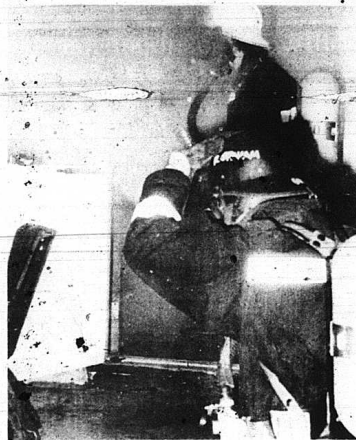
As an Air Force recruiter, Staff Sergeant Ritchey is responsible for the recruitment of qualified people for the Air Force in Butler County.

2nd murder trial began Wednesday

The murder trial of Robert Jackson McCowan of Lameo, began last Wednesday morning in Rockcastle county Circuit court. McCowan is being tried for the July 18th, 1983 murder of Arthur W. Jones of Livingston.

The second murder trial in less than one month began with jury selection around 9 a.m. A spokesperson in the circuit clerk's office said that the trial would more than likely take two days.

A total of nine witnesses have been subpoenaed for the trial. The defendant is represented by the Rockcastle commonwealth attorney's office and McCowan's lawyer, Thelma Keene, of London is representing the state.

The murder charge against McCowan stemmed from the July 18th incident in which the defendant reportedly shot Jones once in the chest with a 16 gauge shotgun at the residence of a four-three old Rockcastle resident. McCowan had apparently given Jones \$15.00 to buy some liquor for him Sunday night while Jones was in Madison County with Ma Keene. When the two returned from Berea, Jones reportedly had only one pint of liquor for McCowan and an argument ensued.

Huckabee said that the shooting occurred around 7 a.m.

The detective said that the circumstances around the shooting were as follows: McCowan had apparently given Jones \$15.00 to buy some liquor for him Sunday night while Jones was in Madison County with Ma Keene. When the two returned from Berea, Jones reportedly had only one pint of liquor for McCowan and an argument ensued.

According to police reports the two men were alone in a bedroom of the house when others in the house heard a gunshot.

Police said that Jones was taken to the Rockcastle County hospital by Ms. Keene and his father, Ovie Jones. He died at approximately 8:15 a.m.

Rockcastle County coroner Bill Dowell said that the autopsy performed on Jones at the U.K. Medical center in Lexington showed that the cause of death to be a single gunshot wound to the chest.

McCowan, 52, was arrested about 10:00 a.m. that same morning in Bond, Ky. in a neighboring Jackson county by state police.

His bond was originally set at \$400,000.00 but was later reduced during a preliminary hearing before the district Judge Dan Venters. Jones has since filled bond. This will be the last trial in Circuit court until August 13th.

Warrant sworn-out over field stone

An unusual warrant has been sworn out in Rockcastle county circuit court for a local stone mason.

Glenn Mullins, a resident of Ohio, who owns a farm in the Calloway section of the county swore out a warrant for theft by unlawful taking of over \$100 against Wendell Renner of Orlando.

The warrant stemmed from an April 13th incident at which time Renner reportedly took field stone from Mullin's farm without

Committee formed to get truck for Brodhead

C.E. Owens, a resident of Brodhead chaired the meeting, which resulted in the appointment of a nine member committee to look into the matter.

The appointments to the committee were as follows: Wallace Proctor, Ottawa area, Evonne Sowder, Brindle Ridge, Loraine Wilson, Gum Sulfur, Wilse Green, Copper Creek, Ray Mack Lunford, Brindle Ridge, Benny Craig, Mareburg, David Ott, Old Mt. Vernon road and James "Doc" Brown, Willala. Deputy fire chief, Deabra Bussell was also put on the committee as chairman.

According to Bussell the committee will be looking for a way to get a fire truck for county runs in western Rockcastle County, the area that the department now serves.

At the present time the fire department is using a 1948 chevrolet open cab truck that, Bussell added, is almost beyond working condition.

Bussell said Tuesday that the fire department was still making county runs but that he did not know how much longer they would be able to.

Members of the fire de-

partment have been to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court on three different occasions concerning the problem but have not received any help as of yet.

They were told to come back for a fourth time to

the May Fiscal Court meeting but Bussell was unsure as to whether they would be in attendance.

The newly formed committee will meet for the first time on April 30th at 7:30 p.m. at the fire station

in Brodhead. Bussell urged anyone that has any suggestions as to what could be done about the problem, to

get in touch with the committee member from their area.

Elderly man drives car through Mary's restaurant at Renfro Valley

Approximately \$25,000 worth of damage was done to Mary's Restaurant at Renfro Valley Sunday morning around 9:30.

Charles Adwell and his wife, Roxie, of Louisville were pulling into the restaurant's parking lot when he lost control of his 1979 Pontiac while attempting to pull into a parking space, according to state police reports.

The Adwell vehicle crashed into the left front side of the restaurant, went completely through the wall and traveled approximately 30 feet before stopping, the report said.

Mary Miller, manager of the restaurant, said that about fifteen people were in the building at the time of the accident but that all were in the private dining area located opposite to the wall that the car hit.

No injuries were sustained in the accident and witnesses at the scene told police that the car sounded like the accelerator was stuck.

Another accident oc-

curred Sunday at approximately 2:30 p.m. on Hwy. 1249 (the Sand Springs Road), 4 miles south of Mt. Vernon.

Police said that Anthony Cameron, 18, of Annville, was traveling south when he failed to negotiate a curve. Cameron left the roadway and traveled some 115 feet before striking a tree about 25 feet from the

road. Cameron suffered a broken leg and was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital where he was treated and released, according to police.

Police said there was no apparent cause for the accident and that Cameron was not traveling at a high rate of speed.

Red Hill man saved from fire by woman

These days, it is sometimes hard to find someone willing to do for others. However, one such Rockcastle resident was lucky enough to be the recipient of much-needed help when his home on Red Hill Road burned to the ground on April 22.

Edward Singleton, an elderly man who lived by himself, was lying only a few feet from the burning dwelling when help arrived in the form of Sandy Clark of Gauley Mountain.

Mrs. Clark happened by Singleton's house that night, saw that it was on fire and noticed that the elderly man was unable to get any farther away from the house.

Singleton had been in a car wreck only days before the fire occurred and, because of injuries he had sustained, he was unable to get far enough away from the fire to be safe.

Mrs. Clark pulled the man from the area and put him into her truck. Then, when others were unable to move a camper that was sitting next to the house, and vulnerable to the fire, she hooked her four-wheel drive vehicle to it and pulled it to safety.

Singleton's home, which is about 7 miles from Livingston, was completely destroyed by the blaze which left him with only the

clothes on his back. He is now living in the small mobile home that Mrs. Clark saved.

Periodically, articles and editorials appear using the catch word "double-dipping," specifically referring to those people retired from military service who then are employed by the government in a civilian capacity.

This oft-used term absolutely defies logic. The term connotes a greedy, if not dishonest person, getting something for nothing.

The "Slogan for the Unthinking" that is factually untrue and emotionally misleading.

To verify this, one must inspect the "Dips" one at a time.

Military retirement is one benefit offered as an incentive to individuals for service during their prime years during which they endure low pay, loss of elements of personal freedom, repeated dislocations and at times extremes of personal danger.

Many of the young military families right now are existing at poverty levels. Civilian counterparts receive three to four times as much as a serviceman for the same work.

The 60,000 killed in Southeast Asia and in the Middle East weren't getting time and a half and triple time on Sundays.

Retirement pay is the compensation justly earned for 20 to 30 years' service under conditions at which most "Dips" would just

It is this country needs a young and capable military staff, by professional corps, then this country must offer its military a reasonable retirement or other suitable (and expensive) incentives.

Most retirees can neither afford nor do they de-

sire to remain idle.

If they perform an honest day's work, should they not be paid for it? Does it really matter whether they are self-employed, work for a private business or for government?

Should we devise a way of handicapping the retiring serviceman so the person who stayed at home will have an easier time in the job market than the retiring serviceman?

If we do, then how much should we compensate the serviceman for this additional loss of freedom?

The use of the term "double-dipping" brands the user as a person who has inadequate knowledge of military life and who has not bothered to reason out the alternatives.

If the nation feels military retirement is a boon-dog, then it should be changed openly and directly.

However, to legislate against a retiree's ability to earn equal pay seems unfair, if not unconstitutional.

Program. Johnson grass seed usually begins to germinate when the soil temperature approaches 70 degrees. New plants arising from seed will start to produce rhizomes 3 to 4 weeks after they emerge from the soil.

Rhizomes are underground stems and will initiate new growth from the soil when temperature has reached 80 degrees. Each rhizome consists of a bud which can produce a new plant. When one bud on a rhizome develops into a plant, it keeps the other buds dormant until the new plant separates from the rhizome, at which time dormant buds may start to develop or produce new plants.

Rhizomes supply food to the developing plant until it is capable of producing new growth on its own. From this point on, the new plant grows in the same manner as a plant that arises from a seed. Rhizome growth is most rapid after a seed head has formed and continues until frost.

New plants produced from rhizomes are considered more difficult to control chemically than those arising from seed because of their size and food supply within the rhizome. Rhizomes can exist in the soil for only a year or two before decaying and, as a result, are not a long-term control problem as are seeds. In general, plants arising from rhizomes emerge from the soil approximately one month before those arising from seed. Knowing and understanding these biological data on Johnson grass is the key to developing a weed management system that will work.

In a survey of several corn fields in Kentucky's 1981 Integrated Pest Management Program, it was noted that the first Johnson grass emerged in Western Kentucky on May 20 in Central Kentucky on June 11. In 1982, these dates were May 17 and May 25. These dates of emergence correspond approximately with the dates at which the soil temperature reached 70 degrees. It should be noted that the corn planting usually starts in early to mid-April in Western Kentucky and late April to early May in Central Kentucky. For herbicides to be successful in controlling Johnson grass, the herbicides must last for several weeks in the soil. Soil temperature and the role it plays in initiating seed germination and rhizome growth are most important for developing sound weed control programs.

For the past several years, two main herbicides have been used for Johnson grass control in corn. These herbicides have provided good season control but of short duration, usually four to six weeks. Taking into account this short duration has been recommended that planting corn in heavily infested Johnson grass fields be delayed until the first week of May, or when soil temperature is in the 60-70 degree range. This would ensure that the maximum amount of herbicide would be in the soil when the Johnson grass seeds germinate. Delaying planting does improve control but another alternative is to use chemicals which last longer in the soil and provide the longest duration of Johnson grass control.

Johnson Grass Control In Corn

Johnson grass has traditionally been the most difficult weed to control in Kentucky's corn crop. In addition, two recent surveys have indicated it to be the most common and troublesome weed to control in all of Kentucky's agronomic crops. Because it is such a difficult weed to control, much weed control research has centered on this species.

Johnson grass is a perennial plant that reproduces by seed and rhizomes. Any weed control program must be oriented to providing control of both of these reproductive systems.

The number of Johnson grass seed produced per plant is variable, but usually 200 to 300 seed per panicle can be expected. With a heavy infestation, several million Johnson grass seed per acre can be produced.

These seed can remain viable in the soil for many years. This seed reservoir in the soil presents the greatest challenge in developing a long term management
