Local school system is in non-compliance on 38 indicators

The State Board of Education has submitted an accreditation report to the Rockcastle County school board.

An accreditation team made an on-site visit to the school system in February of last year and a member of that team, R.C. Story presented the team's findings to the board during their last meeting.

Rockcastle's school system was in compliance with 206 indicators out of a total of 244, according to Story, who said that the system had 38 non-compliances with the board, and did not review the 206 compliances.

Not wanting to take hours going over the report, Story only reviewed the thirty-eight non-compliances with the board, and did not review the 206 compliances.

The local school system was cited for failure to comply with state regulations in the following areas:

Curriculum and Learning Environment. There were 10 non-compliances: (1) World Civilization was incorrectly listed as World History at ROHS (2) A need for a system-wide plan for addressing competency in the basic skills at each (3) a need for a system-wide plan stating "Knowledge and Skills expected of pupils at the completion of each grade through eight grade for reading and math (4) the development and completion of district-wide "scope and sequence" for all grade levels and all subjects (5) teacher lesson plans should be developed more thoroughly (6) the present system of reporting grades to parents at the high school is not adequate because of the ever present possibility of grade alteration by pupils who carry report cards from one teacher to another for grade recording (7) health and social studies books were not available for all students, grades 1 and 2 (8) additional teaching supplies, such as tapes and maps, were needed by foreign language and social

studies teachers (9) recommended that the school district implement a program to reduce the drop-out rate (10) skills for promotion from level to level base not established for grades K-5 and 6, 7, 8.

Special Education: There were seven non-compliances: (1) some student records not dated (2) incomplete psychological evaluation used for placement of students (3) committee summaries showed that one student making little or no progress in the program was not re-evaluated for 5 years (4) some students were in too restrictive environments (5) severely and profoundly

handicapped students at Family Life Center are too isolated from other students (6) a work-study program is suggested for handicapped students as alternative placement (7) an assessment of adoptive behavior in two schools have not been completed.

In career development, there were two non-compliances: (1) no documentation of employee involvement in assessment of student skills, attitudes and work quality, who go out for on-job training and (2) no dust collector system in the In-

P.T.A. held meeting Thursday

Asbestos removal is main topic at Brodhead meeting

The controversy over the possible existence of asbestos in two of the grade schools in the Rockcastle school system was the topic of a special called meeting of the Brodhead PTA last Thursday night which was held in the Brodhead gymnasium.

A panel of guests, including school superintendent Danny Charles B. Parsons; 80th district representative Danny Ford; Jim Judge, director of the Ky. Department of Education; Buildings and Grounds; local physician Dr. K.R. Boggs and local health inspector Steve Midkiff, spoke on the asbestos subject and fielded questions from the over 100 persons in the crowd as well as answered questions of a three-member PTA panel which were headed by PTA President Kenneth Chatterle.

During the meeting, Sup. Parsons told the crowd about several occasions when asbestos had been removed from local schools, including Brodhead.

Parsons said that in the summer of 1982, J and R Salvage Company of Brooks removed asbestos from the ceiling at Roundstone Elementary at a cost of \$42,000. Also in that same summer, J and R Salvage removed asbestos from duct work at Mt. Vernon and Brodhead Elementary, at a cost of \$10,306.

The Superintendent also the organization that maintenance workers removed a fire wall from a classroom in the upstairs of the main building at Brodhead in the summer of 1983.

Head of maintenance, Everett Bradley, took a fire wall down in the science room, without first consulting me, that he thought might contain asbestos," Parsons said. "Once I was consulted on the matter, I contacted J and R Salvage and had them come to the school and take the material off," he said, "I had the workers put the material in containers and J and R picked it up because you can't just dispose of it in any way."

The superintendent said that Bradley was also working on a heat duct in the old agriculture building at Brodhead this summer when he found a material he thought might also contain asbestos.

"He brought it to me and I had Mr. Midkiff send it off and see if it contained asbestos," Parsons said.

Midkiff confirmed that the material was tested and the results were known in late June of this year. The material did

contain asbestos.

Parsons told the crowd that Hibbits Bros., a london-based firm would be in Brodhead on the week end to remove the asbestos from the rooms.

The question was then raised by Mt. Vernon Elementary assistant principal Mark McKinney, whose wife, Sharon, teaches in one of the two rooms in question, if Mr. Parsons had intended to allow the kindergarten students to go into these classrooms at the start of school.

McKinney told the crowd that he and his wife went to her classroom about three of four days before school was to open and the doors were standing open and no signs had been posted.

"My wife told me that she could tell that asbestos had been removed from her room and I went to Mr. Payne (Brodhead's principal) who told me that he was going to close the rooms until the matter could be cleared up," McKinney said.

McKinney asked Mr. Parsons that if his wife (McKinney's) had not questioned the removal of asbestos, would he (Mr. Parsons) have allowed children to be placed in those two classrooms when school opened. McKinney got to response to his question from Mr. Parsons.

5 file for 3 seats in local board races

With last Tuesday being the filing deadline for local school board races in the county, a total of five candidates have filed for the three seats at stake.

Incumbent Willie Taylor of Rt. 4, Brodhead, who has served on the Board of Education for 18 years will face newcomer to politics Shirley Long, of Rt. 1, Brodhead in the Second District Race.

Mr. Taylor originally announced that he would not seek re-election but later changed his mind.

Taylor is a retired school teacher and is married to the former Mabel Craig.

In making his official announcement this week, Mr. Taylor said, "During my past experience on the board, I have tried to serve you honestly and fairly. Since my only interest is a good effective school system, I pledge to continue to serve you in an unbiased manner."

Jim Judge, of the Department of Education, told the crowd that there were no state laws on the removal of asbestos and that only the environmental Protection Agency had guidelines as to what to do if "friable" asbestos is found in school.

The federal agency requires that if the asbestos is found, a notice is to be posted on the bulletin board; that all employees be notified in writing of the presence of asbestos; that custodians be provided with a list of safety rules for working around the asbestos and that the P.T.A. be notified.

But Judge reiterated that there were no laws as to how to remove the asbestos and that it was left up to local districts.

He (Judge) said Tuesday in a telephone interview that many school districts across the state held classes in rooms that had asbestos in them and that, in his opinion, the Brodhead school, except for the agriculture building, was safe.

Several parents asked Mr. Parsons why they were not notified about the asbestos and he told them that it was taken out in the summer. However, Judge said Tuesday that it did not matter if school was in session or not.

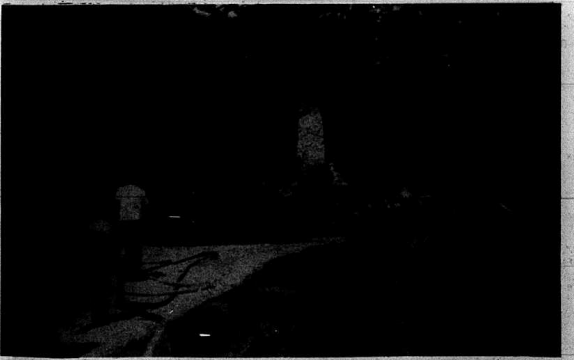

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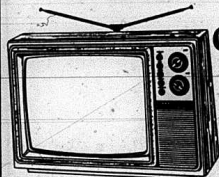

Berea Hospital has new staff orthopedic surgeon

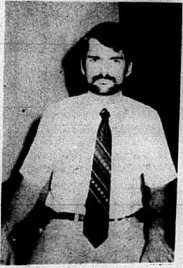

Parkerson said he did not tell Mr. Parsons that assistant principal Mark McKinney could see fibers floating around in the room, as was reported in last week's Signal.

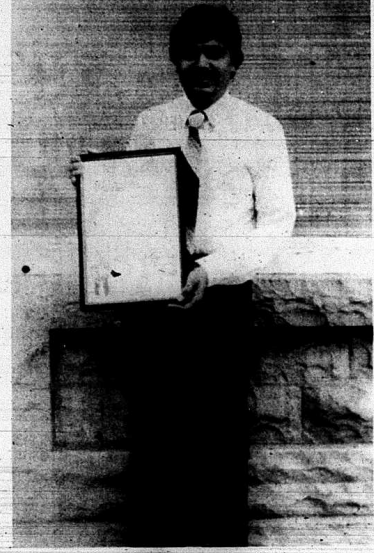

Note Changes in Home Canning Recommendations

USDA has changed canning recommendations for several vegetables and fruits because new research indicates that methods used in the past may lead to

spoilage. If you plan to can food this summer, contact the county extension office and get a copy of "Revised Home Canning Procedures", which lists the changes recommended by USDA.

Here are USDA's changed canning recommendations:

Tomatoes: Do not raw pack tomatoes. Follow instructions for hot pack tomatoes. Process in boiling water bath: Pint jars, 35 minutes; quart jars, 45 minutes.

Winter Squash: Process in boiling water bath: Pint jars, 35 minutes; quart jars, 35 minutes.

Pumpkin and winter squash: Do not can strained pumpkin or strained winter squash. These vegetables may be canned if cut into cubes.

If strained pumpkin/squash ready for pies is desired, it may be frozen.

Apple Sauce: Process pint or quart jars for 20 minutes.

Fruit Purées: Process pint or quart jars for 20 minutes.

These changes are based on research made available to researchers at Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and the Eastern Regional Research Center of USDA.

Tomatoes when packed raw take a long time to come up to boiling temperature. The previously recommended processing time for raw pack tomatoes is believed to be inadequate and more research is needed to determine a correct processing time. Also the processing time for hot packed tomatoes, which was 10 minutes, has been shown to be inadequate and so has been increased.

Note also that the processing time for tomato juice, apple sauce and fruit purées have been increased because of heat-resis-

tant spoilage organisms associated with these products. Heat penetrates slowly in thick products such as strained pumpkin and winter squash. Rather than increasing the processing times even more, USDA has decided to recommend that pumpkin and squash still be canned only in cubes in a pressure canner.

What to do with tomatoes, apple sauce, purées, pumpkin or winter squash. Rather than increasing the processing times even more, USDA has decided to recommend that pumpkin and squash still be canned only in cubes in a pressure canner.

Remember that all vegetables except tomatoes should be canned in a pressure canner to make them safe from botulism. And before serving them, be sure to boil them at least 10 minutes.

Tomatoes should be canned with lemon juice or citric acid to increase their acidity. University of Kentucky Extension food specialists recommend: for pint jars of tomatoes or tomato juice, add 2 teaspoons bottled lemon juice or ¼ teaspoon citric acid; for quart jars, add 4 teaspoons bottled lemon juice or ½ teaspoon citric acid.

Jars of fruit or vegetables should be heat-processed after they are filled and the lids are put on. Do not put them away without processing them. This is called open-kettle canning and has been shown by research to be unsafe.

A Bible is A Bible

The caption of this article describes the attitude of many of us. When we see a book with "Holy Bible" inscribed on its cover, we assume it contains the unadulterated word of God. However, we need to particularly heed, in this case, the old age, "You can't tell a book by its cover."

There are many so-called translations today which are not translations at all, but paraphrases or commentaries, or both. A case in point in the Condensed Version of The Bible published by Reader's Digest. The very word, "condensed" tells us that this version does not contain all the word of God. Careful Bible students would reject it on this basis alone. We believe the Bible to have been verbally inspired, thus any condensing would destroy its authenticity (See Matt. 4:4; 2 Pet. 1:20-21).

Unfortunately, there are other versions which are not so easily recognized as perversion. They are more subtle, and many people are being deceived into thinking they are authentic. We need to be warned against "translations" wherein men admit that their work is "more than a word translation." So reads the Preface in the New International Version (NIV); a "Bible" that is growing daily in popularity. The Greek in which the N.I.V. was originally written is the same as the O.T. Hebrew Scriptures were originally translated is now a dead language. Therefore the words which the Holy Spirit used in directing the writing are forever sealed and they cannot be changed, added to, or omitted if the original message is to remain intact.

Space will not permit our going into great detail, but we will cite a few errors and inconsistencies of the NIV which will hopefully acquaint you with the danger of using it as your chief study guide.

1. The NIV teaches original sin. "Surely I have been a sinner from birth, sinful nature the time my mother conceived me" (Psa. 51:5). "In sin did my mother conceive me..." (true translation) is a far cry from having been a sinner when he (David) was conceived.

2. There is a direct contradiction between Mt. 5:17 and Eph. 2:15. In Matthew it says that Jesus did NOT come to abolish the law of Moses

and, but in Eph. He did what very thing Jesus did what He came to do - He "abolished in his flesh the enmity, even the law of commandments contained in ordinances..." (Eph. 2:15). The Law was not to be destroyed until it had been fulfilled (Matt. 5:17).

3. Christ alone has immortality (1 Tim. 6:16), which would mean that no other one is immortal; an absurd conclusion. The proper translation is, "who only has immortality," meaning that He is only immortal. He is not mortal.

4. The NIV teaches premillennialism. The blessings which God proposed in Christ, according to the NIV, are "to be put into effect...to bring all things in heaven and on earth together, under one head, even Christ" (Eph. 1:10). The truth is that all things have been put under Him. When did this occur? "When he (God) raised him from the dead, and set him at his own right hand" (Eph. 1:20-21). Also see Dan. 7:13-14.

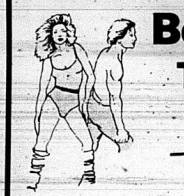
If Jesus' exaltation and reign is for some future time, He is presently a King without a kingdom, a Head without a body, and a Ruler without a law.

In addition to many other such "wrestlings," there are numerous omissions in this version. Why so many perversions? According to Greek experts, one of the reasons is that they are upon faulty Greek texts. It's own Preface admits to using an "eclectic" (free choice) among readings) method of translation. "It ignores over 5,000 Greek MSS; therefore, the choice between variants ultimately depends upon guesswork" (The Identity of The New Testament Text, page 24, by Wilbur N. Pickering).

If you have an NIV, we suggest you make frequent comparisons with other versions long recognized by Greek authorities, before accepting its teaching. If you want a modern version which eliminates archaic language without changing the message, the New King James Version comes highly recommended.

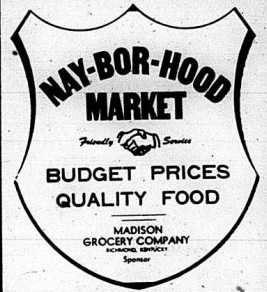

Squirrel season opens "mixed"

Squirrel hunters enjoyed mixed results over the Aug. 18-19 opening weekend, with the best hunting reported from far Western Kentucky.

According to an informal survey of regional law enforcement supervisors with the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, conservation officers, checked in 111 of Kentucky's 120 counties. 1,828 squirrel hunters with 2,282 squirrels over the two-day period. Only 79 hunters had reached their daily limit of six

squirrels when checked by conservation officers.

The First Wildlife District in Western Kentucky is the only region to report squirrel populations higher than last year. In the second district (West - Central Kentucky), conservation officers felt that overall population levels were the same as last year, while in the rest of the state, squirrel numbers were generally lower.

However, this year's harvest ratio of 1.18 squirrels per hunter was higher than last year, when this figure was .78 squirrel per hunter. Those who remember the 1983 season

opened in the middle of a record-setting drought and heat wave which created almost unbearable hunting conditions.

One problem squirrel hunters are encountering now is that hickories, buckeyes and other nuts are not ripe across much of the state. This means that the squirrels are scattered and hard to locate. West Kentucky apparently has a good hickory crop this year, and the squirrels are cutting in hickory trees now, accounting for the high success there.

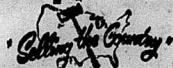

Squirrel Season

hunters should find squirrel numbers just about the same as they were last year, according to a survey conducted by Biologist Harold Barber. An assessment of each year's mast crop gives a good indication of overall squirrel numbers for the following year.

If mast (nuts, seeds and

similar wildlife foods) is in short supply, squirrel survival and reproduction will be low. But years when mast is plentiful are followed by booms in squirrel numbers.

Last year, what started out as an excellent mast crop ended up as barely moderate, thanks to the lack of rainfall in 1983. Some crops failed to mature, while much of the mast that remained on many upland sites was stunted and poorly developed, Barber reports.

Barber's report concludes, "No great change from 1983 levels is expected in any region, although it seems probable that squirrel numbers in 1984 will be slightly above the 1983 level in the eastern region, about the same or slightly higher in the central region and about the same or slightly lower in the western region."

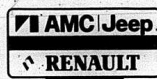

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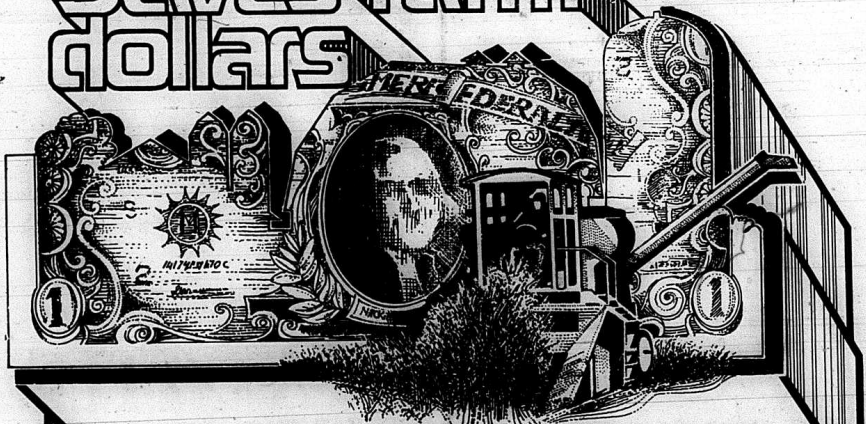

Use marketing cards correctly

The Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service recently reminded Rockcastle Co tobacco program participants of penalties for improper use of their tobacco marketing cards. The cards were issued for each farm with a marketing quota and are to be used by producers to market those kinds of tobacco that are subject to marketing quotas.

"Using the card to market tobacco produced on any other farm and allowing the card to be used by another person to identify tobacco

produced on another farm, constitutes false identification of tobacco and will result in a reduction in producer allotments and quotas, assessment of severe monetary marketing quota penalties and other possible civil and criminal liabilities," ASCS official Harold Ballinger said.

When a producer shares in tobacco that is produced on several different farms but markets the tobacco on marketing cards without regard to the farm of production he/she violated the tobacco program. By using

more care in keeping the production from each farm separate during the curing and storing processes, Ballinger said producers can avoid this and many other false identification cases.

He said other typical misuses of marketing cards occur when producers with excess tobacco poundage available on their cards allow producers on another farm or a warehouse operator to market tobacco on

those cards. Some producers who own a farm with a tobacco marketing quota and also rent a farm having a marketing quota, may market the tobacco from both farms on the rented farm's marketing card. Consequently, all undermarketings or unsold tobacco quotas, are reflected on the marketing card issued for the operators own farm when undermarketings may have occurred on both farms.

The ASCS official said the tobacco program will be monitored closely to detect these and other possible violations involving illegal use of tobacco marketing cards.

dustrial Arts shop at the high school.

Gifted and talented programs also had two non-compliances: (1) no program for identifying gifted and talented grades 1, 2 and 3 and (2) no appropriate instruction program for gifted and talented in grades 1, 2 and 3.

In the area of school staff and administration, there were also two non-compliances (1) 70 teachers are teaching out of their major or minor field in the district with only Livingston grade school not having any teachers out of field and (2) the pupil-teacher ratio in the system is too high with more students in classrooms than is allowed by the state.

The area of pupil services had two non-compliances: (1) the need of another counselor at the grade school level and (2) clerical assistance is not adequate for all libraries.

The accreditation team found four non-compliances in the area of school plant and

facilities: (1) classroom space and restroom facilities at Mt. Vernon School being inadequate as well as Livingston School because of the age of the building (2) all programs are not accessible to the handicapped at some elementary schools and (3) lighting in the elementary schools did not meet state regulations of 50 foot candles at desk level.

In the area of transportation, there was one non-compliance, that of cars passing buses at RCHS while students were loading and unloading.

In the areas of philosophy and objectives, school and committee relations, responsible pupil conduct, pupil activity program and financial support and budget, the school system did not have any non-compliances.

Rockcastle School Superintendent Charles Parsons said recently that 16 of the 35 non-compliances had been corrected and that local school officials were working on correcting seven other non-

compliances. The local system must develop an educational plan for the next three years to correct the non-compliances. This plan, which has to be approved by the state Board of Education, must be submitted to Frankfort within 30 days.

Crackdown on reckless driving
