New Testament Worship

"God is a Spirit: and they that worship Him in spirit and n truth" (John 4:24) Jesus sald that there are

Jesus sald that unere con one elements essential to acceptable worship: spirit and

two elements essential to acceptable worship: spirit and truth.

In Spirit signifies that all expressions of adoration must be from the heart, in sincerity and true sense of reverence and not merely outward forms of service. For one to worship God acceptably, he must believe that God is and is a rewarder of those that diligenty seek-Him-(Heb.-11-8). He must love God with all his heart (Matt. 22:37). Obedience in becoming a Christian must be from the heart (Rom. 6:17-18; 19-tt. 122). This same sincerity and fear-of-God must continue in his life as he serves God every day as His child (Phil. 21:22 Co. 7:1; I Pet. 1:14-17; Heb. 12:28).

In Truth signifies that one land truth is recommended to the control of the control

2:12; 2 Cor. 7:1; I Pett. 1:14-17; Heb. 12:28). IT Truth signifiles that one, in nor merely to worship in sincerity, but in expressions as directed by Him who is worshipped. To worship in spirit alone, without regard to the content of what is done, is to worship, in vain (Matt. 7:22; Lk. 6:48). To worship in correct form elone, without sincerity of heart and true Teelings of devotion, is to worship in vain devotion, is to worship in vain forms of worship, not according to truth, with pretended devotion, not in sincerity, is vain (Mark. 7:6-9).

For one to worship God acceptably, he must act in harmony with God's will as expressed in His - Word. The gospel of Christ is the source of faith as one obeys it unto salvation, and as he lives by it (Rom. 10.17; 1:18-17). The worship of early Christians was simple. They sang (Eph. 5:19), prayed (Acts 2:42), studied (Apt. 2-20.7), gave (II-Cor. 16:1-2), and partook of the Lord's Supper upon the first day of every 19-20/1, gave (It-Cor. 16:1-2), and partock of the Lord's Supper upon the first day of every week (Act 20:7; I Cor. 11:23-34). Many reason that "silence gives consent," and if God says nothing about a matter (sepecially if He doesn't expressly forbid it - "Thou shall not"), then we are at liberty to supply it. However, God's authority is expressed and, without the expressed will, one does not have authority to act! One departs from the truth when either he acts without God's direction or in violation of it. One worships by truth-only as he abides in truth (John 8:31-32; 2 John 9).



Renovation scheduled for ball fields at Lake

for ball fields at Lake

The Lake Linville area is finally on its way to getting some much-needed improvements, according to Soil Conservationist David Stipes.

Stipes is working in conjunction with the city on a project that would enable the two ball fields at the Lake facility to be used by county residents next season.

The project, which is scheduled to begin next month, will involve the placing of drainage tiles as well as putting mulch, seed and fertilizer on the two ball fields and around the road banks leading to the site, which are too wet to have the proper vegetation. have the proper vegetation

have the proper vegetation cover.

According to Stipes, the City of Mt. Vernon will be responsible for only 25 percent of the cost of the project with the federal government picking up the tab for the other 75 percent.

Right now, all that, is growing on those ball fields is weeds because it stays too wetto get any vegetation to grow. Stipes said. The seeding will also stop the soil erosion around the banks alongside the lake road."

Harris Plumbing of London will put the drainage tiles in the ball field at a cost of \$7.416 and lackers was the low bidder on the seed mulch and furtizer which will cost over \$3.000.

According to Stipe; 7.5 acres of land will be fixed so that vegetation can grow and the ball fields can be us. "At the present time, the fieleg are not used because of their poor condition," Stipes said.

The project originally cost the City of Mt. Vernon \$50,000.



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

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Cracking down on support evaders

Thanks to action taken by Congress this past week, we will be cracking down on the millions of parents in this work of the millions of parents in this country who either do not pay child support or are delinquent in their payments.

As a former prosecutor,
As a former prosecutor,
almost nothing made me more angry than to see a mother and her children abandoned without financial responsibilities, and often they provide no support what soever. This situation is a major cause of the large numbers of families who find themselves on welfare and who barely eleve out an existence.

But this week, I was a major cause of the intervention of the presentatives in passing tough new enforcement laws.

ference "worthwhile and very helpful," and stated that get-ting the career criminal off the street and in jail where he belongs is a high priority of his as well as that of other prosec-utors he talked with at the Conference.

Under the bill we approved, states will be able to withhold child support payments from a parent's wages once it is proven that he is more than 30 days behind. It will put pressure on employers to make sure that money gets to the agencies which handle such cases. It will also allow for the deduction of delinquent child support from tax refunds which the non-paying parent is due.

This is no small problem. The Census Bureau estimates that children in America are being cheated out of \$4 billion as year through unpaid child support, and that is simply wrong!

In the past, our efforts to collect delinquent child support payments have lacked real enforcement powers. But this new legislation puts teeth into the efforts of all 50 states to find and recover delinquent payments.

The legislation will provide special grants to help states work together to help recover child support. No longer will it be simply a matter of moving across state lines to avoid child support. By working together, our state can find these parents and make them pay up.
