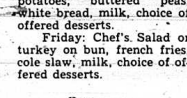

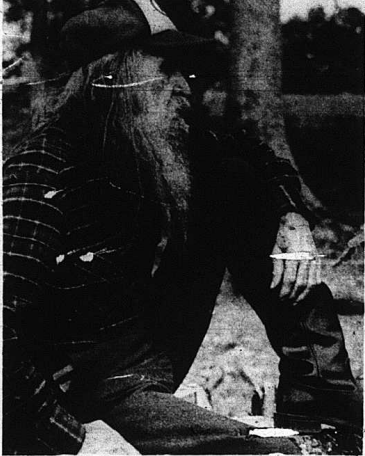

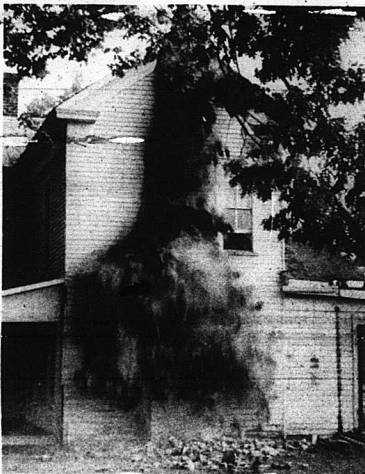

not afford an FMHA loan. Even with a one percent interest rate...the payments are simply too high to leave them enough income to pay other living expenses."

Under these conditions, he said it is difficult in many rural areas to find people who can qualify for very low income brackets until it can assure that 40% of all single family housing

loans can go to very low income people. In Kentucky, Seaton said since the legislation went into effect November 30, 1983, we have financed 29.6% of Section 502 units to very low income families. She suggested to the Housing and Community Subcommittee that "It may be that a more practical balance between these economic segments could be agreed to or that the absolute ratio be removed in favor of more realistic targeting goals."

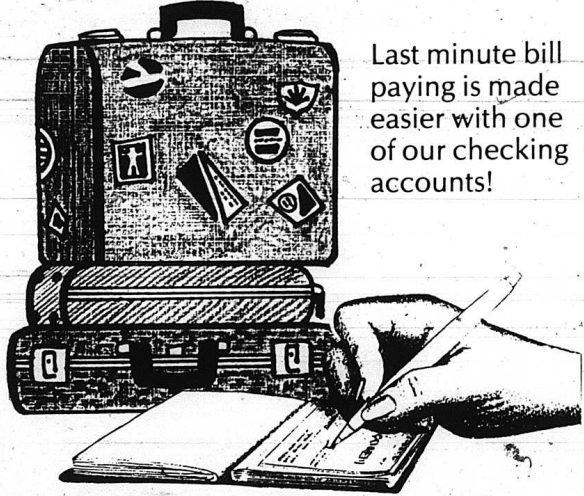

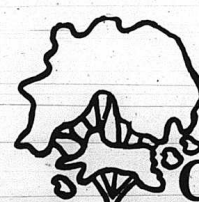

5 residents injured in two accidents

Five Rockcastle County residents were injured in two separate accidents Monday morning about 8 a.m., according to police reports on file at the Kentucky State Police in London.

The first accident, which occurred at 8:05 a.m., involved a Rockcastle County school bus, a local woman and her daughter and a King's Mountain man. According to Rockcastle County Schools Transportation Director Bige Towery, John W. "Garner" Brown of Route 1, Brodhead, driver of the school bus, was traveling west on Hwy. 150 when he topped a hill, approximately 1/10 of a mile from the junction of Hwy. 461 and saw a small red truck sitting in the road. Towery said that Brown told him that he did not see a turn signal and that by the time he noticed the truck was moving, he had to apply the brakes on his bus with a great deal of pressure.

Towery said that when Brown hit his brakes, he lost control of the bus and

it hit the truck in the rear end, knocking the truck out of the roadway.

The transportation director said that Brown's bus, No. 125, which was empty at the time, then went sideways in the road and struck an oncoming car.

Towery said the accident happened during a hard rainstorm. The oncoming car, a 1982 Buick Electra, driven by Joyce Norton of Mt. Vernon, was completely totaled by the bus which came to rest on top of the car, according to police.

Police said that Mrs. Norton and her five-year-old daughter, Hollie Nicole, who was also in the car, were transported to the Rockcastle County Hospital and later to the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington. Both were released from the hospital that night.

Brown and the driver of the pick-up truck, Mitchell Cain, were not injured in

Ford explains stand on issues of recent General Assembly

The 1984 Kentucky General Assembly is over and 80th District Representative Danny Ford, R-Mt. Vernon, thinks that several pieces of legislation were passed that will affect the citizens of Rockcastle County.

During an interview with Rep. Ford last week, the topics of discussion ranged from the Drunk Driving bill to pay hikes for teachers and state employees as well as a state lottery.

Ford, who represents all of Rockcastle County and portions of Lincoln, McCreary and Pulaski counties in Frankfort, was very vocal about his feelings concerning state government.

On the subject of pay cuts for teachers and state employees, Ford made it very clear that this was just not true. "All of the major news media has dwelled on the fact that state employees are getting a three percent cut in pay when in all actuality, they are getting a 2% increase over last year," he said.

"Before the state's budget has been set up for all state employees, including teachers, to get a 5% increase in salary each year, but the money was not there this time and some cuts had to be made," he further said.

Ford, who is a Republican, said that the Republican's alternative budget called for a 5% increase for state employees each year and the budget still came out balanced. "When the Senate and House and both Democrats controlled, a Republican budget, does not have much of a chance and

ours didn't," he said.

The Representative said that the two-year budget that was approved, was set up for state employees to get a three percent increase next year and a 5% increase if the budget has grown enough to allow for it. Ford, who is a member of the prestigious Appropriation and Revenue Committee, said that he felt "like the money would be available for the 52 increase" voted for the final budget draft because it was sure that was the closest we were going to get to a compromise," he said.

Some of the bills that Ford sponsored and co-sponsored that were passed into law included House Bill 385 a bill that makes it mandatory for all Kentucky State Police cruisers to have a seat between the front and back seats. Ford prefiled this bill after the tragic deaths of a Rockcastle County family in a dependent involving a cruiser that did not have the screen;

House Bill 846, which makes it mandatory for doctors to sign death certificates 15 days after the date of death so that survivors, who are relying on insurance money, can get the expenses incurred during such a time, will be able to get their money sooner;

House Bill 75, which sets up a clearing house in state government to assist people who are attempting to start a new business with information concerning the business and its involvement with the government and

House Bill 76 which takes authority from the state Board of Education to pry into religious and pri-

vat school matters.

Also helped with House Bill 486 which deals with child abuse as well as missing children and House Bill 385 which gives tree hunting and fishing licenses to totally disabled veterans.

Ford also had some concerns on some of the issues that made headlines during the session. The state's new multi-banking law could certainly affect Rockcastle County and, while it did pass during the session, Ford voted against it.

"I think the new law will create a monopoly in the banking industry and hurt the rural communities of the state," Ford said, "but I hope I'm dead wrong," he added.

While Ford was against the bill, which was originally introduced by Sen. Ford, he was strongly in favor of the new drunk driving laws.

"Before, judges had options on what they could do about drunk drivers but now they don't have an option, they simply have to enforce the laws because they will be mandatory," he said.

The bill, which becomes law this year, was originally introduced by Sen. Ford and he lobbied hard for it on the

Jury finds Denny guilty of robbery

A one-day trial in Rockcastle County Circuit Court recently resulted in a guilty verdict against a local man.

A 12-member jury returned a guilty verdict for first degree robbery, against Sherman Denny of Route 4, Mt. Vernon for the March 21, 1983 robbery of Super Test gas station on U.S. 25, south of Mt. Vernon.

The Commonwealth presented a case to the jury which alleged that around 6 a.m. on that Monday morning, walked into the gas station, carrying a 12 gauge shotgun and wearing a stocking over his face.

The Commonwealth further alleged that Denny told

the gas station attendant, Tim Price, to open the safe and that Denny took \$4,610.32.

The warrant sworn out for Denny shortly after the incident showed that Price called the station and told them that he had been robbed by Denny.

Denny was also charged with stealing Price's 1968 Chevrolet truck which he left the scene in and which was later found on Chestnut Ridge Road. An 870 Remington shotgun was also found in the truck at that time, police said.

The jury recommended a sentence of 15 years in the state penitentiary for Denny.

Sentencing has been set

for April 27.

POTTER FOUND GUILTY

Another recent trial in Circuit Court resulted in a guilty verdict against Bruce Potter of Scaffold Cane.

Potter was found guilty of receiving stolen property over \$100 in value.

The merchandise, which Potter supposedly received, was a stereo that belonged to Donald E. Gabbard. The jury recommended a fine of \$87.50 and gave Potter credit for time already served in jail.

Local man's son released from Saudi Arabia

When Ronald Wyatt left Jan. 20 on an archaeological expedition, he called his parents to say good-bye. "Dad and Mom, I'm leaving for Jordan," he said. "I want you to pray for me while I'm gone."

His parents are Robert and Lottie Wyatt of Livingston and Little did they know then how desperately their son would need their prayers in the weeks to come.

Robert Wyatt said this is about the sixth time his 50-year-old son had traveled to the Middle East in search of religious artifacts. Ronald Wyatt is accompanied on

most of his trips by his two sons, Danny, 24, and Ronnie, 22. His daughter, Michelle, 26, went with him on his first expedition.

His sons were with Wyatt on this trip to Jordan and all three planned to return to their home in Madison, Tenn., by Feb. 5. Danny and Ronnie Wyatt were to get back to their jobs in construction and Wyatt was to return to his position as anesthesiologist at Memorial Hospital in Nashville, Tenn.

When Feb. 5 passed and the Wyatts failed to return to the United States, their family gave them another week in case they had experienced a delay in finishing their expedition. When they

still hadn't heard from them, the family got worried and Ronald Wyatt's brother, Roger, called the State Department in Washington, D.C.

The next word that reached Robert and Lottie Wyatt was that the car their son had rented had been found deserted. For almost three nightmarish weeks they lived with the fear that their son and two grandsons were dead.

They experienced tremendous relief when they finally got the news from the State Department that the three younger Wyatts were alive and being held by the Saudi Arabian government.

The elder Wyatts' wooden farmhouse is located several hundred yards into a hollow about two miles south of Livingston. When I talked to them last Wednesday, they couldn't have seemed any further removed from the deserts of Saudi Arabia.

Robert Wyatt, 73, is fairly tall and slim with white hair and blue eyes. Lottie Wyatt, 71 has straight brown hair and a strong face. She and her husband have lived in Livingston since 1956, raising 11 children on the same farm they've retired on.

The elder Wyatt sat on a couch in his living room and told what he knew of

the circumstances surrounding his son's disappearance. "The only information I got was that they were walking through the sand and the border wasn't marked too closely, and they got on the Saudi Arabia side from Jordan."

The younger Wyatts had not intended to visit Saudi Arabia and were evidently arrested without a visa. The elder Wyatt feels they were probably suspected of being spies for that reason, because they had a lot of camera and scuba diving equipment.

When the State Department called to say his son and grandsons were alive, Robert Wyatt responded,

"Praise the Lord!" A spokeswoman from the department assured him that the United States has good relations with Saudi Arabia at this time, but that he and his wife would have to be patient since it can be slow dealing with two governments. The State Department called about once a week and promised to let them know when they received news of the younger Wyatt's release.

Robert Wyatt remembered a conversation he had with the State Dept. for Jordan. "Son," he said, "this seems like a treacherous trip with all that fight-

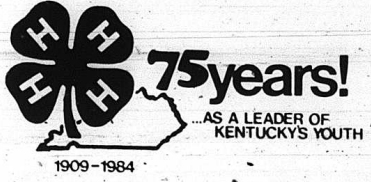

Easter Fun for Everyone

Most people probably believe that the tradition of coloring eggs at Easter time is a Christian custom. Actually, the tradition began 5,000 years ago with the Persians who celebrated the



Eggs for Easter and After.

Preparing Eggs
Hard cook eggs in enamel, steel or glass pans. Iron or aluminum pans will cause a chemical reaction with the egg shell which keeps color from adhering properly. If you want to empty an egg, make a small hole in one end of a raw egg and a slightly larger one at the other end. The yolk will come out better if the egg is room temperature and if you briskly shake the egg before piercing it. Use the eggs in those Easter custards or cakes.

Coloring Eggs
Use commercial egg coloring and mixing to get the colors you want. Use 1/2 cup warm water, a tablespoon of vinegar and 3-4 drops of coloring to get the desired color.

Names and other writing can be put on the warm egg by using a wax crayon before it is colored. When the egg is colored, the writing will appear.

To make striped or plaid eggs, place rubber bands around egg, color, allow to dry completely, then remove rubber bands.

For variety, decoupage or glue cut outs from magazine pictures, wrapping paper, greeting cards on eggs. If hollow egg shells are used, coat with clear nail polish. (Do not use polish on hard cooked eggs). Bits of lace, embroidery, or ribbon can also be glued on colored eggs. Add construction paper ears and tails or pom-pom tails to eggs to make egg animals or bunnies.

Make An Egg Tree
Select small branches from tree and remove buds and leaves. Spray paint-if you wish. Use emptied, colored and decorated eggs. Glue a loop of ribbon to the broad end of the egg to serve as a hanger. Hang egg shells on the branches.

Decorated and colored eggs can also be used in baskets or place small egg tree in vase to use as centerpiece.

Groundbreaking held for new Bethany Methodist Church

Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, Wednesday, April 11, 1984 at 2:30 p.m., the ceremony of groundbreaking for a new

church was held just off the Old Brodhead Road between the Rockcastle Villa Apartments. The church was organized in June, 1980 and the first service was held in the Public Library. Then a

double-wide trailer and a lot to place it on were purchased on Hwy. 150. This was paid off in approximately one year's time. Then, on December 21, 1982, ten acres of ground was purchased just off the Brodhead Road. A hill that will be visible for three miles and is now Hwy. 461 and this is now the site. Two Rockcastle students chosen for scholar program

Nearly 600 high school juniors from across Kentucky have been selected to participate in the Governor's Scholars program at two college campuses this summer, the Governor's office announced recently.

Chosen to participate from Rockcastle County High School were Cynthia L. Cash, daughter of Wil-

liam and Doris Cash of Mt. Vernon, and Scott W. Stayton, son of Donald and Dorinda Stayton, also of Mt. Vernon.

The program will be held at Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond from June 1 to Aug. 2 and at Centre College in Danville from July 1 to Aug. 3.

The program started last year with about 50 students but its size was more than doubled this year to accommodate the increased interest, according to the Governor's office.

The students attend the program free of charge. A partnership of business, government and education bears the costs, an aide to the Governor said.

Even with the enlarged program, some qualified students were turned away.

Governor Martha Layne Collins said in a prepared statement from her office, that the response of school officials, teachers, counselors, parents and students had been outstanding and demonstrated that Kentuckians have a commitment to

excellence in education.

Students, who qualified for the program, came from 118 of the state's 120 counties. The selection process is based on both objective and subjective information.

Students had to score in the top 10 percentile of last year's state-wide comprehensive test of basic skills.

They also had to be nominated by two teachers who ranked them on the basis of academic and intellectual achievement, breadth of interest, originality, creativity, independence, leadership and motivation.

Students were also required to complete an essay on the program's theme for this year, "High Tech and People: Kentucky in the Information Age."

ing going on over there."

When Wyatt replied, "Dad, when it's the Lord's work, it's the safest place to be."

The elder Wyatt added, "Ronald believed the good

Lord would see him through it and he just went on."

Wyatt's daughter-in-law, Rosemary, wrote letters explaining her brother-in-law's situation to state Rep. Danny Ford, R-Mt. Vernon, and U.S. Rep.

Harold Rogers, R-Somerset. Both men contacted her the next day.

It happened to be the last day of Frankfort's regular legislative session and Ford asked the speaker of the house for an adjournment to allow a resolution to be passed to aid the imprisoned Wyatts. The exception was granted and a resolution was passed by the House of the State Department, to make every effort to secure the Wyatts' release.

A copy of the resolution, with a request for help, was sent to President Reagan, Senator Wendell Ford, the embassy in Saudi Arabia, and the seven Kentucky congressmen. A copy was also sent to United Press International in hopes of generating public interest and drawing attention to the international incident.

How were Hobert and Lottie Wyatt feeling at this time? "It made us feel concerned and uneasy," said the elder Wyatt. "Sad," his wife said simply. "I cried some too."

But their faith in God has been a big factor in their ability to cope with this situation. "We trusted in the Lord," he said. "I've prayed every night for Ronald and every day too. I believe the Lord will see me through and that's the only thing that keeps me going. I believe he'll come back but I don't know how long it will take. My Ron is a Christian and he believes in prayer too. I imagine he's doing his part of it since he's been tied up over there."

Knowing their son, do they think this incident will keep him from returning to the Middle East for future expeditions? "Ron just has that urge," he said. "I don't believe he would be called back." His wife added emphatically, "I hope he never goes back over there myself."

Hobert Wyatt recalled that Ronald Wyatt had been an adventurer from an early age. He and his older brother would explore caves around Livingston, the old battlefield on Wildcat Mountain, and the land around the Rockcastle River. "They found a scabbard you cut your sword in and I guess that's where he got the idea of trying to find different things."

About six years ago, Wyatt took up archeology as a serious hobby and began to fulfill a childhood dream. "It was an intriguing booklet, he wrote that was published in 1980, Noah's Ark Found. Wyatt made that statement. "It has been my determined desire since an early age to do something during my life to express my gratitude to my loving God for His personal integrity and all enduring kindness toward myself and our children."

Wyatt was concerned about how he could help prove God the Creator of the world, and after praying he made a decision. "The first of five projects was to locate the remains of Noah's Ark and to prove its existence beyond reasonable doubt." The summer of 1977 found Wyatt and his two sons "hurtling along the poorly maintained roads of eastern Turkey" in search of the remains of one of the oldest religious relics: Noah's Ark.

After two trips to the mountains of Ararat, a hair-raising escape from a band of Turkish outlaws, and the exhilarating find of a boat-shaped object, Ronald Wyatt felt certain he had located the legendary Noah's Ark. His suspicions were further confirmed when the measurements of the object matched those given by the

Bible for the ark, and when samples of the boat were proven by Galbraith Laboratory to be wood, to be the residue of a wood-en object.

Wyatt announced at the end of his booklet: "The evidence I have found and photographed may be all that in God's wisdom He intends to make available regarding the remains of the ark. If they believe not Moses, and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded though one rose from the dead."

Wyatt also listed several of the other projects he is presently working on. He would like to make a film showing how the pyramids were built, retrieve Egyptian artifacts from the Red Sea crossing site which he would like to locate, and complete the excavation of the Ark of the Covenant (which they've also located).

Wyatt finances his expeditions himself along with the help of friends and doctors who "know him and know his work in the past," said the elder Wyatt.

"I've got interested themselves." The trip to Jordan was partially financed by Astronaut James B. Irwin who lives in Colorado.

Hobert Wyatt understood that his son was going back to Jordan to get a brass chariot he discovered on an earlier expedition when he was scuba diving into the Red Sea. The water was too rough at the time to be able to surface the artifact and Wyatt was once able to get an underwater picture of it.

Hobert and Lottie Wyatt seem to be interested in their son's extraordinary hobby in stride, making it seem perfectly natural for him to use archeology as an instrument in proving God's existence and the validity of the Bible. Somehow it does.

The elder Wyatt said calmly, as if he reported that his son had found an Indian arrowhead in the backyard, "Noah's Ark had been sited in 1952, but the first one to analyze it and report the measurements was Ronald. He thinks the Lord wants him to find all these things to prove the Bible is right."

Ronald Wyatt's daughter, Michelle, has a job with the state of Tennessee and couldn't get away this time to India to see him. "Michelle took it awfully good until they didn't show up and she began to wonder about the validity of what she said, 'Grandpa, if anything comes in call me at the office.' Wyatt's ex-wife, Loretta, moved to Louisville several years ago after they divorced, and he raised their three children.

Hobert Wyatt said his is a close-knit family. Even though he has children, grandchildren and brothers and sisters scattered throughout such varied states as California, Tennessee and Illinois, they have managed to stay in touch during the international incident that has affected all of them.

"We just love each other and they're very concerned. When they're with him, we're all in trouble. They call us and say, 'Have you heard anything?'"

The elder Wyatts have had to adapt quickly to being in the public eye the past few weeks. Channel 27 from Lexington did a feature on them for the evening news, the Lexington Herald-Leader came down to interview them and the Courier-Journal called them to get comments over the phone. Their story has also been televised on national news.

The elder Wyatts expressed their appreciation (Cont. to 13)

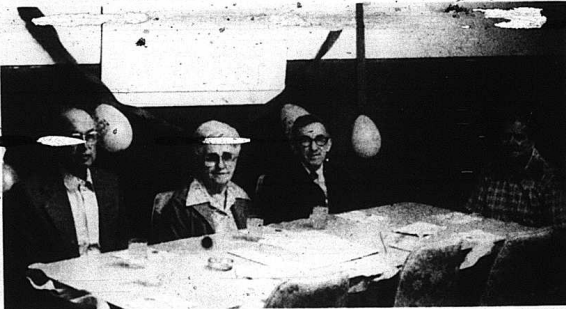

The Mt. Vernon Signal atts' prayers were answered just the next day when they received word from the office of U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers that their son and grandsons had been released and were in the process of coming home.

"I've run all through the house laughing and clapping my hands," exclaimed Mrs. Wyatt over the phone last Friday. "Anybody who would've seen me would've thought I was crazy! My husband is elated too. We are so relieved Ronald's coming home. I believe the news media was a big help and I thank all of them. I'm just rejoicing."

Danny Ford was also glad to get the news. "I'm certainly happy about the Wyatts' release and I feel great about it now. Any time you have that type of situation, it puts a lot of stress on the family. Had the situation gone on and not as many people been involved, it might have lasted longer."

Ford said he believed the Wyatts were being questioned as spies, "but from Feb. 6 until now is a long time to determine if they were on some other mission. I appreciate the efforts of all those who did assist and Hal Rogers' office showed a great deal of con-

cern. It made me feel good toward our congressional office."

Richard Weeks, a spokesman for the State Dept., declined to comment on the Wyatts' case last Friday, saying they hadn't yet signed a Privacy Act waiver. He could only confirm that all three had been released by the Saudi Arabian government on April 12.

Mrs. Wyatt said Tuesday that her son and grandsons arrived at the Nashville airport at 10:23 Monday night, and her husband met them at the plane. She talked to her son on the phone after he got home and expects to see him within the next few weeks. She noted that all three men were unharmed and the Saudi Arabian government released them after being convinced the Wyatts were not spies. After more than two months, the Wyatt family's ordeal is finally over.

I somehow get the impression, though, that Ronald Wyatt hasn't made his last journey to the Middle East on a religious, archaeological mission. It's right there on the list in his booklet Noah's Ark Found: "Complete the excavation of the Ark of the Covenant, which we have located, and are waiting for His sign for us to bring it out."

non were also found guilty by a Circuit Court jury for unlawful taking of property over \$100 in value.

House floor.

The new fines for drunk driving include the follow-

ing: first offenders could get a \$200 to \$500 fine, 48 hours to 30 days in jail, community service for 2 to 30 days and the possibility of losing their operator's license for up to 6 months. "The suspension of license could be for just 30 days if defendant attends a comprehensive care facility in the state for alcohol counseling," Ford said.

Second time offenders, within a period of five years, would receive a \$350 to \$500 fine and 7 days to 6 months in jail, in addition to 10 days to 6 months of community labor and a suspension of license for 12 months.

Third time offenders, within a period of five years, will receive a \$500 to \$1,000 fine, 30 days to 12 months in jail, 10 days to 12 months community labor and their license suspended for 24 months.

Ford also explained that anyone caught drunk driving under the age of 18, would lose their license until they become 18 and any drunk driver involved in an accident where someone is hurt, would receive a mandatory jail sentence.

The Lottery Bill, which was passed by the Senate and sent to the House was voted against by Ford. Ford not only voted against the bill, he lobbied long and hard against it in the House to see that it was defeated.

"Myself and two Democrats, James Johnson and Joel Ellington, were the cause of the Lottery Bill being defeated," Ford said.

There were a lot of hidden facts about a lottery that he did not like, Ford said, but he did admit that a lottery could possibly raise a lot of money for the state.

In defense of his stand, Ford related a story of a young co-ed at Kentucky State University in Frankfort. The student, who was from Columbus, Ohio, told Ford that ever since Ohio had implemented their lot-

tery, her father had spent \$14 a day on it. The Representative said the girl's mother did not have to work before her father began betting on the lottery. He said that her mother had to work now so that her younger sisters would have clothing and lunch money. "I simply think there are other ways to raise money in the state," Ford said.

One bill that could affect the education system in Rockcastle County that will become law this year, was voted against by Ford.

Academic receivership, a bill that will allow the state Board of Education to "take over" a school system if it does not meet state standards on students' test scores, was passed into law.

"I had some problems with this bill," Ford said, "Living right in the middle of the Republican stronghold in the state, we would be vulnerable to Democrat politics if someone down the line in Frankfort had it in for us." "It had some good points and some bad points," he said, "and I hope it works out for the best."

On the subject of educa-

tion reform, Ford said that he felt the General Assembly did a lot of good things for education during the session.

"I think we got a lot of education reform bills passed without raising taxes," Ford said, "I think these reforms will be beneficial to our school system." One point that Ford mentioned that has not been widely-publicized was the fact that all the state legislators took a 25% pay cut in their interim committee meetings salary. This cut would mean about \$200 a month less for him.

"We felt like it was only fair that we 'bite the bullet' ourselves since we were not able to give the state employees the usual 5% increase," Ford said.

Ford, who is unopposed for re-election, said that he hoped in the next General Assembly a limit on the number of bills that can be introduced will be imposed. He said that over 1,000 bills were introduced and that about 400 of them were passed into law this session.

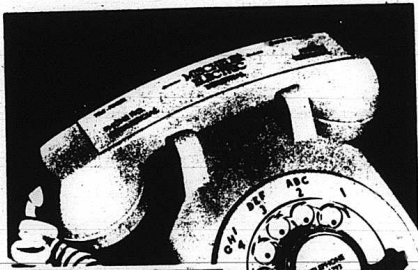

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FmHA seeks change in housing program rule

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is seeking a change in the law that is slowing down the number of loans for single family housing in many rural areas of the county, according to Kentucky FmHA State Director, Kendall Seaton.

Seaton said a law that became effective last December requires the Agency to make 40 percent of its single family housing loans to very low income people.

In testimony before a subcommittee of the U.S. Housing Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs Committee, Wednesday, March 23, 1984, FmHA national administrator, Charles W. Shuman said, "We support efforts to direct the Agency's programs to serve the truly needy. However, a mandate that impairs our ability to serve the needs of rural America is not in anyone's best interest."

Shuman explained, "Many prospective home-

owners, especially in the more rural areas, find themselves in a "Catch 22" situation. If their income is high enough to show repayment ability for an FmHA loan, it is TOO HIGH to fit the very low income category. If their income is LOW ENOUGH to be considered very low income, they can-
