June Dairy Month: A Celebration for all of us

No one knows exactly when milk was "discovered." Historians aren't even sure when other dairy products first became part of the human diet. Although written records first appeared over 6,000 years ago, it is believed that milk had already become an important food. It is even mentioned in the Old Testament.

What we do know is that the first June Dairy Month was celebrated in 1937. Years ago, dairy farmers produced more milk during June than in any other month. A month-long celebration was started to honor these milk and dairy product sales.

June Dairy Month takes on a more profound meaning. It is an ideal time to pause and reflect on the many contributions the dairy industry makes to the American way of life. Just twenty years ago, there were almost two million dairy farms supplying our nation with fresh dairy products. Now there are only one-tenth that many. To meet today's demand, each dairy farm fam-

ily has to produce the milk and dairy products consumed by 280 other American families.

Milk and other dairy foods are a major contributor to the nutritional well-being of our country, and even during times of inflation, these products are provided at a reasonable price. Dairy foods contribute about 72 percent of the calcium in the nation's food supply, almost all of the vitamin D, 39 percent of the riboflavin (vitamin B-2) and 22 percent of the protein while providing only 11 percent of the calories. Besides the nutrient benefits, milk is flavorful and refreshing whether served with meals, snacks or by itself.

There is a hard working dairy farm family behind every gallon of milk, pound of cheese and cup of yogurt... and without these and other dairy foods, some of our favorite recipes would be impossible to make.

As you celebrate June Dairy Month, try some of these tempting suggestions.

They are sure to become some of your favorites!

- Cauliflower & Tomatoes Au Gratin**
Yield: 6 servings
- 2 cups water
 - 1 1/4 tpsps. salt
 - 1 small head cauliflower (1 1/2 pound), cut into florets
 - 1/2 cup fine bread crumbs
 - 1/2 tpsps. celery salt
 - 1/8 tsp. pepper

- 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Swiss cheese
- 1/3 cup butter, melted
- 3 medium tomatoes, peeled, seeded and cut into 1/2 inch strips

In large saucepan, bring water to a boil. Add salt and cauliflower cover and return to boil. Reduce heat and cook until tender; about 12-15 minutes. Drain; set aside. In small mixing bowl, toss together bread crumbs, celery, salt and pepper. Stir in Swiss cheese. Pour melted butter over mixture and mix well. Sprinkle one-half cup bread mixture over bottom of shallow, buttered 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Arrange cauliflower and tomatoes over crumbs. Top with remaining crumb mixture. Bake in preheated 375 degree F. oven for 20 minutes or until cheese mixture is golden brown.

Pear and Cheese Spread
Yield: Approx. 2 cups

- 1 can (8 oz.) Bartlett pears
 - 1 cup creamed cottage cheese
 - 1/4 cup crumbled Blue cheese
 - 1 tbsps. pear syrup
- Drain pears, reserving 1 tablespoon syrup. Chop. Beat cottage cheese with mixer until smooth. Stir in chopped pears, Blue cheese and pear syrup. Spread mixture between 2 slices of bread for a sandwich or open-faced on slices of party rye bread.

Garbage problems are main topic at court meeting

Problems with garbage disposal throughout the county surfaced several times at Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

Rockcastle County Court Clerk, Irene Bales had local county attorney James Lambert to read a letter she received from Laurel County attorney, Elmer Cunnigan.

The letter alleged that some of Mrs. Bales garbage had been found dumped on the gabbard Parsley road in Laurel county and further threatened action against Mrs. Bales.

Mrs. Bales said she wanted to bring the letter to the court's attention because she was innocent of the crime. She said she had always disposed of her garbage at the truck provided for county residents at Pine Hill.

Second district magistrate Tom Denny, then asked county attorney Lambert where he dumped his garbage. Lambert answered Denny's question saying "I always use the truck at Pine Hill or Green Hill."

Denny then told the rest of the court that a white bag of garbage apparently belonging to Lambert was found dumped in his district. The magistrate failed to specify where the garbage was found, however, deputy Rockcastle County Sheriff Clarence Hasty, who holds the garbage collection contract with the county, said he had been dumping some of the county's garbage on his farm on Slegg's creek (which is in Denny's district).

After much discussion on the matter the court then voted at Hasty's request to office again pay a dump fee for Hasty at the Lily Land fill in Laurel County, not to exceed 8 loads per week or approximately \$120.

Hasty, who said that the county was not living up to their end of the contract, told the court that he was willing to turn the garbage collection back over to the county any time they wanted it. He said his trucks had been vandalized, he was supposed to get paid by the first of the month, but sometimes he said that it takes at least 10 days to

get his money, and that commercial recyclers have been using his trucks for free disposal of garbage they receive money to pick up.

When members of the court reminded him that he had a contract with the county, he said he just wanted the members of the court to know they could get someone else, if they dissatisfied with his service.

Only one bid was submitted to the county to provide gasoline for the county trucks for the next three months. Bullock's gas station in Mt. Vernon bid \$11.14.09 per gallon. The court accepted the bid.

In other business the court agreed to pay unpaid medical bills, dating back as far as 1977, incurred by prisoners in the Rockcastle County Jail, at the request of Rockcastle County jailor Henry Lee Abney.

The \$2,000 amount is owed to local doctors, drug stores and the Rockcastle

County hospital. According to Abney these medical service providers are willing to enter contracts with the jail to serve the prisoners in the future. Contracts such as these are required by the state, according to Abney.

1st district magistrate Donald Rowe questioned the paying of private citizens \$10 per hour to clean out culverts when county workers are not paid over \$5 per hour for the same work.

The work was allegedly done in Joe Clark's 5th district and W.H. Wren's 3rd district following the recent flooding.

Wren told the court that the men involved used their own tractors to do the work and thus were worth \$10 per hour for the labor and use of equipment.

Rowe then questioned why the court had not paid a moving bill which had

City hires three employees

The Mt. Vernon City Council met in a special called meeting Thursday night to hire a police officer to replace Dicky Collinsworth who resigned from the force recently.

After about a 40 minute executive session the council came into open meeting where they hired Mike Hopkins to replace Collinsworth. Hopkins is a graduate of Eastern Kentucky University with a degree in Law enforcement.

Ed Jackson, Lake Louisville boat dock operator, approached the council concerning the need for patrolling the lake area. Jackson's request prompted the council to hire Jim Durham to patrol the area. Durham had applied for the full time police job.

The council also hired James Denton Thompson as a substitute police officer and an employee of the water and sewer department.

All three men will be paid \$4.20 per hour. Three bids were received for street lights on Main Street. The lights are part of the Downtown Revitalization project.

Wholesale lighting of Somerset bid \$7,507. Cumberland Electric bid \$11,791

and Brock McVey bid \$7,567 with an alternate bid of \$9,644. Following some discussion the council agreed to authorize director Floyd Owens to study and select the lowest bid closest to the specifications.

June 30 is final planting date for insured tobacco

Springfield, Ky.—June 30 is the final planting date for insured tobacco in Rockcastle County, Ky., according to Richard Derringer, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

"Acts of tobacco planted by June 30, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by July 15 to receive full crop insurance coverage," says Derringer.

Acres planted after June 30 should also be reported on the July 15 acreage report (in the "remarks" section) as being planted too late for insurance coverage.

"Greetings from 1984. Greetings from the previous teenage generation! Our Challenge Class has left a "Time Capsule" for you to unseal and analyze. This

"Time Capsule" was a school project completed and left for safekeeping with the Rockcastle County Court on Friday, June 1, 1984.

We feel the artifacts we have enclosed in the "Capsule" present our American culture and lifestyle for 1984. In fact, our purpose in the project was to analyze our culture and lifestyle and leave a permanent record for a future generation's discovery. We feel it will be interesting for you to analyze our artifacts to try and determine how much American lifestyle has changed in the past 20 years.

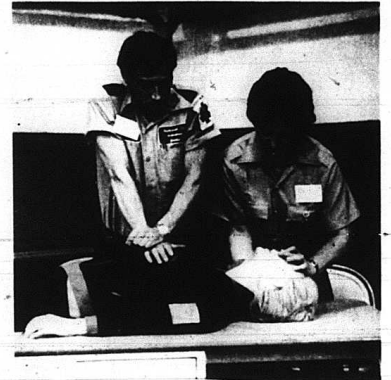
Dear Editor,

Farm & Home News

How Late to Plant Corn

Many farmers are debating the question as to how late we can plant corn and whether the early maturity hybrids. Generally, yield losses occur in corn when planted after May 15th. The date of planting and days to maturity will vary somewhat from area to area. However, we would suggest the following guidelines:

Late season hybrids (120 plus days) such as Pioneer Brand 3147 and 3184, Northrup King PX95, DeKalb-Purifair X919 and most white hybrids should be planted for grain before June 1 and silage before June 5.

Full-and mid-season hybrids (105-120 days) such as Pioneer Brand 3320 and 3355, DeKalb-Pfizer XL71 and XL61, Funk's G4522 and G4523 should be planted for grain from June 1 to June 10 and for silage from June 5 to June 15.

Earlier maturing hybrids (less than 105 days) should be used when planting after the above dates. The last dates for safe planting of any of these hybrids is June 20 for grain and June 25 for silage.

Many of the earlier maturing corn hybrids are susceptible to the thiocarbamate chemicals and there are no early (90-100 day) maturing virus resistant hybrids.

These are only a few of the corn hybrids that are available and are used here only as examples and does not indicate a recommendation of any other hybrids of similar maturity. Farmers should check with local dealers to select the maturity hybrid best for them.

Kentucky's major lakes are improving somewhat, but the recent cold snap hasn't helped angler's luck. The lake-by-lake rundown, as given by fish and wildlife conservation officers:

Kentucky: Black bass slow on plastic worms off rocky points; catfish fair on minnows and worms off banks; clear to murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

Barkle: Crappie slow on minnows (2-4 feet deep) over submerged cover; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

Barren: Black bass fair on crank baits along shoreline; catfish good on worms and bluegill good on worms and crickets; in tailwaters, white bass fair at night on jigs; trout fair on cheese and corn; clear, falling at 21 feet above summer pool and 72 degrees.

Nolin: Crappie fair on minnows; black bass fair on spinner or medium runners; clear to murky to muddy, falling at seven feet above summer pool and 68 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie slow on minnows (3-4 feet deep) over cover; bluegill fair on worms and crickets; falling at 11 feet above summer pool and 70 degrees.

Taylorville: Black bass good on spinnerbaits and worms; bluegill good on crickets and worms; in tailwaters, catfish fair on cut-bait; crappie fair on minnows; clear, stable at summer pool and 68 degrees.

Herrington: No report available.

Green: Crappie fair on minnows over cover; black bass fair on crank baits along shoreline; murky, falling at eight feet above summer pool and 72 degrees.

Cumberland: In the upper lake, black bass fair casting surface baits around tree lines; white bass fair at night under lights off deep banks; in the lower lake, white bass and walleye good at night; in the tailwaters, trout fair on cheese and corn; clear, falling at 14 feet above summer pool and 69 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Black bass fair on plastic worms near heads of coves; bluegill good on worms off shallow banks; catfish fair on worms; clear to murky, falling slowly at two feet above summer pool and 70 degrees.

Laurel: Bluegill fair on crickets and worms in coves; trout good on worms and corn off steep banks; black bass fair on minnows (5-6 feet deep) over stick ups; black bass fair on spinner baits around mud banks; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 62 degrees.

Cave Run: Crappie slow on minnows over cover; musky fair casting medium to deep runners over cover; clear to murky to muddy, falling at six feet above summer pool and 68 degrees.

Buckhorn: Crappie good (4-6 feet deep) over cover; bluegill good on worms and crickets over cover; murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 70 degrees.

Grayson: Crappie good on minnows (5-6 feet deep) over submerged cover; muddy, stable at summer pool and 68 degrees.

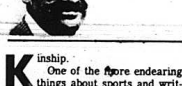
Dewey: Crappie slow on minnows over cover; muddy, stable at summer pool and 72 degrees.

Crappie fair on minnows (3-4 feet deep) over submerged cover; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 72 degrees.

kinship. One of the finer endeavors in which those of sport and writing about them, is the acquaintances one makes and kinships one strikes during the search for one bit of information or another that might make a story worthy of your interest.

Details about this or that player or coach who has come on the scene, perhaps left his mark and gone on to the rocking chair. For an athlete time goes by swiftly, doesn't it?

As for the high school student/athletes graduated last week and those kind of things stir memories of another time, another place

in one's own experience. It seems to me that memories and things that made them worth keeping are much more an integral part of sports than are the games. The things that make them more are more pleasant and sometimes fascinating that recollections of an "old coach" or warrior who recounts his exploits with verve and comedy.

For example one of the very best story tellers I know is Hardin McLean from his days at Elizabethtown Catholic. A man who remembers his players fondly and cherishes their successes as much as his own.

Of course there are lots of men who can recall with exultation who played for whom, when, how, and naturally, how many wins were involved. In one way or another the players and coaches come to be kindred brothers as the years go by.

If not linked by family name, they are made kindred by times and places, an unforgettable game, or season past, back there in the sunny late afternoon of one's own life. A pause. A respite to recall them fondly is an opportunity for the writer to chronicle them again before moving on to the next batch of feisty upstarts.

Somehow, some way, by the end of a career, along with an old coach or player the puzzle pieces seem to fit together better, make a bit more sense.

What follows are a few examples of what happens when a body stirs a memory here or there. See how each touches somebody you know, like or heard about along the road.

■ Ed Miracle is director of athletic at Madison Central High School in Richmond. Bob through 1981 he coached football, first at Lynch High School in Hartan County and later at Madison Central. White at Lynch, Miracle coached four teams to state championships, probably more than any other coach and certainly more than anyone else in the state.

So, it was logical to ask Miracle last week, who were some of the best football players he ever coached? "I think the man that made me had some real good ones a course, but probably the fastest I ever had was Joe Washington. He played tailback for me at Lynch, in 1971. History of a Coffey Family

[Ed's. Note: The following article concerns the Coffey family, a well-known family in the county with many descendants still living here. Because of its length, the article will be published in serial form. pma]

The history of the Coffey family, Willis (1856-1927) and his son, Ransome (1885), who now lives in Wildie, will appear in a magazine published by Western Kentucky University.

The material for the article, written by James Broaduss, who is married to the former Virginia Stevens, daughter of Colson Stevens of Rockcastle County, was obtained from a number of conversations with Ransome Coffey and from an examination of the building on the old Coffey farm.

The story begins in 1880 when Willis obtained a farm on the southern slope of the ridge between Roundstone and Renfro Creeks and describes the life that the family lived there—farming practices, building practices (all of the buildings were of log, social life (visiting), cooperation with neighbors (workings), church going, etc. Willis was a hard working man who worked other people's land as well as his own.

By 1900, Willis had accumulated enough money to buy the farm on top of the ridge where there was better, level land. He built a two-story frame house which used an existing two room log house as an ell. The house is featured in the article because Broaduss believes it is a clear reflection of the way the Coffey fami-

ly perceived themselves to fit into the community. In 1908, Ransome Coffey married, bought half of the farm from Willis, and, with Willis' help, built a two-room frame house which he added on to as the years went by. In 1927, Willis died and Ransome bought the other half of the farm from the other heirs and farmed the whole farm until he retired in 1957.

Broaduss reports that he would like to do histories of other families in Rockcastle County and combine them into a book. Rockcastle is interesting, he says, because it is a transition county between the hills and the bluegrass. But, more interesting, he says, are the lives of people who have lived the way most of the people in their generation lived.

An ideal person to talk to, he says, would be a man in his nineties who likes to talk, who still has adequate hearing, and who still lives in the old house on the farm he grew up on.

The Coffey Family, Father and Son, Rockcastle County, Ky., 1880-1957. Oral History and Material Culture with a Small Focus

James W. Broaduss

William Ransome Coffey was born on a 90 acre hillside farm in Rockcastle County, Kentucky in 1885. His father, Willis (1856-1927), had acquired the

farm which Ransome calls "a rock pile, a rough old farm", in 1880, probably from Ransome's grandfather, Ransome Coffey (1836-1917), who came from Grainger County in eastern Tennessee in 1843 with his own father, Benjamin Coffey (1808-1867). By 1900, through hard work and frugal living, Willis had accumulated the \$1200 necessary to buy 225 acres, already logged but almost all uncleared, on top of the ridge where there was some level land and some much better soil. Ransome married in 1908 and bought half of the ridge top farm from Willis. When Willis died in 1927, Ransome bought his father's half from the other heirs and worked the whole farm until he retired in 1957. He now lives with his widowed daughter, Lillian, in the hamlet of Wildie, just north of the ridge on which his farm lay.

Although there have been many attempts to get at life in southern Appalachia, I do not believe there has been an interdisciplinary study of a single southern Appalachian family with an emphasis on the way that family expressed itself through its artifacts, artifacts here used in a sense large enough to include not only the buildings but also the farm which the Coffey family fashioned on top of the ridge. In such a study, we can deal not only with the artifacts themselves, the single pen log cabins, barns and cribs; the house, the various kinds of rail fences, etc., we can also make educated guesses about why the builders

built the way they did and even, perhaps, get glimpses of what the artifacts meant to the artificers. The materials for this study have been gathered from a number of conversations I have had with Ransome Coffey during the past two years and from my examination of the remains of the ten buildings on the ridge top farm, seven of which are of log and nine of which were built or modified by the Coffeys in their 57 years of ownership of the land. There are also remains of rail fences which Ransome built. Ransome's memories of the hillside farm enable what are certainly accurate descriptions of the six buildings there, all of which were of log. The changes and continuities in building traditions and techniques are clear and still observable reflections of more significant changes and continuities in ways of life which can be gathered from Ransome Coffey's memories and re-

lections on those memories. In, say, 1885, the Coffey family lived in an almost pioneer, very nearly completely subsistence agricultural community and shared fully in the cooperative life of that community. By 1910 or 1915, the Coffeys were living the much more separated, life of the small, still essentially subsistence, farmer in rural, but not pioneer, southern Appalachia. It is this change which I plan to trace.

Willis did some farming on the hillside farm. There was a 20 acre field (sloping on which he sometimes raised corn but even this field was, for the most part, kept in pasture. The func-

tion of the farm was to produce food for the family, and, as far as I can gather, the food and the methods of production and preservation were typical. Willis kept bees and tapped the sugar maples. There was an orchard around the garden with pear and apple trees. There were horse apples, a great big, yellow looking apple, best one you ever seen, sidelin apples, Jensen apples (a fairly small, grey striped apple which would keep through the winter). Apples were eaten raw, fried for meals and were preserved by drying and also in the form of apple butter. The Coffeys also

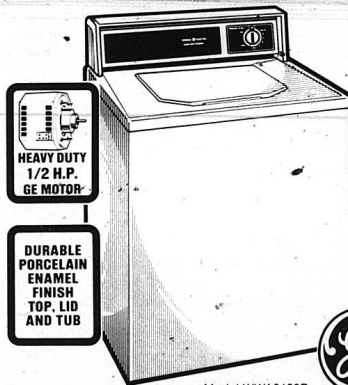
