there could be rapid deterioration if the dry weather continues," the Commissioner added.

At present, 65 percent of the state is reported to be short of moisture, 33 percent is adequate and 2 percent has a surplus.

"This is an improvement over last week when 82 percent of the state was listed as short," Boswell said.

At this time, corn, soybeans and tobacco are listed as being in good fair condition. The state's hay harvest has been very active, with high quality hay being reported.

"I was very glad to see the improvement in soil moisture content. That's enabling crops to maintain their growth," Boswell said.

Rockcastle County Grocer charged with food stamp violations

Edgar Barnett Store, Mt. Vernon, has been barred from accepting food stamps because of program violations, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service, reports.

Owned by Mrs. Dealie Barnett, the store was disqualified from the Food Stamp program for five years, starting June 25, after being charged with selling tobacco products, a flashlight and other ineligible items for food stamps.

Hello from Clear Creek Valley

I sit, looking at the picture before me of a man who has meant much to me in the past - my dad, O.M. Payne, who would be 119 years of age this coming July 7th if he could have lived. But he departed this world in 1961, which is 33 years ago. My memories of his kind childhood are of a kindly and loving father of whom I'm very proud. He was an honorable and just man, fair in all his dealings with his fellow man and he proved it by being in the public as a storekeeper and postmaster of the Disputanta Post Office for many years. He came to Clear Creek in 1893 and remained until his death, raising a family of 11 children. My dad was a gentleman and a Christian and his belief was somewhat like the old mountain men who said he believed you had to "be a Baptist and vote the Republican ticket" if you wanted to get to Heaven. I was in Mt. Vernon on

business to the Signal office last week where I saw Editor Anderkin try out some new machinery. She and her husband are constantly trying to find ways to improve the paper. I even heard her remark that she would return to the office that night to do some work. The fact that the paper's circulation is over 5,000 is due, in part, to this woman's striving to improve and make interesting for the reader, the newspaper that we expect each week in our mailbox. We take no thought for the struggle to report news and meet a deadline - I know for I am sitting here at 12 a.m. thinking up "I should be nice if you'd put a card in the mail telling Mrs. Anderkin how you feel about this newspaper."

From the big city of Chicago to the outskirts of McKee in Jackson county, I hear of people who hold Rockcastle and Clear Creek close to their memories.

Mary Ethel Croucher McCollum was born on Clear Creek in 1905, she writes from Gray Hawk, a community near McKee in Jackson County. Her mother was a sister to Tom Legear and named Nannie. Her memories of Clear Creek are of going to the Payne's Store and to Uncle Rube Abney's grist mill as a little girl with her father, Elijah Croucher. She remembers Monkey John Gadd being there playing the fiddle and "dancing all over the mill floor" as she tells it. Mary lives alone and "would be so glad to see you," she writes. It was a wonderful letter written by a lonely woman whose contact with Clear Creek is only through the Signal which she has been reading for years, paying \$1.00 a year for it then (I can hear some of you groan). So thank you for Mary for the letter and picture you sent. I'll bring you a "Reader Button" and sit down for a cup of good coffee one of these days.

My next letter was from a good old Rockcastle name - Mullins. There's a plenty of them in this neck of the woods but, however did you stray all the way up to Chicago, Richard Mullins? He used to wet his feet in the creek near Mullins' Station but strayed off in 1959. Shame on you, Richard, for leaving all the hazelnut thickets, sawbrars and blackberry patches down here - you won't find the hill country up in Chicago where you used to build a fire at night and look at the big yellow moon while the other boys told ghost tales. No wonder you pass up those big city newspapers and read the Mt. Vernon Signal. You're homesick so get right on down back home and visit Roland

His wife, Celia McCracken Anglin, passed away some months ago but his daughter, Beatrice Durham, lives with and helps Ivory with his home. She greatly resembles her mother, who was a pretty woman.

I hadn't seen Ivory for many years so we talked of old time people and days when he lived on the creek.

Paul Galvan is a cool little Texan with Mexican features. A Walt Garrison drawl and he chews tobacco like a cow poke.

When he is not administering from behind his principal's desk at Trimble Tech High School in Ft. Worth, Tex. or seeing to his duties as supervisor of officials for the Southeastern Conference, Galvan is on his way to a college basketball game somewhere in these United States.

Galvan, along with Dale Kelly in the south and Hank Nichols in the east, is one of America's very best college basketball officials. He is at the top of his profession as the diamond studded NCAA Final Four ring on his right hand attests.

Galvan has been an official for 20 years and he talked about his profession recently, some of its high points.

"I've done games in the Metro Conference, Western Athletic Conference, the Southwest Conference; of course the SEC, and I've done some of the best inter-sectional games too," he said. "And I think without a doubt the Southeastern Conference is the best there is."

Galvan has worked a pair of NCAA Final Four games. The first was in 1974 when he called the seminal final match between UCLA (Bill Walton, Keith Wilkes) and North Carolina State (David Thompson, Monte Towe and Tom Burleson).

"It was a great game," he said. "went two overtimes. That was the night UCLA's streak of wins in the NCAA ended."

Three years later Galvan worked

the NCAA title game that matched Marquette and North Carolina. "That one was special," he said. "It was at the Omni in Atlanta and it was Al McGuire's last game. There was a great deal of emotion involved with the game, it was hard not to be moved by it with McGuire crying and so forth. No, I'll never forget that one."

Marquette won 67-59. Although he has been in the SEC for 10 seasons, Galvan became familiar to Kentucky (boo-bird) fans last season when he seemed to be assigned to many crucial games involving the Wildcats. In fact, he was assigned to four. But UK lost two of them and one of those, at Alabama, when Galvan levied Sam Bowie his fifth foul and erased an apparent follow basket, made an indelible mark. He was duly branded "anti-UK" by some hardcore types.

"I'm kind of surprised you would

say that some fans think I cost Kentucky a ball game," Galvan said. "because I've had Kentucky when they've won and lost on the road. Yes, it surprises me that people feel like I might play favorites."

"I remember having a crucial game at Auburn (against UK) two years ago when I had to throw Charles Barkley out of the game," he said. "So, if it was a situation where I was playing favorites to any team then I wouldn't have been throwing out a team's star player in front of 15,000 fans. But I'd do it at Auburn, I'd do it at Kentucky."

Galvan was severely criticized for expelling Barkley. In fact, according to another referee, "Paul is still

catching a lot of hell over that one." "The thing is," Galvan said, "I'm going to work my tail off in the games that my contract calls for and as long as I'm satisfied that I've done the best job I could do then it doesn't matter if Kentucky wins, or Indiana wins or LSU wins." so to speak. "People don't come to see me referee, they come to see the players. But I try and make the same call at the end of a game that I made at the start. Consistently. One thing, I'm not ever going to swallow my whistle on a call. When I do that it will be time to get out."

Galvan holds UK's Joe B. Hall in high esteem.

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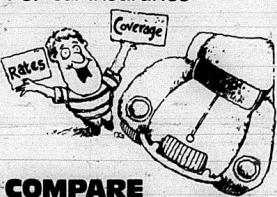

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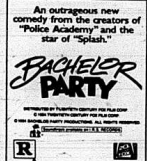

"Part of his job as coach is to try and intimidate the officials," he said. "But the thing about coach Hall is he says what he's got to say and then gets off it. Another thing, usually when a coach is vocal his players are too. But I've never heard a word from a Kentucky player. They're always well behaved."

Free agency. Referee ratings are not made public. But this reporter learned that Galvin is rated at or near the top by Kentucky's coach.

Precedent. The Supreme Court established one last week that is not unlike baseball's free agency in the early 1970s. The Court's decision that college football's "have to" belong under anti-trust status (belong in the corporate portfolio with General Motors and AT&T) was hardly a revelation. But what the new free agency means is: first, the football "have" can negotiate their own television packages in the free market of supply and demand.

The backlash of that will be this: now that a precedent is on the books, college basketball's heavyweights—Kentucky and Louisville in the front rank—won't wait long before demanding their own free agency.

Just as Nebraska Football Inc. would like it must share Cornhusker pie with the likes of UK. U of Indiana, how long before the basketball boys ask the same question?

Not long. Reminds me of something referee Paul Galvan said. "When you start talking about the big bucks these institutions are getting for playing on television, they're going to let TV dictate about anything they want to."

A result of that could be this: Say for example, UK signs a television basketball package with the Ted Turner Network and TBS decides, for ratings sake, it wants the Wildcats on the tube on Tuesday and/or Friday night, what's going to happen? UK will play. And the NCAA and its member institutions will have nothing to say about it. Sadly, a result of that could be this: high school basketball, the college game's golden egg, will suffer one more blow, perhaps a killing one.

Let's wait and see what happens next.

Cedric Henderson, once headed to the University of Louisville and

then a University of Georgia signee, the 6-8 220-pounder from Marietta, Georgia, was in Louisville last week working as an unpaid counselor at the U of L summer camp.

Mt. Vernon City Council Meets

Citizens concerned over crime; turn out at meeting

Many people are highly upset over the number of break-ins that have occurred in and around the city limits of Mt. Vernon in the past several weeks.

Over twenty of these people made their feelings known Monday night during a special called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The fact that the Mt. Vernon police force has not been able to make an arrest in connection with the break-ins, and that the break-ins have continued with regularity, evidently prompted the large citizen turnout at the meeting.

"I think we need more police protection during the night, 12 to 6," said Mrs. Dollie Pillion, owner of the Mt. Vernon Dairy Freeze.

Mrs. Pillion was the first citizen to voice her opinion on the matter during the meeting.

Most of the persons at the meeting spoke of a need for more police protection at night, especially between the hours of midnight and 6 in the morning. "I'm here to say we can catch these fellows, this is getting ridiculous," said Clarence Carter, owner of Carter's Market in Mt. Vernon.

"You can't sit out here in front of this building and down at the jail and catch these people, you've got to sneak around just like they do," he said.

"I don't think it will do any good for two policemen to ride in the same car, they need to get out of those cars and walk around so they won't be as noticeable," Carter added.

"I've set over at the house for two or three hours at a time and never seen a police car go by," said Bobby Anglin, "I need more patrolling by these police at night."

The question as to whether a curfew could be imposed to get people off the street after midnight was also raised and a majority of the citizens at the meeting seemed to be in favor of one.

"Could there be some kind of curfew law passed by the council," asked Johnny Hedge, manager of Food Fair Supermarket in Mt. Vernon.

"Basically, you can't enforce a curfew unless it is some kind of public emergency, such as a flood or whatever," said Mt. Vernon City Attorney Carl Clontz, who has repeatedly told the council on various other occasions that it is unconstitutional to impose a curfew.

"In my opinion, I would call this some kind of crisis," Hedge said.

"They have a curfew in London," said local furniture dealer Oscar Fain. "I don't see why we can't have one here."

"You can't take an adult off the street in this country for no reason, it is just not constitutional," Clontz said.

Fain went on to say, "Mt. Vernon used to be a laughing stock because we had Clifford Pittman and McKinley Arnold who couldn't drive a police car, but we didn't have the number of break-ins we're having now, nowhere near the number."

"I'll tell you what, if I had a job as a policeman I'd either stop them or I'd quit one, I wouldn't let them make a

monkey out of me," Fain added.

Fain also recounted one incident he witnessed, "I was sitting at my house one night, saw an individual stealing a C.B. radio out of a man's truck. I called for the police and you could see the cruiser coming from two blocks away. The thieves ran over the hill till the cruiser passed. They waited about thirty minutes and came back to the truck and stole the C.B."

"They're (the police) are going to have to change their pattern of doing things," Fain added.

Once most of the concerned citizens had spoken, it was the council's turn. All of the members were very outspoken on the problem and each agreed that something had to be done immediately.

"I think that it is the duty of an officer to stop someone who is out on the street at 2 a.m. and not going to or from work or having an emergency, to see what they're doing out at that time," said council member Jack Renner.

"Even if we can't impose a curfew, we can find out what people are doing out at that time of night," he added.

The fact that State Troopers in the county go home at midnight and there is not another one on until 8 a.m. was also brought up several times during the meeting and Mayor Roland Mullins said that he wanted the council to pass a formal resolution asking the State Police Post at London for help between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m.

After almost an hour of discussion with citizens, Mayor Mullins called in the three police officers, present at the meeting, Ronnie Hurd, Frank DeBorde and Mike Hopkins, to discuss what measures they were going to take to try to get a hold on the crime in the city.

Mullins also called for an executive session for this discussion.

After about forty minutes, the council came back to open meeting and Councilman Renner made a motion to place Frank DeBorde in charge of the police force for the next 60 days; to put two police officers on duty between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. with the officers walking and checking and using their vehicle as well and having

DeBorde to coordinate a neighborhood volunteer watch program.

The motion carried as well as a motion for the formal resolution to the State Police requested by the Mayor.

"This is only on a trial basis and if this doesn't work, we'll do something else," said Renner after making his motion.

Thieves still on rampage; Superior hit Friday night

One local grocery store was lucky, but the other was the hardest hit since the rash of break-ins started in Rockcastle County about five weeks ago.

Superior Food Market, on U.S. 25 near Mt. Vernon, was broken into last Friday night and the biggest haul yet was made by robbers who gained entrance through a back door.

"They used twenty of the big bags to carry our stuff out the back door," said one of the store's owners, Ms. Florence Reppert.

"They took only name brand cigarettes and left the ones you couldn't give away," said Mrs. Reppert's son, Ronnie, who also works at the store.

"The best that we can tell, they took about 800 cartons of cigarettes, not to mention 4 country hams and other miscellaneous items," Mr. Reppert added.

Reppert went on to say that a carton of cigarettes cost about \$7 wholesale and that they were figuring their loss at around \$6,000.

Mrs. Reppert said she and her daughter discovered the break-in when they opened the store for business on Saturday morning.

"When we opened the store, my daughter noticed that 4 of the cigarettes were missing and we walked to the back aisle to see what else was

missing and you could see all the way out the back of the store," she said.

"The robbers had completely destroyed the back door and it is untellable how long it had been that way," Mrs. Reppert said.

"Anyone could have come in the store and gotten anything they wanted, there was nothing to stop them," she added.

Both Mrs. Reppert and her son pointed out the fact that they were robbed the same day they received a new shipment of cigarettes.

"They robbed us at the time when they could hurt us the worst," Mr. Reppert said.

Reppert also pointed out that the same was also true of the break-in at Hammond's Supermarket and at Carter's Market. "They were both robbed the same day they got a new supply of cigarettes," he said.

Had a neighbor not been awakened by loud noises, Food

Fair Supermarket would have also felt victim to thieves.

At approximately 4 a.m. Thursday morning, Harlan "Buck" Farthing and his wife were awakened by noises. Farthing told police that he got out of bed and went outside his home, which is located almost directly behind Food Fair.

One of the store managers, Lewis Catron, said that the thieves apparently based their escape route of his home and left from behind the store on foot.

Police said the thieves had been using a sledge hammer to break concrete blocks out of the back wall of the building. This was the same method thieves used to gain entrance to Franklin's earlier in the week.

These break-ins are only two in a series that have plagued the county, and especially the city of Mt. Vernon, for the past several weeks. As in all of the other break-ins, no arrests have been made.

Fiscal Court votes to pay Sheriff \$1000 a month

In a move to try and deter some of the crime in Rockcastle County, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, on a motion by First District Magistrate Donald Rowe, voted to give Sheriff William Taylor \$1,000 a month on a two-month trial basis to act as a deputy for the express purpose of patrolling the county roads after midnight.

The action came during the court's regular monthly meeting Tuesday morning.

Although the county's budget is set up for this fiscal year, Anna Rose Mullins, Judge Jasper's secretary, said the money could be taken from the road fund and given to the Sheriff, if the court voted to do so.

Rowe's motion was prompted by the number of recent break-ins and acts of vandalism that have occurred in the county and the fact that State Police go off duty in the county at midnight.

Grand Jury hands down indictment for reckless homicide

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury has handed down yet another indictment for reckless homicide in connection with a traffic death near Brodhead on April 25th.

Michael DeBorde of Mt. Vernon was charged in connection with the death of James Northern, 27, of Brodhead, after a police investigation revealed that DeBorde was apparently racing his vehicle with the vehicle, in which Northern was a passenger, on that Wednesday night.

Northern was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County Coroner Billy Dowell after he was thrown from the car, driven by Ricky Bussell, of Mt. Vernon. Bussell has already been indicted in the case and is awaiting arraignment in Circuit Court.

DeBorde is presently free, after filing a \$10,000 bond and is scheduled for a court appearance on July 27th.

Three other indictments were also handed down by the Grand Jury but they have not been released because the parties involved have not been brought before the court. One of the indictments is against a former businessman in Mt. Vernon.

week, hauled at a cost of less than \$2.25 per cu. yd. Currently, there is less than 40 percent of that amount being hauled by the county and at a cost of more than \$5.00 per cu. yd. This translates into a cost of 75c per 30 gal. bag after the people put their garbage on the county trucks. The people are spending from 35c to 55c for gasoline per bag to get their garbage to the trucks, and then neither age, sex nor physical impairment is an excuse for not loading the truck. The written contract between the County and the Contractor specifically calls for a man and truck.

Dear Editor,

Generally the first edition of the month, of your newspaper, carries a front page story of the problems being encountered by the Fiscal Court and the Contractor who hauls garbage. It has escaped my notice that you ever print anything about the problems the people in the county are having with their garbage. Possibly I am as much to blame as anyone for I have neglected to bring any of these problems of the people to your attention. Unless the Fiscal Court changes the course of their actions, the problems of the people, with garbage, are probably going to get a lot worse.
One year ago, the County was having more than 480 cubic yards of garbage, every

I operate a waste collection service in the Brodhead area and collect garbage at the home for 60c per bag or box of whatever equals a 30 gal. size. I'm just not particular about how my patrons package their garbage. Another operator in the Conway area tells me that they furnish the bags and charge only 75c for collecting at the home. These figures seem to make two questions obvious: ONE: Why is it costing the people over \$1.10 per bag in addition to the time and money spent to haul their garbage to the trucks? TWO: How long can they be expected to bear the system and its cost.
In the current budget for Rockcastle County, there is enough money, now earmarked for garbage, to provide collection at the homes, if the money were spent for that purpose. However, the money is not, being proposed, to be spent in that manner. The budgeted items indicate that the money cont. to pg. 5

Landfill to Garbage

To the Citizens of Rockcastle.

It seems that the biggest thing to hit Livingston in decades is the Proposed Landfill, which will be located off the Mullins Station Road near Pine Hill.

Did Appalachian Science in the Public Interest intend for the petition they gave Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper, as a protest against the proposed landfill to be a legal document? If so, they should not have let wives sign their names then their spouses; husbands should not have been allowed to sign their names, then their spouses and children should not have been allowed to sign their names, then their parents' names and grandparents' names. Also, people who live out-of-state should not have been allowed to sign the petition. I am not a handwriting expert, but I can recognize the same handwriting.

On the petition, four statements were made, I would like to address them:

(1) Contaminate Livingston's water supply, thus posing a health hazard to all who drink the water; and (2) in all likelihood, toxic waste will also enter the water supply and increase the harm. Taking those two statements first: The toxic waste they refer to is found in all garbage. In trash bags, trash cans, dumpsters, even in the ten dump sites in the city limits of Livingston on Roundstone Creek. These sites are county wide. Drive along any road and you'll see them. This toxic waste forms then it rains and the water runs off and enters the creek. This is pollution. This same toxic waste is in the raw sewage in Livingston that is dumped back into Roundstone Creek. This is what makes Livingston smell so bad in the summertime. You can't drive through there even with the car windows rolled up and the air conditioner on.

At the proposed landfill site, a leachate control system will be installed. This is an area where the moisture that seeps or oozes from the garbage will be collected. It will be analyzed, then percolated through a filter system and neutralized should it be contaminated and reach underground water systems.

Two other statements made (they were also numbered one and two): (1) Withdraw its application to open the proposed landfill and choose a new site; and (2) Implement a county source reduction/recycling plan to extend the life of any landfill that may be opened and eliminate much of its potential for harm.

Address to No. 1 of these: Several other sites were tested for a sanitized landfill and denied by the Division of Waste Management because they did not meet with their standards. The Division of Waste Management and the Environmental Protection

Agency know the problems with the contour, structure and terrain of the Appalachian Mountains. They are constantly testing and trying to solve these problems. As this area and type of terrain make selection of a landfill site not only in the state of Kentucky (but other states) few and far between, some time should have been spent in studying the landfill application notebook and the rules, laws and by-laws of operating a sanitary landfill.

Federal laws require that by the 31st day of December, 1985, every county in all 50 states have in operation a sanitary waste disposal system.

Address to statement No. 2 above:

As to a recycling plan. Is Appalachian Science in the Public Interest going to volunteer to do the recycling? Are the citizens in this county ready for a huge tax increase? Why huge you ask? Look how a recycling plant works - (1) Engineering plan to be drawn up (2) Building bought or built with heat, water (both hot and cold) for baths, electricity and communication equipment (3) Trucks and people hired to drive them have to be furnished to pick up the garbage and transport it to the recycling place. Wages, insurance, gas, oil and parts aren't the only things that this garbage comes in, it has to be sorted by workers - rags in one pile, paper in another pile, food in another, tin in one pile, aluminum in another, etc. Trucks have to be ready to transport this stuff on to a place that buys scrap, etc. the same day as it cannot lay should it become toxic. Who will pay for this? (6) When something comes in from a hospital, doctor's office or nursing home, this stuff cannot be sorted, it must immediately be buried somewhere. Then the people who handle it must immediately take a hot bath and change clothes lest they become contaminated.

These are only a few of the problems and, if this trash is sold to a recycler, it will be some time before a profit of any kind is realized.

Before anyone gets involved too deeply in claims about toxic waste from the proposed landfill going into Livingston's water supply, look around at your own

pollution. Do you have a livestock barn or outhouse located above your water supply? If so, you are using polluted water. Do you have a septic tank? If not, you're polluting somebody. You throw trash along the roadside and cause pollution.

If toxic waste from the site will get into anyone's water system, we don't want the landfill approved. As we don't want anyone poisoned or harmed.

However, if this site is approved, we wish to be left alone as the Division of Waste Management will be checking, monitoring and analyzing this site constantly and I'm sure people will be reporting anything they see that they think is illegal.

This need not be debated in the newspaper or on street corners as a hearing is scheduled for July 9th and 10th at the Courthouse.

Please read a little and think a lot before you jump to the cry of contamination.

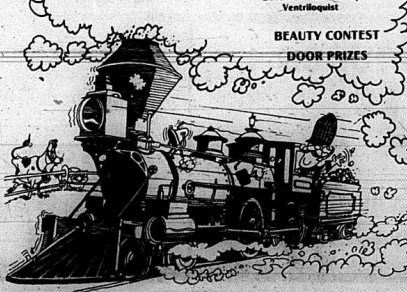

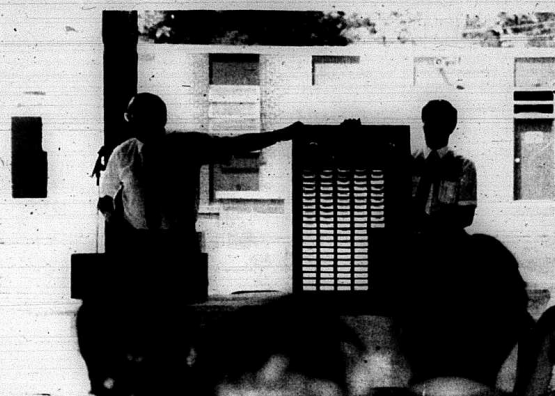
