



which results in actual class sizes ranging up to 40 stu-dents, should not be looked upon as a goal, but as a base on which to build. Other successful school sys-tems use local funds to low-er student-teacher ratios and er student-teacher ratios and to provide support and en-richment services such as counselors and music and art programs. We are tax-payers have the right to see our taxes, spent in this way also, and to see our children have advantages equal to also, and to see our children have advantages equal to those in Danville, Lexington and Louisville.
