Trooper sued in connection with deaths on I-75

Nearly one year after the tragic deaths of three members of a Rockcastle family in a traffic accident on I-75, another lawsuit has been filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

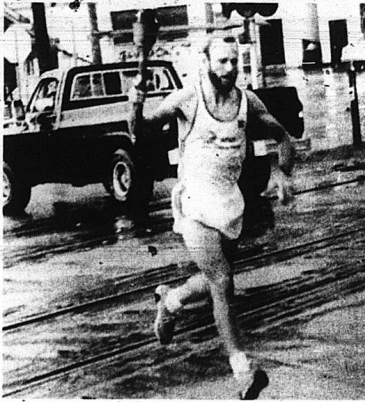
Jerry L. Burke, the husband of Pamela Burke and father of David and Cindy Burke, all three of whom were victims in the accident, and the driver of the vehicle which was struck head-on on the wrong side of the Interstate by a drunken driver, has filed suit, against the Kentucky State Police officer who was called to the scene that day.

Marcus Daly, a KSP trooper from the London Post, has been sued, along with the driver of the vehicle, Earl Denver Holley, for over two million dollars.

In the suit, which was filed by local attorney Joe Lambert, Daly is accused of being negligent when he left the keys of the State Police car in the ignition after he arrested Holley for public intoxication and placed him in the cruiser. And, of being further negligent for leaving the vehicle running, not having a screen or barrier in his car and leaving Holley unattended.

The suit also alleges that Daly was negligent in the use, operation and control of a motor vehicle and was also negligent in failing to exercise ordinary care to control the conduct of Holley.

Petitt indicted after death of 11-month-old daughter

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury has released seven indictments from their most recent session on May 25th.

The nature of the indictments ranged from murder to an indictment against a mother in the death of her 11-month-old daughter.

In perhaps the most unusual case to be brought in Rockcastle Circuit Court in several years, Katherine Petitt, age 25, of College Park, Georgia has been indicted on a second degree manslaughter charge in the death of her infant daughter on U.S. 25 at Burr on May 25.

Mrs. Petitt was arrested by police after authorities were called to the scene where her daughter, Katherine Roberta Petitt, had been struck by a vehicle driven by Billy Rash of Mt. Vernon.

According to the indictment, Petitt said she left her child in a ditch alongside the road and walked back to the Holiday Motel to get her boyfriend.

When she returned, the indictment continued, the child had crawled into the roadway and been struck by Rash who told authorities he thought the baby was an old box lying in the road. The infant was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle County Hospital by local Coroner Bill Dowell.

Mrs. Petitt also reportedly faces charges in Arizona of abandonment of her 7-year-old son, whom she allegedly left at an interstate rest area in April.

The FBI charged Petitt with interstate flight to avoid prosecution after the child was found, according to the Kentucky State Police Post at London.

The young boy is now with Petitt's husband, Vaughn W. Petitt, age 65, of College Park, Georgia.

The case received so much press coverage that a "Gag" order was issued by District Judge Michael Cain, at the request of Ms. Petitt's attorney, in order to prohibit anyone involved with the case discussing it, since Ms. Petitt's attorney said he felt his client might be in some physical danger.

However, after Petitt was indicted Friday, Circuit Judge Dan Venters lifted the order.

Mrs. Petitt is lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail under a \$10,000 bond.

It is unusual for a Grand Jury session in Rockcastle County to meet without an indictment for murder being handed down, and this session was no exception as Farley Newcomb, age 45, of Rt. 2, Livingston, was indicted for the April 29th shooting death of Ernest Singleton of Lamerco.

The circumstances apparently leading to the indictment, as reported by the Kentucky State Police, were as follows:

At approximately 4 a.m. on that Sunday morning, Singleton and Tim Bosher of Red Hill were traveling toward Livingston on the Red Hill Road when they had a collision on Gauley Mountain with another vehicle, reportedly driven by Robert Earl Newcomb of Livingston.

Police said that after the two vehicles collided, they apparently stopped and Robert Earl Newcomb and Farley Newcomb, reportedly a passenger in the Newcomb car, and an altercation ensued between Bosher and one of the Newcomb men.

Authorities said that while this altercation was going on, a gun was fired near the truck where Singleton was still sitting. Singleton was pronounced dead at the scene by Coroner Bill Dowell.

Newcomb is free on \$10,000 bond.

Theft by Unlawful Taking over \$100

Tim Robinson and Randall Vanwinkle, both of Orlando, were also indicted for a May 17th theft at Cummins Saw Mill in Mt. Vernon.

The two men are charged with stealing 5 log chains and 5 log binders from the mill, police said.

Both men were released after filling \$3,000 bond.

Receiving Stolen Property Over \$100

David Wayne Mahaffey of Cincinnati, Ohio, and formerly of Livingston, Michael Eversole and James L. Morris, both of Livingston, were indicted for an April 27th incident in which they reportedly received stolen copper wire, valued at over \$10,000 which had been stolen from a utility company in Ohio.

The three men were arrested after they tried to sell the wire to some local businessmen, police said.

Mahaffey is still lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail under \$20,000 bond. Both Eversole and Morris have been released on bond.

All seven people indicted are scheduled to be arraigned in Circuit Court on June 8th.

A spokesperson in the Circuit Clerk's office said that no more indictments will be released this week.

Only 5 percent go to the polls in Primary

Only 497 registered voters turned out for Tuesday's primary election in Rockcastle County.

The 5% turn-out in the county was probably the lightest ever, according to a spokesperson in the County Clerk's office, who said the reason for the low number was the fact that Rockcastle Countians had only one race to vote in.

The Republican nomination for United States Senator was the only race on the ballot that had not already been decided and, even though Rockcastle is almost a 5 to 1 Republican

county, the voters still stayed at home.

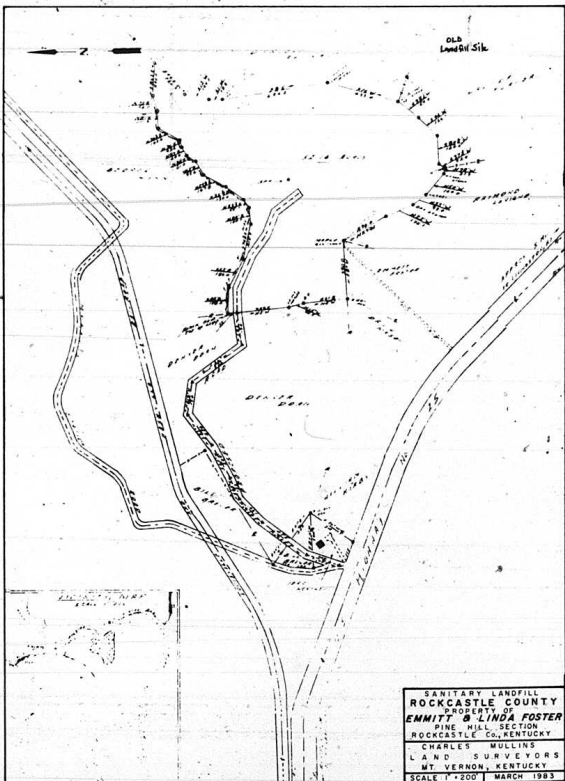
Jefferson County Judge/Executive Mitch McConnell, who was the easy winner across the state over his three opponents, tallied 247 votes in the county compared to the combined total of 70 votes for the other three candidates.

McConnell was declared the winner in the race early Tuesday evening and with 98.6 percent of the vote in across the state, he had 39,687 votes compared to just over 10,000 for the other three men combined.

After former Governor John Y. Brown dropped out of the race for the U.S. Senate, incumbent Walter Dee Huddleston was declared the winner and votes were counted in the race across the state. However, 165 Democrats did go to the polls Tuesday in the county.

Huddleston and McConnell will face each other in the November General Election. 5th District Congressman Harold Rogers, R-

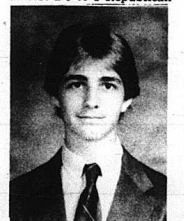

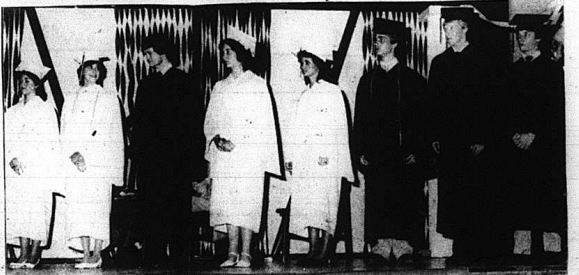

Dear Editor,

We were surprised to read your coverage of the landfill challenge in the May 24th issue of the Signal, since neither Appalachia-Science in the Public Interest representatives nor Livingston residents were ever contacted directly to report their side of the story. I am writing this letter in order to clarify some factual mistakes printed in your article.

In the article, Judge Jasper stated that he had already approved the landfill plans. In fact, the state's approval is contingent upon the public's review of the county application. Appalachia-Science in the Public Interest (ASPI) responded to the public notice, which appeared in the March 8th edition of the

Signal, on behalf of several Livingston and area residents who were concerned about the landfill's impact on area residents. ASPI recognizes the need for a landfill. We only wish to make sure that it is done properly and in the safest way possible. It is unfortunate that the only way we citizens of the county have a chance to voice our concerns is through this formal "complaint" process allowed by law. Perhaps a better way would have been to allow public input before the process reached this point.

In addition to the "alleged" dumping of hazardous materials in the landfill, ASPI has compiled documentation (which is available for public inspection) that demonstrates that hazardous materials have been dumped into the Lily landfill in Laurel County. Citizens in Pulaski County are voicing similar complaints about their landfill. Once a landfill opens, it becomes very difficult to close. Similar violations of dumping standards occur. Residents living in an impacted area should have a chance to comment on the possible dangerous consequences or such a project.

Mr. Joe Clark was quoted in your article as saying, "...we have never had any water problems from the old dump site." It is not known what hazardous materials, if any, have been dumped in the old landfill. However, upon inspection of the site, one can see that the pond built to contain the runoff does not give adequate protection. When we visited the site, polluted water was indeed running into the creek which feeds Roundstone Creek.

Livingston water from Roundstone Creek, not the Rockcastle River, as was incorrectly reported in your article. We have also heard the phrase "98 percent pure" used in connection with our water supply by many area residents. This fact is not very significant, since much less than one percent contamination of water sources by most toxic and hazardous materials is all that is needed to make the water unsafe for human consumption. Our water could test 98 or 99 percent pure and could still represent a serious health hazard depending on what the other one or two percent contained.

Given this information,

there are important questions that should be raised. What steps do we have that hazardous and toxic chemicals will not be dumped in the landfill? What will the county do, if such chemicals are found in the landfill? Who will maintain the site after its eight year lifespan? If Livingston's water supply becomes spoiled, then what? Such questions need to be addressed by our county officials in a public forum.

Farm & Home News

The UK College of Agri-

culture and the Kentucky Educational Television Network have recently started providing a new information service to farmers in the state. Called AgText, the service provides timely information via the KET signal.

AgText uses closed captioning technology to bring information to farmers about markets (including local and cash futures), weather and Extension recommendations and advisories. The information is presented through KET's normal broadcast hours and is arranged in a 15-minute loop so that at any given time farmers can tune in and wait a maximum of 15 minutes to receive the information they want.

AgText's information is new each day and timely material such as weather and markets is updated several times each day. There are two methods by which farmers can receive AgText. First, a television with a special decoder in decoder is available for under \$400 which permits viewing AgText by flipping a switch. Second, a special decoder attached to a stan-

dard television allows viewing and is available for less than \$300. Either method allows the farmer to receive the information on AgText.

The following is the current update schedule for AgText material: 8:00 a.m.; AgText is on the air, 8:30-8:45; Weather Update-state forecast and summary, 9:30; USDA-Weekly weather and crop summary (Tuesday), state extended outlook (Monday, Wednesday and Friday), 10:05-10:45; Weather Update-state observations, roundup, state summary and agricultural advisories, 10:50-11:30; Futures Markets-opening quotations for corn, wheat, soybeans, feeder cattle, hogs and slaughter cattle, 12:00 Noon; Weather Update-state forecast, observations and roundup, 1:05-1:30; Futures Markets-midday quotations for corn, wheat, soybeans, feeder cattle, hogs and slaughter cattle, 1:45; Weather Update-state observations and roundup, 2:05-2:15; Cash Markets-quotations for feeder cattle, hogs and slaughter cattle, 2:20; Weather Update-state observations, roundup, 3:35-3:45; Cash Markets-closing

quotations for corn, wheat and soybeans, 3:50-4:15; Futures Markets-closing quotations for corn, wheat, soybeans, feeder cattle, hogs and slaughter cattle, 5:15;

Weather Update-state summary, forecast and extended forecast, 6:00 p.m. to sign-off. Continuous recycle of information already presented.

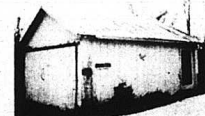

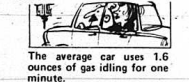

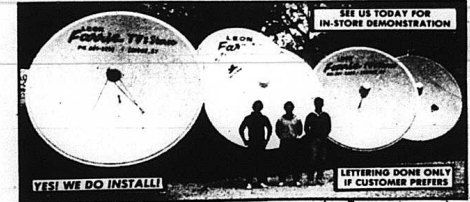

Calcium Needs Never End

Many adults have the mistaken notion that calcium is important only for children, whose teeth and bones are still developing. That's not the case. People never outgrow their need for calcium.

Calcium is necessary for maintaining healthy teeth and bones, as well as forming them in the first place. Lack of sufficient calcium in adult diets can lead to osteoporosis, the hard, brittle, easily-broken bones so often associated with old age.

Milk is one of the most common sources of calcium, but it's not always a favorite item on adult menus. Most adults don't drink the 16 ounces of milk each day that would provide their Recommended Daily Allowance of calcium.

Here are some other foods that are good sources of calcium. Each item provides the same amount of calcium as one cup of whole milk.

One-half cup of undiluted evaporated milk, one-third cup instant, non-fat dry milk powder, one cup hot chocolate made with milk, one cup plain or fruit flavored yogurt.

Cheese and foods made with milk and cheese also are good sources of calcium. A two-inch cube of Swiss, Colby, American or Cheddar Cheese will provide as much calcium as a cup of whole milk.

Two ounces of processed cheese food, four tablespoons of processed cheese spread, or two cups of cottage cheese are equal in calcium to a cup of whole milk.

One cup of custard, 1 1/2 cups of ice cream or ice milk, or one cup of pudding made with milk, provide the same amount of calcium as a cup of whole milk.

Milk and milk products used in cooking also count

toward daily calcium needs. Such dishes include casseroles, pizza, macaroni and cheese and creamed soups. It is good to avoid cream cheese and sour cream since they add a high percentage of fat.

Here are some recipes rich in calcium:

Buttermilk Noodle Bake
2 tbsps. butter or margarine
1 cup finely chopped onion
1 1/2 lb. ground beef
2 tbsps. flour
1 tsp. salt
Dash pepper
1 cup catsup
1 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce
1 4 oz. can mushroom -bits and pieces
2 cups buttermilk
1 8 oz. pkg. medium noodles

Melt butter or margarine in heavy skillet, add onion and cook until transparent; do not brown. Add meat and cook until it has lost its color. Remove from heat and drain fat. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Add catsup, Worcestershire sauce, mushrooms and liquid with buttermilk. Cook until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Cook noodles according to package directions. Drain. Combine meat mixture with noodles. Pour into a 2 1/2 quart casserole. Bake in a 350 F oven for 45 to 60 minutes until heated thoroughly and slightly browned on top. Yield: six servings.

Cheese-Chicken Sandwich
1/2 cup chopped celery
1 tsp instant minced onion
2 cups cooked, diced chicken
2 tssps. lemon juice
1/8 tsp. poultry seasoning
1/3 cup salad dressing
6 slices bread
1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Cook celery and onion in two tablespoons skimmed chicken broth about 10 minutes in covered pan. Mix chicken, celery and onion mixture, lemon juice, seasonings and salad dressing well. Toast bread on one side under broiler. Spread chicken mixture on untoasted side of bread slices. Sprinkle with cheese. Broil sandwich about four inches from heat until cheese is melted. Yield: six sandwiches.

Cheese Waldorf Salad
1 cup cubed American or Cheddar cheese
2 medium apples, unpeeled, diced
2 cups diced celery
1/4 cup pecans, chopped

1/2 cup yogurt
Combine cheese, apples and celery. Blend with yogurt. Sprinkle chopped nuts over the top. Serve on lettuce leaf. Yield: four servings.

To lower the fat in recipes, you can make the following substitutions:

Instead of 1 cup evaporated whole milk: Use 1 cup evaporated skim milk. Instead of 1 cup sour cream, use 1 cup plain yogurt or mozzarella cream (recipe below). Instead of 1 cup whole milk, use 1 cup 2 percent milk or skim milk.

Milk Sour Cream
2 Tbsps. skim milk
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 cup lowfat cottage cheese

Mix all ingredients in blender or food processor until smooth. Yield: 1 1/4 cups.

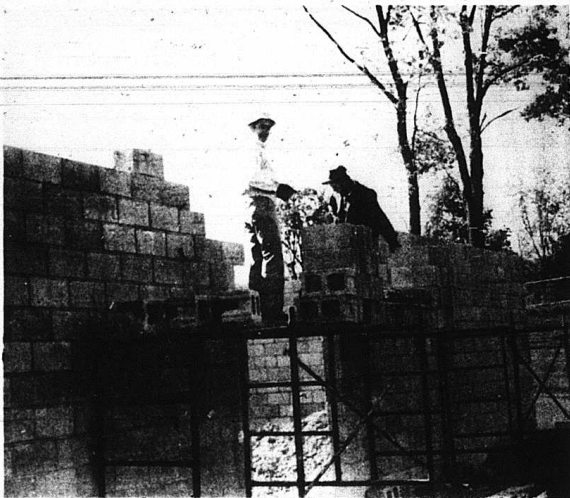
