



do. We don't want to quit fighting fires in Western Rockcastle County be we're going to have to," said the officers.

In an effort to see how residents feel who live in the areas they cover by fire protection, the department has scheduled a public meet-ing for this Friday night at the Brodhead Elementary School at 7.30.

"This is going to be an

Brodhead makes about 40 county fire runs a year and, if they have to discontinue this service, the burden of covering Western Rockcastle will fall on the Mt. Vernon Fire Dept., which has a new county truck purchased for them by the fiscal court two years ago.

However, more than one officer of the Brodhead Fire Department said that they were told that Mt. Vernon (fire department) was not going to try to serve the Western Rockcastle area be-cause 1) it would throw too much work on them and 2)



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

Make Maximum Use of Spring Grazing Season

Make Maximum Use of Spring Graning Season —
As pastures begin to turn greener and start the rapid spring growth phase, many farmers are thinking about how to make maximum use of this forage with their cattle. Some pointers for grazing cattle on spring grass from illvestock Extention of the start of the

energy and other nutrients. 
h moisture forages overe cannot supply enough energy to allow the cattle to maintain their body weight, supply milk for the calves and robred, with first-call heifers. Continue to supplement the diets of cattle with silage, high-quality hay or 3-5 pounds of grain, and continue to Supplement with a minegal mix containing magn sium and phosphorus. Relative to the second point, the grass is always greener on the other side, so beging pastures, check your fences and water gates to make certain they haven't developed new weak places over the winter. Consider whether tross fences for developing a pasture rotation plan would allow more efficient utilization of pastures. Finally, work with a local veterinarian to develope and remember that pasture rotation helps control interial parasites. Cattle should be wormed using any of several types of commercial worming products and a program to control face and horn files should be developed.

Insecticide ear tags work well, although there

may be problems with flies developing resistance in some areas. To avoid prob-lems, follow directions care-fully use two tags on all

animals, don't put tags in until fly season starts around late May and consider alternating fly control methods

A door-to-door salesman comes to your door on an alleged referral from a neighbor. You are told that you were recommended as a potential representative for a company selling built-in vacuum cleaners. Nothing he selling approached as a potential customer.
You learn that the company will pay you \$75 for each customer referral and an additional \$75 for each referral that results in a purchase. The price of wacuum system is \$650. However chase the system. The salesman assures you that year price is not reflips?

Referral selling is illegal in Kentucky and there are three other laws that relate to door-to-door sales.

The three-day coling-off period, also called the home solicitation sales law, gives you three days, to cancel a purchase that is more than \$25. A statement about this right to cancel must be printed on the contract. If you choose to-cancel, you must do so in writing. It would be wise to send the written notice by certified or registered, mail, with return receipt requested. But the law of the world of the with return receipt requested. These requirements protect you from false claims by the caller concerning your need for a hearing aid and the safety of the product. 


