for the railroad for 50 years. His work during the Depression would take him away for weeks to a month at a time because of railroad strikes, but he managed to keep his seniority and his job. They lost about 50 percent of their savings when the Livingston bank closed. Times were hard during the 1930s and she raised food and sent vegetables to where he boarded to help pay the bills.

Their lives weren't too disrupted by World War I and II. Although Mounts was examined for World War I, his work on the railroad was necessary and he wasn't drafted. And, by the second World War, he was too old to be called.

I asked Mrs. Mounts what she thought was the most exciting thing that ever happened in Livingston. She stopped to think. "We had strikes. And I guess the building of the school and gym was the most important thing that has happened here. We had a good high school here for years until they consolidated."

The Mounts were active

members of the Livingston Christian Church for 60 years. C.L. Mounts was baptized along with 26 others in 1924. Mrs. Mounts had been raised in a Baptist church, but went to the Christian church after she married.

Has she been happy in Livingston in the 62 years that she's lived there? "I guess as happy as happy as any normal, hard-working people are. I've worked hard farming ever since I've been here. It was rough land." She and Mounts had no children, but "we've had about six elderly people we've cared for in their old age."

Times have changed since the Livingston of the 1920s, and the saddest thing for her is the change in population. Many of her friends and most of her close relatives are dead. Her parents and brothers died one by one until she is the only one left.

It was a blow to Mrs. Mounts when her husband died last June. She gets lonely even though she has company fairly often. "It's just living, honey," she said. "It's just being alive. I'm trying to do some of the things Charlie wanted to do but waited too long to do."

Although she has a heart condition, she stays active, trimming shrubbery and taking care of the house. "Oh, no, I'd be glad," she said earnestly. "I'm not afraid of dying. I waiting on Charlie for over a year before he died and I prayed to live just to take care of him, he depended on me so much."

She never dreamed she'd live to be 90 years old, since people didn't live that long when she was growing. But there isn't much she would change. "I think sometimes you might do different, by you might do worse, so I've accepted my life as it is."

She added, "I think times are better than they ever were. People used to

talk about hard times, but they don't know anything about hard times. There's so much government aid now, and old people are a lot better cared for in these days."

At night, Mrs. Mounts has an 11-year-old guest, Anthony Medley, who has been staying with her for almost a year. If anything happens to her during the night, she'll have someone who can get help. She's got attached to Anthony and said, "He'll come put his arm around me before he leaves for school."

Irene Bales of Mt. Vernon is a close friend of Mrs. Mounts. "Clifford and I married in 1940 and since then we have been like a second mother to me. She helped me with the children and any time I needed advice, I would run to her. She taught me so many things and has been such a good example -- even up until now. We lived right across the road from her in Livingston until 1964, and after we moved to Mt. Vernon, she remained a dear friend to me."

"I remember her always being so pleasant and going out of her way to help others," said Mable Mullins of Livingston, who has also known Mrs. Mounts for 40 years. "She's a seamstress and she used to make burial clothes for people that needed them."

She's one of the best friends I've ever had. Just call her the Good Samaritan." Mrs. Mounts gave me a tour of the house she drew the plans for and then walked to the edge of her yard overlooking the creek and Daniel Boone National Forest. She pointed to the row of tall, strong trees that lined the driveway.

"I've set every tree on the place," she noted with pride.

It seemed to give her a great deal of satisfaction to know that the trees she planted would still be standing long after she was gone.

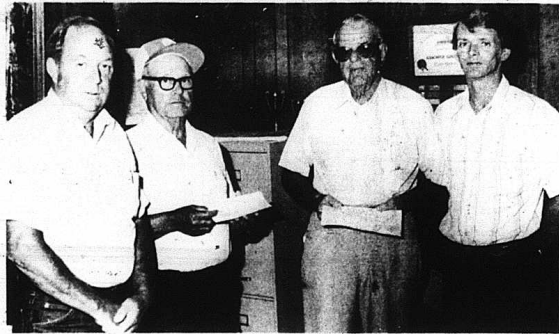
Driest June

According to official rainfall records kept for the county, this is the driest June in five years. Daily rainfall records are available only for five year periods, according to Bob Cox, who keeps weather records for Rockcastle.

Cox said that as of the 19th of June in previous years, the rainfall was as follows: 1983 - 2.59 inches; 1982 - 5.35 inches; 1981 - 4.62; 1980 - .25 or 1/4 inch. So far this year, only .14, or roughly 1/10 of an inch of moisture, has been recorded.

So far, farmers are facing the same problems they faced last growing season - unbanked earth, short hay crops and shriveling tobacco plants and corn.

Harold Bullinger, local ASCS officer, says that some farmers are already resetting tobacco which didn't make it through the initial setting and are harvesting less hay on the second cutting.

Fiscal Court accepts state proposal for Co. Road Fund

The Rockcastle Co. Fiscal Court met in special session Thursday and approved a new plan by the state Highway Dept. for disbursing county road funds.

In the past, the county has received their allocation monthly. However, this year, the state is offering to disburse up to 80% of the funds shortly after the fiscal year, with the balance to be paid in January or February of 1985.

The only condition for the county's participation in the program is the payment of 2% of the county's share of the funds (about \$6,000)

into an emergency fund to be disbursed from the state level to participating counties for emergencies such as washed out bridges, etc.

Of course, the county can make back part or all of this \$6,000 by investing the initial bulk payment in an interest-bearing account until needed.

Initially, there will be about \$900,000 in the emergency fund but the state may be able to add about \$2.5 million to the fund from another source.

The two representatives from the Highway Dept. told the court that another

Local attorney wins big settlement

A local attorney has received judgement in favor of a Knox County client the amount of which will be nearly \$600,000 when final payment is made.

The case involved the breach of contract case against Adams Resources and Energy, Inc., was awarded the judgement on behalf of her client, Delma Siddens in Knox Circuit Court, presided over by Judge Charles R. Lusk on May 18, 1984.

The original suit, which involved failure by the coal company to pay on

promissory notes Siddens held a month of stock sales, evolved four years ago and includes an appeal by Clontz on a previous judgement of \$312,000. The appeal was for an additional \$18,000 in interest which the court had failed to award the first time it ruled. The recent judgement included payment of the \$18,000 to Clontz's client.

According to Clontz, Adams Resource and Energy, Inc. is a Texas oil and gas company, recently involved in the coal industry in Knox and the judgement is collectible.

School Board votes to buy equipment for computer lab at RCHS

The Rockcastle County School Board met in regular session for its June meeting and dispensed with various routine matters on the agenda and voted unanimously to purchase computer equipment for a new computer lab at Rockcastle County High School. The equipment, which will cost approximately \$13,000, will be purchased either from Central School Supply in Louisville or Radio Shack in Lexington. The board left the final decision, which involves the selection of a suitable printer, to school personnel.

In other matters involving spending for specific schools, the board voted to help the Roundstone PTO with the cost of air conditioning the school. The Roundstone Elementary will also be getting a new roof some time this summer. Seven bids were received for re-roofing work on the school with a "Troc" (or equal quality) material. The low bid was submitted by Dixie Roofing Company of LaPolette, Tennessee for \$58,450. Other bids were as follows: Reliable Roofing Company of Lexington, \$59,588; Coatings Applications, Louisville, \$59,700; P and R Roofing, Lexington, \$59,988; R.J. Mantuffell Co., Louisville, \$66,706; Triangle Industries, Louisville, \$69,900; and Pearce-Phelps Roofing Co., Lexington, \$72,451.

Broadhead Elementary will be getting a new burglar-fire alarm system as voted on by the board following review of two bids for the purchase and installation of the system. The cost of the project is \$13,233.31 with the order going to Storm Security Systems of London. M and M Electric, Inc. of Danville submitted a bid of \$15,452.99.

Auditing of the schools' accounts and records will be done this year by William E. Robinson, CPA of Greensburg. Robinson's big was for \$1,470.00. The only other bid for this work was by Griffin, Greer and Co., PSC, CPA, Mt. Vernon for \$2,375.00.

The board followed the recommendation of Superintendent Charles B. Parsons and approved the placement of all certified personnel and 12 month classified personnel for the coming fiscal year, and approved the continuing contracts for the following persons: Sherry Webb, Ryan Riddle, Carla Parsons, Beverly Owens, Betty Jo McKinley, Patsy Morgan, Paula Clark, Regina Burton, Doris Cash and Roscoe Denny.

On the recommendation of the superintendent, the board also approved 5% salary increases for teachers and other classified personnel for the 1984-85 school year. Other raises approved were \$25 per month for position and the increase to \$3.94 per hour for hourly wage personnel. In other business, the board voted to approve a contract with Morgan Electric Company to wire the Roundstone building with 220 Volt bus drivers and to receive air conditioners in each room and office for a total of \$4,910.00; employed Dobby McClure and John Nugent for manual labor on the Broadhead School building, including painting and

Mrs. Mounts remembers Livingston in early days

There are many people in Rockcastle who have spent the greatest part of their lives here, living in the nooks and crannies of the county. They're hard-working folks who go to church, look after the families and lead simple, honest lives. They've learned to cope with death and heartaches. Although they may have never done something the world would consider extraordinary, it is their persistent hold on this thing called life that makes them extraordinary.

Gertrude Mounts of Livingston is one of these people.

Mr. Mounts is a 90-year-old widow, her husband, C.L., having died a year ago. Since 1922, when she came to Livingston as a new bride, she's occupied a house and 45-acre farm that has Roundstone Creek and the Daniel Boone National Forest in back of it and the road that used to be U.S. Highway 25 in front. She remembers things about Livingston in its early days that a lot of people never knew.

She sat on the porch swing of her brick, two-story house, and smoothed the lavender

handkerchief in her hands. Pink petunias bloom in the pots on her porch and the present seems far removed from the turn-of-the-century.

Mrs. Mounts was born in Clay County, the second child of Daniel and Mary Francis Allen. Her father named her Gertrude Balki. Some after a heroine in a book he read before she was born. She never really liked that name and just goes by "Gertrude." She had eight brothers, six of which survived to manhood.

Mrs. Mounts finished the eighth grade at Oneida Institute and then stayed on for nearly three years to work with the children there. "It was almost like an orphanage," she said. They had 33 little girls when I worked there. I cared for the children and registered them in."

When she was about 21, she moved to Detroit to work during World War I. She mostly cared for her brothers while there; two of them were in the service. Her stay in Detroit was cut short when her mother developed cancer. She began her trip to Stanford, Ky., to help care for her and it was on this journey that she got her first look at Livingston. "I came back to Livingston to wait for a train,"

she said in a clear voice, not even having to stop to remember details. "That's when I met Charlie Mounts (her husband). It was a Sunday afternoon and Charlie was in the agent's window since the agent had gone out to lunch.

"I thought he was the agent and I asked how long I would have to wait. He told me and then I asked if there was any place I could get lunch and he showed me where the depot restaurant was. Then one thing led to another and he found out while she was going. I heard from him while I was there."

She moved to Louisville with her parents when they left Stanford and took a job caring for four little boys whose mother was ill. C.L. Mounts visited her while she lived in Louisville. He did lineman and electrical work for the railroad and would ride to the city on passes they earned a year after they met. She was 28 and he was 29.

Right after their honeymoon, she and her husband settled in Livingston to help care for Mounts' widowed mother. It was only the second time Gertrude Mounts had been in Livingston. There was no water system or electricity in that part of

the county in 1922 and, although she was from a farm family, the adjustment was difficult.

"But it was either adjust or go back to Louisville," said Mrs. Mounts. "It was hard; I had got used to modern conveniences and modern living."

She estimated that at that time, Livingston had a population of about 1,400, which is considerably more than the 300 of today. There was a lot of activity in the town then. "For a long time, we had a bank and four good stores," she remembered.

"We had two good doctors, Dr. Amyn and Dr. Webb. The railroad was here as well as the water and coal stations. There was also the roundhouse, where they cleaned and repaired steam engines, the depot and a three-story, eight-gable hotel where the Taste Freeze is now."

The road by her house has changed along with everything else. It used to be U.S. Highway 25 and was unpaved. The only two cars in that part of the county belonged to Fred Mullins and Roy Cox. She recalled getting their first Ford in 1922. She laughed and said, "We had to come right around the hillside and

through a big mud hole!

"Yes, Livingston has changed terribly."

The year after she and Mounce married, they built the house she lives in now. "The house had been born in the little house in the backyard, and although they

lived there for a while, they needed something bigger. They installed a Delco plant and wired the new house at the same time. Mrs. Mounts gardened, farmed and raised cattle. C.L. Mounts worked

We hear of people being murdered and raped in view of witnesses who will not lift a finger to come to the aid of the victim. Fear also prevents them from assisting someone with car trouble who comes knocking on their door in need of help.

Until now, I thought incidents such as I have just mentioned happened elsewhere and that our small community was exempt from such fear. Well, welcome to 1984 Rockcastle County! We can now put ourselves into the same category with those individuals we hear about from the cities who are indifferent and/or fearful of their neighbors.

My brother, Dale F. Carter, who lives alone, fell at his home Thursday night and broke his leg. He is one of the few who doesn't have a telephone and, to add to his misfortune, after struggling to his truck it wouldn't start. So, he started crawling out the road, using his hands and one good leg to drag himself painfully and slowly along. He made it to his first neighbor's home and pounded on the door, asking for help. He got no response. He crawled for 1/4

of a mile with a broken leg. He yelled for help at each of the 4 houses he passed, in addition at least 10 cars passed him up as he tried frantically to flag them down. Finally, he made it to our mother's house and we quickly took him to the hospital and I'm thankful to say, he is doing fairly well. However, I'm terribly upset that he was forced to crawl, seeking help, and help was not given. I understand the times we are living in and it is true we can not open our doors to just anyone. But there is a very convenient instrument in practically every home that anyone can use without opening their door to render assistance. That instrument is called a telephone. All you have to do is pick up the receiver and call the State Police. Tell them someone is at your door needing help and that you are afraid to let them in. The person outside doesn't even need to know you are ringing help and that you are afraid to let them in. 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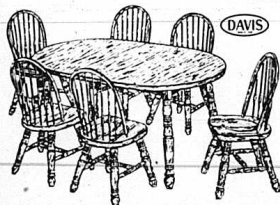
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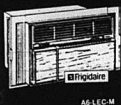

Board of Education Supports Special Education Center

On January 3rd of this year, the Rockcastle Co. Board of Education approved the opening of the Rockcastle County Special Education Center, located on the Family Life Center grounds at Renfro Valley.

The center serves public school-age children with severe handicapping conditions.

Superintendent Charles B. Parsons, along with board members, approved funding for the center in excess of \$2,000. The funding has been used to purchase necessary adaptive equipment, motor development equipment, positioning aids, self-care materials, communication aids, manipulatives, social play items and more.

The new Special Education Center is located in the Roundstone Elementary School District so Glenn VanWinkle serves as principal for the center.

The center presently

serves five children, ranging from ages 8 to 15. Enrollment is expected to increase to 7 or 8 students in the Fall.

The center is taught by Catherine Dotson and Lucille Owens. Each child's program focuses on the following areas: 1) Self-Help 2) Language development 3) Fine Motor 4) Gross Motor 5) Cognitive Development and 6) Social Development.

The children receive physical therapy and speech services. Physical therapy services have been contracted independently with Sherri LeCompte, licensed physical therapist with the Rockcastle County Hospital. The children receive these services twice weekly.

Speech services are provided by Lori Stewart, Speech and Language Pathologist, C.C., employed by the school system and Rockcastle Co. Hospital. These services are provided bi-monthly throughout the school

year.

Special playground equipment is being purchased by C.A.P. out of Lancaster. The equipment will be placed on the Family Life Center grounds and will be made available to the Special Education Center students for the '84-85 school year.

The center is applying for several grants for the upcoming school year. If approved, part of the grant money will be used to provide the center with transportation services. Other monies will go toward the construction of a new therapy pool providing the most innovative approach to motor skill development.

The center plans to supervise E.K.U. field placement for 84-85 school year. The areas that will be involved include Behavior Modification, Nursing-pediatric placements, Occupational Therapy and Speech and Language students.

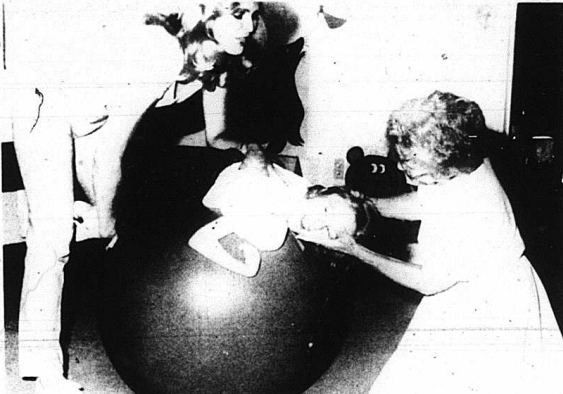
