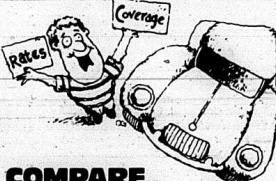

Dear Captain Brittain:

As you may know, Rockcastle County, and particularly the City of Mt. Vernon, has experienced an increase in break-ins in the past few weeks. This increase appears to be largely a result of the fewer number of State Troopers now assigned to Rockcastle County.

Further, the fact that no troopers are on duty between the hours of midnight and 8 a.m. seems to have worsened the problem.

I understand the Mt. Vernon City Council has requested State Police help between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. The Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted unanimously in its July 3 meeting to request that State Police authorities assign additional troopers to Rockcastle County. The Fiscal Court also requested that work schedules for state troopers be set up in a manner that permits police personnel to patrol on the highways and in the towns of Rockcastle County on a 24-hour basis.

As counsel to the Fiscal Court, I join the Court in making these requests, and pledge the continued assistance of my office in every possible way.

## Local school system will participate in "School Effectiveness Program"

In an effort to improve the quality of education in Rockcastle County, the local school system will take part in the school effectiveness program for the 1984-85 school year.

The chairman of the effectiveness committee, Bige Towery, who is also transportation director and Chapter I coordinator for the school system, said Tuesday that

Rockcastle was one of 25 school districts in the state chosen to participate in this program.

"Some districts declined but Superintendent Parsons recommended to the board that we take part," Towery said.

"On April 9th through 20th of last year, a team from the Kentucky Department of Education visited Rockcastle County schools interviewing teachers, administrators,

reviewed the curriculum and surveyed some students and parents," Towery added.

"After the survey team submitted their effectiveness report the local committee felt that the areas most needing attention were leadership, instructional planning, instructional time and evaluation and reward needs," Towery said.

Towery said that his committee devised such a plan

to try and upgrade all of these areas with subcommittee of parents, teachers, board members and administrators being formed to help in the task of addressing the areas of need.

The committee chairman outlined six steps that the effectiveness plan is geared toward. These are: (1)

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## Graves arrested in Berea Saturday

The second suspect, sought in connection with the recent rash of break-ins in and around the City of Mt. Vernon, has been arrested.

Randy Graves, age 20, of Mt. Vernon was arrested last Saturday in Berea by city police, who spotted Graves there, after a warrant was issued for his arrest for receiving stolen property in Rockcastle County, according to local authorities.

Police said that Graves was immediately transferred to the Rockcastle County Jail under \$10,000 bond.

According to local authorities, a preliminary hearing was held on Wednesday and Graves case was waived to the grand jury. He remains in jail under the same bond.

The other local man arrested in connection with the break-ins, Earl Overbey, age 18, of Carter Drive in Mt. Vernon, was released in the custody of his mother last Monday, after a preliminary hearing in district court.

Overbey is 18, but he will reportedly be tried as a juvenile because the crimes he is accused of occurred before he reached 18.

While these two arrests have been made, not all of the break-ins have ceased.

Thomason's Scrapper in Mt. Vernon was broken into last Thursday night. The theft was discovered by the owner, A.B. Thomason, on Friday morning when he went to open his garage.

Thomason said that thieves gained access to the garage through a side window which they broke out.

Taken in the break-in was over \$300 worth of tools. "It could have been worse," Thomason said. "Whoever it was must have got nervous because there was a lot more stuff in the garage that was worth a lot of money that they didn't bother."

These arrests have been made in connection with this break-in.

## Indictments returned

Two Rockcastle County men have been indicted by a Circuit Court Grand Jury for receiving stolen property, valued at over \$100.

Bill Barron and his brother, Randy Barron, both of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon, were indicted after they were charged in connection with a May 22nd burglary at the home of John Randall Barnett in Rockcastle

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## Lake is main topic at meeting

Even though the Mt. Vernon City Council has hired a policeman to patrol Lake Linville in a boat for five days a week, boat dock operator Ed Jackson says that is still not enough.

Jackson made his feelings known during the council's regular monthly meeting last week.

"This is not in any way a slap on James Thompson (the policeman patrolling the lake), I just think that you all should give him more authority and let him start writing citations to violators," Jackson said.

Jackson was present at the meeting to ask the council for help in (1) keeping boats out of Hysinger Hollow (2) keeping campers from camping around the lake and not in the camping area and (3) to keep landowners from building docks on their property, which according to Jackson, is against the city's ordinance.

"James goes up and runs all the boats out of the hollow (Hysinger Hollow) and, by the time he gets back to the dock,

they are all right back in there," Jackson told the council.

"A lot of people have told me that there are no signs posted and they think it is alright to go up in there," said Councilman Joe Martin. "I think we should put the signs back up and then start writing tickets, that should take care of the problem," he said.

## Local dentist is state champion in slalom water skiing

You can usually find Dale Coffey on Lake Cumberland any week day morning at 6 a.m. He joins a couple of friends and they each spend about 20 minutes on the water before heading back home to get ready for work. This ritual continues from April until early October.

What's going on at Bunsie Marina, you ask. Good fishing? A Loch Ness monster in Kentucky?

Nope, it's slalom skiing. You know, where you cut through lake water on one ski at a fast clip while trying to beat a path around the buoys that mark the course. If you fall into the water, you're out. It's not as easy as it sounds.

"Unless you've skied a course, you don't know how difficult it is," said Coffey convincingly. "But I love the competition of it." He ought to know. In June, he skied to the winner's spot in the Men's II Division of the Kentucky State Championships in Paducah. That was after he won the

Atlanta Open in Georgia and the Mid-America Two Round in Paducah, also last month. Last year, he placed 30th out of skiers from seven states who competed in the Regionals and secured a rating of 250th in the world. And he's only been skiing competitively for three years. Up until 1981, Coffey skied just for the fun of it.

The 31-year-old dentist could pass for a skier, looking trim and athletic in his dental office in Mt. Vernon where he practices dentistry two days a week. The rest of the time, he practices in Somerset, where he lives with his wife, Phyllis.

Coffey and his sister, Janice, grew up in Mt. Vernon, the children of Henry and Margaret Coffey. He began skiing when he was a freshman in high school and developed a passion for the sport that continued longer than he dreamed it would. Charles B. Parsons first taught him to ski and Parsons said they skied together for almost seven years.

"Dale and my son Randy were about the same age and were buddies, and I'd take

them camping to Lake Cumberland. Dale was a quick learner and caught on fast. We skied together until Dale was in college and skiing on his own," said Parsons. "We had a lot of fun and I always respected Dale."

Coffey's father bought a boat when he was a senior in college at Cumberland and he was on the water every chance he got. He kept improving his slalom skiing during the four years he spent at the University of Louisville School of Dentistry by going to the lake on week ends.

When he opened his dental practice in 1979, he finally had more time and money to spend on his favorite sport. "At that time, I didn't even know anything about competition skiing; it was totally recreational," he said.

All that changed after Coffey helped found Somerset's first water ski club - the Lake Cumberland Skiers. They were organized in 1980 and by 1981 held their first tournament in Somerset. The club has grown to almost 30 members.

Coffey explained how water skiing tournaments are run. "There are three types of skiing: slalom, trick and jump." There are also different age categories for both men and women; he skis in the Men's II Division which is for males aged 25 to 36.

During the tournaments, there are two rounds with everyone competing twice. You choose your best run of the two to determine the winner. You really don't go head to head with someone else. Everybody runs the same course separately and you take the best score of the end."

The almost 600 foot course is marked by buoys. All contestants follow the same course and use the same boat, driver, timer and boat judge. The driver, timer and judge ride in the boat to make sure the skier's run is completed fairly. Each run is timed by a stop watch so the competitors are pulled at the right speed.

The boat maintains a straight path through the middle of the course; it's up to the skier to swing wide of the six buoys placed at strategic points

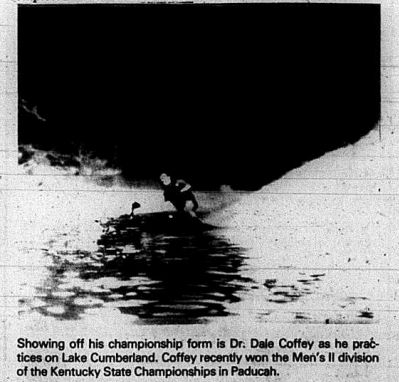
in the lake.

Coffey competes in what is appropriately called "short-line skiing." A 75 foot rope is used which has links in it that are removed to shorten the line. Therefore, if the skier completes the course suc-

cessfully holding on to 75 feet of line, he can then work his way down to 60 feet, 53 feet and less.

The maximum boat speed for the Men's II division is 36

We are not equipped to feed people in emergency situations. In 1984, we have housed 44 adults and 27 children with emergency need for housing.

population of our county. In 1983, CAP employed 34 Rockcastle County residents, with a total earnings of \$198,700.00. CAP expenditures with local suppliers totaled \$65,100. The total cost of operating the 12 Rockcastle County projects in 1983 was \$463,800.00. The Christian Appalachian Project supplied \$225,500.00, or 49% of the cost of these projects from contributions of its national donors. The remaining 51% came from fees for services, state funds and the sale of clothing through the ATTC.

CAP is made up of people. Therefore, we are apt to make mistakes. But, if one stops to consider these statistics, it appears that CAP is quite active in the financial well-being of many of our county families and businesses.

Dear Editor,

On Friday, July 13, 1984, simultaneous new conferences were held throughout the State of Kentucky concerning the new DWI law, or "Slammer Bill" as it is often called, which became effective on that date. The significance of the effective date being on a Friday the 13th is sad news for those who drink and drive.

The new DWI law is much stronger than the previous law. Persons arrested for driving while under the influence of alcoholic beverages or other substances will now be facing much stricter penalties. The penalties grow much stronger with each subsequent DWI offense. Thus, repeat offenders upon conviction will not be happy to learn about those penalties the court must give them.

The new DWI law places new demands on police officers, jailers, prosecutors and judges, all of whom are required to deal with DWI offenders within the perimeters set forth in the new law. During the last month, a series of all-day seminars have been held throughout the state for these criminal justice officials.

The last such meeting was held in Somerset on July 11, 1984, and was attended by many criminal justice officials from southeastern Kentucky. Instruction was provided by representatives of each criminal system and was sponsored by the Kentucky State Police and the office of Attorney General David L. Armstrong who was the luncheon speaker.

It is hoped that publicity about

the new law and its penalties will bring a renewed awareness to drivers on Kentucky highways who may be inclined to drink and drive. The Kentucky State Police joins with other law enforcement agencies and criminal justice officials in seeking compliance with the law to reduce traffic accidents and deaths caused by drivers who are impaired and under the influence of alcoholic beverages or other substances.

However, if drivers see fit to drive while under the influence, officers of this agency stand ready to remove them from the roads to face whatever penalty the new law requires.

## Deer hunt deadlines

If you plan to don the orange and deer hunt this year, applications are due now. Advance applications are necessary to hunt on several wildlife management areas and federal installations.

Random drawings determine who hunts on all these areas and, if you hope to hunt on your favorite area, applications need to be sent before the cut-off dates. Be sure to get yours in on time.

At two military posts, timing is most important because applications are rejected unless received between specified dates.

At Fort Knox, applications for week end bow hunts will be accepted only between July 14 and July 29. Bible Baptist Church averages between 40 and 50 people at its services, he stated.

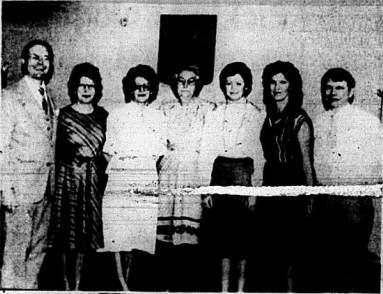

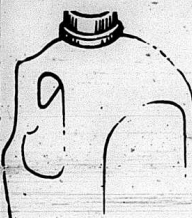

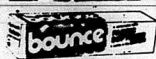

Coffey said he gets nervous waiting for his turn to compete. "Falling is your biggest fear, not getting hurt," he said. "I've been hurt when I had five stitches in my head where I hit the ski on. You can get broken limbs or sprains."

His mother, Margaret Coffey, worries about him when he travels to compete. "Yes, I do worry," she admitted, "and usually I call every Sunday afternoon to check in on him after he gets back from a tournament. And I have a phone number where I can reach him at all times while he's gone."

But Mrs. Coffey is proud of her son's success. "I didn't think he would have time to get into competition, but Dale puts everything he does."

Coffey says in a tournament almost every week end

during the season, traveling to each of the seven states in the southern region. These include Tennessee, North Carolina, Indiana, Georgia, Alabama, Kentucky and Florida, although he doesn't routinely get that far south.

A member of the American Water Ski Association, he gets the annual Southern Regional Guide which lists all water ski tournaments scheduled each year. "It's the bible of the sport,"

"Water skiers are a very close-knit group," Coffey noted. "The competition part of it is still very family-oriented with most family members usually there with the skiers."

Where does a top-rated skier in the state go next? He plans to compete in the Regionals again this year which are to be held in West Palm Beach, Fla. To ski in the regionals, you must first have a "merit" rating that is received by skiing 40 buoys in a sanctioned tournament.

And then what? Up from the Regionals are the Nationals in August. To compete in the Nationals, a skier must have two Exceptional Performance (EP) ratings. "This separates the men from the boys," he said. "To participate in the Nationals you have to EP two tournaments before you're eligible. An EP is three buoys at 35 feet off the rope."

Coffey has EP'd in practice but not in competition. His goals are to compete in the nationals by this time next year, but he really doesn't entertain the faster a skier goes. At 35 feet off the rope to 36 mph, a skier can reach up to 60 mph on the water.

Coffey said he routinely competes at 32 feet off the rope, and only top skiers ski at 35 feet off. The worst record has recently been broken and is now set at four buoys at 39 1/2 feet off. When the line is that short the rope won't reach around the buoy and the skier has to stretch his body to make it.

Once a skier falls, he's out of the competition for the day. To tally a skier's score, the judge multiplies the number of successful passes of the course times the buoy's turn points are given the shorter the line length.

During competition, Coffey wears gloves and a competition vest. The vest is lightweight and designed to give Coffey's interest in water skiing has affected where he lives. He mainly moved to Somerset to practice dentistry because it was close to Lake Cumberland. And, recently, he and his wife have moved to a house on the lake which is only about 300 feet from the dock at Burnside Marina.

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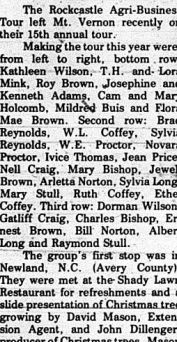

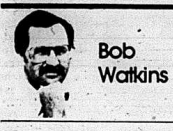

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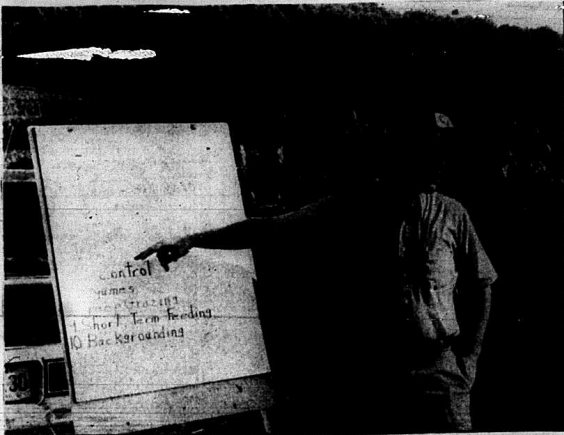

## Training class for welfare recipients

A special training class for eligible welfare recipients in the Cumberland Valley Area Development District will be sponsored in August by the Cabinet for Human Resources. The classes in home-maker/home health care will begin August 13 at Union College in Barboursville.

The class is part of the federally-funded Preventicare program and will be limited to 25 eligible people who receive benefits under the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program. Participants who successfully complete the seven-week training course will be employed by the Cumberland Valley District Health Department, the Seton Home Health Agency, the Knox and the Whitley County Health Departments.

Human Resources Cabinet Secretary Al Austin said Preventicare is aimed directly at providing a needed service and some necessary training for welfare recipients who will in turn supply the service. "Many of these people who will take part in this program are unemployed due to a lack of education, job training or marketable skills," he said. "We hope to provide them with the opportunity to pursue an existing job and to become self-sufficient."

Preventicare involves the development of a network of in-home services to better enable elderly and disabled persons to live in their own homes safely and comfortably. "At the same time, it will provide jobs for people who receive AFDC benefits," Austin said. "The people who receive this service might otherwise have to enter a long-term

care institution."

The program is open to AFDC recipients who have not been placed in jobs or job training through the Work Incentive Program. Applicants must have a valid driver's license, be at least 18 years old, in good health and able to read on a seventh-grade level.

During training, participants will continue to receive AFDC, medical and child care benefits. They also receive incentive pay, work clothing, lunch allowances and reimbursement for transportation costs.

Those participants who get a

passing grade at the end of the course will be placed in jobs that are funding-guaranteed for at least 12 months. Each job will be in an employee's county of residence. Employees under Preventicare receive wages, fringe benefits and reimbursement for mileage incurred during working hours. They also retain their medical cards for the year.

Applications for enrollment are available now at the Department for Social Insurance offices.

Interested AFDC recipients may also contact their public assistance caseworker for more information.
