This is compounded by the fact that these smaller tractors are generalthese smaller tractors are generally associated with use on the steeper farm land. In contrast the greatest use of ROPS has been cabs on bigger tractors which are used in larger farming operations. Often these larger tractors are used on the more level terrain and in crop production activities with

used on the more level terrain and in crop production activities with the lower fisk of tractor accidents. Some age groups appear to be at greater risks of a tractor accident than others.
