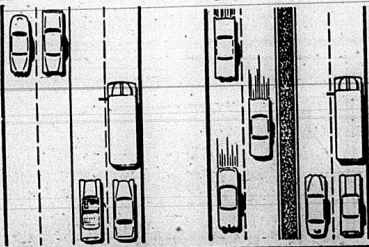
# How to save a child's life...



## Every school bus is a 'STOP' signal

The highly yellow school bus, laden with children going to or from school, is a familiar sight on Kentucky highways.

It travels in the early morning, at midday, during afternoon rush hours, and, all too often, after dark. Whenever it travels, however, you, the motorist, must exercise caution to protect the lives of its young passengers. A standing or unbraking children will display a STOP sign and flashing red lights.

If you meet a school bus loaded or unloading children on a highway that is not divided by a median, you must stop - no matter which direction you are going - and wait until the bus moves on. On a divided highway, you must only stop if you are driving in the direction moving on. On a divided highway, you must only stop if you are driving in the direction moving on. The STOP sign that swings out from the side of the school bus places the safety responsibility squarely on your shoulders. So be careful - the child you save may be your own.

"Whenever any school bus or school bus used in the transportation of children is stopped upon a highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers, the operator of a vehicle approaching from any direction shall bring his vehicle to a complete stop and shall not start up or attempt to pass until the bus has completed receiving or discharging passengers and has been put in motion; provided, that this stop requirement shall not apply to vehicles proceeding in the opposite direction from a church or school bus which is stopped upon a highway where multi-lane roadways providing for opposite directions of travel are separated by a raised, depressed, mountable or non-mountable median."

## Council adopts new personnel system for city employees

Compiling with state law the Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to adopt a new personnel system for city employees.

The new system classifies all jobs in one of two categories, employees or non-elected officers of the council.

Andy Meadows, a representative of Cumberland Valley Area Development District, wrote the system and presented it to the council Monday evening.

Meadows' first version of the system listed only one worker on the city's payroll as a non-elected officer - Mary McClure, the city clerk.

However, before any of the council members or the Mayor really had enough time to look over the proposal,

## Citizens Bank has applied for National Charter

The Citizens Bank of Brodhead has made application to the United States Comptroller of the Currency for a national charter.

According to Keith Smith, vice president at Citizens Bank, the application was made so that the bank could go ahead with their plans to build a branch bank near Mt. Vernon.

If the charter is approved, and according to Smith all indications are that it will be, Citizens Bank will be called the Citizens National Bank of Rockcastle County.

Citizens Bank had previously applied to the Kentucky Department of Banking and Securities, seeking a permit to build a branch bank in Mt. Vernon.

However, Smith said

Tuesday that application had been withdrawn because the bank did not want to become involved in a lengthy series of administrative hearings and possible judicial problems.

A local complaint was filed with the Department of Banking and Securities in Frankfort, which would have caused the long, drawn-out process.

"We will know something in about 60 days," Smith said, "But our counsel, who suggested that we go this route, said that he did not feel like there would be any question of being approved."

Smith said that the board of directors of the bank met last week and decided to make the application because it would speed up the building of

## State audit cites several areas of non-compliance by county

The Kentucky State Auditor of Public Accounts of 1983 presented their audit report for 1983-84 fiscal year to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court last Tuesday and the findings did not reflect too well on the accounting procedures of the court.

The fiscal body was cited for several non-compliances, including the improper spending of over \$150,000 by the court from the road and bridge fund, revenue sharing fund and the local government economic assistance fund.

The improper spending occurred when the court did not advertise for bids for materials, equipment and services they used during that fiscal year, according to the audit report submitted to the court.

\$123,688 was spent in the road and bridge fund without receiving bids and \$14,902 was spent from the revenue sharing fund illegally, as well as another \$15,802 spent from the local government economic assistance fund.

The representative of the auditor's office reminded the court members that they were in violation of state law \$24,260 because when the amount of money spent is over \$7,500, bids must be sought.

However, the report did show that the county complied with the law in the 1983-84 fiscal year.

The representative also told the court that they violated KRS 68.280 when they overspent the Rockcastle Ambulance fund by \$17,578 in the same fiscal year and another violation occurred when the county spent \$5,777

from the grandstand and exhibit hall fund without budgeting for it.

At the end of that fiscal year, the general fund, road and bridge, revenue sharing, local government economic assistance fund and the jail funds all had deficits, according to the report.

Besides all the discrepancies in the county's bookkeeping, the county is also in violation of KRS 68.005

## Pettitt manslaughter trial scheduled for Thursday

Katherine Pettitt, 25, of College Park, Georgia, will go on trial Thursday (today), in Rockcastle Circuit Court on a charge of second degree manslaughter, in connection with the May 2nd death of her 11-month-old daughter.

Mrs. Pettitt was arrested and later indicted by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury after the May 2nd incident which claimed the life of daughter on U.S. 25 near Burr.

Authorities were called to the scene where the child had been struck by a vehicle driven by a Mt. Vernon man.

According to authorities, Mrs. Pettitt is being tried on the manslaughter charge because she left her child in a ditch alongside the roadway on that morning and then walked back to the Holiday Motel where she was apparently staying with her boyfriend.

Police said that when Pettitt returned to where she had left the child, it had crawled into the roadway and been struck by the vehicle.

The baby died a few minutes later at the Rockcastle County Hospital, according to

The annual report also dealt with Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor's tax collections for 1982. This part of the report showed that Taylor owes the county an additional \$3,347 in tax monies

## Ford is youngest man to take over as "N.A.A." President

Sammy L. Ford leaped back in the swivel chair at his desk at Ford Realty and Auction Company in Mt. Vernon and clasped his hands behind his head.

He has recently returned from the annual convention of the National Auctioneers Association in Minneapolis, Minn. The week long conference came to a close on July 21 with a moment Ford will long remember: His being named president of the 6,000-member organization. At 37, Ford is the youngest person and only the second Kentuckian to hold that office.

The auctioneer was relaxed, sitting comfortably in his office that has the usual file cabinet, desk, and a couch for visitors. Two framed Don Enzor prints hung on the wall and books on real estate and selling occupied a bookshelf.

His relaxation was in contrast to the excitement and nervousness he felt at the conventions closing ceremonies when he took the gavel from William L. Gaulie, the president who preceded him. As Ford began to make his acceptance speech, which had been carefully written and rehearsed, he started to say that being named president was a "humbling experience." Instead, the words came out "This is a humiliating experience."

Ford grinned, remembering the laughter of the crowd that went on for several minutes after catching his slip of the tongue. He said he laughed along with them and then began his speech again, noting that he had unintentionally done a job of breaking the ice.

Ford naturalness and sincerity have endeared him to his fellow auctioneers as well as to the president, William Gaulie. Gaulie commented on Ford over the phone from his office in

Chatham, Ill. "I've never seen a finer individual than Sammy Ford. He is one of the finest examples of what an auctioneer should stand for. He has high principles and is a dedicated worker. I can't think of anyone I'd rather hand the gavel over to. He has a huge task before him because I found it to be a very challenging position."

Ford will serve as president for one year and then take a place on the national board of directors for three years. As president he said he is to serve "primarily as an ambassador of good-will."

His responsibilities include traveling to state conventions to conduct seminars on different aspects of the auction method of selling, speaking for the auctioneering

profession, and working to pass positive legislation affecting auction.

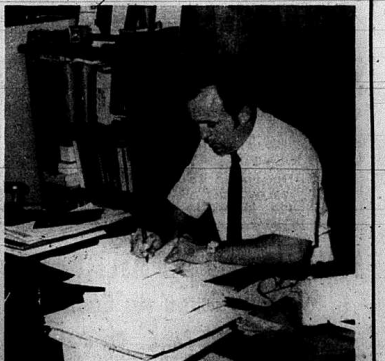
Ford has four main goals he wants to accomplish for the association during the next 12 months. He plans to increase the membership of the organization and to work with government agencies to persuade them to use the auction method of selling over the sealed bid method. He also intends to see the completion of a museum tracing the history of auctioneering which will be located in the new national headquarters in Overland Park, Kansas. And he would like to educate the public about the advantage of selling by auction.

Although Ford gets his travel-

## Renovation scheduled for ball fields at Lake

The Lake Linville area is finally on its way to getting some much-needed improvements, according to Soil Conservationist David Stipes. Stipes is working in conjunction with the city on a project that would enable the two ball fields at the Lake facility to be used by county residents next season.

The project, which is scheduled to begin next month, will involve the placing of drainage tiles as well as putting mulch, seed and fertilizer on the two ball fields and around the road banks leading to the site, which are too wet to have the proper vegetation cover.

According to Stipes, the City of Mt. Vernon will be responsible for only 25 percent of the cost of the project with the federal government picking up the tab for the other 75 percent.

"Right now, all that is growing on those ball fields is weeds because it stays too wet to get any vegetation to grow," Stipes said. "The seeding will also stop the soil erosion around the banks alongside the lake road."

Harris Plumbing of London will put the drainage tiles in the ball field at a cost of \$7,416 and Rockcastle Nurseries was the low bidder on the seed mulch and fertilizer which will cost over \$3,000.

According to Stipes, 7.5 acres of land will be fixed so that vegetation can grow and the ball fields can be used. "At the present time, the fields are not used because of their poor condition," Stipes said.

The project originally cost the City of Mt. Vernon \$50,000.

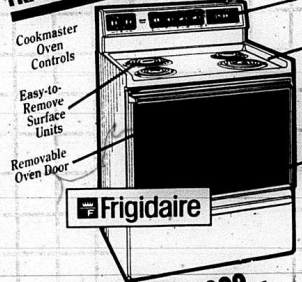
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## Local girl participates in modeling convention



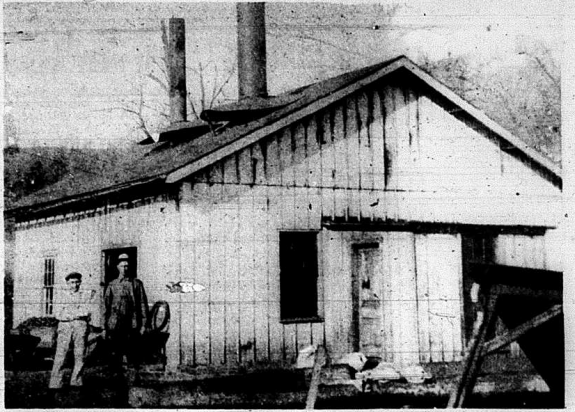

## Summer fruits for pleasant eating

Many fresh fruits are at their peak in quality and abundance now. This means they are at a cost that is at another time of the year.

Melons, peaches, grapes, plums and a host of other favorite fresh fruits are available in groceries and from the garden. Enjoy fresh fruits-they are excellent sources of nutrients. Deeply colored fruits such as apricots, cantaloupes and peaches are high in Vitamin A. Cantaloupes, watermelon, berries, and apricots also contain worthwhile amounts of vitamin C. Many fruits also contain potassium and other minerals.

When preparing fruits, wash them well, whether they will be served raw or cooked. Trim away soft or bruised areas. Loosen skins of peaches and apricots by dipping the fruit into boiling water for 45 seconds and then dip into cold water. To prevent browning of cut or peeled fruit such as peaches, pears, apples or bananas, dip these fruits into citrus juice such as lemon, orange or grapefruit juice or pineapple juice.

Serve fresh fruits in mixed salads, use as snacks or desserts, or use in sauces or cake or ice cream. Here are some more ideas for using summers' fresh fruits:

- Watermelon Salad 1/2 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1/3 cup whipping cream
- 1 1/2 cups finely diced celery
- 3/4 cups watermelon balls, chilled

- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 cup lemon juice

Combine first five ingredients in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil; reduce heat, and simmer 5 to 8 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Arrange fruit in a large bowl; pour syrup over fruit and toss gently. Chill several hours or overnight. Yield: 12 servings.

Melon Soup 4 cups finely chopped cantaloupe or honeydew melon, divided

- 1 1/2 cups orange juice
- 1/4 cup lime juice
- 1 tablespoon honey or sugar
- 1 1/4 cups sweet sparkling wine or ginger ale

Combine 2 cups melon, orange juice, lime juice and honey in container of electric blender; process until smooth. Stir in remaining 2 cups melon and wine; chill thoroughly. Yield: 4 servings.

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch

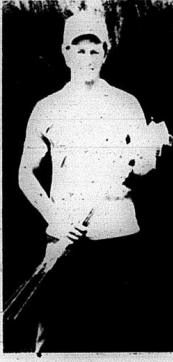

Families with foster children should contact the school for information regarding benefits. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be verified at any time with each school district required to verify a sample annually. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. An application for free or reduced price benefits cannot be approved unless it contains complete documentation of eligibility information, including names of all household members, social security numbers of all adult household members or an indication that a household member does not possess one, total current household income and the amount and source of income received by each household member and the signature of an adult household member. Households currently receiving food stamps may submit their Food Stamp Program case number instead of income information. Households receiving meal benefits are required to report increases of income of \$50 per month or \$600 a year or a decrease in the household size:

If a household's income decreases or if household size increases during the school year, the household should contact the school to file a new application since such changes may make the children of the household eligible for meal benefits if the income is within the income guidelines.

Under the provisions of the policy, a school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the determination, he/she may contact either orally or in writing the following official:

the branch and would also give certain advantages to the bank that it presently does not have.

The vice president listed some of the advantages as being: increasing the bank's loan limitations; making them a member of the Federal Reserve system and allowing them to deal directly through the Federal Reserve, if they so desire. If the application is approved, Citizens Bank will become the only national bank in Rockcastle County.

Citizens Bank is now a state bank and is governed by state laws. As a National bank, Citizens would be subject to state banking laws but would be examined by the Comptroller's office, which is located in Chicago, Ill. and by the F.D.I.C. instead of by state banking auditors.

Smith said that if, and when, they receive National charter, they will make application to the Comptroller for the right to build their branch bank on U.S. 160, just outside the city limits of Mt. Vernon.

"One thing that we have in our favor," Smith said, "is the fact that last year the state ranked us a number one rated bank in the state. "The state gives out ratings to all of the banks on a 1 to 5 scale and we got a one. That will help our chances a great deal," Smith said.

ing expenses paid, there is no salary to go along with the position. "The biggest compensation I am getting for it is the satisfaction of helping a profession that's been good to me," he said. "I've already traveled to 17 states on behalf of the association's association."

During the next year Ford will continue to work out of his office in Mt. Vernon. Ford Realty and Auction Company, Inc., that he owns with his brother, Danny R. Ford, who is also a state representative for Kentucky's 86th district.

Sammy Ford's love of auctioneering began in college when he started going to a few auctions and noticed that conducting them could be a lot of fun. He also liked a song that was out about that time—Leroy VanDyche's "The Auctioneer."

On a whim he decided to attend the Reppert School of Auctioneering in Decatur, Ind., during one of his summer breaks. After three weeks there he decided to change his major at Eastern Kentucky University from political science to business. He realized there was something that attracted him to the auctioneering profession.

"I met people at Reppert's who seemed to be people who enjoyed what they were doing. I didn't know what I wanted to do, but I knew I wanted to be happy doing it."

Ford also developed a love of public speaking while at Eastern and got a minor in speech. He was on the novice debating teams there.

The oldest son of Dicie and the late Robert Ford of Mt. Vernon, Sammy Ford was a hard worker and showed signs of ambition from an early age. At high school he delivered papers for the Courier-Journal for over two years and in college he sold Electrolux vacuums door to door.

But the part-time job he relished was conducting auctions for some area auctioneers. "A lot were mighty auction that could pay little," he explained, "but I worked cheap and I wanted to learn the auction business. I worked for some good people—Gene Evans, an auctioneer in London, was an inspiration to me. And I also worked for Jim Mason in Grab Orchard, who was probably one of the best real estate auctioneers in this part of the country."

"I used to call auctioneers in other towns who had been successful. I'm not afraid to ask if I don't know something."

He was conscious of his young looks when he first started auctioneering at about the age of 19. "I'd do things to make myself look older like wearing a cap." He smiled. "I don't have that problem now."

In the summer of 1966 Ford married the former Judy McClure of Mt. Vernon. She was a freshman in college and he was a junior. "Mere children," he commented, thinking of them during the early days of their marriage. After getting about 50 hours on a business degree Judy Ford left school and worked in a Berea bank for awhile to put her husband through school.

Ford actually went into business for himself in January 1968 after getting his real estate license. It was his senior year of college and he began to pick up an auction or two. He also continued to work for other auctioneers.

In the fall of that same year Ford, who was in the ROTC, began two years of active duty at Fort Gordon, Ga. He was eventually stationed in Thailand as a communications officer for an engineer battalion which was

building a road there. He was fond to not be stationed in a combat zone and Ford said his tour of duty made him appreciate his country more.

Sammy and Judy Ford's first child, Devin, who was born before he went into the army. Devin, now 16, was followed by John who is 13, and Amy who is 6.

Ford's auctioneering came to a deadstill while he was in the service, but he did conduct an auction once while on furlough. "It was a house and lot in town and I always appreciated that client waiting for me. A lot of people wanted to see me make it and when he came back to Mt. Vernon in September 1970 he was confused about what he wanted to do."

He was questioning his abilities, but was questioning whether there was enough auctioneering in the country at that time for him to make a living.

Robert Ford, his father, was also a businessman, having owned a restaurant, two grocery stores, a service station, and a laundromat. Ford said his father was a great influence in his life, particularly that fall when he was just out of the army.

"Dad said, 'Son, you can make it here if you work,' Ford added. "I stayed here and we sold a house when we got back. It was any sale that was instrumental in my staying here that was it. But by 1975 business began to pick up. Ford's younger brother, Danny, joined him in the firm and they added Roy Adams as their associate. They have two part-time auctioneers, Wayne

Jerry Ham, as well as a secretary, Paula Mink.

They began conducting auctions in other areas and have now performed sales in 22 Kentucky counties, an impressive record. They've also auctioneered in Tennessee, Indiana, and even Michigan.

Ford became active in the Kentucky Auctioneers Association and in 1965 he also became a member of the National Auctioneers Association. "The biggest reason I got involved is that I hadn't grown up in the auction business so I didn't always have anyone I could call on to get answers to my questions. The national association put on seminars across the country on selling real estate, antiques, and farm machinery; it provided knowledge I wouldn't have had if I hadn't taken advantage of it."

Ford held the positions of director, vice-president, president-elect, and president for the state association before moving into the same positions on the national level. When the state endorsed Ford for a national office he hesitated before accepting because he knew it could lead to the presidency. The responsibilities would be demanding, but "what really bothered me at the time was my family obligation, not my business, because I knew Danny and Roy could take care of it."

After talking it over, his family urged him to go for it. "Everything has fallen into place and I've loved every minute of it," said Ford with satisfaction.

His mother, Dicie Ford, attended the convention for the first time to see her son accept the presidency. "Being a national officer is a big honor," she said. "I just feel good about it."

His wife Judy has supported him by working in the business,

traveling with him to conventions, and meeting people. She will also travel this year to several engagements that begin in October. She admitted that the pace is sometimes hectic. "But Sam enjoys it and loves it, so he doesn't mind. The Kentucky association has really supported him. It has touched us with all the things they've done to get him elected. They worked hard for him and we appreciate their help."

Ford attributes most of his success to his attitude. "I think you've got to be positive," he said firmly. "You have pitfalls, problems, and adversity, but it makes you a stronger person. And you have to have a genuine concern for helping people. I like to make commission, but I like to help people and see them happy."

There are several things Ford would like to be remembered for after he leaves the presidency of the National Auctioneers Association. "I'd like to be remembered as someone who worked hard for the people and as a person who gave. And, of course, everybody wants to be remembered as a person of integrity."

"One gets the feeling that for Sammy Ford the upcoming year will be a once-in-a-lifetime, 'humbling' experience that he won't soon forget. And neither will the members of the National Auctioneers Association."

an employee but the Mayor cannot hire someone to replace them unless they are approved by the council first."

It is the job of the Mayor, where non-elected of-

that he collected last year.

However, Sheriff Taylor said Tuesday that he did not intend to pay the county's report indicates he owes.

"I'm not paying them one penny until they pay me the \$2,000 that they voted to the first year I was in office," Taylor said. "I had to pay for gas out-of-pocket that they were supposed to pay for and until I receive my money, they are not getting theirs."

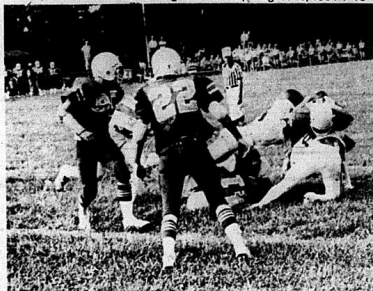

## Cracking down on support evaders

Thanks to action taken by Congress this past week, we will be cracking down on the millions of parents in this country who either do not pay child support or are delinquent in their payments.

As a former prosecutor, almost nothing made me more angry than to see a mother and her children abandoned without financial responsibilities, and often they provide no support whatsoever. This situation is a major cause of the large numbers of families who find themselves on welfare and who barely eke out an existence.

But this week, I was proud to join the President and a nearly unanimous House of Representatives in passing tough new enforcement laws.

## Mr. and Mrs. Lambert attend conference

Rockcastle County Attorney James H. Lambert and his wife, Brenda, recently attended the 1984 Kentucky Prosecutors Conference in Louisville.

Sponsored by the Attorney General and the Prosecutors Advisory Council, the Prosecutors Conference was conducted August 2-4 at the Seelback Hotel. Both County Attorneys and Commonwealth Attorneys' from throughout the state participated in the Conference.

In welcoming the prosecutors to the Louisville Conference, Attorney General David L. Armstrong stated, "We sincerely hope your attendance will help you make an even greater contribution to the justice system in Kentucky."

The conference was "worthwhile and very helpful," and stated that getting the career criminal off the street and in jail where he belongs is a high priority of his as well as that of other prosecutors he talked with at the Conference.

Under the bill we approved, states will be able to withhold child support payments from a parent's wages once it is proven that he is more than 30 days behind. It will put pressure on employers to make sure that money gets to the agencies which handle such cases. It will also allow for the deduction of delinquent child support from tax refunds which the non-paying parent is due.

This is no small problem. The Census Bureau estimates that children in America are being cheated out of \$4 billion a year through unpaid child support, and that is simply wrong!

In the past, our efforts to collect delinquent child support payments have lacked real enforcement powers. But this new legislation puts teeth into the efforts of all 50 states to find and recover delinquent payments.

The legislation will provide special grants to help states work together to help recover child support. No longer will it be simply a matter of moving across state lines to avoid child support. By working together, our states can find these parents and make them pay up.

## Robbins are newest Tree Farmers in Co.

Mr. and Mrs. D.A. Robbins of Broodhead were named recently as operators of Kentucky's 982nd certified Tree Farm, according to Robert W. Schaefer, chairman of the Kentucky Tree Farm Committee. The Robbins now display a green and white Tree Farm sign on their farm on the Purr-Rigsby Road. The Robbins also received a certificate of membership in the American Tree Farm system and subscription to "Tree Farm News," and "Green America."

The American Tree Farm System is a nationwide program,

sponsored by the American Forest Institute. Tree Farmers are recognized for actively managing their forests for increased production of tree crops, along with improved benefits of food and habitat for wildlife, watershed protection and outdoor recreational opportunities.

The Robbins' eleven-acre Tree Farm in northwestern Rockcastle County was completely harvested of over-mature timber. The Robbins then had the remaining small, stunted and large, hollow trees felled so that seedlings and sprouts could have full sunlight and make their best growth. 3,000 shortleaf pine seedlings were planted in spots where seedlings had failed to come up naturally. Livestock was permanently excluded to protect the new crop of trees.

In addition to having a fully productive forest, the Robbins' Tree Farm will provide excellent food and cover for wildlife. Soil erosion control is also improved with the livestock exclusion. As the new tree crop develops and wildlife flourishes, the adjacent pond will be a more beautiful place to enjoy the outdoors.

The Robbins' Tree Farm was nominated by Jim Olive, a forester with the Kentucky Division of Forestry. Tree Farm certification is only one of the services available from the agency that also provides fire prevention and control. Foresters are available for forestland management planning, timber marking, tree planting, timber stand improvement advice and forest pest problems. Owners of forestland seeking information for any problems in their forests can contact Steve Bullen, County Ranger, for Rockcastle County, phone 256-2957, or the Southeastern District Office in Pineville, phone 337-3011.
