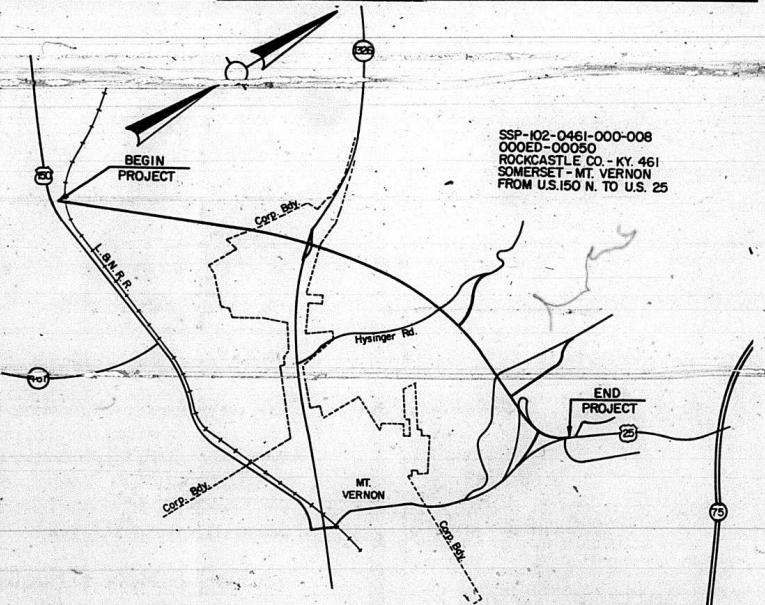
Another chance to join Scouting fun

FREEZE TOMATOES FOR SOUPS AND CASSEROLES

Tomatoes are easy to freeze, and they stay high in vitamin C content and other nutrients. But don't expect to taste like either fresh or canned tomatoes.

Frozen tomatoes are a bit mushy when thawed, but they still work fine in soups and casseroles. Another advantage is that you can do small batches at a time.

You can freeze them without heating first, except for a quick dip in boiling water to loosen their skins. Use sound, vine-ripened tomatoes. Dunk them in boiling water and then into cold water. Slip off the skins and cut them into quarters or eighths. Pack them into moisture-vapor-proof freezer containers, pressing down with a wooden spoon to make enough juice to cover. Leave 1-inch headspace, seal, and freeze immediately.

Frozen tomato juice is another possibility. Here are directions: Wash, sort and trim firm, vine-ripened tomatoes. Cut in quarters or eighths. Simmer 5 to 10 minutes and press through a sieve. If you like, season with 1 teaspoon salt to each quart of juice. Pour into freezer containers, leaving 1 inch headspace. Seal and freeze immediately.

FREEZE MELONS NOW FOR WINTER TREAT

While melons are plentiful in your own garden or local market, freeze some for winter meals. Watermelon, cantaloupe and honeydew melons are all easy to freeze.

Use only top quality melons. Remove the seeds, peel and cut melon into slices, cubes or balls. Cover with a cold sugar syrup, using two cups sugar to four cups water—or pack dry in bags using no sugar. Expel as much air as possible from the bag, seal and freeze immediately.

When using frozen melons, serve them partially thawed, especially those frozen without sugar. Melon slices frozen in a sugar syrup will maintain their texture better and be firmer after thawing.

KEEP FROZEN FOODS AT ZERO OR BELOW

After all your hard work in the garden and kitchen, is your freezer keeping its cool? Frozen foods keep best at zero degrees Fahrenheit or below.

Foods frozen at higher temperature of your freezer with a thermometer, or give it the "ice cream test". Put a container of ice cream in the freezer. Remove it after a few hours and try spooning it out. If it's soft enough to spoon out easily, your freezer temperature is probably around 20 degrees Fahrenheit—not nearly as cold as it should be. If the ice cream is hard and brick-like, impossible to dish out without heating up the spoon, the freezer

temperature is at zero or below. If you find that your freezer is too warm at its normal setting, turn the dial to a colder position. If it still doesn't get cold enough, call a repair man.

4-H POSTER CONTEST

During September, youth ages 9-19 in our county as well as all across the state have been enrolling in the largest youth organization in the world—4-H. After club enrollment, 4-H

ers are able to move right into 4-H activities with the Poster Contest.

The 4-H Poster Contest aims to give young people an opportunity to start the new year by expressing in art form, what 4-H is and does. Everyone has the opportunity to participate in this 4-H project which is quick, easy and fun. Outstanding posters go on to area, state and National competition. State winners will be displayed at the Kentucky State Fair.

RULES FOR THE CONTEST:

1. Posters may be made by any currently enrolled 4-H'er.
2. All posters must be designed on posterboard of 14" x 22" dimensions (one-half a standard poster size). Posters may be produced by a medium — watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils or collage. They cannot be three dimensional.
3. 4-H is to be the topic for the poster. 4-H'ers can show what they think 4-H is, what they do in 4-H and what they think 4-H does for young people. Catchy slogans or titles may help tell the story.
4. Lettering should be neat. Using stencils or cut out letters is suggested.
5. Well-known cartoon figures cannot be used because they are copyrighted.
6. The 4-H'er's name, age, full address, grade, school, teacher and a brief interpretive statement

should be completed on provided forms or written on the back of each poster.

One winner will be chosen in each grade level in the county—4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and high school age. Winners will receive ribbons and first place posters will be submitted to the Area Poster Contest.

Posters are due from Roundstone and Livingston Elementary on Friday, Sept. 14; and from Mt. Vernon and Brodhead Elementary on Friday, Sept. 28th. Students from RCHS may turn posters in to the Extension Office before Friday, Sept. 28th.



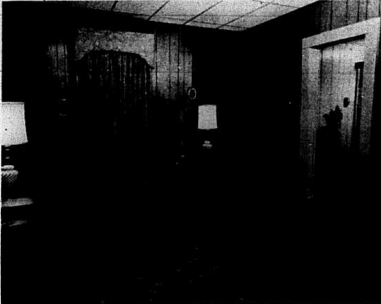
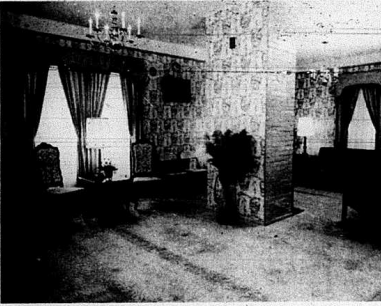

Main street has new look with twenty-five new street lights

Main Street is getting a new look in the form of 25 new street lights.

The lights are a part of the Mt. Vernon Local Development Corporation's Revitalization Project for Main Street and are being installed by city employees.

Festival planned to turn on street lights Thursday Sept. 27th

The Mt. Vernon Local Development Corporation and the local business and professional association have made plans for a Festival in Mt. Vernon, during which the new street lights on Main Street will be officially turned on.

New street lights were recently placed on Main Street by city employees as part of the LDC's continuing program to revitalize Mt. Vernon. The installation of the lights coincide with the recent rebuilding of the sidewalks and the planting of trees.

LDC Director Floyd Owens told the Mt. Vernon City Council, during their regular monthly meeting Monday night, that the Festival had been planned for Thursday, September 27th from 4 p.m. until around 9 p.m., when Mayor Roland Mills will officially turn the lights on.

Owens said that the Festival will be used by the Business and Professional Association to help raise money for new Christmas lights that will go along with the new street lights.

The director also said that the event will be used by merchants as a time to say "Thank You" to their customers for summer business, as well as to lay groundwork for the Fall and Christmas shopping promotions.

Owens stressed that the event is for the entire county and that any club or organization would be welcome to set up a booth and participate in the day's events.

Entertainment at the Festival will be provided by

the RCHS band as well as organizations throughout the county, such as the Karate Club, Rockcastle County Council for the Arts and local rock and country musicians.

Owens, who has been director of the LDC since its inception two years ago, said the organizers of the event are hoping for a carnival-type atmosphere with booths and shows. He said that people working the booths and participating in the events would be asked to dress in old-time clothing because the first street lights were turned on in Mt. Vernon in February of 1911 and they were gas. The

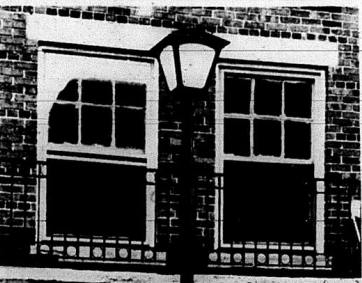
Local man shot near Livingston Friday night

Shirley Long, candidate for school board speaks out on educational system in Rockcastle county

"Our main emphasis should be placed on what happens in the classroom," said Shirley Long, who is a candidate for the Rockcastle County Board of Education in the Second District. Mrs. Long's remarks came during an interview last Friday.

The mother of three said that education had always been a major interest in her life, that she loved it and that education could add richness to life.

"I believe in education, it is the basis of democracy and a way to move up in life," Mrs. Long said.

The school teacher of ten years said that she became concerned about education in Rockcastle County about two years ago when the state-wide test scores were released and Rockcastle was so close to the bottom.

"I felt like I had to do something and that is the main reason I decided to run for the board," she said. "I am not a person that likes to be in the public eye, but when you feel as strongly about something as I do about this, you have to do something about it," she explained.

"Rockcastle County is my home and just because we are a small rural community is no reason for us to settle for anything less than a first rate educational system," Mrs. Long went on to say. "We can have a first rate system if enough people want it and are willing to work for it and do

what is necessary."

Mrs. Long said that she felt the present Board of Education dealt too strictly with the business dealings of the system and did not get involved enough in matters of what's going on in the classroom. She said that she realized that the business end was necessary but she said she did not feel it should be the main focus of board meetings.

"If I am elected to the board, I will work very hard to see that conditions are made so that every child in the school district has the opportunity to learn and is helped in every way to value learning and become motivated to learn," she said.

"I will strive to do what is right, as I always have in making decisions and I will try to get as many facts as possible and consider the needs and opinions of other people," she added.

Mrs. Long said that by being both a teacher and a parent, she has two different perspectives on education and she feels like this would help her to be a good board member as well as the fact that she has had the opportunity to study education and to work in other systems. "I think that these facts will help me to do what is right," Mrs. Long said.

"I think we have lots of intelligent, well-trained people working in our system that we need to listen to and use their ideas for improvement," she said.

"In my meetings with other people from other areas

of the state, it has become apparent that Rockcastle County has a reputation of being a 'political' school system. While I know this is not unusual in Eastern Kentucky, I do think that it is not good for our schools and especially for our children," she went on to say.

On question, Mrs. Long said that she did not agree with the way teachers were hired by the local board. "I can see why this procedure has been adop-

ted, with those graduating first and applying first getting the first openings. But, I personally do not think this is the best way to hire teachers. Teachers should be hired in their field and not just because they are next on the list," she said. "You will have better results in the long run."

Mrs. Long is the daughter of Jay and Myrtle Brown and is married to Billy Long, who

Why Not A Public Meeting?

It has long been our contention that few differences cannot be resolved if there is a sincere effort on the part of everyone involved and if there is an open discussion of the facts of the matter.

We feel that the question of a new or a remodeled school for Mt. Vernon Elementary is a case in point in which an open discussion of the matter by those concerned is needed.

The Board of Education's decision to reject the state Board of Education's recommendation for a new school should, we believe, have been reached only after everyone wishing to do so had a chance to voice their opinion on the matter at a public meeting.

As we understand it, the school board cites insufficient bonding potential to completely finance a new building and the feeling that the present structure is "too sound" to be torn down.

Perhaps this is the case but we still feel that a public meeting between the public, school board members and representatives of the state Department of Education, would serve to answer a lot of questions there might be about the matter and would certainly go a long way toward enhancing the school board's general public relationship. Whatever the outcome, citizens would, at least, feel they had had the opportunity to learn more about the school board's financial condition as regarding new construction. And, the feeling that they might have the chance for a little personal input into so important a matter would, we believe, be of much benefit.

In this time of turmoil over education, we feel the board should explore every possible avenue of being more responsive to the public and a public meeting of this type would certainly provide such an avenue.

Fairground Hill resident, was present at the meeting to present the Council with a petition containing 44 signatures from people in the Fairground Hill area. The petition was in protest of a recent business that opened in the area.

Shaferly told the council that Paul McFerron had opened a pool room in the community and that it was causing a nuisance to the people living in the area.

Councilmember Jack Renner said that he felt the council should do something about the situation because of the number of people upset by it. "If this many people are willing to sign a petition, then something must be wrong," Renner said. Councilman Joe Martin echoed the same sentiments, saying, "If we can do something about this, I think we should." Martin made a motion to revoke McFerron's privilege license until the matter of no restrooms and no parking are cleared up.

The council also voted in favor of Martin's motion and Mayor Ronald Mullins instructed the city police present at the meeting to ticket anyone illegally parked on the street and to patrol the area to see

that the business is not causing a disturbance.

In other business, the council voted to notify city garbage collectors William K. Bullen and Clarence Hasty to exercise their garbage franchise or give it up. They instructed the city clerk to write the two men and give them 10 days to answer their written replies.

The council's move came after several people had complained about garbage pick-up in the city.

As one of their last items of business, the council hired James Thompson on a full-time basis as a city policeman.

Service stated they would help in designing a landscaping plan for the springs area.

the figure for the total tax assessment, both personal property and real estate.

The breakdown is as follows: 51c on real estate with 14c being the county's share, 15c for school tax and 22c the state levy.

A \$1.17 will be levied on personal property, with the state getting the lion's share of 88c of the tax. The local school tax on personal property is 15c and the county's tax on personal property is 14.27%.

Anyone owning bank stock will pay 19% county tax on assessed value and 85% state tax.

Again, we reiterate, the tax rates remain unchanged except for the increase in the school tax to 15' from 9.5 for personal property and 7.7 for real estate and the lowering of the state's levy to 22' from 22.1 on real estate.

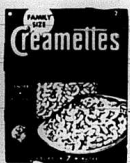

Physical therapy department expands with new room, new staff members

The physical therapy department at the Rockcastle County Hospital has recently added a room and two new staff members to accommodate the increase in outpatients who come for treatment.

Sheri LeCompte, head of the physical therapy department, explained why a new room is being used now. "The main reason we expanded was that the outpatient program has built up to about 10 to 12 patients a day and with the other two rooms, we couldn't

treat many at once."

The new room is directly down the hall from the other two and it has a new piece of equipment; parallel bars. Mrs. LeCompte said, "The bars are needed for the pre-ambulatory phase when a patient cannot stand by themselves. A patient that would take two people to help them stand can stand in the parallel bars with only one person. And the bars give a patient more of a sense of independence because they can walk through them alone."

are now used for physical therapy treatments. The whirlpool room is used by any type of patient needing water therapy in a tank. The modality room is used for heat and cold treatments, electrical stimulation, ultrasound and massage. The gym room, now located in the new area, is used for exercise and ambulation.

She said, "With the extra room and extra staff, we'll be able to treat different types of patients at the same time whereas we used to be able to handle only two heat patients and an exercise patient at once."

Mrs. LeCompte is a licensed physical therapist and she is joined by Kim McGowen, who is a certified physical therapist assistant. Joy Durham has been added to the staff and she is a licensed physical therapist. Karen Ramsey works in the department as an aide and Glen Adkins has been added in an aide's position.

Mrs. LeCompte added, "We have three people here at all times (8 a.m. to 4 p.m.) except on week ends when we don't treat outpatients. But, we work our schedule out for the patients' needs, not the therapists. Although we don't, as a policy, accept outpatients on week ends, we will make an exception."

looking forward to teaching another CPR class for the boy scouts since this one went so well."

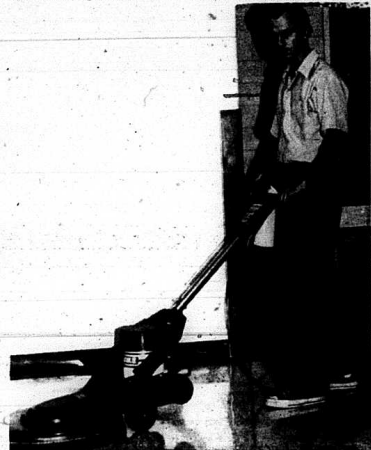

Know how to react during an emergency

Would you know what to do in case of a medical emergency? Would you panic or could you remain calm and act rationally? September is National Emergency Care Month and its purpose is to educate the public about how to give life-saving care before medical help arrives and to pay tribute to those skilled in treating persons during emergency situations.

The following topics on medical emergencies are covered in a booklet called "Emergency Care of the Adult Victim" written by Dr. Steven L. Arnold. Clip out the article so you'll have a reference on how to handle certain emergencies you could be faced with in the future.

CHOKING
If the victim can make any noise at all, encourage them to cough it out. Do not slap their back. If the victim makes no sounds and cannot move air, then give four hard blows with the heel of one hand to the victim's back between the shoulder blades.

Next, wrap your arms around the victim's belly between the breasts and the navel. Make a fist with one hand and grab it with the other hand. Press the fist in and upward into the victim's abdomen quickly four times.

If the victim is very fat or pregnant, apply the same procedure to the lower half of the breastbone near, but not on the breastbone tip.

BURNS
There are three types of burns. If the skin is red and painful it's a first degree burn. A second degree burn has red and painful skin with blisters. White or charred and painless skin indicates a third degree burn.
For first degree burns, apply cold water to the burn. Then use a cold, wet towel or immerse the burned extremity in cold water. Do not apply ointments or fats.
For a second degree burn, submerge the burned extremity in

ice cold water. Do not apply ointments or fats. Put ice pack dressings on the burn with clean, freshly laundered cloths that have been wrung out in ice cold water. Do not break blisters since they act as a sterile band-aid.

For third degree burns, call the ambulance. Do not remove charred, adherent clothing. Cover the burns with sterile dressing or freshly laundered linen. If the arms, hands, legs or feet are involved, keep them higher than the heart. If the face is involved, sit the victim up and watch for breathing problems. Do not cover with ointment, greasy medications or home remedies.

BLEEDING
Rapid, heavy loss of blood can cause death in 3 to 5 minutes. Apply direct pressure over the wound. Use a pad from clothing, if necessary, and one as clean as possible and place it directly over the wound, then apply pressure with your hand.

Elevate the bleeding extremity higher than the heart. Do not elevate a broken extremity. Continue the pressure until the bleeding stops. If the pad soaks through, add more pads, but do not remove original pad.

If, after 5 to 10 minutes of direct pressure, bleeding does not stop, apply pressure to a pressure point between the wound and the heart. A pressure point is a point at which the artery runs close enough to the surface to feel. Pressure points may be felt:

- a) forearm: on the side of the bend at the elbow closest to the body.
 - b) upper arm: underneath the biceps muscle on the side closest to the body.
 - c) lower leg: behind the knee.
 - d) calf and thigh: at the crease between the groin and the thigh.
 - e) neck: in the groove between the windpipe (Adam's Apple) and the muscles of the neck.
- Stop pressure on the

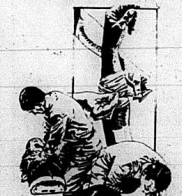
pressure point when bleeding stops.

If the extremity is amputated, crushed, or mangled, or all attempts to stop bleeding have been unsuccessful, a tourniquet may be used as a last resort. Once applied, rapid medical help is needed to prevent loss of the extremity.

Use only a wide piece of cloth, at least 1 1/2 inches in diameter, such as a shirt sleeve or tie. Never use narrow items such as rope or wire. Wrap the tourniquet around the extremity (never around the neck), a few finger-breaths above the wound, between the wound and the heart.

Tie a knot in the tourniquet and then tie a stick to the tourniquet above the knot. Twist the stick as little as possible, tightening the tourniquet until the bleeding stops. Keep it in this position by hand or tie the stick lightly to the limb.

Mark the time the tourniquet



was applied, and indicate this to medical personnel.

Remember that it is always easier to prevent an injury than to treat it. For example, poisons can be removed to a safe place in the home, emergency identification bracelets can be worn by those who need them, and individuals at risk for coronary heart disease can take steps to reduce those risks through proper diet, exercise, stopping smoking, and other preventive measures.

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Rockets lose to Clay County

After taking a 41-6 drubbing, at the hands of the Lincoln County Patriots week before last, the Rockets traveled to Clay County Friday night and were handed another resounding 46-0 loss, despite a series of penalties at one time against Clay County which moved them back 50 yards and incurred their coach being ejected from the game.

The Rockets couldn't get any offense going and made some crucial turnovers in the game to assist the Tigers to

their lopsided victory. Plus, the Tigers picked Rockcastle's pass defense to pieces.

The Rockets took the opening kick-off and started their first drive from their own 21 yard line. Junior Greg Mink and senior Garry Fain combined to pick up 8 of the yards needed for the first down and, on third and two, defensive pass interference was called and the Rockets had a first down on their own 44. But, misfortune struck immediately as, on the next play, Mink was

stripped of the ball and the Tigers recovered on the Rockets' 47 yard line. Six plays later, the Tigers went in for the touchdown. The extra point attempt was good and Clay County led 7-0 with 8:50 left in the first quarter.

After, the Rockets picked up their second first down of the game on a 9-yard run by Fain, they were unable to retain possession and Biron Mullins' first punt gave the Tigers their second possession of the night on their own 24.

Two pass plays later, the Tigers ran the ball in for their second touchdown of the game and were ahead 14-0 with 4:45 still showing on the clock in the first quarter.

Clay's next score came on a bad snap which sailed over Mullins' head and gave the Tigers the ball on the Rockets' 4 yard line. Mullins was shaken up on the play as he fell on the ball and, consequently; several of the Clay County players fell on him.

On their first play, the Tigers took the ball in for the score and it was 21-0, which was the tally at the end of the first quarter.

The first touchdown of the second quarter came after Clay County took a Rockets' punt and began their drive from their own 26 yard line. The Tigers threw the ball seven times in their drive to the goal

Cassandra, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David McCauley of Mt. Vernon, is majoring in Bible.

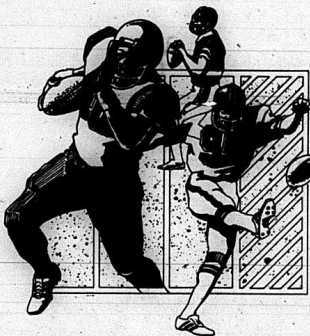
