



If the first draft of the 1984-85 budget for the opera-tion of Rockcastle County is 94 Hö the link of milt op mile ion of Rockstile County is correct, the county govern-ment will have almost \$60,000 less to spend next year than it did in fiscal year 1983-84. 

Soil conservation Service Conservation tillage in soil conservation refers to the use of a variety of pra-tices in which the soil is managed or prepared for managed or prepared for Tillage is a collective term for most practices that dif-fer from conventional plow-ing methods. Practices such as No-till, minimum till, stubble use are all components of Conservation Tillage and are used widely in Rockcas-tle County. It is estimated that approximately 65% of

the corn acreage in Rockcas-tif County is produced through some method of Conservation Tillage. Soil loss in Rockcastle Conty on range in excess of the conserva-icids. However, on compar-able fields where conserva-able fields where conserva-tion tillage is used, the soil loss is held to aminimum of 5 tons or less, which is an acceptable level. Soil loss on cropland occurs from both wind and water damage. Conventional Tillage allows some stubble to remain out the soil surface to protect the soil aurace to protect the torm both wind and Technical Assistance is


New ambulance arrives
