## McConnell is featured speaker at Republican Rally Friday night

Calling him the leading Republican in the state of Kentucky, local attorney Joe Lambert introduced the Republican nominee for United States Senator, Jefferson County Judge/Executive Mitch McConnell, to approximately 60 supporters who gathered at the Rockcastle County Library Thursday night for a pot luck supper and to hear McConnell.

McConnell, who called for a change in the Senate in November, had some very interesting remarks about his opponent, Democratic Senator Walter "Dee" Huddleston.

Speaking for about thirty minutes, McConnell revealed some facts about Huddleston to his local constituents, which included many county officials as well as Rockcastle County Republican Chairman Alonzo McCollum.

According to McConnell, the image portrayed by Huddleston as a "QUIET" Senator is much deserved because of his record in Washington for the past 13 years.

"They call Dee Huddleston the quiet senator, if I had a record like his I would try to keep it quiet too," McConnell said.

Concerning Huddleston's record, McConnell told the crowd:

"Last year, Huddleston was the 18th biggest spender in the United States Senate. Since 1979, Huddleston has received the big spender award from the National Taxpayers Union, a group in Washington that rates Senators on their spending record."

"Voted to create 106 new federal bureaus??? and voted against only one."

"Voted to give away the Panama Canal."

"Was for the MX missile when Jimmy Carter was, is chairman of 50 percent of the time and to the other one, one time out of 12."

"A member of the Small Business Committee, Huddleston attended 16 percent of

the meetings in the 96th Congress and one of 37 in the 97th Congress."

"In 9 of the last 10 years, Huddleston was in the bottom half of the 100 Senators who showed up to vote on the Senate floor and, in the last five years, he has been in the bottom one-third."

"However, Huddleston is one of the top eight Senators opposing Ronald Reagan the most in the 97th Congress."

"Only two Senators supported Jimmy Carter more in the 96th Congress than did Huddleston."

Stated the fact that the tobacco support price is \$1.75 for the third straight year and that Huddleston is a member of the Agricultural Committee, McConnell said that Huddleston has done absolute nothing for the farmer in Kentucky.

"I would have more influence in the Senate, as a freshman senator than Huddleston does because the Senate is Republican controlled," McConnell told his

audience.

Saying that the country needed four more years of Ronald Reagan and a new Kentucky Senator, McConnell said that in Reagan he said "cost-tails."

"I'm not saying that Reagan's election will assure my victory but it sure can't hurt," he said.

"Since World War II, Republicans have won eight of fifteen Senate races, and five of those eight years were Presidential election years," McConnell said.

"However, a Republican has not been elected to the Senate since 1965 and I think it's time for a change," he added.

Ending his speech with an appeal for contributions, McConnell told the crowd that he could not win unless he had the needed money.

"I am the closest to an incumbent across the nation in fund-raising," McConnell reported. To date, he has raised 1.3 million dollars compared to Huddleston's 1.5 million.

## County students receive better test scores for 1984

The Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills, given to students throughout the state of Kentucky each year, has a good report for the Rockcastle County school system.

Three of the four classes tested in 1984, in the local system, had higher scores than did the students tested in these grades in 1983.

Bigge Towery, Chapter I Coordinator and Transportation Director, said Monday that all of the scores were up considerably except possibly for the tenth grade and these scores were not immediately available since they were apparently being gone over by high school principal Cleston Sayler.

"It's hard to say, but from what I can tell right now, it looks like the tenth graders' scores are going to be lower than they were last year," Towery said. The other three grades tested were the third, fifth and seventh.

"The third graders scored the highest of the four classes, when compared to the national average," Towery said.

According to data supplied by Towery, 71.6 percent of the third graders tested were either at or above the national average, a gain of 12.1 percent from a year ago.

"The highest scores were recorded in the area of math," he said.

The other two areas covered by the test were reading and language and, Towery said, the reading skills part of the test was the area third graders scored the lowest in.

69.2 percent of all third graders tested scored above the 50 percentile in reading, while 62.7 percent were ahead of the average in language skills.

"Fifth graders recorded the best overall gain in scores from last year," Towery reported.

The fifth grade class jumped a total of 21.8 percent from their 1983 scores with their best efforts also coming in math.

However, fifth graders had the biggest increase in scoring in the language part of the test, scoring 29.0 percent higher than last year.

This year, 53.2 percent of the fifth grade class were above the national average in the reading part of the test.

62.2 percent were better than average in the language skills and, as in the third grade, the highest scores recorded in the fifth grade were in math, with 63.2 percent above the national average.

"Although the seventh grade class did not fare as well as the lower two grades, their scores were better than those of 1983," Towery said.

A gain of only 10.1 percent was shown for the seventh grade class with the best scores coming in language.

51.9 percent of the students, as compared to 42.0 percent in 1983, scored above average in language skills.

47.6 percent of the 7th graders tested were above average in reading skills, as compared to 41.6 percent in 1983.

The lowest score recorded on the test by last year's 7th graders was in math, with only 45.2 percent being above the average. However, an 8.2 percent gain was recorded in this area when compared to 1983 when only 37.0 percent scored above average.

"The only dark spot in the test scores this year is in the tenth grade, I think," said Towery.

Without the summary of the tenth graders' scores being available, Towery couldn't give any exact figures right now on their scores. However, he did say that from a quick look at individual scores, he felt this grade might be down from last year.

"For example, in the one area which Towery took the time to go over and group the individual scores, math, only 32.2 percent of the class were above the national average, as compared to 39.0 percent in 1983."

Towery noted that as students got older and moved into the higher grades, it had been his experience that scores dropped. "This fact is not only true for Rockcastle, it is a national trend," Towery said. "It has been this way for years."

The transportation director said that the state-wide rankings, showing how Rockcastle students compared to other systems in the state, will be released on August 3 by the state Department of Education.

Last year, Rockcastle ranked 161st out of 182 school systems in the state.

## Local firm applies for home health agency

A Rockcastle County firm has applied for a Certificate of Need which would allow them to open another Home Health Agency in Rockcastle County.

Appalachian Medical, Inc., a Mt. Vernon based corporation, is submitting an application to the State Board of Need and Licensure several months ago and, last Wednesday, they were granted an extension on their application until November.

The local firm is owned by Gary R. Cromer, Mike Gary, Dr. P.J. Montayne and Dr. Dale Coffey. If their application is approved, they will be permitted to serve Rockcastle and Laurel counties in the field of home physical and respiratory therapy.

In past weeks, some controversy has arisen as to how Appalachian Medical's application, if approved, would affect the present home health agency in the county.

"We would be starting a completely different home health agency from the one presently in operation and our agency would simply provide a service that the one in the county does not provide now," Cromer said.

"We will provide some general nursing services, but our specialty will be the respiratory and physical therapy," Cromer added. "We will have nothing to do with the present agency."

Appalachian Medical, Inc., must prove to the state that there is a need for the service in the

two-county area by November when the board will vote on the application.

## Third arrest made by police in break-ins

Another man has been arrested in connection with the recent break-ins of homes and businesses in the county.

Alton "Rocky" Boswell, age 28, was arrested Sunday, July 25 at Pic Pac Supermarket by city police and charged with first degree burglary, in connection with the recent break-in at the home of Willis Bussell on Quarry St. in Mt. Vernon.

The Bussell residence was broken into sometime the week of July 12-15 while the family were away on personal business, according to Police Chief Ronnie Hurd. Hurd said that a shotgun, a watch and other jewelry, an arm cassette radio, boy's jacket, Case XX knife and two rings were taken in the break-in.

The police chief said he later recovered the shotgun, watch, knife and rings and the jacket, which Boswell was reportedly wearing at the time of his arrest.

Hurd said Boswell has also been charged with theft by unlawful taking as the result of the theft of a television set from the Keith Cummins' residence. The

However, it is a double-elimination tournament and the 13-year-olds will get their chance for a comeback Thursday morning at the tournament site in Danville.

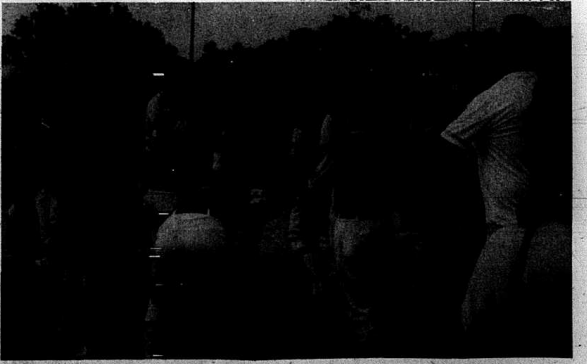
In the regional championship game, Rockcastle committed few errors but were sluggish with their

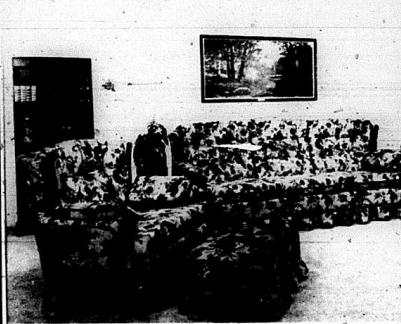
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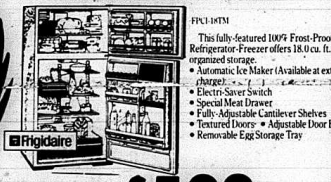
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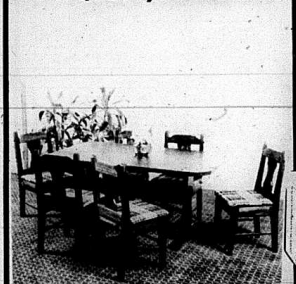
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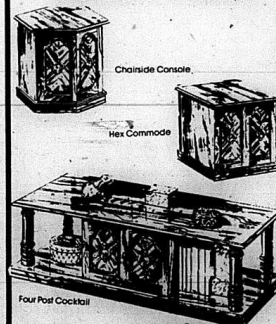
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# Congratulations! Rockcastle Co. All-Stars

Rockcastle County has much to be proud of due to the performance of the 13-year-old All Stars.

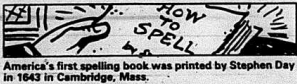

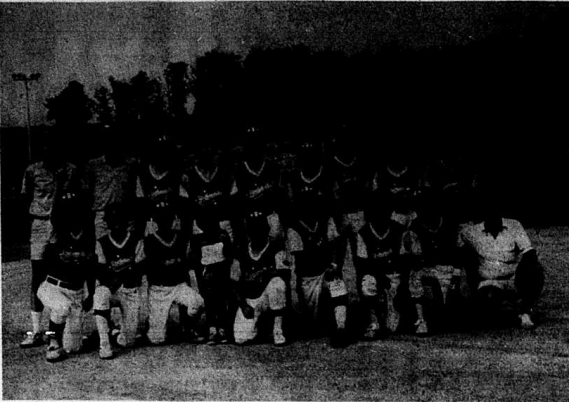
They appeared to be in trouble in the championship game against Knox County but they displayed much composure to come from behind and take the championship in the bottom of the seventh.

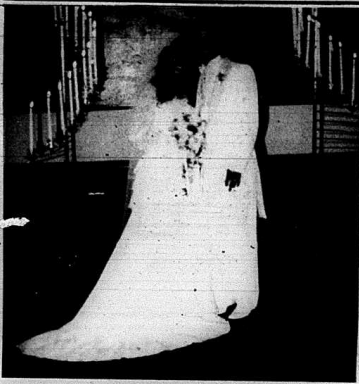

EXTENSION HOME ECONOMIC

By Cheryl Witt, County Extension Agent for Home Economics

SEWING SHORTCUTS

Sew a straight metal eye at top of slit of skirt to prevent ripping.

When covering buttons, wet the fabric first; it will be easier to handle.

When sewing on loopy fabric, tape end of presser foot so it won't catch in loops.

Spray starch on the edge of knit fabrics that curl to prevent additional rolling.

Tap a paper bag to side of sewing table for trimmings.

Place straight seam on selvedge of woven fabrics when possible to eliminate seam finishing.

Use zipper foot for stitching in the ditch.

When hand sewing buttons, double thread before threading needle.

Loosen upper tension slightly when making buttonholes.

Lay slippery fabric over towel or on carpet to prevent sliding when cutting out fabric.

Use soap over seam of heavy fabric. It will stretch and press easier.

On very firm fabric, eliminate facing. Just turn and stitch.

Set fustibles by spot fusing. First.

Use a damp cloth when applying fustibles.

Use buttonhole thread in bobbin when gathering. It won't break.

Use embroidery floss for tailor tacking. It's less slippery.

Glue a tape measure to your sewing-table for quick measurements.

Fill several bobbins with frequently used thread colors.

To pull out sharp corners, use a threaded needle. Insert needle in corner, grasp threads and pull gently.

Make a belt loop by zig-zagging over cord.

When making buttonholes in knits, put paper underneath to prevent stretching.

Before storing fabric, label with #9 width, yardage and care.

Seam to one side sharper press. Press seam to get side before pressing.

**USDA Issues Interim Rule on Use of Pesticide Products on Tobacco**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will require tobacco producers to certify that

pesticides used on price support loan tobacco have been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency and that these products have been used in accordance with label directions.

Everett Rank, Administrator of USDA's ASCS, said producers who fail to certify will be ineligible for government price support tobacco.

Current USDA regulations require tobacco producers, as a condition of price support eligibility, to certify as to the use of DDT, TDE, toxaphene or endrin.

Rank said the interim rule issued extends the certification requirement to the use of "any substance or mixture of substance intended for preventing, destroying, repelling or mitigating any pest and any substance or mixture of substance intended for use as a plant regulator, defoliant or desiccant."

Buyers of tobacco analyze samples to determine whether

the quality of the tobacco has been adversely affected by the use of pesticides. If the value of

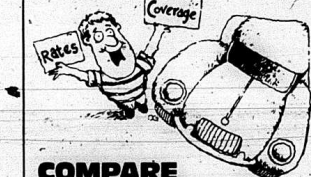

### Religious Unity

This is much talk about religious unity, and it seems to be almost unanimous that unity is desirable, but we are admittedly a long way from achieving it. Why? We have the one Lord and the same Bible.

Could it be that we are seeing unity in the wrong way? Some seek to unite all religious people in one package (union). This is the road of conformity and compromise but - alas - no unity.

Every Christian should deplore division and "give diligence to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Eph. 4:3). But how can this unity be realized and preserved? The apostle sets forth the basis for religious unity in Eph. 4:1-6. There are two conditions:

**THE PROPER ATTITUDE:**  
"With all lowliness and meekness." A truly humble person will not cause strife and division but will promote goodwill among those in the family of God. Unless we have the humility of a little child we cannot enter the kingdom of heaven (Matt. 18:1-3).

With long suffering, forbearing one another in love. When a heart is filled with love, there will be no room left for seeds of division. Read Paul's description of the fruits of love in 1 Corinthians 13 and you will agree that when love moves in, strife and division move out.

**THE DOCTRINAL BASIS.**  
The apostle of the Lamb points out seven fundamental unities which center around the Divine Trinity. (1) One body, or church (Eph. 1:22-23). (2) One Spirit, which is the Holy Spirit. This spirit animates the body, giving it life. The body without the Spirit is dead; and the Lord cares nothing for a dead church. (3) One hope, or aspiration. This is the heavenly home toward which we are moving. This blessed hope quickens the step, gives sparkle to the eye,

fills the soul with joy unspeakable, and provides an anchor for the soul. (4) One Lord, the Christ. Unto Him all authority has been given (Matt. 28:18). Unto Him all our thoughts, words and deeds should be brought into subjection. He is not our Lord at all unless He is indeed the Lord of our life. (5) One faith, or system of teaching. This is the teaching of Christ revealed in the New Testament. The addition of man-made creeds to the one system of faith brings division among Christians. (6) One baptism, which is immersion in the name of the Holy Three. All professed Christians, regardless of party affiliation, agree that immersion is Biblical; but sprinkling or pouring for baptism is a source of disturbance to unity. (7) "One God and Father of all, who is over all, and through all and in all" of His people. He is the grand Object of our worship and devotion. We must worship Him in spirit and in truth, if we are united.

Division weakens Christianity. It confuses the converted. It perverts and distorts the gospel. It prevents Him from being Lord and Master of individuals and the church as a body. It is fostered by believing and following man and not the Word of God. DIVISION IS SINFUL, a work of the flesh, and will rob the guilty of heaven.

The path to unity begins with a desire for unity. Unity is something that requires diligence; something to be "kept." It is a path in which all must "walk worthily."

Are you endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit, in the body of peace?
