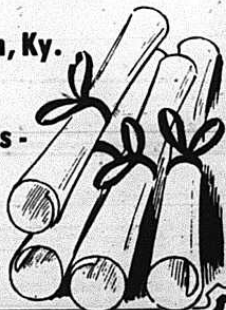

## Rockcastle County Fiscal court budget will exceed \$850,000

If the first draft of the 1984-85 budget for the operation of Rockcastle County is correct, the county government will have almost \$60,000 less to spend next year than it did in fiscal year 1983-84. And, the shortfall amounts to a \$150,000 drop over fiscal year 1982-83, according to figures presented to the fiscal court during a public hearing last Thursday afternoon.

Even with the projected shortfall, the county still has a budget of over \$850,000 with the general fund receiving and using the biggest allotment of funds - \$376,623. The general fund is made up of property tax monies and Revenue Sharing funds the county receives from the federal government.

While two separate accounts are set-up and different items paid with the monies, it is all for the general running of county government.

The county's road department also takes a big chunk of the budget with \$361,500 appropriated for next fiscal year. However, this is almost \$2,000 less than was spent on roads during the 1983-84 fiscal year.

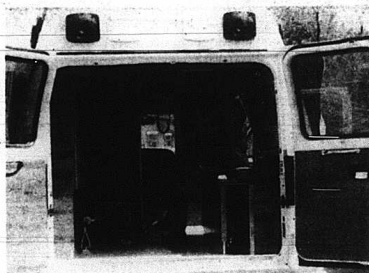
State law requires that the county jail budget be included in the county's budget and this figure makes the county look as if they have more money than they actually have.

This year's jail budget will be over \$114,000 and, if possible, the county plans to spend an additional \$40,000 to make the present facility meet state specifications.

A public hearing is held in order for residents to voice their opinion. However, at Thursday afternoon's, no one except those connected with county government

was present. But, the public will have another chance since another Public Hearing on the budget is slated for Tuesday, June 5 at 10 a.m. At that time, citizens will be given an opportunity to make written or oral comments regarding the proposed annual budget and

the use of anticipated revenues. An complete breakdown of the proposed expenditures for the 1984-85 fiscal year can be found on page 11 of this week's Signal as well as the legal notice of the proposed budget.

There are several ingredients to a successful Christian Service Camp. Among these are Christian fellowship, Bible study, exciting activities, young people, good food, campfires and the spirit of Christ.

The Kentucky Christian Assembly at Brodhead has all of these and more.

The isolated campgrounds are a unique asset to Rockcastle County and evolved from an idea by the

Christian Men's Fellowship, a voluntary group of men from area Christian Churches. During the summer of 1963, the fellowship paid the tuition of two campers to go to church camp. When the two were baptized during that week, the men realized the value of Christian Service camp.

In May of the next year, the fellowship had an opportunity to purchase the Three Links Bible Camp near Climax, but there were several problems involved with this abandoned camp, such as water, sanitation, and the cost of the project.

It was at this time that Clay Colson of the Brodhead Christian Church offered to give a 99-year rent-free lease on some property he owned near Brodhead. A group of men visited the site and were impressed with the location, view and possibilities, and decided to build their own camp there. The project was undertaken and in June 1984, trustees were appointed and incorporation papers drawn up.

The first trustees for the camp were B.F. Dailey of Livingston, James Taylor of Buckeye, C.B. Owens of Brodhead and Billy Hiatt of Wildie. Logan Bryant of Mt. Vernon was shortly replaced by Estill McBee.

## Proposed landfill being held up by local complaint

Had a controversy not arose over the new landfill, construction would likely already be underway, according to County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper.

The landfill, which is to be built in the Mullins Station area of the county, was proposed after the county fiscal court learned that the landfill they were using owned by William K. Bullen, would no longer be available to them.

County surveyor Charles Alfred Mullins did the engineering work on the project, which was submitted to Frankfort for state approval during the latter part of 1983.

"Everything was going fine," Judge Jasper said. "The plans had already approved the plans and published the notices that the landfill was going to be built and the complaint was submitted and we are going to have to go to Frankfort for a public hearing today (Tuesday)," he added.

The complaint was submitted by Appalachia-Science in the Public Interest, a Livingston-based organization which coincides with the Rockcastle Resource Center.

The complaint, which was sent to the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, Division of Waste Management, alleged that the proposed landfill site would be located above a bedrock of porous limestone which would make the local water system, "extremely fragile and susceptible to pollution."

The complaint further claims that long-term and short-term health hazards are possible if the landfill is opened and a public hearing with state and county officials was requested.

The hearing was granted and held Tuesday and five questions were raised Appalachia-Science:

Would the landfill endanger the health of local residents not served by city

water, their complaint, Appalachia-Science stated that the county claimed they did not see a possible health problem because most residents are served by city water. However, the organization's staff environmentalist, Peter Nestle, who prepared the complaint, stated, "We do not think that the fact that most residents are served by city water is adequate justification for the operation of a landfill in the proposed area."

The second question raised concerned the possible danger to Livingston's water supply. Also in question by Appalachia-Science is whether or not the water at the site, and in local communities, will be tested for contaminants before the landfill is allowed to open as well as adequate testing of the water afterwards and if these results will be available for public review.

Appalachia-Science is also seeking guarantees such as the safeguarding of the "fragile water supply" through the use of the best available technology and/or denial of an operating permit, if such construction still fails to guarantee safe drinking water for Livingston.

Among other guarantees sought by the organization include no dumping of toxic or hazardous materials, legally or illegally, on the site, as Appalachia-Science alleges had occurred in

other local communities. A group of county officials, including several of the magistrates and the County Judge, as well as some local attorneys, attended the hearing Tuesday. Joe Clark said that he did not think that Appalachia-Science in the Public Interest had a case, because the old landfill, used by the county for 17 years, was in the same general location as the new one would be and that every time the water was tested at Livingston, it was 98% pure.

"I don't see where there is any problem with this landfill," Clark said, "the only thing that separates the old landfill from the new one is a bridge and we have never had any water problems from the old dump site."

The results of this hearing are not known. However, Magistrate Donald Brown, who attended the hearing, said Tuesday that a public hearing would also be held in the county at a later date.

The site of the landfill is located on a farm owned by Emmitt Foster which runs adjacent to Crooked Creek. Crooked Creek runs into Roundstone Creek which dumps into the castles River at Livingston. The river is where Livingston residents get their water supply.

The torch that will be used to light the Olympic Flame in Los Angeles at the beginning of the Olympic Games this summer, will be carried through Mt. Vernon on that date by runner.

On that Monday morning, the run will begin at Keeneland Race Track in Lexington and will travel U.S. 25 into Tennessee.

Although no local runners will carry the torch, one young woman from Berea will take part in the 2,000 mile run, which originated in New York City.

She is scheduled to pick up the torch in Berea at approximately 8 p.m. and carry it to Berea.

## Church Camp plays important role in lives of local youth

was chosen at their first meeting on June 22, 1964. Kentucky was chosen because the men realized the facilities would also be used by people outside of Rockcastle County and Assembly was chosen because they thought the ground would be used for more activities than just Christian Service Camp.

By Christmas of 1964, the Christian Churches in the county were supporting the project, Brodhead, Buckeye, Livingston, Mt. Vernon and Wildie, had donated almost \$1500 to be given work on the campgrounds. A gravel road was the first priority with a main building, housing, kitchen and dining hall coming next. A men's dorm and women's dorm followed, and then a canteen and three classroom shelters were added later. A majority of the early building was done by volunteers from the Christian churches.

To get to the Kentucky Christian Assembly, you make a right turn at Sowder Nursing Home in Berea. If you are traveling west, you then turn left across a bridge after almost a mile and follow a gravel road to the top of the hill. The camp is set on a knoll overlooking distant Crab Orchard. Although it wasn't the fellowship's original intention to have the camp on the isolated Colson's donation of the land greatly hastened the building of the camp.

The dedication ceremony for the Assembly was held on October 17, 1965, and the first weeks of camp sometime around the summer of 1966.

James E. Taylor of the Buckeye Christian Church was an original board member and trustee of the camp. He explained why the churches decided to build the Assembly. "The purpose of the camp is to promote Christianity, and it's dedicated mainly to young people. I know there's been a lot of hard work and dedication gone into it and it's come a long way. Taylor has been the camp photographer for almost 15 years.

Estill McBee of the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon was also an original trustee. "The camp has done extra well," he said. "The churches are supporting it more now because we're seeing some results of it. The children who work in the first camp have grown up, and now speak well of it."

McBee was treasurer for the camp for a while and he noted that not only did the Christian churches in the county contribute, but other area churches donated mon-

ey also. "Many, many, many gave me money. I'm pleased with the support of the churches and I think that camp has been one of the most wonderful things that's happened to this county."

Lynnell Hammons, 23, is also from the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon, and has attended the camp along with her two brothers and sister. "I've been going to camp from the first retreat they ever had. I began in the fourth grade." Miss Hammons has only missed camp a couple of years and she served last summer as counselor.

"I love the camp so much," she said. "I think it's important for the kids to get away, separate themselves from the world, and get their priorities and spiritual values straightened out." The spiritual discipline she learned at camp has had a lasting effect. "I was a better counsellor because I know what the camp meant to me and I wanted it to be an ongoing thing with other generations of kids."

Most of the activities at the Assembly are scheduled during the warm months, from May to October. Besides the Christian Service Camp, the grounds host separate retreats for men, women, high school

## Controlling Soil Erosion with Conservation Tillage

Conservation tillage in soil conservation refers to the use of a variety of practices in which the soil is managed or prepared for planting. Conservation Tillage is a collective term for most practices that differ from conventional plowing methods.

Practices such as No-till, minimum till, stubble mulching and crop residue use are all components of Conservation Tillage and are used widely in Rockcastle County. It is estimated that approximately 65% of

the corn acreage in Rockcastle County is produced through some method of Conservation Tillage.

Soil loss in Rockcastle County can range in excess of 15-20 tons per acre on some conventional plowed fields. However, on comparable fields where conservation tillage is used, the soil loss is held to a minimum of 5 tons or less, which is an acceptable level. Soil loss on cropland occurs from both wind and water damage. Conventional Tillage allows some stubble to remain on the soil surface to protect the soil from both wind and water.

Technical Assistance is provided to land users in the Rockcastle Conservation District through the use of the Universal Soil Loss Equation (USLE). This equation can be used to estimate soil loss on croplands under a wide range of management alternatives. Through the Soil Conservation Service, assistance can be given to landowners by the development of Conservation Plans to plan good cropping systems to minimize soil loss. 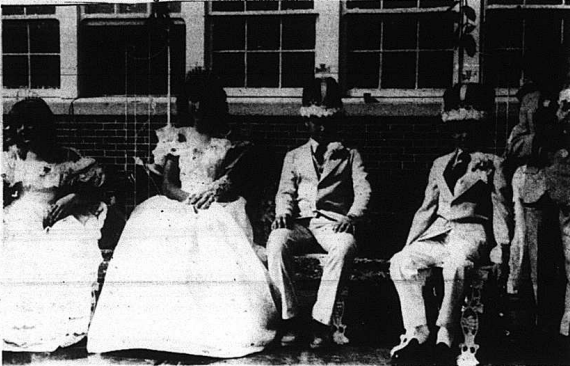

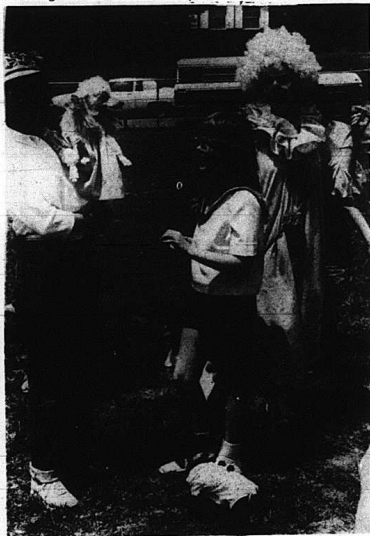

# Apply for SS number first

People in the Rockcastle County area who expect to need a Social Security number should remember to apply for it before they must have the number, Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

People should apply for a number at least 3 weeks before the number is needed. This length of time is down from the 4 to 6 weeks it used to take, Anderson said. The reduction in time has taken place because Social Security is in the process of modernizing its computer systems. This is one of the first results of this effort.

When applying, a person must have evidence of age, identity, and citizenship or legal alien status, Anderson said. In addition, a person 18 or older who is applying for the number the first time must appear in person.

or hospital record of birth or a religious record of birth or baptism established before age 5. Only if these records do not exist should other evidence be submitted.

Evidence of identity can be any document showing identifying data such as physical description, photograph or signature. Examples include driver's license, voter's registration, school record, report card, identification card, marriage record, divorce decree, draft card, military ID, building pass, baby's hospital wrist band, adoption record or organization membership.

People applying for a duplicate card to replace one lost must provide evidence of identity. Also, a person who wants to change her or his name in Social Security records must provide evidence of identity under both old and new names. A person born outside the U.S. must submit evidence of current U.S. ci-

tizenship or legal alien status.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency are acceptable.

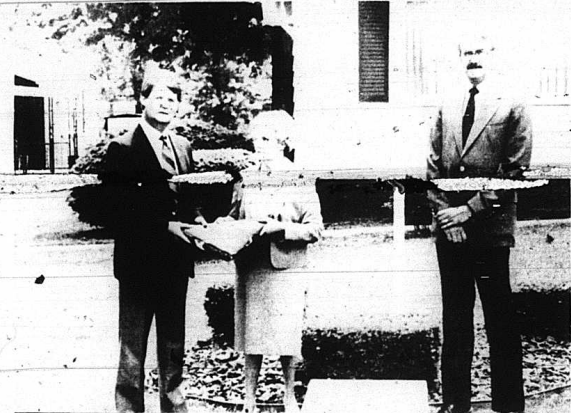

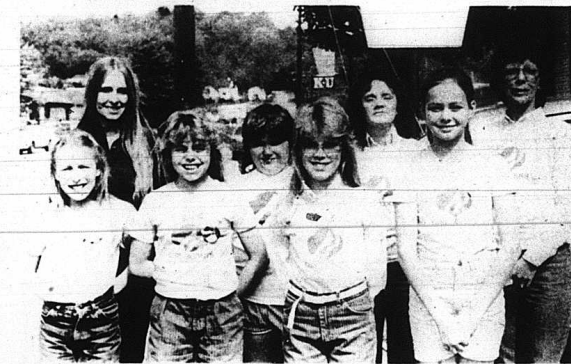

students and college students. A Camp Rally Banquet and a Sunday School Picnic are also held there.

But perhaps the most important function of the Kentucky Christian Assembly is to provide two weeks of church camp for area youth each year. A pamphlet for the Assembly explains, "Christian Service Camp" is a place where young people come together for a week with God. Its purpose is to provide a Christian atmosphere in which the camper feels the presence of God in every activity.

"Although the camp is sponsored by area Christian churches and Churches of Christ, any young person, regardless of church affiliation, is invited to attend. Rules for acceptance and participation in the camp program are the same for everyone without regard to race, color or national origin.

There is a Junior Week of camp which is for children who have completed the fourth grade up to the seventh grade. The Senior Week of Camp is for eighth graders through seniors in high school. Both weeks of camp begin on a Sunday night with a potluck supper and a vespers service afterwards. Parents then leave their children at camp until Saturday morning when the camp is dismissed. The cost for registration is \$25 and can be done on the afternoon camp begins.

This year, Senior Week runs from June 10 to 16. The dean for that week is Ernie Johnson, pastor of the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon. Johnson has been working in the camp for nine years and has been the dean of both weeks several times.

Campers can look forward to Bible classes on such topics as the Book of Proverbs, the end times, the Acts of the Apostles, and current events. They can also choose two of several elective workshops. There will be one on crafts, journalism, drama, music and how to preach. Athletic programs, vespers and a banquet with a consecration program on Friday night help round out the week.

Johnson commented on how campers look at the

chance to get away for a while. "The thing I hear most from them is that it's a retreat from the world. It's a week with the pressure of peers gone and it's a time to change pace like when Jesus spent time in the wilderness.

Johnson will have three children involved in the camp this year and he thinks that makes the effort even more worthwhile. "No one realizes how much work is involved, but when you have children up there, it's even more fulfilling. You see how much they enjoy it and it makes you feel good when it's all over and it's reflected in their spiritual lives."

Kenton Parkey, pastor of the Wildie Christian Church, has been involved with the camp program for 12 years and is the dean of this summer's Junior Week of camp, which will be held from June 17 to 23. These campers will have classes and sports and they will be sponsoring a week-long project for the Christian Mission to the Sightless. A representative from that organization will do programs and the offering for the week will support that organization. They also have skit, talent, Bible drama, and movie nights along with a banquet and consecration program on Friday evening. Parkey said, "It's the most effective tool we have for evangelizing our young people. It's also the most challenging and motivational program we have to encourage them to commit and dedicate their lives to full-time Christian service. The isolation shuts out all worldly distractions and allows you to concentrate on Christ. He's expecting 40 to 50 young people for this year's Junior Week.

Matt Manzi, 14, is from the Wildie Christian Church. He attended his first week of camp last year and was named Junior Boy Camper of the Week. Although he was reluctant about going, now he's glad he did.

"It gave me a good chance to meet different people and it also gave me a chance to learn about the Lord in different ways through Bible Bowl and other activities. All of the people helped me, and the counselors, mostly, helped me learn about the Lord."

Who should go? "Everybody," he said firmly. "I'd like to encourage everybody

to go."

Roger Carr, pastor of the Brodhead Christian Church, is beginning his fourth year as camp manager. His responsibility is to oversee and help make plans for the continuing operation of the camp. In doing this, he has watched

the Assembly grow in the last few years. "There are approximately 13 churches involved in the camp now," he said. "Church come from Rockcastle, Pulaski, Madison and Garrard counties."

The Kentucky Christian Assembly campgrounds are the results of an idea that began over 20 years ago and was made possible by the dedication and faith of the county's five Christian churches and other interested individuals.

Those who have contributed time, money and energy to make the camp what it is today don't question whether their efforts were in vain when they see a circle of intent young people around a campfire at the end of an exciting day singing softly "I have decided to follow Jesus."

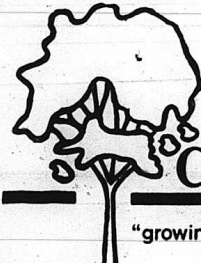

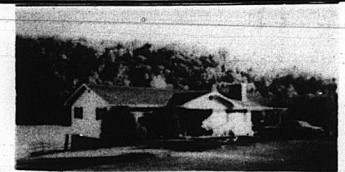

Named as delegates to the June 2nd State Convention were Mr. Brown, David McCauley and Joe Bullen. Other county party officers elected were:

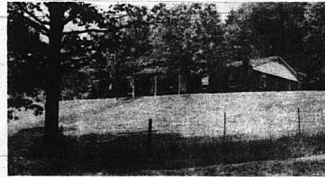

In a warm kitchen (yes, we have heat on May 4th) I refill my cup and ponder over the past memories as I turn to the present.

Most of these youth are from big cities of Japan and the exchange gives them a chance to experience rural life and to learn about a different culture as the LABO theme "Moving to Another Dawn" signifies.

More than 35 Kentucky 4-H'ers between the ages of 12-18 years old have traveled to Japan since Kentucky began participating in LABO in 1978. Many of the exchanges are direct, with the Kentucky host staying with their Japanese host brother or sister if they decide to travel to Japan.

one out of seven Americans. Yet, 75 percent of the American population is unaware of the facts surrounding the disease.

Although — a growing number of people now relate high blood pressure to heart trouble, strokes and kidney failure, many people still have misconceptions about the disease.

High blood pressure is a physical condition in which the heart and blood vessels are strained by blood pumping with too much force

through the body. Some people think that a headache, dizziness or feeling poorly are telltale signs that blood pressure is up. However, high blood pressure may not have any symptoms. You can feel fine even though your blood pressure is high.

Another common misconception about the disease is that "it affects only the nervous, tense individual." The medical term for high blood pressure is "hypertension." Some people as-

sume that only anxious or tense people have high blood pressure. However, this isn't true. High blood pressure can affect anyone.

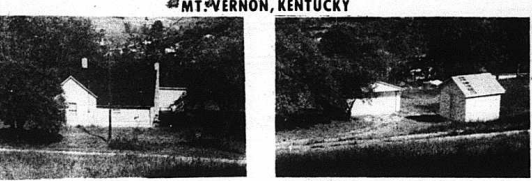
Another erroneous belief is that high blood pressure control is a cure. There is no cure for high blood pressure. Physicians generally use medication to bring blood pressure into the normal range. However, unless medication is taken each day as prescribed, blood pressure will go back up.

fered 23 wildfires this Spring which burned a total of 404 acres. "The major causes of fires this spring were debris burning and arson," said Ranger Bullen. "These causes accounted for over 65% of Rockcastle County's fires." As these fires cause so many fires preventable and usually a result of a fire law violation. There were 4 prosecutions for fire law violations in Rockcastle County this spring.

"The fires in this county cost a total of \$1,494 to control," noted Ranger Bullen. "However, even this figure is small compared to the loss in timber value and loss of value added to the local economy. Studies have shown that these losses, accumulated over the 75 year average maturity period for timber, will often exceed \$2,000 per acre of timberland burned."

In addition to medicine, high blood pressure patients are often advised to watch their weight, cut down on salt, exercise more and stop smoking. Some people think that they can choose either to take the medication or follow the other advice. However, this isn't true since the two types of therapies are meant to complement one another. If you watch your weight, cut down on salt, and exercise more, your medication may be more effective, and as a result, you may need to take less.

Ask your doctor what to do should you miss a dose of medication and that you make certain your prescription doesn't run out. High blood pressure must be treated every day, regardless of how you feel.
