the office of president of the National Auctioneers Association. Founded in 1947, the National Auctioneers Association has a membership of almost 6,000 with members representing all 50 states and several foreign countries. The threefold purpose of the association is to serve the public, the client and the profession.

Ford moved into the profession of auctioneering in 1965, serving as director of the association for three years, vice-president from 1982-83 and president elect from 1983-84. He previously held the same four positions in the Kentucky Auctioneers Association.

Ford, succeeded William L. Gaul, from Chatham, Ill., who served as the national president during 1983-84.

As president of the association, Ford said, his responsibility is "primarily, as an ambassador of good will." "The president travels to state conventions to conduct seminars on different aspects of the auction method of selling, speaks for the auctioneering profession, and works to pass positive legislation affecting auctions," he said.

The association has recently erected a new national headquarters in Overland Park, Kan., where they are now in the process of building a museum tracing the history of auctioneering from early times to the present.

goals he wants to accomplish during his presidency. Ford, who is also a state representative for Kentucky's 80th district.

Sammy Ford began his career in the auction business after graduating from Eastern Kentucky University and the Repper School of Auctioneering, in Decatur, Ind. He lives in Mt. Vernon with his wife, Judy, and their three children, Devin, 16, John, 13 and Amy, 6. The first Kentuckian to serve as president of the National Auctioneers Association was the late John L. Cummins of Cynthiana.

If your answer is yes to any of these questions, then people in the Berea area and Rockcastle County may want to take advantage of free GED courses beginning August 15 at the Family Life Center School, one mile north of Renfro Valley on Richmond Road. There will be two sessions - 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. - each day, five days a week, all year. People can sign up for one or both sessions.

The classes are being sponsored by the Christian Appalachian Project's Adult Education Program. According to Debbie Bugg, CAP's coordinator of Education, all adults above 18 years of age are welcome. Everything is free.

The course is designed to educate adults in math, reading, history, science and literature, and to help raise their learning levels for passing the GED.

A course of study will be designed for each individual.

Each adult will be tested for their strengths and weaknesses in math, reading and language arts.

"For adults who want to learn to read, it isn't necessary for them to sign up for the GED course," Ms. Bugg said.

For those who complete the GED course and pass the test, they will receive a diploma certifying their high school equivalency.

Students will also be helped after finishing the course. "We are trying to work with state Manpower Services for employment opportunities afterwards," Ms. Bugg said. She is also attempting to make connections with vocational schools so that graduates will have the opportunity to pursue greater skills.

Enrollment is limited, however, because of the individualized instruction. But, since some complete the program faster than others, there is a constant turnover. A waiting list will be kept.

Tutoring will be offered to the school children in the Berea area and Rockcastle County for a fee.

Vote comes at Tuesday's Fiscal Court meeting

## Motion defeated to withdraw application

Saying that he made a mistake in voting for the proposed landfill site originally, 5th district Magistrate Joe Clark made a motion to withdraw the county's application to the state for a landfill permit during Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

Clark's motion got a round of applause from the over 50 people jammed into the county courtroom concerned about the proposed site.

When the applause ended, second district magistrate Tom Denny seconded Clark's

motion.

First district magistrate Donald Rowe voted with Clark and Denny on the motion but the other two magistrates, W.H. Wren and D.G. Albright, along with County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper and voted no.

"I would rather wait and see what we hear from Frankfort," Jasper said. Wren and Albright said they would rather wait also.

"The county has already spent \$21,000 on this project and I think we should wait and see what they have to say in Frankfort," Jasper said.

However, Magistrate

Clark told the Judge that, "if this many people are against something it must be wrong. I know when I have a mistake and this landfill site was a mistake."

Backing up his vote, Rowe told the crowd, "I can show you things that this fiscal court tried to do two years ago and have never gotten done."

"A neighbor of mine had to buy a load of gravel the other day, a \$50 load of gravel. If the county can't afford gravel, how are we going to spend a million dollars on the landfill?"

Two Livingston area residents, Danny Hitton and

Archie Burkhardt made appeals to the fiscal court during the lengthy hour and a half discussion on the landfill.

"Our county officials should take this matter into their own hands and not expect people in Frankfort to worry about our children's lives, this matter shouldn't be decided by someone that doesn't care one way or the other," said Burkhardt, who spoke to the court on several different occasions during the meeting.

"I urge the members of the court, and especially you, Judge, to look it over with us, Hitton said. "If you could just see the site, you would know that it will cause us a problem," he added.

However, the Judge told the group that he would wait to hear from Frankfort before viewing the site. "I would not know what I was looking at if I went down there, because I'm not qualified on this matter. I'm not an engineer," Jasper said.

Another Livingston resident, Earl Baker, who made the initial request that the county withdraw their application, told the Judge and Magistrates that the new landfill would pose a threat to the lives of the school children at Livingston.

"There are 400 students at Livingston and three busloads of children get to the high school each day. If the water was to get contaminated, it could cause a problem for the whole county and not just Livingston," Baker said.

But, according to Gene Centers, who was present at the meeting, contamination has already occurred in the water supply below the old landfill site.

"We are having to haul water every day because our well is contaminated," Centers said. "We have been told that the old landfill is the cause of it," he added.

Centers went on to say that he did not understand why the county wanted to add to a problem they already had. At times during the meeting, the discussion became heated with such comments coming from the crowd as, "I don't guess we'll have to pay county taxes any more, after the landfill goes in, no one will want to buy our property so it won't be worth anything and we won't have to pay taxes."

"Other remarks such as, 'We'll remember you all at election time,' and 'Mr. Albright, we'll do all we can to help you out when election

time comes,' were also made during the discussion but no action was ever taken by the court except the vote on Clark's motion to withdraw the application, which ended in a 3-3 tie.

Hitton suggested that the court consider hauling their garbage to another county such as Jackson. "We talked to Jackson County Judge/Executive William O. Smith, who said that he would be willing to meet with the court on the possibility of using that county's newly-constructed landfill to dump Rockcastle's garbage."

"\$700,000, which is what it would take to build a landfill, would pay for a lot of garbage to be dumped, and in another county," Hitton said.

However, Magistrate Denny told Hitton and the members of the court that the county didn't have trucks to haul rock in and he didn't see how they could haul any gar-

## Local school district is 137th in state rankings

The Rockcastle County school district got their report card for the 1983-84 school year Monday and improvement was shown.

Rockcastle jumped in the statewide rankings from 161st in 1982 to 137th in 1984, a gain of 24 places.

Bigge Towery, Jr., newly-appointed Curriculum Coordinator and Chapter I director for the local school district, said that he was very pleased with the results but, he continued, that there is still room for improvement.

Towery was asked the question if students were learning more or if they were simply becoming better test takers.

"I feel like our children are learning more because of the concentrated effort put forth by the teachers and administrators in the district," Towery said. "I simply think everyone worked harder so that the students would learn more and do better on the test," he added.

Towery was then asked if there were in truth in the rumors circulating that the test scores were higher because the test were taught in some of the schools.

"No," Towery said, "We did not teach the test, the curriculum that we follow in the classroom covers the subject area of the test quite well

## Ford elected President of National Auctioneers

For the second time in the history of the National Auctioneers Association, a Kentuckian has been named president.

Sammy L. Ford, an auctioneer from Mt. Vernon, accepted the position during the closing ceremonies of the week-long national convention held in Minneapolis, Minn., from July 17 to July 21. At 37, Ford is the youngest person to hold

and therefore there was no reason to teach the test."

Rockcastle fared quite well in the rankings among the 150 largest school districts in the state.

Laurel County, which ranked 128th last year, fell to 154th this year. Lincoln County also did not do as well, going to 142nd this year, compared to 116th last year.

Jackson County improved 12 places from last year but still managed only a 152nd ranking.

Neighboring Pulaski County finished higher than the local school district at 121st, but fell some 30 places from a year ago when they ranked 91st.

The same was also true of Madison County, which a year ago ranked 59th, and 83rd this year.

One bright spot for the Rockcastle school district was the fact that the third grade class ranked 54th statewide, averaging 64 percent over the national average.

The 5th grade class ranked 86th, with 52.6 percent of the students over the national average and the 7th grade class ranked 129th with over 51 percent above average.

The local school system's downfall was the scores of the 10th grade class, which were worse than they were a year ago.

Overall, the class ranked 168th out of 183 districts, with only 41 percent of the students at or above average.

10th graders did worse in every area tested in 1984, compared to 1983.

In reading skills, the class had only 29.6 percent scoring at or above the national average, compared to 33.5 percent in 1983.

The same was true of language skills, an area that students fell from 40.5 percent

a year ago to 35 percent this year.

A decline was also seen in math skills where students scored 42 percent in 1983, only 38.2 percent in 1984.

"Although we realize we need work at the high school level, and intend to get that work done this year, this is a national trend of test scores going down as students get older," Towery said.

One note of interest, neighboring school district Berea ranked 12th year in the statewide rankings and 10th last year.

## 5 indictments returned by local Grand Jury

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury has handed down five indictments from their most recent session, with all five indictments being against local people.

A four-count indictment was handed down against a former Mt. Vernon businessman.

Mt. Beeker of London was indicted on four counts of theft by failure to make proper disposition of property, according to the indictment which stated that Beeker ordered over \$32,000 worth of petroleum products in the spring of 1984 from F.H. Shoemaker Company of Whitley City and did not pay for the products.

Beeker, who was released on his own recognizance is scheduled for a pre-trial conference on September 28 at 10 a.m.

Randy Graves was also indicted for receiving stolen property valued at over \$100. Graves is suspected in the recent rash of break-ins in the

county and Circuit Judge Dan Venters set Graves bond at \$10,000. He is presently lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail awaiting arraignment in Circuit Court on August 24th.

Alton "Rocky" Boswell was also indicted on the same charge as Graves and his bond was set at \$8,500. He is presently lodged in another jail in the county and has yet to be served on this indictment.

Dean McCoy of Mt. Vernon was indicted for theft by unlawful taking over \$100. The indictment stemmed from a July 17th incident when McCoy allegedly stole a pick-up truck belonging to R.V. Brock

## Community Day is Saturday

A Community Day will be held this Saturday at the Pizza Hut Restaurant in Mt. Vernon.

The main theme of this first-ever event will be children, according to Bruce Traugher, representative of

the Kentucky Attorney General's office.

Traugher will be representing the Attorney General Dave Armstrong during the Community Day. Armstrong's office is among several organizations helping sponsor the event.

The money raised from the event will go into the Child Victims and Trust Fund for Missing and Exploited Children.

This will be the first funds to be donated to this legislation across the state, according to Pizza Hut assistant manager Debbie Noe, who said Tuesday that this would be a great opportunity for the people of Rockcastle County to be recognized as the first county to support this legislation.

According to Traugher, the money raised will go towards funding House Bill 486, which deals with exploited and missing children. The bill was passed into law during the last legislative session.

The new law will allow -The Boy Scouts, the YWCA and other youth organizations to check the record of any job applicant or prospective volunteer for a history of sex crimes against children. -Adds to the state income tax

form a check-off box allowing taxpayers to donate \$2 of their tax refunds (84 for couples) to a trust fund to support state and local child abuse.

-Establishes a 15-member board, led by the attorney general, to promote public awareness and education, assist local task forces in developing prevention programs and use the trust fund money to make matching grants to local groups.

-Permits abused children to submit claims for psychological damage to the state Crime Victims Compensation Board.

-Enables judges to allow sexually abused children to testify by closed circuit television or videotape, rather than having to face the defendant in the courtroom.

-Makes the use of children for sex, whether for pleasure or profit, a felony instead of a misdemeanor. The punishment is a prison sentence of one to five years. Penalties for more serious crimes such as sodomy and rape remains unchanged.

-Prohibits judges from placing convicted child abusers on probation or parole.

-Requires local police departments to make a written record of every missing-child report. Within 24 hours, the information is to be forwarded to the Kentucky State Police computer and the National Crime Information Center's computer network.

-Orders the Justice Cabinet to establish a statewide Missing Child Information Center and periodically issue fliers, including descriptions of missing children.

## RCH's Respiratory Therapy Department helps you breathe easier

You can breathe a little easier with the help of the Rockcastle County Hospital's respiratory therapy department.

Both inpatients and outpatients benefit from the use of sophisticated equipment and trained personnel who are

available 24 hours a day to treat patients with respiratory problems.

Mike Barr, director of rehabilitation at the hospital, has been there since 1976. Barr has degrees in both respiratory and physical therapy. He explained that respiratory therapy is a profession that assists physicians in the diagnosis and treatment of any problem that causes impaired breathing. This includes all respiratory and cardiac disorders, as well as acute traumatic and neuromuscular problems which temporarily or permanently impair breathing. There are also measures used to prevent respiratory problems.

Working with Mike Barr is Jim Hughes, who was hired this year to serve as director of respiratory therapy. Hughes also has a degree in respiratory therapy.

A staff of respiratory therapy assistants and licensed practical nurses assists Barr and Hughes in providing round the clock care at Rockcastle. The assistants are Teresa Bussell, Robert Claunch, Mario Colangelo, Tony Crömer, Brad Durham, Stanton Hayes, Jack Lewis, Jim Marcum and Don Smith. The nurses are Ruby Godbey, Brenda Miracle, Diane Thompson, Larry White and Arlene Wyatt.

The hospital has purchased advanced equipment and machines to use in treating patients with respiratory problems. A year ago, they bought a \$25,000 blood gas machine that measures acute or chronic changes in a patient's lungs or kidneys in a matter of minutes. This procedure can be done on anyone with breathing complaints.

Barr said, "We also just bought a pulmonary function analyzer. With this machine, we can do either very simple or complex tests to show any changes in the lungs which would indicate early signs of emphysema or asthma. It's used to diagnose problems and determine if a patient is getting better or worse."

Another machine used at Rockcastle is the oximeter which measures oxygen in the bloodstream without having to draw blood. This machine is used, mostly in the nursery, in surgery, or with extremely ill patients.

The hospital also uses ven-

tilators to assist or breathe for basically anyone, regardless of age or size, who for some reason are unable to breathe for themselves, whether temporarily or permanently.

The skilled nursing facility began making a name for itself in the state and even nationally when it began its ventilator program in 1981. Today, there are 16 patients on ventilators in the 32-bed facility.

"The importance of what we do on skilled is two-fold," said Barr. "We're attempting to provide a better quality of life for people who have no alternative and at a much-reduced cost as opposed to intensive care or home care. I think the importance of it is that the project has spearheaded other programs which will be opened in other parts of the county. We were among the first to do this."

Ventilators are also used in the emergency room, in surgery, and in acute care.

Barr said, "The benefit to this county is that the hospital is able to provide care for patients who are hospitalized because of their ventilator program. Because of the level of care the respiratory patients need, all parts of the hospital have higher quality personnel and provide more skilled care than we could have otherwise."

Not only does the hospital treat inpatients, but it also regularly treats outpatients. They do outpatient evaluations and treatment before surgery, as well as testing for patients sent from the doctor's offices. They also care for patients with respiratory problems who can't be hospitalized or who can't afford to be.

Barr said, "Certainly, I think we have equipment and personnel capabilities that no other hospital this size would have."

He complimented the staff. "The people in the department are extremely hard-working people with a lot of responsibility. They have to work with the nurses and doctors, as well as be able to make decisions independently. The department isn't just Jim or me, it's the whole group."

### Allergic reactions to insect stings can be dangerous

Allergic reactions to insect bites and stings can be a real danger for some people who are severely affected by them. The American Medical Association Family Medical Guide offers some practical advice on what to do if you're stung and have a reaction.

**Allergic Reactions to Insect Stings**—Some people are allergic to stings from certain insects. An allergic reaction to a sting may be life-threatening. The extreme case of a total body allergic reaction is called anaphylactic shock.

Symptoms may include severe swelling in parts of the body other than the area of the sting, such as the eyes, lips and tongue; weakness; coughing or wheezing; severe itching; stomach cramps; nausea and vomiting; anxiety; difficulty in breathing; bluish tinge to the skin; dizziness; collapse; unconsciousness and/or hives on the body.

Many people know that they have such an allergy, and have an emergency kit available. If this is not the case, remove the stinger by scraping it out with a knife or fingernail (do not use tweezers, as you may squeeze more venom out) and apply a light constricting band two to four inches above the sting. Make the victim as comfortable as possible, and get medical help at once.

### Minor Insect Bites and Stings

Symptoms of a minor insect bite or sting may include pain, swelling at the site, redness, itching and/or burning. Multiple stings may cause a toxic reaction with headache, muscle cramps, fever, drowsiness or even unconsciousness.

A severe toxic reaction may require medical treatment. Remove any stinger without using tweezers. Wash the area with soap and water. Apply an ice pack or cold compress to the area.

## Medical staff largest in hospital's 28-year history

The Rockcastle County Hospital has a six member medical staff for the first time in its 28-year history. Along with the three family practitioners and a general surgeon, there are now the specialties of pediatrics and internal medicine.

Dr. G.W. Griffith grew up in

Mt. Vernon and came back here in 1973 to practice medicine. He graduated from the University of Louisville School of Medicine and is a board certified member of the American Academy of Family Practice.

Dr. O.L. Arvin, originally from Louisville, completed his medical

training at the University of Kentucky and has been practicing medicine here for 12 years. He is the chief of the Rockcastle County Hospital's medical staff and the director of the county's Health Department. He's also certified from the American Board of Family Practice.

Dr. P.J. Monteyne has practiced in the county since February 1982, and is originally from Calgary, Alberta, Canada. He graduated from the University of Saskatchewan and is a member of the College of Family Physicians of Canada.

Dr. A.E.T. Thomsen came to Rockcastle as the county's first general surgeon. He has practiced here from 1978-80 and from 1982-84. He grew up in the Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia), and went to medical school in Amsterdam, Holland. After surgical training in Canada, he stayed there to practice for awhile before coming to Mt. Vernon.

Dr. K.S. Boggs began his practice in March as the county's first pediatrician. He came here after finishing his residency at Columbus Children's Hospital in Ohio and is originally from Wise, Va. He specializes in the treatment of newborns to children aged 18.

Dr. M.A. Gutierrez is the newest member of the medical staff. He started his practice in July, offering internal medicine to county residents for the first time. Internal medicine is the specialty that deals with serious, more difficult adult diseases that usually do not require surgery. He is a native of Golden, Colo., and just completed his residency at the University of Kentucky.

The six doctors in the county are available to give area residents health care close to home and treat a wider range of medical problems than ever before.

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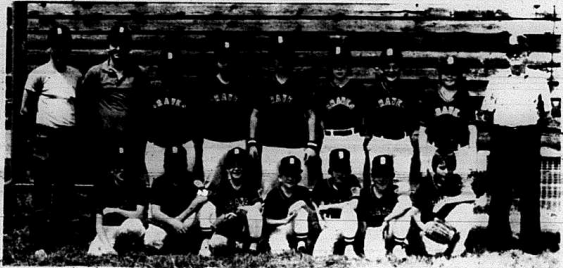

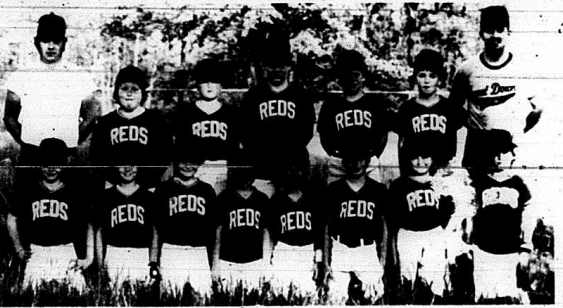
