FREEZE TOMATOES FOR SOUPS AND CASSEROLES

like either fresh or canned toma-toes. Tozen tomatoes are a bit mushy when thawed, but they still work fine in soups and casseroles. Another advantage is that you can do small batchest at a time. The still be still be succeeded to the still be still the boiling water to toosen their stins. Use sound, vine-ripened tomatoes. Dunk them in boiling water and then into cold water. Slip off the skins and cut aftem into quarters or eighths. Pack them-into moisture-vapor-proof freeze conatiners, pressing down with a wooden spoon to make enough juice to cover. Leave 1-inch headspace, seal, and freeze im-mediately.

Frozen tomato juice is another, possibility. Here are directions: Wash, sort and trim firm, vineripened tomatoes. Out in quarters or eighths. Simmer 5 to 10 miles and press through a sieve. If you like, assean with 1 teaspon sellike, seed in the cash quart of juice. Pour into receze containers, leaving 1 into headspace. Seal and freeze impreciately.
