



New DUI laws could be sobering experience

On July 13, in effect will be a new law which stiffens penalties for convictions of driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. The passage of this new law may not immediately stop the deaths, but perhaps it used encourage Kentuckians to stop

and think before they get behind the wheel; those who "think they can handle it" might review these consequences before they drive.

"After July 13, if you are arrested and convicted for the influence, you will receive a fine of \$200.8500 and could spend 48 hours to 30 days in jail. You will spend at least 48 hours in jail if you physically

injure another person. You will lose your license for 30 days if you agree to take an alcohol education or treatment program; six months if you don't. And you well fined \$350-\$500 and spend a minimum of seven days in jail don't. And you well fined \$350-\$500 and spend a minimum of seven days in jail don't. And you were fined \$100-\$500 and more than likely did not spend time in jail.

*For the second offense, you used to be fined \$100-\$500 and more than likely and to spend time in jail.

Too much time spent with bare skin exposed to summer sun can also lead to pain and discomfort. Cetting one's hide tanned, whether by father or by sun, is painful and can be damaging to the skin.

Premature aging and skin cancer are linked to the

cumulative effects of exposure to sunlight. If you want to look 20 years younger 20 years from new, now is the time to start.

People who spend time in the sun should use sunscreens to reduce the pain and hazard of sunhurn, especially people who will be exposing, for lengthy periods of the winter and spring.

The Food and Drug Ad-ministration now gives sun-screens a number called a Sun-Frotection Factor. The SPF is an exposure guide. A person using a sunscreen with an SPF of five would get the same amount of exposure in five hours that someone without a sunscreen would get in one hour. The Food and Drug Ad-

Fifteen is about the highest SPF you can find. You should apply most sunscreens

about half an hour before going out into the sun and reapply them after swimming or strenuous activities.

There is no point in using baby oil or mineral oil. Oily substances have no effect on ultraviolet rays or on the skin's reaction to them. But they will prevent dyness. In order to achieve greater effectiveness and productivity in the operation of their offices, the circuit clerks participated in a time management seminar conducted by Dr. Jerald R. Smith, director of University cuplication of effort, procrastination and distrac-ting interruptions which cur-tail successful professional achievement.




