For a week of swimming, boating, sports, crafts and computers, pack up and head to 4-H Camp this summer. Rockcastle County will be camping this year July 16-20.

Last year, 66 4-H'ers from Rockcastle County camped with youngsters from Breathitt, Knott and Clay counties at J.M. Felner 4-H Camp, one of five 4-H camps in the Commonwealth offering a wide variety of summer activities for youngsters age 9 to 19.

4-H'ers had fun and a chance to enjoy the outdoors and learned about computers, crafts and even citizenship.

4-H Camp is not all swimming, volleyball and basketball, although those are three favorites. Computers are fast becoming a favorite indoor pastime for campers. Computers and printers will be available at all Kentucky 4-H camps again this year. After short how-to sessions, campers can try any of 70 mini programs - quizzes, games and puzzles - on such topics as energy, nutrition, Kentucky resources, bicycles and cars, money and even the constellations.

4-H'ers also will have the chance to learn archery, fishing, hiking and nature crafts.

Extension agents and adult leaders will be on hand to supervise young campers. Camp managers, supported in part by the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, coordinate the total camping program.

For many youngsters, staying in cabins with other young people and adults will be their first experience in group living outside their own families. They'll learn a lot about getting along with others. Getting to know

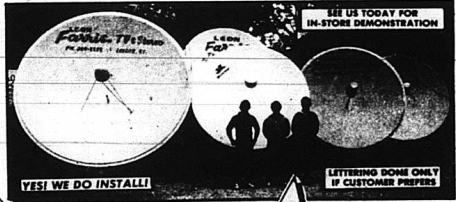

## School called off due to flooding

For the first time since December of 1978, students in the Rockcastle County School System were told to stay home because of flooding in some areas of the county.

According to local weatherman Bud Cox, over 5 inches of rain fell on the county from Saturday morning to Monday morning and a total of 7.21 inches of rain has already fallen during the first nine days of May.

"All of the rain fall has caused several thousand dollars worth of damage to county roads," said Rockcastle County Road Supervisor Paul Hansel. Hansel said that three bridges washed out on one county road and that numerous culverts had been swept away by the water on other county roads.

Hansel said Tuesday that he was preparing an application for aid from the federal government to help fix the roads through the Department of Emergency Services. "We got \$40,000 to help fix the roads in 1978," Hansel said, "but that was in 1978. I don't know when if any, we'll get this time."

Hansel, who is also director of the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad, said that the squad had evacuated David and Susie Kidwell and their family Saturday

night from the Scaffold Cane area after water trapped them in their home. He said they cut down some trees and made a walkway for the Kidwells and three children.

At least one home in the county was struck by lightning Saturday night, Hansel said.

Curtis Vanzant's home at Brush Creek was struck by lightning at 3:45 Sunday morning, according to Mrs. Vanzant, who said that she and her husband were awakened by the jolt. Mrs. Vanzant said that no estimate had been made of the damage as of yet but that the electricity in their home had not been working right since the mishap and that the wall that was hit by lightning was destroyed.

County roads were not the only ones damaged by the flooding. Garland Scott of the Rockcastle County State Highway Garage said Tuesday that just about every state-maintained road in the county had been damaged to some extent.

He listed Highways 25, 490, 1249, 1787 and 1250 as being damaged and said that the cost of repairing the roads would run into the thousands of dollars.

Scott said that most of the damage was done to the roads when the ground was completely saturated by the

rain and mud slides occurred. He also said that some roads just simply fell in. "The high water standing on the roads didn't hurt them as badly as all the rain going into the ground," Scott said. "I would say that it will take us at least a month to get the roads back to the same shape they

were in before all the rain fell."

According to local officials, the flooding was the worst in the southern part of the county near the Rockcastle River, which was the main reason school was called off Monday and Tuesday, according to Rockcastle County Schools

Director Bige Towery.

Towery said that it would have been impossible to have had school Monday but that the water had only five buses blocked Tuesday. "We could have possibly had school Tuesday but we thought it would be on the safe side to call it off,"

Towery said.

With missing these two days, Rockcastle students will not get out of school until June 4th, the latest closing date in several years.

While Rockcastle residents had their trouble, it could have been much

## \$90,000 extra to be realized by school system

Although the Rockcastle County School Board had a twenty-three item agenda presented to them last week during their regular monthly meeting, there was very little major action taken.

Complying with state law, taxpayers in Rockcastle County will have to pay over 7c more per \$100 of assessed value for school tax next year.

Rockcastle County Superintendent Charles B. Parsons told the board members that the legislature had passed a new law which requires all of the school districts in the state to collect at least 15c per \$100 dollar assessed value for the school tax.

Approximately \$90,000 will be realized additionally by the school system and Parsons said that he felt the

board could use the extra money to pay off some of the bonds on the high school. "If we could get some of those bonds paid off, we could possibly begin working on some of the much-needed additions at the grade schools," Parsons told the board.

The motion, which passed unanimously, was brought to the board's attention because the Roundstone P.T.O. is in the process of raising enough mon-

ey to purchase 20 window air conditioners for the school. Board member George Poynter said that he would be more than happy to have all of the county grade schools wired for 220 current if the P.T.A.'s would buy the air conditioners and all the board members agreed.

In the past, numerous parents have complained about the lack of a walkway from the old agricultural building at Broadhead Elementary School to the main building.

The complaint was based on the fact that small children were having to walk in the rain several times a day.

During last week's meeting, the Broadhead P.T.A. sent a request for the board's approval to build a walkway. The board gave

their approval, and the P.T.A. will be footing the bill.

However, the P.T.A. also asked the board for their approval to purchase a gym net, which will be used to divide the gym into two classrooms so that two different gym classes can be held at the same time.

The board voted to go along with the request and pay one-third of the bill with the school paying one-third and the P.T.A. one-third.

The Rockcastle County High School is finally going into the computer age. At last week's meeting, the board voted to advertise for 10 TLS-90 Radio Shack computers and one printer at an estimated cost of \$16,000.

Parsons told the board that new courses would be offered at the high school which will involve the com-

puters, word processing and computer math. Bids will be opened at the next meeting.

The board also discussed other business involving the high school - House Bill 474, passed into law by the recent General Assembly, which does not provide an funds for free textbooks for high school students.

Parsons said that a rental system would be set up at the high school for the textbooks now on hand, at a low cost, and the money realized from this would be used to buy new books. The new books will then also be rented out at a low price.

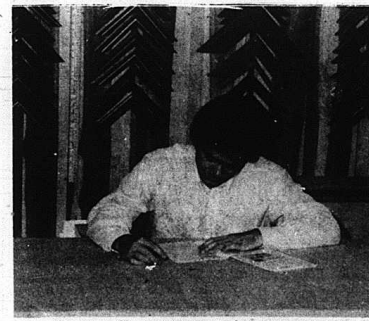



## Farm Bureau asks for import quotas to salvage tobacco program

Farm Bureau officials took a request for tobacco import quotas directly to the White House recently as they intensified their efforts to rejuvenate a sagging domestic tobacco industry.

The delegation, which included Kentucky Farm Bureau President Ray Mackey, met Tuesday, April 24 with Presidential assistant Jack Svahn and three other White House staff members to urge imposition of an immediate cap on leaf imports.

Following the session, Mackey was upbeat, "I'm very much encouraged about our prospects for getting import quotas. We had to take them through an educational process to illustrate the nature of our problems. They seemed to understand what we're talking about."

The White House meeting is the second Washington visit in less than a month for the Farm Bureau group. American Farm Bureau President Robert Delano led a similar excursion April 6 to the office of Agriculture Secretary John

Block, asking that they carry its to President Reagan. Farm Bureau is asking the request for import limits. (Cont. to 11)

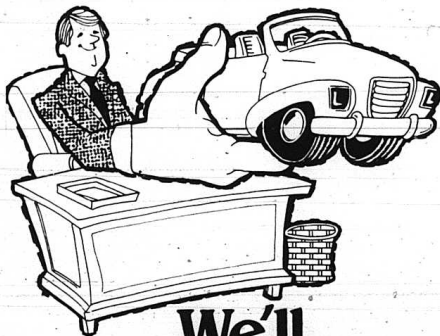
arrangements to persons arranging funerals.

They must disclose itemized price information both over the phone and in writing.

The new law also prohibits misrepresentations about legal, cremation and cemetery requirements pertaining to the disposition of human remains.

Under the law, certain unfair practices are also prohibited, such as embarking for a fee without prior permission; requiring consumers to purchase caskets for direct cremation or conditioning the purchase of any funeral goods or service on the purchase of any other funeral goods or service.

Each funeral home in the county was contacted concerning the new laws and all three report that they are complying with the federal regulations.

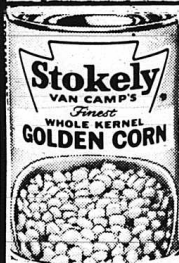

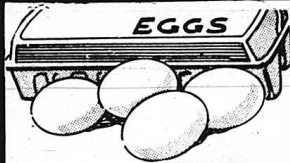

that the burgeoning imports be slowed under provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act, Section 22 of that law empowers the President to cut imports by up to 50 per cent if the shipments are increasing the tobacco price support program.

Mackey said he expects Reagan to reach a decision on the request within the next month. "I don't think they will sit on it too long," he noted. "But obviously it has to wait until the President returns from his China trip. We have been assured that the staff won't make a decision, that the President will be made aware of what's at stake and that he will decide."

Mackey added, "We're talking about saving the program, not just some minor adjustment to relieve some inconvenience. If tobacco farmers could write the President and tell him what it would be like in Kentucky without the program, I believe hundreds or even thousands of letters would help our cause."

Last year was the first in history that U.S. tobacco imports exceeded exports, a massive turnaround in trade balance from just a few years ago. Imports of unmanufactured leaf have increased 141 per cent since 1970 and jumped nearly 30 percent in 1983 alone. Imports totaled 527 million pounds during 1983 for the various types of tobacco, according to the Foreign Agriculture Service, slightly

more than the export total of some 524 million pounds. In 1980, imports amounted to 393 million pounds, well under the 598 million pounds of exports that year. Mackey says the stakes are high in the current campaign to win import relief from the White House. Pool stocks of burley total some 380 million pounds in the Lexington and Knoxville, Tenn., cooperatives, while this year's quota in the eight state belt could produce a crop of 700 million pounds or more.

Last year's drought shortened crop attracted little more than a cold shoulder from company buyers, as more than half the 1983 production failed to bring one over the support price and was consigned to the pool.

Those higher stocks portend a likely increase in growers' net cost assessments to insure against financial losses from storing and processing the excess leaf. That assessment was 5 cents per pound for burley last season, but most observers are predicting a rise of 2 to 5 cents before the 1984 auctions begin.

Farm Bureau is asking that the burgeoning imports be slowed under provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Mackey says the major reason that U.S. burley and flue-cured tobaccos are going unsold in Mexico. A coming shipments of those two tobacco types have soared 350 per cent since

1970, dramatically impacting domestic marketing during a time of increased taxation and a slowdown in smoking. "If a substantial limitation could be placed on imports," Mackey told the Kentucky Farm Bureau Board of Directors recently, "that would do more to revive next year's tobacco markets than any other conceivable action."

Although prices for imported tobacco are difficult to pinpoint, Mackey says much of the foreign grown leaf is being bought by manufacturers at \$1 a pound or less. He said tariffs levied on the imports are almost totally ineffective because of provisions in the law which allow companies to drawback most of the payments when they sell processed tobacco overseas.

Mackey said farmers currently find themselves in a desperate situation, unable to produce tobacco at the price of the cheap imports and solely responsible for the cost of processing and storing their own tobacco which U.S. cigarette makers seem unwilling to buy.

He said 1984 could be a make-or-break year for growers and the 45-year-old tobacco program which limits production and sets price support levels. Without action to limit imports, he fears another large influx of burley and flue-cured leaf into pool storage and a back-breaking assessment to insure against losses.

That picture could brighten considerably if the President grants the Farm Bureau request and slashes imports. The Farm Bureau delegation has asked that imports be limited to 50 per cent of their average during the years 1970 through 1983.

That reduction would amount to an even larger percentage cut from last year's level. Under terms of the Farm Bureau request, imports would drop to around 165 or 170 million pounds for all types of tobacco.

bacco, a 68 percent reduction from the 527 million pounds brought in last year.

Mackey said immediate action on the import question is essential if the 1984 tobacco market is to be salvaged. A lengthy study of the issue by the International Trade Commission, another procedural spelled out in farm program law, would undoubtedly provoke a buying binge of imported leaf by domestic companies if they anticipated a move to curb the purchases.

If that were to happen, and companies filled their warehouses with offshore tobacco, Mackey warned, next year's auctions in Kentucky and other tobacco states could be disasters. And, if a serious push developed to match the cheap imports by legislating lower support prices during the same period, he added, buyers would anticipate the lower prices and the 1984 markets would be virtually destroyed.

Mackey acknowledged growing political support in Kentucky for the Farm Bureau plan. Endorsements of the import quotas have come from Sens. Walter D. Huddleston and Wendell Ford and from Reps. Larry Hopkins and Harold Rogers, among others. Jefferson County Executive Mitch McConnell, Republican candidate for the Senate seat now held by Huddleston, has also pledged his help in lobbying President Reagan for action.

In the tobacco community, both the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, which administers the burley pool in Lexington, and the Burley Auction Warehousing Association have publicly endorsed the Farm Bureau plan. 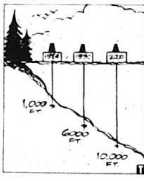
In the year 1990, some of the gasoline in your tank may come from beneath ocean waters that are a mile deep.

Oil is already being produced from beneath 1,000 feet of water in the Gulf of Mexico. It is the world's deepest water production and, according to petroleum engineers, probably the deepest practical with current technology.

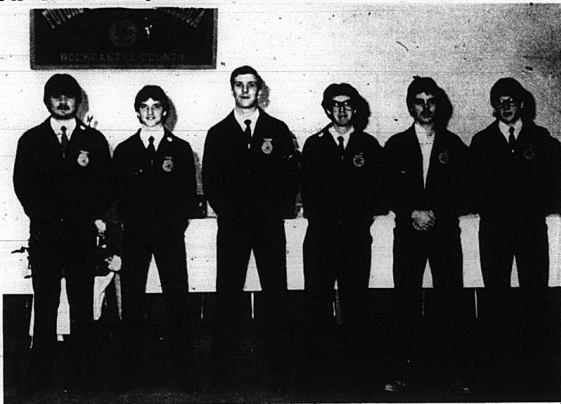

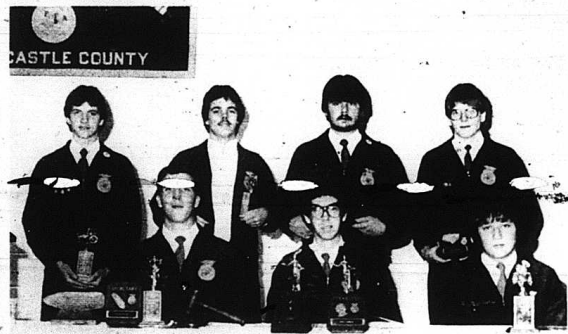

By setting up an annual report on coaches and (doing) special stories on what old coaches are doing now." Good idea, a *Where are they now* format. On the football side, a former All-State at Madisonville High and member of the 1958 Kentucky Wildcats, Bob Butler, suggested last week a number of old time grid

We like to share our good memories don't we?

**People and things.** Football. While searching out candidates for my football *Win List* I have come across a few gems for grid trivia buffs. Fred Clayton coached from 1954 to 1980 including 14 years at Caldwell County. "Best players I ever coached?" "I had an offensive guard on our unbeaten 1963 Caldwell County team: Kerry Curling who was, pound for pound, a very fine player." Curling starred at UK. "One of the best backs I ever had," Clayton said, "was a fullback who went on to Western on scholarship. Joe Jagers. He only weighed about 170, but he was a good one." Ex-Hopkinsville High coach Fleming Thornton, after coaching for almost three decades said, "No body ever enjoyed it more than I did." Walt Green coached at Pineville, Bell County, Hazard, Mid-

dlesboro and Corbin from 1953-67 now lives in Richmond. He had the distinction of coaching Harvey Lee Year at Middlesboro High in the 1960s. Harvey Lee who? Harvey Year is better known today as Lee Majors of *The Fall Guy* on ABC-TV. "Best players Green ever coached?" "The best running back was Roger Bird (UK All-American and offensive back on the Oakland Raiders) at Corbin," he said. "The best linemen were Melton Chandler (Corbin High) and Greg Page (Middlesboro)." Page was the first black football player to sign a football scholarship at Kentucky. He died of a practice field injury while at UK in his

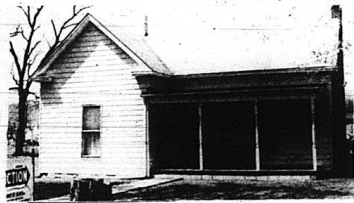

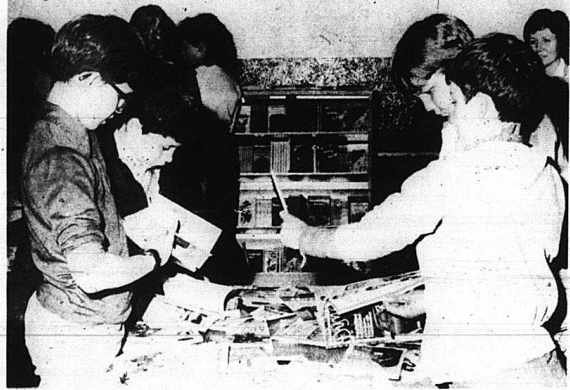

## NOTICE OF STATION TRINALIZATION

Seaboard System Railroad ("SBD") hereby gives notice that on June 15, 1984, it intends to trinalize the Agency Station of Frankfort, Kentucky and the dualized Agency Station of Richmond/Berea, Kentucky into the Transportation Service Center located at Lexington, Kentucky. Also included in the agency trinalization will be the following non-agency stations, located in the Commonwealth of Kentucky: Sam Clay, West Frankfort, Cliffside, Jett, Ft. Estill, Berea College, Snider, Roundstone, Wildie and Mullins.

The proposed trinalization would allow all agency functions to be performed by SBD's agent presently based at the Transportation Service Center at Lexington, Kentucky. The Lexington Transportation Service Center is equipped with a sophisticated IBM 3276 computer configuration which connects to and interfaces with SBD's host computer at Jacksonville, Florida. Rail customers at all involved locations will be given a toll free telephone number with which to contact the trinalized agency at Lexington. In addition, the trinalized agent will be provided with a two-way radio equipped automobile in order to call upon rail customers as needed.

The proposed trinalization does not contemplate abandonment or reduction of rail service. It will be implemented in order to provide a more modern and efficient customer service operation, with attendant cost savings to SBD. In addition, trinalizing the agency functions into the Transportation Service Center at Lexington will allow SBD to dispose of unneeded station depot buildings pursuant to managerial discretion. In that regard, the Commonwealth of Kentucky has expressed interest in purchasing SBD's station building at Frankfort, Kentucky, which building is located in close proximity to the State Office Building in that city.

A public contact program has been completed, with SBD's having called upon all rail shippers and interested public officials, at the above mentioned locations. To date, there is no known opposition to the proposed trinalization. In any event, the general and shipping public have a right to be heard on the proposal. ate in having this talented person with so much experience and enthusiasm directing our summer production. I can't say enough good things about him."

Last summer's play "By Hex" was also directed by a former resident, Brian Holman, from the Brodhead area. Mrs. Cox said, "Brian is a college student and that was his first attempt at directing. He did a great job and it was a complete success as far as we're concerned."

The Rockcastle Council for the Arts is presently operating on a matching challenge grant of \$1,150 from the Kentucky Arts Council. To date, the council members have been able to raise \$900 from churches, some businesses and mostly concerned individuals who have a desire to support the arts in the community. Mrs. Cox pointed out that they

still have until the first of June to raise the \$250 needed to get the full amount of the allotted grant, and she should be contacted if anyone wants to make a donation.

One of the first things Penso did as the director was to select a play. "The council members gave me a stack of scripts to read over and, after meeting with them a couple of times, I got a feel of what I thought they were wanting. And I also contacted some friends and got some recommendations."

His choice, "One Upon a Mattress," is one of his favorite musicals and it met with the approval of the council members. Penso sat at the kitchen table in his parents' (Harvey and Emily Penso) home and expressed his delight with "Once Upon a Mattress."

"It's exactly tailor-made for this situation, even though it's going to be cut down for our purposes. The show is set up to be done

with 8 or 10. It's a parody of the story of the prince and the pea."

He went on, "This is a full-fledged musical, ordered from the Rogers and Hammerstein music library. A lot of colleges and community theaters do it and it had a nice, long run on Broadway. It's the perfect musical."

The auditions for "Once Upon a Mattress" have been set for Monday, May 14 at 7 p.m. in the Mt. Vernon Elementary School gym. Penso stressed that the play has parts for all age groups, from the fifth grade on up. He would like to see some interested adults play the mature roles.

"I don't want to scare anybody away from auditions," said Penso. "If you can walk and talk and count, you can handle the auditions. Anyone interested in being in the show doesn't have to prepare an audition piece, even though if they want to I'll be more than happy. And I'm not just looking for actors. I need anybody that's interested in working on costumes or the set or photography or art work."

"This is a community endeavor. There's Livingston, Roundstone, Brodhead and Mt. Vernon and I'd love to see as many from one place as the other. Even if anyone just wants to come and sit and watch to see what we're doing, that would show some interest."

After listening to his own excited comments about the play, Penso said, "All of this is very idealistic I know, but I'm shooting for the moon. I'm very enthusiastic about it."

Once the cast is selected, rehearsal will begin on Monday, June 4. Although it hasn't been decided which facility will be used for rehearsals, Penso hopes to have an entire rehearsal schedule ready by the first practice session.

The play has been scheduled so that it won't interfere with the county's 7-4-H camp. Although the first couple of weeks will involve some fast-paced rehearsals, Penso explained that will let up some after a couple of production numbers are polished enough to be taken to county groups for occasional performances.

After that, not everyone will be at every rehearsal and the scheduling will be more flexible. The dates for the play have been set for July 26 and 27 at 7:30 p.m. and on July 29, there will be a Sunday matinee at 2:30 p.m. The play will also be performed on August 2 and 3 at 7:30 p.m. All shows will be at the Red Barn in Renton Valley.

Upon a Mattress is good family entertainment, according to Penso. It's a play that children will enjoy, but it will undoubtedly have a great appeal for adults. "It's a love story with dance, costume and lights set in the medieval period," he said.

And he intends to make the rehearsals enjoyable for everyone involved. "At the rehearsals we'll be playing and dressing up and being with friends. If someone's coming with the idea of not having fun then they might as well stay home."

If making the play fun to produce is Penso's first priority, then keeping "costs lower than minimal" is his second. He said, "This is one thing that isn't going to cost the individual a cent to be involved in. Working in the business side of the theatre has opened my eyes to a lot of things; we can cut costs."

In probing Penso about his background in the theatre, he asked him when he developed a desire to act. "I don't remember not," he said strongly and laughed. "This desire led him to perform in high school dramas, summer theatre and college productions until he left Cumberland College with a degree in art education. Penso had graduated from Mt. Vernon High School in 1972 after moving to this area with his parents and two brothers, Jerry and David, from Valdosta, Ga.

After leaving Cumberland, Penso got a job with a touring company out of Scottsdale, Ariz. He toured with them for a year, playing the part of "Young Tom Edison." He then got a job as actor and instructor at the Nashville Academy Theatre, where he worked for three years until his contract was up last fall. That's when he decided to take a break for a while a come home.

But his leaving the theatre temporarily doesn't mean that it's lost its appeal for Penso. "It's the only thing that really stimulates me," he noted. "It's the environment more than anything else. Does theatre get in your blood? I guess so because it's always been there and some form of it." Penso played "The Legend of Daniel Boone" in Harrodsburg for four summers, which ran on the week nights while the cast rehearsed for what is called a canteen show that was performed on the week end. The canteen show is an entirely different play from the regular season's production and it gave the actors in "Legend" a chance to explore other areas of the theatre.

For Penso, it was directing, something that he didn't know how to do at first. But he is very comfortable with directing now, and he has his own ideas about the art.

direct you really take a small idea and nourish it. Plus, you're going to reach a lot of people. I much prefer directing musicals because they're happy."

Penso said the theatre will always be there and he hasn't yet made plans to leave Mt. Vernon. I asked where he would go when he does. "Probably a four-room cabin on Sand Hill. He joked in the meantime, he will be running the new video shop that's opened in Mt. Vernon owned by David Penso and John Hess Parsons.

Even though Penso was talking calmly in blue jeans and a plaid flannel shirt, it wasn't hard to picture the way he looked in a period costume when I saw him on stage in "The Legend of Daniel Boone" several years ago.

The "prodigal actor" has almost been a stranger in the county for many years, but his personality may become well known now that he's back. And, after "Once Upon a Mattress," who knows?

"If we get a theatre built in Mt. Vernon I may stay here," he said wryly. "If you're interested in becoming a member of the Rockcastle Council for the Arts, making a donation or auditioning for the upcoming musical, then contact Martha Cox in Mt. Vernon for more information. It could be the beginning of a real summer."

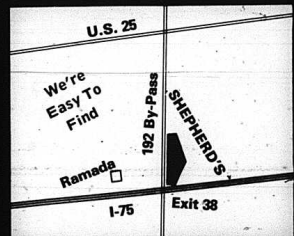

## Two local students honored at Berea

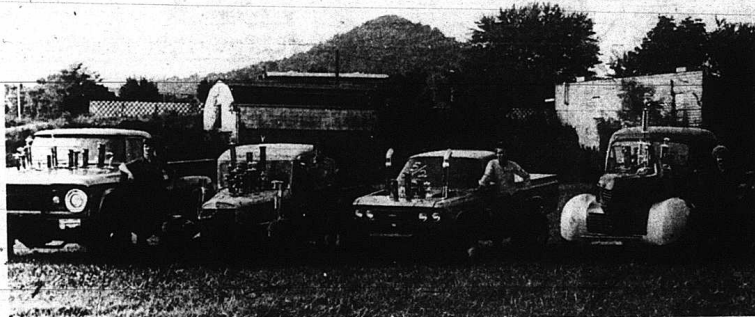
Two Rockcastle County High School graduates received awards at the Berea College Labor Day awards ceremony.

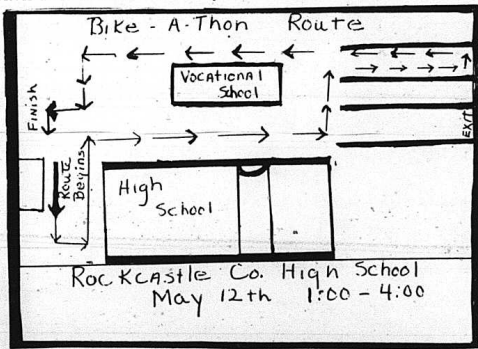

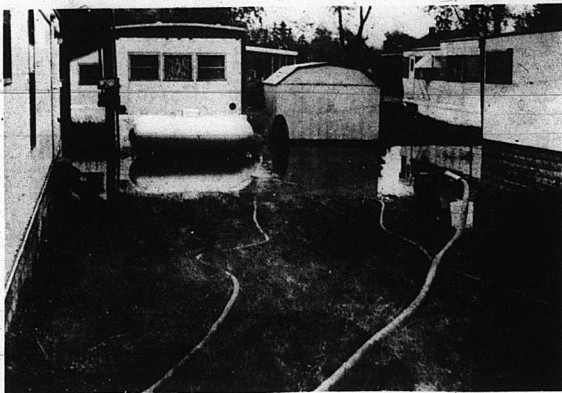

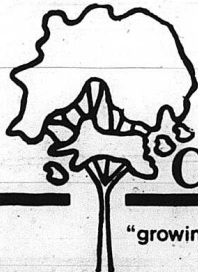

All your RECC demand measures the rate at which consumers use energy over a specific period of time.

For example, a family returns home from vacation, one snowy day in January. Here's how their increased demand for electricity is recorded at their RECC:

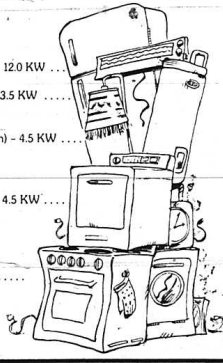

- Heating (was turned up) - 12.0 KW
- Lights, TV, etc. - 3.5 KW
- Hot Water (shower turned on) - 4.5 KW
- Load of laundry - 4.5 KW

From the time the family walked in their front door, their demand for electricity jumped a staggering 22.5 kilowatts. 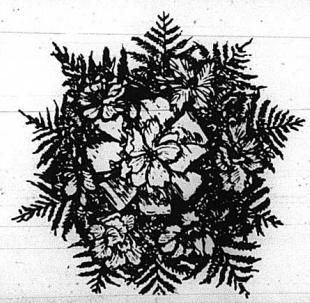

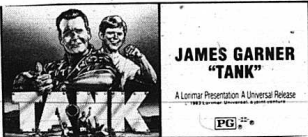

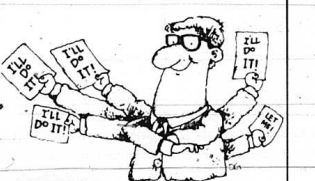
