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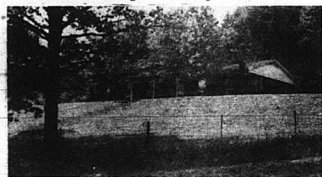

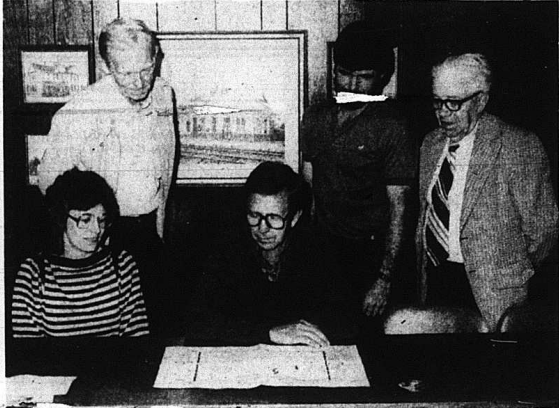

City will apply for \$750,000 grant; Collinsworth resigns

For at least the last eight years, the City of Mt. Vernon has applied for a Community Development Block Grant to be used to upgrade the Fairground Hill area of Mt. Vernon.

During Monday night's regularly scheduled monthly meeting, the council once again gave their approval for an application to be submitted to the state by Will-Lender Associates of Berea, who is handling the application.

If approved, the \$750,000 grant would be used to lay sewer lines, install some bathrooms in private houses and generally upgrade the area as a whole.

The city has always been turned down in the past and Mayor Roland Mullins said that he was unsure

of how long it would take for the city to find out anything on the application this time.

One project that the city has already been funded for is the renovation of the sewer plant. During the meeting, the question was raised as to the possibility of the city using some of the money from the Fairground Hill Block Grant, if it is approved, to help them meet their total of \$300,000 needed to match the \$900,000 grant for the sewer project. The city must have their matching money before the government will release the grant.

However, Diane Hayes of Will-Lender told the Council that this was not possible since grant money cannot be used for any purpose other than the one proposed in the funded project.

Mayor Mullins said the city had part of the matching funds on hand and would borrow the money needed, if necessary, to reach the \$300,000 goal. Renovation on the sewer plant is expected to begin sometime this fall.

During the meeting, city policeman Dicky Collinsworth submitted his resignation in the form of a letter to the council, thus creating an opening on the force.

At first, the council asked Collinsworth if he could work for two more weeks and be paid for the two week vacation that he had coming.

Collinsworth agreed to do that so that it would not put the rest of the police force in jeopardy. However, after the meeting, police chief Ronnie Hurd told Collinsworth that it would be alright to quit immediately.

In his letter to the council, Collinsworth had resigned effective May 15th.

City Clerk Mary McClure said Tuesday that a replacement for Collinsworth would probably be hired by the council around May 30th.

Mrs. Mabel Reppert of Hummel sent a letter to the council meeting protesting the city's handling of the water run-off from Lake Linville during the recent heavy rainfall in the county.

Mrs. Reppert's letter read that she did not appreciate the city letting the water out of the lake when they did because it caused her home to be cut-off by the water.

Superintendent Matt Powell told the council that there was no way that water could be let out of the lake by the city and that this was not the first time that heavy rain had caused flooding in that area of the county.

Powell was told by the council to contact Mrs. Reppert and explain the situation.

Several new light poles will be put up in the city, limits in the near future and at Monday night's meeting.

Rockcastle County Health Fair is set for June 2nd

How would you like to receive over \$150 of health services absolutely free?

Then plan to bring your family to the Rockcastle County Health Fair that will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, June 2. The fair will be located at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School gymnasium and classrooms.

The Health Fair will be sponsored by the Rockcastle County Hospital in cooperation with the various community health services in the county who want to participate.

Local health professionals will be volunteering their services the day of the Fair, along with several high school students and area residents.

The Health Fair is open to the public and everyone is invited to take advantage of the many free health tests and screenings that will be offered. Some of these tests may not be as familiar as others and the following explains what the tests are for:

Scoliosis is a painless test that checks for an abnormal curvature of the spine. It takes from 15 to 30 minutes.

Pap smear tests will be performed by nurses from the county's Health Department who will check women for cancer of the cervix. Women should have this test at least once every year.

The Health Department nurses will also offer breast exams which check for cysts and lumps in the breasts that could possibly be malignant.

Oral cancer screenings will be done by local dentists and an orthodontist. This is a painless visual exam of the soft tissues of the mouth as well as a visual exam of the neck and head.

Children's dental screening will be available and is a quick exam of a child's teeth that tells whether or not the parents need to get dental treatment for the child.

Two blood tests will be conducted by hospital laboratory technologists. One

quick finger stick will give enough blood for an anemia and blood sugar test. The anemia test is to see whether a person has enough iron in their blood. The blood sugar test tells whether the person has any indications of diabetes.

A urine test will reveal if a person has any indications of diabetes as well as tell if they have protein, blood or bilirubin in their urine.

The pulmonary function exam tests for asthma and emphysema. The person being tested blows into a machine and a reading can be had in two to three minutes.

There will also be two tests to check a person's eyes. The visual acuity test measures the sharpness of the eyes. The **glaucoma** test is done to see if the person may have one of the most common and severe eye disorders in people over 60.

A hearing test will be offered to determine how well a person hears. And a speech test is available to determine if a person has any communicative disorders.

Height, weight and blood pressure tests will also be available.

Besides the tests, there will be booths with health displays and information. Some of the agencies having booths will be the American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, Sowder Nursing Home and Rockcastle County Extension.

John Rush will hold CPR demonstrations several times during the day and the state police will have a booth in the afternoon with information on children's car seats and on narcotics. Local physicians will have a booth for referral and counseling and one to supply information on medications.

Citizens Bank has applied for approval to build branch bank

Citizens Bank in Brodhead has plans to build the first-ever branch bank in Rockcastle County.

Keith Smith, vice president in charge of the project, said Tuesday that he had submitted an application to the Kentucky Banking Commission approximately one month ago and that the application was being reviewed at the present time.

"We should know if we have been approved or

turned down in approximately 60 days," Smith said. The Department of Banking and Securities in Frankfort is processing the application, according to Smith.

If the application is approved, Smith said the new branch will be located on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon, adjacent to the Methodist Church and that it will eventually be a full-service branch. The lot that the

branch will be built on was bought by the bank in 1979 at public auction.

"We have applied for the approval to build this branch because we want to serve our customers in that part of the county better," Smith said.

The vice president also said that if the application is approved, the bank will be hiring additional people. "We're not sure how many new jobs this branch could create," Smith said, "but we will have to add some additional people."

"If the application is approved, we are hoping that we can open the branch around the first of 1985," Smith said Monday, "but that is really just a guess."

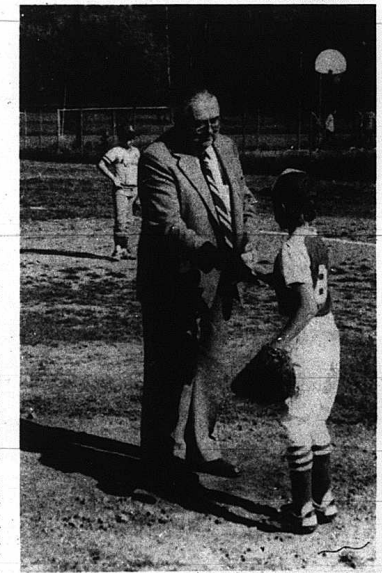

opposed to paying the extra tax assessment if the money will be used to improve our schools.
However, we are opposed to using this new money for buildings or maintenance. We feel the budget for capital outlay and maintenance should cover this, just as it would have without the new funds. This new local money should be used instead to make an impact on the quality of instruction in the classroom.
It is time we began to put the emphasis where it will count: on people. The state funding of a student-teacher ratio of 27 to 1,

which results in actual class sizes ranging up to 40 students, should not be looked upon as a goal, but as a line on which to build. Other successful school systems use local funds to lower student-teacher ratios and to provide support and enrichment services such as counselors and music and art programs. We are taxpayers have the right to see our taxes spent in this way also, and to see our children have advantages equal to those in Danville, Lexington and Louisville. We have plenty of qualified, creative, dedicated teachers - many of them waiting for

a job. If we care about students and teachers; if we want to improve the quality of education in Rockcastle County, this is one sure way to begin.

\$90,000 would pay the salaries of at least six teachers in the county. This would allow one new teacher for each elementary school and one for the high school, plus one for an enrichment area or a second counselor for the four elementary schools. It would be a beginning toward reducing class size, which is one of the main differences between successful schools and poorer ones. Children in too-large classes do not get the individual attention they need in order to master basic skills. This is not fair to the students or the teachers.

As a parent whose children have recently been in the high school, I know how crowded some of the classes there are, especially freshman classes. I also know that many elementary classrooms are overcrowded; one example is a first grade teacher at Broadhead who has 28 students. Educators agree that first grade classrooms should not be larger than 20-22 students. 28 in one first grade classroom is not a good situation for the teacher or the students.

Our schools are important to every citizen in Rockcastle county, whether or not we have children of our own now in school. Our ability to attract business and industry, they affect the kind of citizens we will have when today's students become adults; in short, they affect the quality of life here. Our elementary school PTA's are doing a great job of showing what can be done when parents get involved in schools. So let's get involved.

I have expressed my opinion to the school board representatives. I would like to see an area. If you agree that these new funds should be used to make an impact on classroom instruction, please contact your representative and let your views be known. If you have a better idea, let that be known, too. If we do nothing, we have no right to complain.

The Fearful

Did you know that "the fearful" are listed right along with the unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and scoorners, and idolaters and all liars in Revelation 21:8? And what's more, John said that all these "shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone."

Two big game hunters in Alaska were searching for bear. The first day out they had no sooner entered the forest than they saw the tracks left by a huge grizzly. One hunter looked at the other and said, "Why don't you go that way and see where he is." I'll go this way and see where he came from!" He knew the most dangerous of all emotions - FEAR!

Jesus told the story of three men who were given money to invest while their master was away. Two did and were rewarded, but the third man buried his money in the ground and used the excuse, "And I was afraid, and went and hid thy talent in the earth" (Matt. 25:25). That same emotion haunts us today.

We are afraid to talk to someone concerning spiritual matters or even invite them to worship services of the church.

2. We are afraid to

make a commitment to help in an area of work in the church.

3. We are afraid to admit that we attend a church, let alone love Jesus and want to serve Him.

Why fear? What is the answer? Knowing this is a problem, Jesus said to His disciples, "Do not be afraid-trust in God, trust also in me" (John 14:1-3). Always trust in God and Christ. Despite your fears, doubts and weaknesses do what God says. Each time you obey, you show trust in Him; and each time you do makes it easier to rid yourself of fear.

Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15), and John said, "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love" (1 John 4:18).

The solution for fear of God's judgment is preparation--obedience. When one believes and is baptized (Mk. 16:16), and lives faithfully serving the Lord in this life (Rev. 2:10), he has NOTHING to fear!
