturing in Columbus, Ohio and will cost \$30,000, without equipment. Some of the features the model will have are a diesel engine, a custom interior designed especially for Rockcastle County's needs and numerous safety options made to protect both the driver and the patient.

Mike Barr, volunteer di-

rector for the ambulance service, said the reason for the fund drive is that the program operates without directly taxing county residents. The service is able to pay \$45,000/year, new equipment and the upkeep of the ambulances with a \$1,500 monthly subsidy from the fiscal court and an improved billing system.

Barr said, "The ambulance service has become financially stable within the last year, but, with a total operating budget of \$75,000

annually, purchasing a new ambulance would be impossible without some community help."

He added, "The ambulance service intends to borrow the balance of the money necessary to purchase the vehicle and will make monthly payments on it. The purpose of this fund drive is to enable us to borrow as little money as possible to prevent a severe hardship in making the payments."

The service presently employs four emergency medical technicians which provide 24 hour service, seven days a week. And, although the ambulance won't be delivered until some time next month, the drivers are looking forward to receiving the new vehicle.

Willmer Robinson, a driver for the service, commented, "I need a new ambulance because the old one has so many miles on it and needs a lot of work."

Russell Barron, also a driver, said he likes the way the new ambulance is designed. "It's so far ahead of a heart monitor and ventilator, you have everything right there."

There will be a demonstration model of the ambulance on display for the public in front of The Bank of Mt. Vernon during the fund drive.

Charles Napier, salesman and deputy chief of radio station in Renfro Valley, will also be on hand with equipment to conduct the radio-athon at the bank. Many of the county's businesses have been contacted for pledges and Napier said these over the air from 9 a.m. until noon.

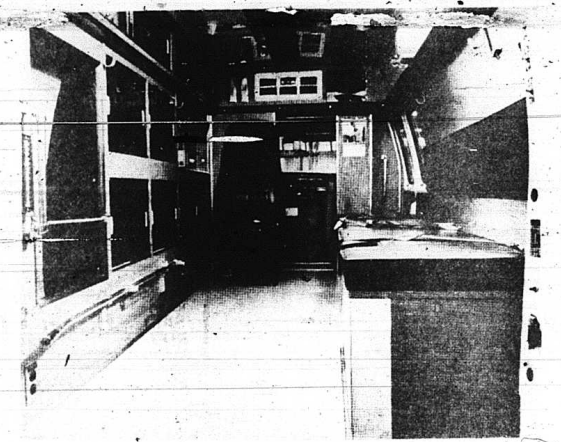
He will also be giving the numbers of three phones that can be called by those wanting to make pledges the day of the radio-athon. The phones will be located in Jarr, 60 W. Lamb, the law office in Mt. Vernon.

The ambulance service board members donate their time to the program and they feel the fund drive is a good idea. David King, vice-chairman for the board, said, "The ambulance service is important because there could be unnecessary loss of life if we don't send a check to the Rockcastle Ambulance Service, Rt. 4, Box 498, Mt. Vernon, Ky, and they will receive a receipt in the mail."

Ernest Stanley, secretary for the board, expressed his opinion, "I think it's a necessity that we have an ambulance service. We can't do without it and I think everybody realizes the need for it."

The board's vice chair, Tom Welch, urged, "Support your ambulance service. Be a part of a good cause for all the people of Rockcastle County by making a contribution during the month of April. We need and encourage your help."

Eighth grade class tours hospital during Career Day

The entire eighth grade class from Brodhead Elementary School got a look at the many kinds of professionals that make up the Rockcastle County Hospital on the final stop of their Career Day last week.

The students were welcomed by Administrator Wayne Stewart and then divided into four groups to be taken by tour guides to the different departments in the hospital.

One group concentrated on the nursing department by visiting the nursing station, the pharmacy and delivery rooms. They watched a nurse demonstrate suction and IV techniques and put on gowns, masks and shoe covers before going into the delivery room.

A second group looked at a series of x-rays in the x-ray department, learned what kinds of tests are con-

ducted in the laboratory and put on gowns to go into the scrub room where they could look through a window into the surgical suite.

Another group of students learned how the hospital's sterilization equipment works, watched the new IBM computer make a printout of the day's census and heard a lecture on the kinds of treatments performed by the physical therapy department.

The fourth group went to the respiratory therapy department to see how a ventilator works. A ventilator is a sophisticated machine that breathes for people who are unable to do so on their own. They also visited several patients in the skilled nursing facility who are on ventilators.

All of the students finished their tour by examining the ambulance parked outside the emergency room.

Dr. P.J. Monteyne, a family practitioner on staff at the hospital, concluded by telling the eighth graders about the education required to become a doctor and giving them an idea of the things he does in an average day.



Hospital sponsors second nursing assistants class

The Rockcastle County Hospital recently sponsored its second week-long class designed to train interested community members and potential employees to be nursing assistants.

Betty Purcell, the hospital's training director, conducted the class and taught the six women basic nursing assistant skills and CPR. After successfully completing the course, the women are qualified to function as nursing assistants.

Those who participated in the second nursing assistants class are Lois Bachhaus, Carolyn Donn, Charlene Irvin, Tammy Manuel, Charlene Pennington and Treasure Singleton.

Mrs. Purcell said the class has been popular and that she plans to hold other nursing assistants classes periodically in the near future.

She added that the five day course will be expanded to seven days so the class members can spend more time in an orientation period doing actual patient care.

Lab staff answers questions during Medical Laboratory Week

Although most people don't look forward to a trip to the lab, it's often laboratory testing that aids doctors in diagnosing a patient's illness.

The Rockcastle County Hospital Laboratory will recognize National Medical Laboratory Week from April 8 - 14, 1984, along with approximately 13,000 laboratories and 6,000 hospitals throughout the United States. The staff at Rockcastle would like to take this occasion to answer the questions most frequently asked about laboratory testing.

The following information is from a pamphlet printed by The American Association of Bioanalysts.

"Why will these tests help my physician?" Your physician has three ways to tell what might be happening in your body:

1) A history obtained by carefully questioning you. 2) A physical examination. 3) Laboratory and/or x-ray tests.

There are over 1000 different laboratory tests which can be performed on various body fluids; most commonly on blood or urine. The physician will choose tests which may establish or confirm a diagnosis, or which may be used to follow your course of treatment.

"How do I know you're using a clean needle?" Needles come prepackaged and sterile - often you can watch your phlebotomist attach the needle to the syringe or vacutainer while you're sitting there. If you're somewhere else, All laboratories must conform to the licensure requirement which states: needles that are sterile, needles shall be used one time only; needles shall be properly disposed of.

"Why can't you just stick my finger?" Capillary blood collection (from your finger) means a relatively small volume of blood and usually more time required to obtain a specimen.

This method is especially suited to infants and small children who have small blood volume than an adult does, but even then the amount of blood necessary for some laboratory tests may be obtained by venipuncture.

A fingerstick is also useful for patients on chemotherapy, whose veins have been multiply punctured.

Most of the time, you

Most of the time, your blood specimen will be collected through a needle attached to a syringe or a vacutainer. Which is used depends on the accessibility of your veins, the type of collection being done and the preference of the phlebotomist.

"Why do I have to have a bandaid?" The length of time it takes you to stop bleeding from the puncture site depends on your platelets (blood cells which promote clotting), your veins themselves and your skin. Sometimes a disease condition will prolong the bleeding time.

In any case, an ordinary sterile area - inside your vein - has been entered, and now the laboratory needs to ensure that nothing besides its sterile needle can get into that vein.

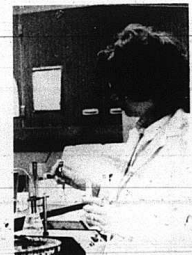
Holding a gauze or cotton pad against the wound will help bleeding to stop, and a bandaid or other bandage will protect the

area until the skin has completely closed.

If you are allergic to the tape on the bandaid, paper tape can be substituted. Laboratories are following accepted medical practice when they protect your puncture wound after drawing your blood.

"It's no fun to be stuck every half hour!" Being "stuck" is not something anyone enjoys, but sometimes multiple collections are necessary to follow the progress of a substance through the patient's body.

Human bodies are unique biological mechanisms and it's not always possible to predict what might be happening inside. Think of tests like this as being tailored to your requirements, rather than buying something off the rack.

-To promote the furtherance of good health practices and safe food service by Americans.

Future food and fitness programs planned include nutrition camps and fair exhibits.
