Rockcastle County Health Fair meets needs of public

The 1984 Rockcastle County Health Fair was a great success with close to 275 people participating in the day-long event. The fair was held at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, June 2.

The majority of the participants in the Health Fair were over the age of 50. The oldest person there was 83 and the youngest was 19 months. The female participants outnumbered the male by two to one.

The fair was sponsored by the Rockcastle County Hospital in cooperation with the various community health services in the county who wanted to be in-

volved. Local health professionals volunteered their services the day of the fair along with several high school students and area residents.

The public was invited to take advantage of the many free health tests and screenings that were offered. The tests available were scoliosis, pap smear, breast exam, oral cancer, children's dental, anemia and blood sugar. Others were urine, pulmonary function, glaucoma, visual acuity, hearing, height, weight, blood pressure and speech.

Besides the screenings, there were almost 20 booths that had health dis-

plays and information. Local physicians were on hand to provide referral and counseling services after participants concluded the routine tests.

Several county residents who went to the fair were pleased with what they received and returned home with opinions about the free event. MaeFord and Mary Cole of Livingston both attended the fair after learning about it from WRV and the Mt. Vernon Signal. He's 66 and she's 61.

Cole said, "I took the glaucoma test and it was all right, but I found I had a hearing problem. His wife, Mary, said, "There was a

test I hadn't had in a while and I needed it. I really appreciate the fair. It was a good thing and was well organized." Both Coles agreed they would go again next year.

Ramesh Patel, 31, of Mt. Vernon, was the fair from when it began until 3:30 p.m. and took his two nephews and his son. He was glad to have the tests, especially the blood check. "I like the fair," he said. "I had never been to one and I hope you have it twice a year!"

Mary Graves, 53, of Brodhead, said, "I saw it in the Signal and I went to just about all the booths. Some of the tests I had done I wouldn't normally have had. And there was a referral service if anything was wrong. I hope they continue it." She said the biggest advantage of the fair for her was getting all of the tests done at the same time.

Clara Fields, 45, from Mt. Vernon, took her mother, Mable Kelley, 66, to the fair. "My mother went and had her blood pressure checked and a glaucoma test. She found a high blood pressure problem and I was glad for her to go."

There was also a positive response from the health professionals and county residents who volunteered to help in the fair. Diana Napier, a registered nurse at the Rockcastle County Health Department, helped several of the nurses from her office give almost 40 pap smears the day of the fair.

She said, "We need a

quota of at least 30 women, age 45 and older, for pap smears for the past year, and we probably wouldn't have got our quota if we hadn't helped at the fair."

Beverly Duncan, a licensed practical nurse at the Rockcastle County Hospital helped in the health history booth. She said, "It was very enjoyable, and I wish I had had more time to go through the fair myself. I was surprised at the number of people; I didn't expect that many at all."

Dentist John Parsons gave oral cancer and children's dental screenings at the fair along with other local dentists. Parsons said, "The turnout was a lot better than I expected and people got an excellent service. It was more efficient that I expected it to be - I think it's a really good thing."

At your local hospital physical therapy treats more than simple aches and pains

Physical therapy has come a long way since it was established in World War I with the beginning of the Division of Special Hospitals and Physical Reconstruction by the Surgeon General's Office. Although physical therapy had developed through the ages, it wasn't until World War I that the different areas of treatment were brought together to meet the demands of rehabilitating the wounded.

Today at the Rockcastle County Hospital, patients benefit from the latest techniques and equipment used in the physical therapy field. The hospital is emphasizing that department during National Physical Therapy Week, which will be re-

cognized on June 17 through 23. The theme for this year is "Physical Therapy: In Touch With You."

The physical therapy department at the Rockcastle County Hospital is directed by Sheri LeCompte, who has held that position since November. She is a licensed physical therapist, and has a four-year degree from the University of Kentucky.

Mrs. LeCompte is joined in the department by Kim McGowen, a certified physical therapist assistant. She has a two-year degree from Jefferson Community College and has been working at Rockcastle since August, 1982. Miss McGowen is presently pursuing her four-year degree in physical therapy.

Karen Ramsey works in the department as a physical therapist aide.

Rockcastle offers many areas of treatment in its physical therapy department. These include cardiac, pulmonary and stroke rehabilitation as well as burn therapy, back and neck treatment, and sports, spinal cord and head injury rehabilitation. They also deal with sprains and fractures of the limbs, provide health fitness programs and aid in the fitting and application of any type of braces and splints.

To perform these treatments, the members of the department use a large physical therapy room which is just across the hall from the hospital's hydrotherapy room. They help patients with such machines as whirlpool baths, electrical stimulators, weightlifting, and "hot bus" exercises. They also use hot packs, ice therapy, traction equipment, paraffin treatment, exercise and ambulation training with crutches and walkers.

The physical therapy department staff treats people of all ages, from infants to adults. The outpatient load is close to 40 people a week, with the outpatients treated from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday through Friday. There are an average of 22 inpatients a day that receive physical therapy, with the rest available to them from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., seven days a week.

Kim McGowen commented, "For a hospital this size, we're capable of treating many types of patients which are referred to us by a physician. We have patients that come from Somerset, Crab Orchard, Richmond, McKee, Berea and Lancaster, as well as from all areas of the county."

Miss McGowen added, "It's rewarding to work with people and see the progress made in their rehabilitation."

Mrs. LeCompte agreed, "It's rewarding to give people back a function they've lost due to illness or injury. The part I think is challenging is to be able to work with someone and instill in them a belief that they'll regain function or at least encourage them to try to do something."

She said, "Without physical therapy, many people that could return to normal function are hindered by a condition that could have been prevented."

Protect yourself from sunburn this year

A problem during the summer months for many people is how to enjoy the weather without getting sunburned by staying too long or too unprotected in the sun. The American Family Medical Guide offers some practical information on what causes sunburn and how to tan safely.

What is sunburn?

Sunburn is inflammation of the skin and the tissues just beneath the surface by overexposure to the ultraviolet rays of the sun. The affected area becomes red, itches, and may become swollen and in severe cases blisters may form. You are much more likely to become sunburned if you have light skin. In addition, a few people are extra-sensitive to the sun because they have a disease or they are taking a drug that makes them particularly sensitive to the sun.

You can become sunburned without sitting under the blazing sun. Ultraviolet rays will penetrate a hazy atmosphere in which you may feel quite comfortable. Also, if you are on the water or on sand, sun rays may reflect off those surfaces and burn parts of your skin that you think are protected.

Sunburn is a special problem throughout the year in the intense sunlight of the southern and southwestern United States. Vacationers are especially susceptible, because they may unwittingly try to acquire a tan too quickly.

You can also get a sunburn on a skiing vacation because cold temperatures don't block ultraviolet rays and snow reflects them the same way sand and water do.

What are the risks?

Repeated sunburn, or regular exposure to strong sun over many years, breaks down the elastic tissues in the skin and malnutrition it took prematurely old and

wrinkled.

In addition, it can cause solar keratoses, which are roughened red patches of skin, to appear on exposed places, especially in fair-skinned people. Solar keratoses and/or long-term exposure to strong sun increase the risk of your getting skin cancer.

What should be done?

Prevent sunburn by not sunbathing or if you must, sunbathe sensibly. On the first day, spend only 20 to 30 minutes in the sun. Increase this by 30 minutes each day until you are beginning to tan, which usually takes four to five days.

During this early period, use a sunscreen, or sunblock, lotion with an SPF (Sun Protection Factor) rating of 10 to 15. The rating

should appear on the label. Try not to sunbathe between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. when the sun is strongest. Once your tan is started, use plenty of suntan oil or lotion to soothe your skin.

If you do get a sunburn, adopt the following self-help measures. Protect sunburned skin, even while swimming, by wearing clothing or applying a sunscreen or sunblock lotion with an SPF rating of 15 or more, and use a soothing cream. You can take aspirin to relieve discomfort. Do not sunbathe again until all signs of sunburn have disappeared.

If the sunburn is very painful, consult a physician. A low dose, anti-inflammatory steroid cream may clear up the problem in a few days.

The Rockcastle County Courthouse was burned in 1873 and many valuable records were lost. In addition, Kentucky did not require birth and death records until 1911. Often the only written record available is the record on a tombstone. That is why these cemetery inventories are so important.

We need your help. If you know of cemeteries that you want to be inventoried and included in the library, please tell us.

To date, we have done 178 inventories. Some are as large as Elmwood. Some have only one person in them. We want to include every-

We need information in particular about: 1) The Johnson Farm Cemetery on Copper Creek; 2) any cemeteries near Saltpeper Cave and the Poplar Gap area; 3) Corinth area; 4) Disputanta, Anglin Falls and Hammond Ford Road area; 5) Turner Cemetery on Piney Branch; 6) Denny Cemetery; 7) Gen-

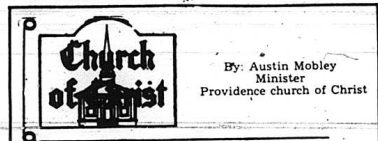
try Cemetery on East Fork. If you know about these cemeteries and cemeteries in these areas, please telephone Shirley Cummins at 256-4902, during the day.

"The Little Bible"

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16).

Because this verse is so comprehensive in scope, it has been called "The Little Bible" as well as "The golden text of the Bible." In this verse we have the spring, the stream, the dipper and the drink.

The SPRING is divine love. "God so loved the world." The Bible speaks of God's eternity, His wisdom, His power, a promise characteristic in His love. The object of His love is "the world" - not the inanimate creation, nor the sin of the world, but the world of humanity. Divine love knows no barrier - social, racial, etc.

The STREAM flowing from this spring is that God "So loved - that He gave." This is love in action, in expression. The gift was His only begotten Son. Not only our teacher, our example, but He gave His life for our sins. This is the preeminent thought in the text. Divine love might have been spoken by an angel, or written in golden letters in the sky; but neither would have cost anything, and for that reason, would not convey the message. The language of love is best expressed and understood in terms of sacrifice; so the supreme sacrifice was made.

The DIPPER is "who-soever believeth." The stream might flow on forever and not reach us if

we do not take the dipper and drink. God keeps the stream flowing; but man should appropriate the blessing. God's love is universal; but man's salvation is conditional. This "belief" is active, not passive. Faith works by love (Gal. 5:6). Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16).

The DRINK is "eternal life." Divine love has a twofold purpose: (1) Negative - "Should not perish." God loves us that He might restrain us (See Rom 2:4). (2) Positive - "But have eternal life." Love and life are associated. It is love that gives life. The stream of love is untouched by death. Eternal life is more than eternal existence; it is a life of eternal bliss. Who cares to live eternally in the misery of the present evil world? There is a "Land that is fairer than day!"

The stream of God's love is flowing to you, my friend. Why not take the dipper. Drink and live? "And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely" (Rev. 22:17).

Amendment would create another 16 million for 461

A bill amendment, submitted to the United States House of Representatives by 5th District Kentucky Congressman Harold Rogers, cleared a major obstacle last Friday when it was passed by the house.

The amendment would provide for an additional \$16 million for the Hwy. 461 reconstruction project between Mt. Vernon and Somerset.

The Surface Transportation Act of 1984, containing a funding amendment for Hwy. 461, passed the house 297-73, according to a press release from Roger's Washington office.

While the bill still has several other tests to pass before it becomes law the congressman said in the press release that he is cautiously optimistic it will survive.

The two-term congressman said that he thinks the bill will make it through the Senate but he is worried about a possible veto by President Reagan because the bill is somewhat over budget.

Rogers said that the bill could take sometime to get through the Senate and to the President because of the July 4th recess and the national political conventions this summer.

The additional 16 million dollars would make the project a \$33 million dollar adventure because the state of Kentucky has already appropriated \$17 million toward its work.

Rogers said in the release that the \$33 million dollars would make Hwy. 461 an "almost new road."

The state included Hwy. 461 in its six-year road plan last March.

Plans to rebuild the road at that time called for a \$5.4 million bypass around Mt. Vernon as well as construction to straighten and widen parts of the 13-mile section of road between Mt. Vernon and Somerset.

However, state funding was limited by revenue shortfalls that nearly killed the project altogether for a short time.

Rogers said that the improvements planned by the state would not have made the road a Class I status.

If approved, the combination of state and federal

funding now possible with Roger's bill amendment would allow upgrading of the road to Class I status.

Class I roads have wider shoulders and pavement surfaces, Rogers said.

Rogers said in his release that he had worked closely with the state in formulating a funding request that would allow comprehensive reconstruction of the road.

The state plan for rebuilding the road would have been completed by 1988, but Rogers said that if his amendment is passed \$10 million of the \$16 million asked for would be available in fiscal year 1985 and the rest would be available the next year.

It is not known as to how this would effect the final completion date.

Ohio man found dead near Fort Sequoyah, Sunday

A Cincinnati, Ohio man apparently fell to his death early Sunday morning from a cliff on Interstate 75 at Exit 49, just over the county line in Laurel County, according to Kentucky State Police.

Robert Hurdle, Jr., 57, was found dead on the Interstate around 6:40 a.m. by a construction worker, police said.

According to police reports, Hurdle stopped on the interchange at around 3 a.m. because of car trouble. When he could not get his car started, he apparently noticed a tractor-trailer truck sitting on the interchange and started toward the vehicle for help.

Police said that the interchange was not very well lit and that Hurdle apparently walked off about a 20-foot cliff, striking his head on the pavement.

Laurel County Deputy Coroner Doug Bowling pronounced Hurley dead at the scene.

Bowling said that preliminary rulling on cause of death was that

Hurley died of head injuries. Police at the London KSP post are ruling the death accidental.

The incident occurred near the new Fort Sequoyah.

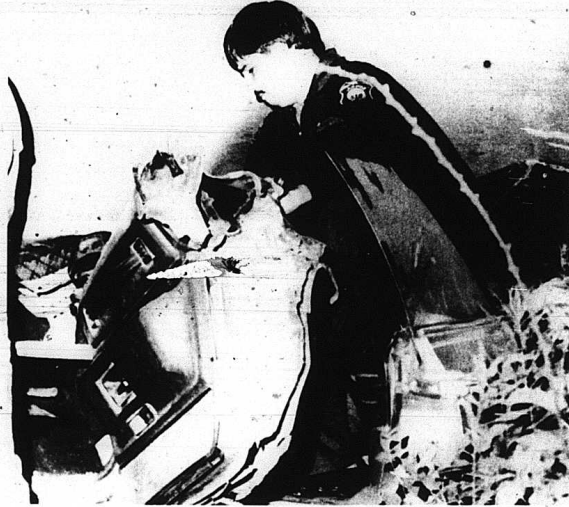
Harris named to council

Traffic accident on I-75 claims life of elderly woman

One woman was killed and three other people injured early Wednesday morning in a traffic accident on Interstate-75 near the Renfro Valley interchange, according to Kentucky State Police.

Monnie H. Bower, 72, of Kokomo, Indiana died at approximately 2:10 a.m. Wednesday from massive head and chest injuries, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that Mrs. Bower was a passenger in a car driven by Robert W. Lower, also of Kokomo, Indiana.

According to police, Lower's vehicle was sliding in the emergency lane of I-75 near the 64-mile marker, when it was struck by a tractor-trailer truck, driven by Donald M. Thier, 30, of Oak Ridge, Missouri.

Police said the truck knocked Louder's vehicle out of the road and over an embankment, coming to rest on top of the 1973 Cadillac. Lower, 59, and his wife, Eula, age 55, were able to get out of the vehicle after the crash, but Mrs. Bower and another passenger, Ella Reed, age 63, of

Indianapolis, Indiana were trapped in the car for over an hour before rescue workers from Rockcastle, Madison and Laurel counties were able to get them out, police said.

Mrs. Bower was pronounced dead at the scene by Dowell at approximately 4:30 a.m.

The driver of the truck and the other three passengers in the Lower vehicle were all taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital and Mrs. Reed was later transferred to the University of

Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington, police said.

The three women in the Cadillac were all sisters and they had reportedly been in Tennessee visiting a sick brother when they had to stop in the emergency lane because of car trouble.

A dispatcher at the London State Police Post said Wednesday morning that charges are pending against the truck driver.

This is the third traffic death in Rockcastle County this year.

Rash of break-ins have plagued county

A rash of break-ins and vandalism has plagued the county for the past few weeks according to local law enforcement officials. At least seven break-ins and two acts of vandalism have been committed in the last three weeks and no arrests have been made in any of the cases.

Three local restaurants, two grocery stores, a local shoe store and one private home have all fell victim to break-ins, as well as a total of \$185,000 in equipment being burned for no apparent reason on two different occasions, according to local police.

The break-ins began May 22nd when two of the drive-in's, Dollie's and Settles', both on U.S. 25 in the city limits of Mt. Vernon, were broken into. In both cases, the burglars gained access through back doors which they pried open, police said.

Very little was taken during these two break-ins -- cigarettes at Dollie's and a grease gun at Settles'. However, according to police, the grease gun was used to spread grease throughout the premises.

On Saturday, May 26, Ruby's Diner in Mt. Vernon was broken into, also through the back door. At least 30 cartons of cigarettes and chewing gum were taken in the break-in as well as over \$200 in cash. Police said that owners of the restaurant discovered

the break-in when they opened for business Saturday morning.

Carter's Market in Mt. Vernon was the next victim to fall prey to a burglar. On Thursday, May 31st, at least 400 cartons of cigarettes were taken in a break-in there.

The loss was an estimated \$2,600, police said. This, on Friday night, June 1st, at least 60 pair of shoes were stolen from Bullock's Shoe Store in Mt. Vernon. Police said that thieves broke into the business by the back door.

However, the biggest theft of all occurred sometime last Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning, June 6th, when observers apparently backed a vehicle through the front plate-glass window of Clayton Hammond's Supermarket on Hwy. 461 and took 600 cartons of cigarettes and a \$4,000 cash register.

Later that same day, a car, which had been stolen from Casper Mullins at Mullins Station, was found burned near Sand Springs and the cash register, which had been taken in the Supermarket break-in, was found in the trunk, police said. However, there was no trace of the cigarettes.

The home of Floyd Bullock on Hwy. 461 was burglarized during the evening hours of May 24th, while Bullock was away. A .38 caliber pistol and [Cont. to 18]

Mrs. Rice died of massive head injuries around 3 p.m., June 8, when the car, in which she was a passenger, struck a wrecker on Interstate 65, on the U.S. 31 entrance ramp, police said.

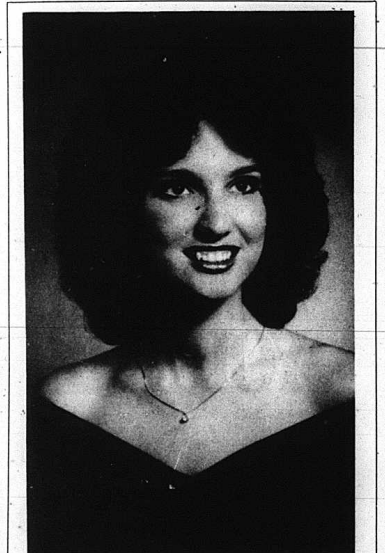

She was a retired teacher, having taught in Rockcastle County and Levy County, Florida, for over 40 years. She was a member of the Livingston Baptist Church where she served as pianist, a member of the Retired Teachers Association and the Ladies Auxiliary of the Livingston Fire Department.

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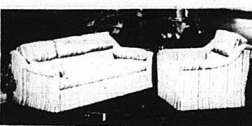
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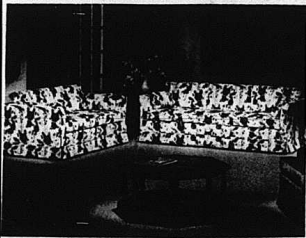

Brodhead student honored for SAT scores

Alan Purcell, seventh-grader from Brodhead Elementary School, recently received an invitation to attend an honors ceremony at Western Kentucky University for 188 Ky. seventh-graders who took the Scholastic Aptitude Test and earned a score equal to or greater than the average score achieved by high school juniors and seniors in a sixteen-state region.

The ceremony was sponsored by the Duke University Talent Identification Program of Durham, N.C.

The SAT usually taken during the junior or senior year of high school, is often used by colleges as a measure of a student's aptitude for college studies.

Those students invited to Bowling Green earned a verbal SAT of 430 or greater, a math score of 450 or more for girls or 500 or greater for boys, or a 52 or higher on the test of standard written English (TWE).

The highest scores possible are 800 on the SAT and 80 on the TWE.

Rockcastle County had 20 students eligible to participate this year; however, only 11 chose to follow through with the test. Those, other than Alan, who gave up a Saturday morning for test-taking are: Stephanie Morrison, Charles Shields, Allison Sowder and Melissa VanHoose (Brodhead); Audrey Youdell (Livingston); Adam Coleman (Roundstone) and Sara Anderson, Faitha Thomson and David Owens (Mt. Vernon).

This is the fourth year Kentucky has participated in the program and the second year Rockcastle County has participated. The 188 students in Ky. who were invited to attend the awards ceremony were the highest scoring of the 1,096 seventh-graders who took the test statewide.

Julia Roberts, program administration for teacher education at WKU, said

"The students involved are certainly ready for some learning experiences that are different from the average 7th or 8th grader, and they already have scores that would get them into some of the most prestigious schools."

We are proud of each of our Rockcastle County students who participated in this program. They are certainly to be commended for their high academic standards and level of achievement.

We are especially proud of Alan, who is the son of Rodney and Betty Purcell. Alan will be an eighth-grader this fall at Brodhead School. He is in Challenge, our new program for gifted education, and is interested in space exploration among other things. He is an active Boy Scout and is looking forward to attending summer camp at Mt. Sterling.

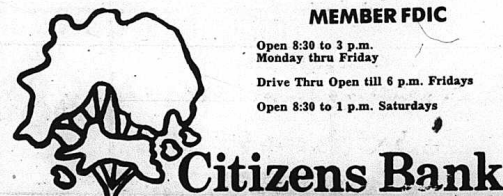

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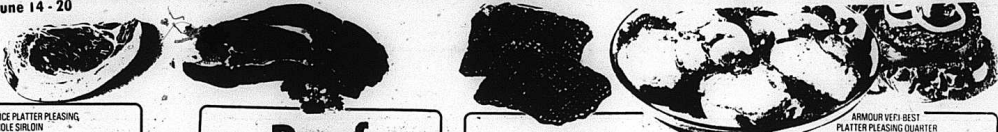
