### 1984 Kentucky State Fair You Can Enter

You are invited to show your "Pride of Kentucky" by entering the best you have to offer in your State Fair. Except for youth programs, such as 4-H, FFA & FHA, it is not necessary to be a winner on the county level to enter the State Fair.

Those who have a quilt to show, a painting or an animal, now is the time to make plans to enter them in the State Fair. Entry deadlines are coming up in July, which isn't very far off. PremNum lists and general rules are available at the county extension office or write for your own catalogue and entry forms to Entry Department, Kentucky State Fair, P.O. Box 37130, Louisville, Ky. 40233.

For most departments, there is no entry fee (except horse shows). Animals do require housing fees. In order to enter an item in the Kentucky State Fair, you must - A. Fill out an entry form and return it to the Kentucky State Fairgrounds by July 8th for textiles, culinary, arts and crafts, hobbies and antiques and by July 12th for plants and flowers. B. You will receive identification tags to place on your entries. C. Mail or bring your exhibit to the fair. Charges for mailed items are paid by the exhibitor. Items will be returned to you by C.O.D. at the close of the fair or

you can pick them up in person at the close of the fair.

Here are some possibilities for entries:  
Culinary: Breads, cakes, small cakes, cookies, jellies, decorated cakes, candies, preserves, butters, canned fruits, canned vegetables, canned meats, pickles and homemade wines. There are culinary categories for senior citizens and juniors, too!

Fine Arts: Oil, water colors, lacquer and acrylic painting, graphics, sculpture, collage, mosaic, calligraphy and hand-painted china.

Crafts: Metalsmithing, metal work, papermaking, pottery, creative textiles, photography and a student division!

Hobby Show: Leathercraft, woodwork, doll houses, tie projects, tooling, basketry, handmade flowers, artificial flower arrangements, shell craft, ceramics, porcelain, decoupage, iconage, tole painting, bread dough art, candles, macramé, tube painting, quilling, string and wire art.

Antiques: Quilts and coverlets, glass, guns and knives.

Textiles: Quilt display, weaving, knitting and crocheting, needlepoint and petitpoint, household furnishings, rugs, wearing apparel, crewel embroidery, infant articles, handmade dolls and toys, doll clothes and junior textiles.

Plants and Flowers: Potted plants, wall hangings, dried arrangements, rose show, gladiolus show, dahlia show, garden and women's Clubs.

### "Children of God"

"Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God; therefore the world knoweth us not, because it knew him not. Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is." (I John 3:1-2).

This expression, so full of tenderness, is frequently found in the Bible. It designates those who have answered God's call and are living in harmony with his will (Gal. 3:26-27). The appellation implies several things.

First, we are like God. The child bears the Father's image. When we were born of God, we became partakers of the "divine nature" (I Pet. 1:22, 23; 2 Pet. 1:4). Not only do we possess an eternal spirit but, as we mature in Christ, we develop the beautiful attributes of God such as love, longsuffering, forgiving, etc.

Second, we are the objects of God's love. "Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us..." (I John 3:1; Psa. 103:13). What child is there whom the Father does not love? There is nothing within His will that God would not do for His children. "According as His divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life (physical) and godliness (spiritual)" (2 Pet. 1:3).

Third, we are dependent upon Him. What can a child do without the Father?

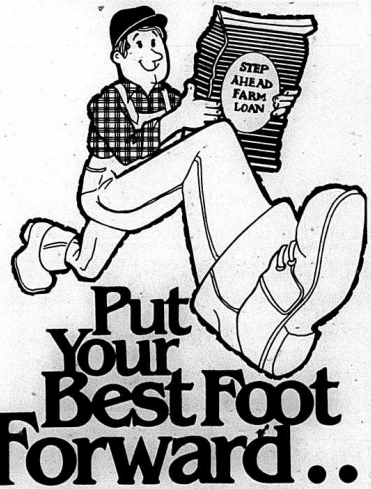
He is obliged to look to the Father for everything - food, shelter, comfort, etc. (Acts 17:28; Jas. 1:17).

Next, we are immature. The child has not attained the full stature of manhood like his Father. In no way have we reached perfection. We are slow to admit our sins, but who is bold enough to claim perfection? We are stammering, stumbling, blundering children, longing and striving for manhood when we shall put away "childish things." This is no encouragement to sin, but the statement of a fact of life (I John 1:8, 10).

Finally, as "children of God," wonderful possibilities reside within us. "Now are we children of God, and it is not yet manifest what we shall be." The boy wonders what he shall be when he becomes a man, but never knows for certain until he reaches manhood. Though inspired, John did not know all the possibilities awaiting God's children. It is enough to know that at the Lord's coming "we shall be like Him" and share with Him the riches of heaven. "And if children, then heirs; heirs of God, and joint-heirs with Christ" (Rom. 8:17).

Are you a child of God? If not, obey the gospel now. (Ga. 3:26-27).

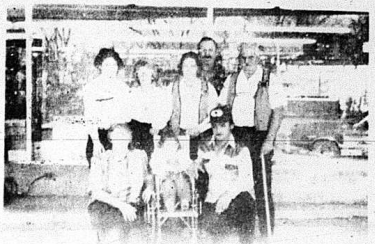

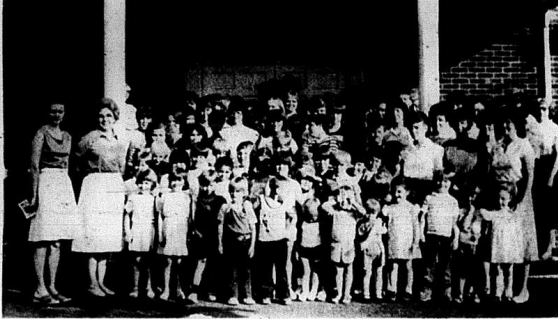

## Grand Jury indicts two men for reckless homicide

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury has handed down indictments against two men for reckless homicide, in connection with two traffic deaths on Rockcastle roads in the past two months.

One local man, Ricky Bussell, age 26, of Rt. 1, Brodhead and Donald M. Thieret, 30, of Oakridge Missouri were indicted after the Rockcastle County Grand Jury met last Friday.

Bussell's indictment was the result of an April 25th one-car accident on KY 1505, 5 miles north of Brodhead, which claimed the life of James Northern, age 27, of Brodhead.

According to police, Northern was a passenger in the vehicle, driven by Bussell, when it left the roadway, hit a tree and threw Northern from the car, killing him.

According to police, Bussell is presently in an out-of-state jail and has yet to be served with the indictment.

Authorities also said that another indictment is pending in connection with the same accident.

Donald M. Thieret was indicted for reckless homicide after the transfer truck he was driving struck a vehicle on I-75 on June 13, killing one of the four passengers, according to police who said that the indictment was sought after a lengthy investigation into the accident was conducted.

Police said that Thieret struck a vehicle, driven by Robert Lowder, 55, of Kokomo, Indiana, while it was sitting in the emergency lane of the Interstate. Thieret's truck then knocked Lowder's 1973 Cadillac over the guard-rail and came to rest on top of it, according to police.

Mr. Lowder's sister-in-law, Minnie Bower, 72, also of Kokomo, was pronounced dead

at the scene by Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

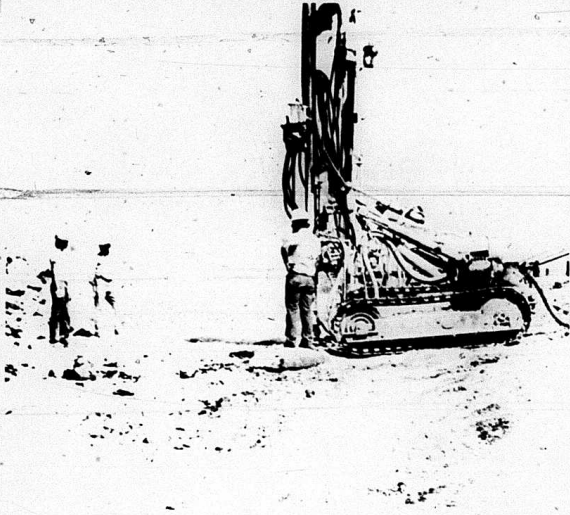
Thieret is scheduled for a July 27th preliminary hearing and is presently free on \$5,000 bond.

Two indictments were also handed down by the Grand Jury against two local men for receiving stolen

property valued at over \$100.

Virgil Mullins and Sam Mullins, both of Climax, were indicted for allegedly receiving log chains that were taken from Cummins' Saw Mill near Mt. Vernon during a recent theft.

Both men were released on their own recognizance pending a hearing in Circuit Court on August 10th.

## Livingston area residents present County Judge Jasper with petition against landfill

(The following is a news release from Appalachia Science in the Public Interest, Livingston, and concerns the proposed county landfill.)

A Livingston resident, Donald Jones, presented Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper with a petition signed by over two hundred Livingston-area residents at the Judge's office last Thursday, in response to the Rockcastle County Administration's proposal to place a new county landfill dangerously close to the source of the town's water supply.

The petition called for Judge Jasper and the County Magistrates to "withdraw

their application to open the landfill at the present proposed site, to choose a new site and to implement a county source reduction/recycling plan to extend the life of any landfill that may be opened and eliminate much of its potential harm."

"From an engineer's point of view, the site that has been chosen by the county is a terrible place for a landfill. In fact, I can truthfully say that it's the worst site that I've ever seen," said Arthur Purcell, an expert from Washington on county waste disposal planning, as he addressed Livingston residents on the waste-disposal problem here in the county.

"There's very little question in my mind that the precautions mentioned in the Engineering Report, submitted by the county to the state, will be inadequate to prevent a contamination of the watershed area below the site, which appears to me to be part of the watershed that becomes the source of Livingston's water supply," he said.

Many of the residents circulated the petitions after a town meeting was held to discuss action against the proposed landfill site. Most of the residents are definitely in favor of building a landfill somewhere, but not in an area that will be dangerous to the health of those who live nearby.

"If they (the county magistrates and Judge Jasper) don't care about us and the purity of our drinking water, why should we care enough

about them to keep them in office?" said one Livingston resident, who requested that her name be withheld.

Joe Clark, one of the Livingston-area County Magistrates, signaled his support for the community and a vote against the proposed landfill site by signing the petition. Tom Denny, the other Livingston-area Magistrate, was not available for comment.

The comprehensive waste reduction program, referred to in the petition, would involve the building and maintenance of a recycling center, which would extend the life of the landfill by as much as ten times the normal lifespan, provide jobs within the county for a number of people, help to lower the cost of waste disposal and possibly even make a profit for the county within a few years.

## New DUI laws could be sobering experience

On July 13, in effect will be a new law which stiffens penalties for convictions of driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs.

The passage of this new law may not immediately stop the deaths, but perhaps it will encourage Kentuckians to stop

and think before they get behind the wheel; those who "think they can handle it" might review these consequences before they drive.

\*After July 13, if you are arrested and convicted for the first time for driving under the influence, you will receive a fine of \$200-\$500 and could spend 48 hours to 30 days in jail. You will spend at least 48 hours in jail if you physically

injure another person. You will lose your license for 30 days if you agree to take an alcohol education or treatment program; six months if you don't. And you will pay for the program yourself. Under the old law, you were fined \$100-\$500 and more than likely did not spend time in jail.

\*For the second offense, you used to be fined \$100-\$500 and received a sentence of

three days to six months in jail, but you often received probation. Now you will be fined \$350-\$500 and spend a minimum of seven days in jail and could be sentenced to as much as six months. However, those seven days are non-suspendable. You will spend time in jail. You could also lose your license for a year and you must attend a treatment program - again, to be paid for

out of your pocket. \*For the third offense, you used to be fined \$100-\$500 and a sentence of 30 days to one year in jail. After July 13, you will be fined at least \$500 that cannot be suspended and 30 days to one year in jail. Anything less than 30 days cannot be suspended. You will also lose your license for two years. After July 13, these new DUI laws will truly be a

sobering experience for many Kentuckians. They are tough, enforceable and designed to make drivers think twice

before combining driving and drinking. I urge you to give these new laws some serious

thought before you get behind the wheel - not after you get behind bars.



"Tanning Your Hide Can Be Painful-Dangerous When a parent tells a child, 'I'm going to tan you hide,' the child does not expect the experience to be a pleasant one."

Too much time spent with bare skin exposed to summer sun can also lead to pain and discomfort. Getting one's hide tanned, whether by father or by sun, is painful and can be damaging to the skin.

Premature aging and skin cancer are linked to the cumulative effects of exposure to sunlight. If you want to look 20 years younger 20 years from now, now is the time to start.

People who spend time in the sun should use sunscreens to reduce the pain and hazard of sunburn, especially people who will be exposing, for lengthy periods of time, great patches of skin that have been covered for most of the winter and spring.

Sunscreens are the proper name for tanning lotions, gels, foams, oils and creams. Use a good sunscreen to block the damaging rays of the sun.

Sunscreens fall into three categories: those that absorb incoming light, those that reflect incoming light and those that do both.

Absorbers include para-aminobenzoic acid (PABA) and benzophenones. They go onto the skin clear.

PABA is probably the most useful of the pure sunscreens, since it absorbs ultraviolet light -B, the sun-burning part of the spectrum.

Reflective sunscreens block out all exposure with a combination of titanium dioxide, zinc oxide or talc, with other opaque substances. Zinc oxide is the white stuff lifeguards used to put on their noses.

The Food and Drug Administration now gives sunscreens a number called a Sun Protection Factor. The SPF is an exposure guide. A person using a sunscreen with an SPF of five would get the same amount of exposure in five hours that someone without a sunscreen would get in one hour.

Fifteen is about the highest SPF you can find. You should apply most sunscreens about half an hour before going out into the sun and reapply them after swimming or strenuous activities.

There is no point in using baby oil or mineral oil. Oily substances have no effect on ultraviolet rays or on the skin's reaction to them. But they will prevent diagnosis. The moisturizer may keep skin moist, but it will not prevent peeling - don't get burned.

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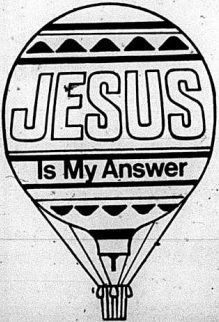

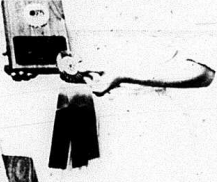

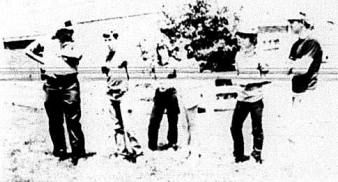

Probably sensing how much money was on the line, former University of Kentucky All-American Sam Bowie strolled without expression toward the podium Tuesday after being the second player picked in the NBA draft. Then, during an interview with USA Network's Al Albert, the popular big man from Kentucky kept on his business face to match a neat blue business suit and dark tie.

Bowie's expression, or lack of, was a message: this is a job now, fellows.

And so it was the usually bubbly Bowie as all business at a moment that must rank as the zenith of his

life. But he was polite and demonstrated what a first class human being he is when it came time to acknowledge a few special people who helped him get where he has gotten to.

"If it hadn't been for the support from the community of Lexington and the state of Kentucky I couldn't have made it," he said.

He added this—"Coach (Joe B.) Hall and his staff did a wonderful job for me and I'd like to thank Coach Hall for everything."

On his new coach at Portland, Bowie said, "Everybody knows Dr. (Jack) Ramsay is a great coach who knows basketball. I'm looking forward to playing for him."

Portland's probable starting lineup? Bowie at center, 6-10 Mychal Thompson at forward with 6-9 Kiki Vandeweghe, with Jim Paxson and Lou Carnetta, who handled analysis of the draft for USA Network, said this of Bowie: "Excellent. Bowie's an outstanding passer. I think he will be a great, great pro."

**Amazing**  
Has anyone else wondered about

what our colleges and universities are teaching student athletes these days?

Watching interviews with just drafted NBA players Tuesday was in some ways sad, and embarrassing too. I found it amazing how poorly most of these 21- and 22-year-old men—many of whom are about to become millionaires—handle simple question and answer sessions. Embarrassing.

Some of our most celebrated "just graduated" basketball players could not get beyond a succession of ponderous mumbblings and "you know, you know, you know." And it was equally clear how much attention these young fellows are accustomed to receiving. Of all those interviewed only Kentucky's Sam Bowie and Auburn's Charles Barkley took time to acknowledge God and/or family.

Bowie: "I might now I'd like to thank my mother and say, 'Mom, I made it.'"

Barkley: "I'd like to thank God for this opportunity and also my mother and grandmother. They are two special people in my life."

That's the class.

But most of the draftees handled their interviews poorly, leaving one to wonder what have these fellows been doing the last four years?

Of course, if we are honest we know some of the answers. Most have been taking courses called Basketball 101, Trampoline 109 and Balloon Blowing 260.

This is no frivolous criticism if only because one must keep in mind that these young men are role models for our children.

Among the better conversationalists yesterday were Bowie, Barkley, Michael Jordan of North Carolina, Tim McCormick of Michigan, Devin Durrant of Brigham Young and Jeff Turner of Vandenberg.

Among those who... well, let's just say, need some "tutoring" in, at the very least, conversational skills, are: Vern Fleming of Georgia, a Melvin Turpin of Kentucky, Lancaster Gordon of Louisville, Tony Campbell of Ohio State and Michael Young of Houston.

Sleepers in this year's draft? Those players not expected to have an impact, but who will...

Durrant was selected by the Indiana Pacers. He could become an excellent sixth man in the mold of John Havlicek.

Turner is going to the New Jersey Nets. A rugged 6-9 hustler, Turner said it best: "I don't do anything great, but I do a lot of things well."

Olympic assistant coach George Raveling on Turner: "The Nets did their homework. Turner's a coach's player in that he uses good shot selection, defends well, and he hustles. The Nets did their homework."

Colleagues most likely to make an immediate impact in the NBA? A few are...

Barkley with the 76ers is strong enough to handle 42 push and shove sessions. Bowie with Portland because he is very good of the rebounding boards, particularly the outlet pass. And of course, Jordan. Called a "people's player," the 6-5 newest Chicago Bull will work exceptionally well in coach Kevin Loughery's system. Not only because of his talents, but because Loughery was himself a big guard in the NBA. Jordan will get some freedoms he would not have gotten under Ramsay at Portland.
