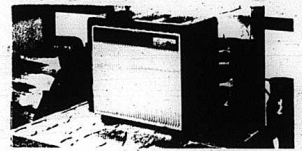

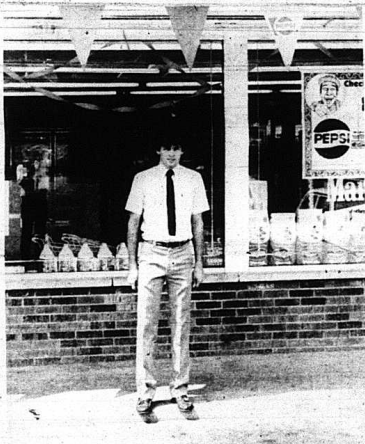

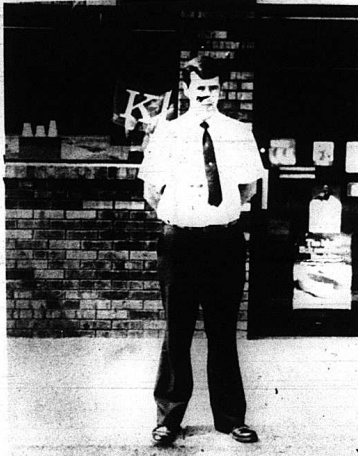

"When I went to the Sturgill residence to question Gary about what happened, I found him in the house where he had stabbed himself in the hand with a knife," Sinkenfelter said.

incident which occurred near the Livingston city limits at the residence of Gary Griffin, according to Kentucky State Trooper Joe Sinkenfelter.

Sinkenfelter said that he was called to the Rockcastle County Hospital about 10 o'clock Saturday night because Newcomb had been brought in with a stab wound to the lower part of his abdomen.

The state police said that Newcomb had been stabbed with a large knife by Gary Sturgill of Livingston.

The officer said that Sturgill was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital and later transferred to U.K.

Sinkenfelter said that he would present the case to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury on September 28th to see if an indictment will be returned.

Will religion play major part in upcoming presidential election?

Is it surprising that religion is playing a role in the upcoming presidential election? Does mixing religion with politics pose a threat to separation of church and state? Should ministers keep informed about religious issues?

These and other questions were put before 12 of Rockcastle County's religious leaders chosen at random by the Signal in an attempt to get their views on the issue.

The appearance of religion on the platforms of the 1984 presidential candidates. The pastors were open and candid in giving their opinions about the situation, with all of them having generally decided where they stood on the often heated issue of church and state. Many said it was a topic they made a point to keep up with.

The media has been furnishing detailed accounts of the disputes between President Reagan and the Democrat Walter Mondale as to how religion should be treated within the political arena. The candidates and their running mates are taking different stands on legislation that will affect issues dear to the hearts of many of the country's religious groups: prayer in public schools, abortion and federal aid to parochial education.

Harvey Pansel, pastor of the Fairview Baptist Church, can't see that religion is playing a part in this election. "Mainly the media is playing it up," he explained.

"I don't feel like the candidates are going to force people to do anything," he said, when asked if there could be a threat to separation of church and state. "But I think ministers, as well as any other citizen, should know what's going on. I don't think we should turn our back on any issue. We have an obligation to uphold those issues."

The pastor of Northside Baptist Church, John Justice, said, "It would really upset me if (religion) would become a debated issue because there's no way in the world Christianity can win." Justice definitely thinks that religious issues will affect the church and "our putting our head in the ground and ignoring the issues won't do any good." He added, "I see a surging back to conservatism as far as morals and spending is concerned. I'm more op-

timistic about what's happening in our political arena now on the federal and state levels. I'm very conservative. Liberalism has about destroyed our country."

He concluded by saying he thinks God will turn His back on our country if the liberalism continues.

Dave Alther, pastor of the Bethany United Methodist Church, isn't surprised that

religion has become an issue in 1984. "If you take a look at the last four years, you'll see that the stage was set, and therefore I'm not surprised with the Moral Majority and all of the things that have cropped up here and there. And remember, one of the Democratic candidates was a minister-Jesse Jackson."

Alther doesn't think religion should be left completely out of politics. "If we have a belief we shouldn't leave that belief back in the church," he said. "It should go out into the world with us." He often reflects on how religious issues will affect him and he said, "I think every man, woman, and child, regardless of who they are, should think on this."

Gary Giarratano, pastor of the Mt. Vernon Pentecostal Church, isn't surprised either. "I think that's what a lot of American voters are wanting, prayer in the schools and some topics that would be considered religious because these are some of the ideal of the American people."

He sees religion coming on strongly in this election as a sign of more religious awareness in the country. "I think there's more of an awareness, possibly because the Moral Majority has brought this out and I feel like the church as a whole is lifting its voice more in these days and that's the reason why we're having so much of it mentioned in American politics."

Austin Mobley, minister of the Providence Church of Christ, said that he definitely thinks that religion will play a role in the outcome of the presidential election.

"Basically, everyone in the United States has some religion and I think most people will use their religious convictions to help them decide who to vote for," Mobley said. "I, myself, am a conservative and I am strongly opposed to abortion, such as President Reagan," Mobley

said. "I think this issue could have a major effect in itself."

"Many Christians will read the two platforms of both the Democratic and Republican parties to see how it will affect their religion," Mobley said. "This could also make a difference in how one will vote."

The pastor of the Wildie Christian Church, Kenton Parkey, is afraid religion is being used as an issue by the candidates to gain political favors. "He doesn't see the use of religious issues as an indication of a spiritual reawakening."

"I think there are some groups that have some potential to sway issues in their (Cont. to 13)

Jack Wren will oppose incumbent Kenneth Adams in 5th district school board race

"We need to get more parents involved in what's going on in our school system," said Jack Wren, a candidate for the Rockcastle County School Board in the fifth district. Wren's comments came during an interview Monday.

The ordained Baptist minister said that he did not feel that enough parents were involved in the school system and that he was running for the local board in the hope of changing that fact.

Wren, who is president of the Roundstone P.T.O. and who has been president of the organization since it began 5 years ago, said that his experiences with the P.T.O. was another major reason for his candidacy.

"We have been able to accomplish a lot of things at Roundstone through hard work with the parents and teachers all cooperating," he said.

"If I am elected to the board, I will try to establish a better working relationship between the Board of Education and the public," he said, "and create a more positive attitude about everything."

Wren, also a building contractor, said that he did not think that the school district he was presently living in was getting good enough represen-

tation from the present board member, Kenneth Adams.

"I contacted Mr. Adams and asked him to come to a P.T.O. meeting and tell us (the P.T.O.) how we could work closer with the Board of Education to get some of the things done that we wanted to get done, but he refused to come," Wren said. "If I was on the board, I would be more than happy to go to any school or P.T.A. and tell them about what we have been able to accomplish at Roundstone," Wren added.

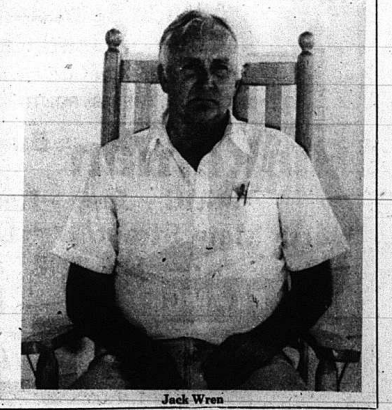
The pastor of 25 years said that recent test scores were another reason for his running for office. "When the test scores came out two years ago and we were ranked so close to the bottom in the state of Kentucky, it was disheartening for me," Wren said. "Our present board member has been on the board for 16 years and while I personally have nothing against Mr. Adams, I do think we need a change; someone with new ideas and an open mind; someone that can come up with some different views on improving education in the county."

"Teachers in our system have a very big load to carry," Wren said. "and I think that if more parents could get involved, they could lighten the load." Wren went on to say, "One thing I would definitely

like to see changed is the fact that we have too many students compared to the number of teachers. It is much easier to teach children when you can devote more time to each one of them individually," he said. "We need to hire more teachers."

"Some teachers are uneasy about the fact that they are going to be evaluated more often and stringently but I

think that this is necessary and I think we need even more of this than is being proposed," he said. "Everytime I do a job, it is evaluated to see if it is done right and if it isn't, I don't get paid for it." Wren added, "The same should be true of our teachers and an evaluation should be used as an instrument to help teachers try and improve in the areas where (Cont. to 8)

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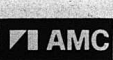

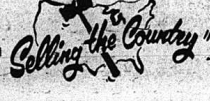

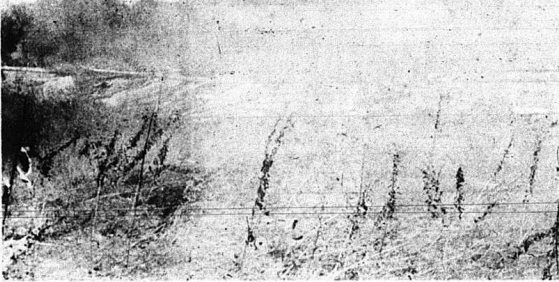

An ordinance establishing a comprehensive personnel system for all departments of the City of Mt. Vernon, Ky.

WHEREAS, the council and the administration of the City of Mt. Vernon recognize that a personnel system which recruits and retains a quality, motivated work force is indispensable to effective and efficient city government; and

WHEREAS, it is essential to have rules and regulations in a single written document delineating all aspects of employment with the city and available to each of the employees affected by said rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Revised Statutes require that the compensation of city employees be in accordance with a personnel and pay classification plan which shall be adopted by ordinance:

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council and the City of Mt. Vernon of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section One: That the attached personnel policies and procedures, classification plan and compensation plan, as well as an applicable state or federal law, shall be the system of personnel administration for the city.

Section Two: That the administration of the system shall be as set forth by these policies and procedures and the applicable Kentucky Revised Statutes.

Section Three: The department heads shall be officers (Clerk, Police Chief, Superintendent of Public Works) and this ordinance and personnel system together are intended to satisfy the statutory requirements for establishment of non-elected city offices.

Section Four: That these policies may be waived, altered or suspended only by a change by ordinance.

Section Five: This ordinance shall become effective when adopted and published as required by law.

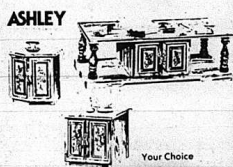

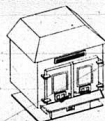

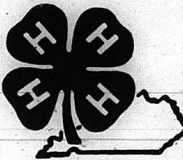

A local attorney will join the Commonwealth Attorney's office in Pulaski and Rockcastle counties.

Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham said Tuesday that Jerry Cox would join his office on October 1st as assistant commonwealth attorney.

Ham said that he would not make any official announce-

ment until September 28th because of some matters that were still pending in Cox's private practice but he did confirm Cox's appointment.

"Jerry will be working mainly in Rockcastle County," Ham said. "He will be very helpful in jury selection over there and will also be more accessible to local police."

Cox is a partner in the law firm of Clontz and Cox in Mt. Vernon and the firm will no longer practice as defense attorneys in Rockcastle or Pulaski counties but they will maintain their private practice, with no changes at all, according to Cox, who said that he would work out of his own office in the courthouse.

Burley crop is larger than estimated

As widely predicted the 1984 burley tobacco crop is turning out larger than earlier estimates had it. And the effects of another bumper output—both good and bad—are getting extra close scrutiny.

One good result would be improved financial returns to burley growers after last year's drought. Another would be the near-certainty of a major slash in next year's crop quotas, to help reduce tobacco surpluses. And as the current crop is generally of

high quality it can be expected to sell well.

Against these prospects, however, is the discouraging probability of adding to the overstocked pool of loan tobacco held by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association. This will increase carrying costs, and could bring bigger assessments on growers for

the NO-Net-Cost Fund.

The September U.S. Crop and Weather estimate last week recorded a jump of 41.3 million pounds over August in the anticipated size of this year's crop. For the eight-state belt the estimate is now 730 million pounds, against 688.7 million predicted last month.

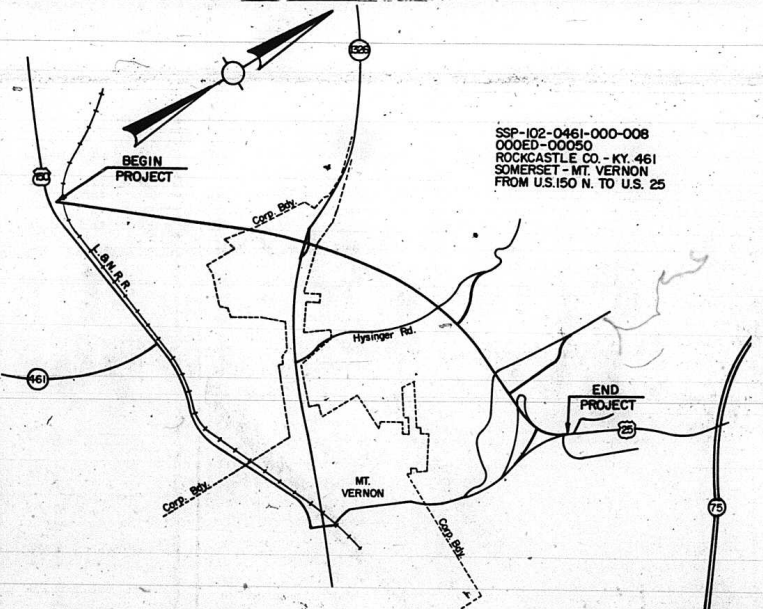

favor," said Parkey. "One way they can get their views across is through the ballot box. I'm more interested in the deeds done than what they're spouting."

He went on, "I think religion should be left out of politics—it's an explosive issue at this time. I'm most interested in meeting needs of man from the pulpit and leaving politics out of it. I don't think we should take a stand on political issues from the pulpit because it is another cause for division among the body of Christ."

"It would be dangerous if a minister tries to sway his congregation on politics," he said. "He is anti-abortion and that he does indicate to his congregation what the scripture says on such issues as abortion."

David Gamm is the priest for Our Lady of Mt. Vernon Catholic Church. He feels religion has to be part of our nation. He said, "As a Christian and as a Catholic, myself, and looking at what I know of American history and the principles on which the country was founded, I see it was freedom of religion."

"I think it's awfully difficult for a convinced Christian to separate their religion from their political life and be totally honest about who they are."

Gamm added, "Religion is necessarily a part of the political campaign because the candidates form their political convictions based on their Christian belief." He also thinks anyone trying to separate their religious convictions because of a political campaign are not being truly honest with themselves because "religion and politics

are inseparable."

He concluded, "I think school prayer and abortion are political footballs and every voter has to make a decision based on their religious convictions and politics."

Ernie Johnson, pastor of Mt. Vernon Christian Church, feels that religion and politics began receiving publicity again with former President Jimmy Carter's born again statements. He doesn't think church and state can be separated.

"The very foundation on which our nation was founded was religious grounds," he said. "The Civil War was fought basically over a religious issue—slavery."

He went on to say that the mainstream of the American people aren't being heard (he considers himself part of the mainstream). "Ultra-liberals and ultra-conservatives are heard the general run of people aren't. Other groups can speak out but it's taboo for churches to do. We do have a right to speak if all the other groups do."

He said he believes we shouldn't have a church state, but that we should have freedom of religion. "We call ourselves a Christian nation and we're founded on Christian principles," said Johnson. "I don't see how religion can be heard out of politics and don't want it taken out. I'd hate to hear a presidential speech and never hear the name of God in it."

Don Jones, pastor of the Broadhead Baptist Church, also believes the general run of people and a person should express what they believe. But he doesn't think religion should be used as a weapon.

Jones said, "I don't think you can totally separate it because the early founders had politics incorporated and in-

terwoven with religion and some would even like to have had a church state."

He doesn't agree with the idea of a church state, but he does think that the candidates shouldn't ignore their religious beliefs. "As for the religious candidates, I think that if religion means anything to them it will come through whether they want it or not."

George Poynter, from Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon, is the pastor of the Colony Holiness Church in London. "From my point of view," he said, "I support what Reagan and the Republicans are saying and I will support prayer in the schools. I'm very glad that's part of the platform; I'm not supporting it by the party but by an issue."

When asked if he thinks Americans are becoming more aware of religion he said, "The president declared 1983 as the Year of the Bible. They're (Reagan's administration) bringing the nation back to religious issues more than any administration in years."

Dr. Charles Hedrick is pastor of the First Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon. He feels today's candidates are taking advantage of the religious balgame, "especially when it's known they're not particularly religious until an election."

He added, "I think the reason religion is being more used is because the church is becoming more visible because of the Moral Majority and the electronic church. The church has become a voice because of electronic media which can make it heard when it hasn't been heard in the past—that's why politicians have been able to latch onto it (religion) now."

Does Hedrick think religion should be left out of politics? "I believe in separation of church and state," he said. "I believe the way political opponents are using religion is a dangerous thing—seeking to draw the religious community to them and they may do anything to gain vote support."

He said he believes in Christian principles, but using them for political gain is a dangerous thing.

Dr. Mike Bryant is the staff evangelist for the First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon as well as president and evangelist for Mike Bryant Ministries, Inc.

Bryant sees Americans turning more and more to religion. "In the past few

years, I've been aware of a back to the Bible theme in our nation and this is especially true among the fundamental evangelicals.

Religious denominations continue to experience an increase in membership, although this may not necessarily reflect a true faith in Christ. While we may be seeing America turn more to religion, I question the seriousness and depth of spiritual commitment given the worst moral and spiritual decline in progress that America has ever faced."

Does he think this poses a threat to separation of church and state? Bryant answered, "Discussion of religious ideals by political candidates does not bother me very much. Legislation regarding religious matters bothers me a great deal. Any time the government actively involves themselves in passing laws or taking other actions that regulates or controls religion I think there's a great potential threat posed to the cardinal principle of separation of church and state."

Bryant agrees with many of the county's other religious leaders that ministers should be aware of what takes place concerning religion and politics.

"God-chosen men, such as the Old Testament prophets and New Testament men, such as the Apostle Paul, not only kept up but also addressed much of their preaching to these kinds of issues," he said. "Religion and politics are a controversial area but that doesn't mean we shouldn't address it."

fatalities and one out of ten injury accidents involved tractors. The single most common factor in tractor fatalities is an overturn.

The documented number of tractor related fatalities occurring in the state vary depending upon the year and source of information. Figures for the 1970s indicate an average of nearly 40 tractor fatalities annually on Kentucky farms and highways. In fact, the rate of tractor fatalities in Kentucky during this time was twice the National average. Most of this difference was due to the high rates of tractor overturns which accounted for 60% of the fatal tractor accidents on Kentucky farms.

Why are tractor accident rates so high in Kentucky? The reasons are varied but one apparent factor

is the large number of farms with small tractors which are not equipped with ROPS, which are roll-over protective systems. This is compounded by the fact that these smaller tractors are generally associated with use on the steeper farm land. In contrast the greatest use of ROPS has been on bigger tractors which are used in larger farming operations. Often these larger tractors are used on the more level terrain and in crop production activities with the lower risk of tractor accidents.

Some age groups appear to be at greater risks of a tractor accident than others. The 45-64 and 65+ age groups account for nearly two-thirds of the accidents. However, these figures only tell part of the story since the 45-64 age group also represents the largest segment of the farm population.

The relative risk figures provide a better means for comparing the risk of accidents between different age groups since it takes the population size of each by the percentage of farm population for each age group. Based upon relative risk, it becomes apparent that those over 65 have a much greater risk of fatal tractor accidents than any other group. This segment of our farm population is often overlooked in tractor safety efforts.

The youth comprise the other

high risk age group who have traditionally received special emphasis for training in safe tractor operation. While their relative risk is lower than other age groups, their hours of actual operation is also much lower. Because they lack experience and a full awareness of the potential hazards they are a high risk group and need special safety emphasis.

Although overturns are the major source of tractor fatalities, falls and run-over accidents are the second most common type of accident. In these accidents several high risk hazard patterns are apparent. First, overturns are a primary source of tractor fatalities of those under 10 years of age and also for those 65 and over. The most tragic are those are to the youth who are run-over by the tractor or a trailing implement such as a "bush hog" type rotary mower while riding with a parent as an extra rider. Adult operators are more commonly killed either while attempting to mount or dismount the tractor while it is moving or from being thrown or knocked off the tractor during operation. Coupled with the tractor run-over accidents are the people who fall or are thrown from wagons and run over.

During this time of harvesting crops, farmers are reminded to take time to prevent accidents. Stay Alert!!!!

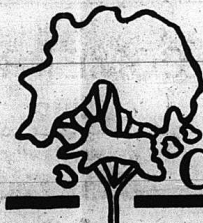

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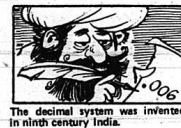

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Fain's 218 yards not enough to get Rockets past Pirates

Friday night, the weather put a damper on half-time homecoming activities and the Berea Pirates put the skids to the Rockets' hopes for a second win by squeezing out a 28-27 win.

The game was originally delayed while school officials checked on the chance of rough weather hitting the area. There were bad storms and tornado alerts across the northeast part of the state all day and it looked threatening here at game time. However, the game finally began and the rain held off until just before half-time when it finally decided to set in and, with 37 seconds left in the half, homecoming activities were called off until the Oct. 5 game against Bell Co.

During the game, Rockets' full back Garry Fain gave it his all, scoring 5 touchdowns but having 2 of them called back because of penalties.

After junior Greg Mink returned the opening kick-off 16 yards to the Rockets' 28, Fain and junior Jeff Bullock combined for a total of 7 yards and, on third and

3, Fain ran the ball in for the score from the 35. However, an unsportsmanlike conduct call on the Rockets brought the ball back to the Rockets' 45 yard line. The Rockets were unable to maintain possession of the ball and had to punt it away.

The Pirates picked the Rockets' pass defense apart and got one first down on a 4th and 2 situation on their own 44, in their 76 yard march to the goal line for their first score of the game. However, their try for the extra point was no good and the Pirates were ahead 6-0 with 3:45 left in the first quarter.

However, the Rockets retaliated almost immediately as Fain and Bullock combined, on 6 plays, to march the ball 60 yards for the TD. The score came on a solid run by Fain from the 14. Junior quarterback Troy Taylor's extra point kick was good and the Rockets were ahead 7-6 with 1:50 remaining in the first quarter.

With only 1:20 remaining in the second quarter, the Pirates put their second score of the

night on the board on a pass play from the Rockets' 45 yard line. This time, Berea's try for the extra points was good and it looked as though the Pirates would take a 14-7 lead to the dressing room at half-time. But, on the first play after the kick, Fain broke away for a 55-yard run to the goal line with 56 seconds left in the half. Taylor's kick was again on the money and the score was knotted at 14 at half-time.

The Rockets held Berea on the Pirates' first possession of the second half and began their series from their own 30. Bullock carried the ball three times straight for 14 yards to the Rockets' 44 and, from there, Fain executed a great run for his third TD of the night, that counted. Taylor's kick was good and the Rockets led 21-14.

Taylor's kick-off was a good one, to the Pirates' 5 yard line. But, the Pirate runner got some excellent blocking and was on his way for the run back when Taylor, the last man between him and the goal line, managed to get him on Berea's 44 yard line. Defen-

sive player Steve Estes caught Berea's quarterback in the backfield on this series for a loss of 4, making it 3rd and 14 and then Tim Roberts stopped the runner after a 5 yard gain forcing the punt.

The Rockets started their next drive from their own 8 and, 2 plays later, Fain broke away for a 92 yard scoring play but, the TD was called back because of a clip on the Rockets, two of them actually, and the Rockets later had to punt the ball away. It was a short punt and the Pirates took over on the Rockets' 17. 6 plays later, the Berea quarterback hit his man in the end zone for the score. Again, the pass for the extra points was no good and the Rockets still had a 21-20 lead.

Johnny Poynter got an excellent runback on Berea's kick-off, a 52-yarder to Berea's 34. Fain then picked up 7 yards and Bullock 7 to put the ball at Berea's 20 yard line at the end of the third quarter. Bullock then carried the ball three times straight, going over from the 7 yard line for the final TD of the night for the Rockets. This time, Taylor's kick went awry but the Rockets were ahead 27-20.

The Pirates didn't waste anytime getting their final TD of the game as, following the kick-off, they marched 68 yards in 5 plays for their score and then completed a pass into the end zone for the two extra points and their winning margin of 28-27.

The Rockets tried valiantly to come back but, after getting one first down, had to finally give up the ball on downs.

The Rockets got one more chance and Taylor hit Mink with a pass to the Rockets' 47. Taylor's next pass was intercepted and the Pirates had pulled out a squeaker.

Without the two touchdowns called back on penalties, Fain, according to est. coach Ryan Riddle, would have set a new state rushing record of 375 yards

on 22 carries. As it was, Fain gained 218 yards on 20 carries. Bullock garnered 103 yards on 20 carries and Taylor picked up 10 yards on four carries.

Berea gave up the ball once, on an interception by Johnny Poynter, who returned the ball 15 yards. The Rockets also gave up one interception.

Only 9 first downs were picked up by the Rockets, all rushing; and, Rockcastle was assessed 95 yards on 10 penalties as opposed to 87 yards for the Pirates on 8 in-

fractions. On defense, the Rockets were led by Tim Roberts with 9 tackles and 6 assists; David Gllovak got 7 tackles, 5 assists and 1 sack; Robb Northern and Steve Estes tied with 6 tackles and 4 assists and Estes was credited with a sack. Charles Bullen, Lonnie Thomas and Elmer Robbins got 4 tackles each and 9 assists combined. (State courtesy Scott Station).

McKinney leads Mountain Division of tournament

Twenty-five fishermen from the Mountain Division of the Red Man Tournament have qualified for the October 5-7 regional tournament on Eufaula Lake near Eufaula, Alabama.

Six qualifying tournaments in the Mountain Division came to an end Sunday, September 9. Mark McKinney of Broches is atop the division standings with 199.5 points and 58 lbs. 12 oz. of fish. Nineteen other Kentucky anglers qualified, as did five from Tennessee.

The Mountain Division qualifiers will join top anglers from the Gator, Carolina, Mississippi and Land Between the Lakes divisions on Eufaula Lake. Regional tournaments for other Red Man divisions are scheduled for Ft. Loudon Lake near Knoxville, Tenn., and Kentucky Lake near Gilbertsville, Ky.

The winner of each of the three region events receives a Dodge Ram Tug truck and Ranger bass boat equipped with an Evinrude motor, Humminbird electronics, Motor-Guide trolling motor and Action Pack/ Super Crab batteries. Prize money at each region tourney is \$18,000.

More importantly, the top 12 anglers from each region advance to the Red Man All American Bass Championship, scheduled for October 30-November 3 on the Kissimmee Chain near Orlando, Fla.

The All American champion wins \$100,000 cash.

The Red Man Tournament Trail now serves anglers in 29 states, most located in the eastern half of the nation. They were designed with the working man in mind. Entry fees for the 90 qualifying tournaments are only \$50 per event. One hundred percent of the entry fees is paid

back in prizes along the trail. The tournaments are held on Sunday, enabling fishermen who work during the week to fish for prizes on weekends.

The top 25 Mountain Division anglers were determined by a system of pounds and points. The top 50 fishermen in each tourney earned points, with the winner receiving 50 points, second place 49 points, etc. After the six tournaments, a straight edge was placed across lists of pounds and points. The straight edge was dropped line by line until 25 different names appeared.

Original plans called for 24 fishermen to advance to the regional. But when the straight edge was dropped to find the 24th qualifier, two names appeared on the same line.

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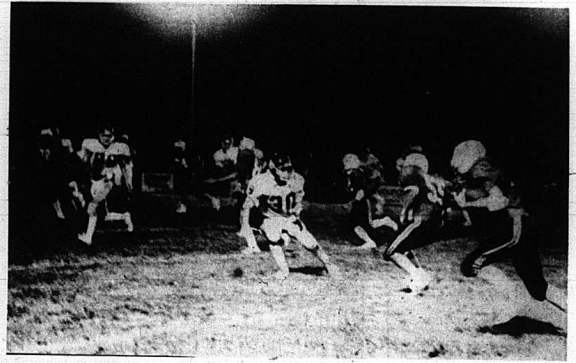

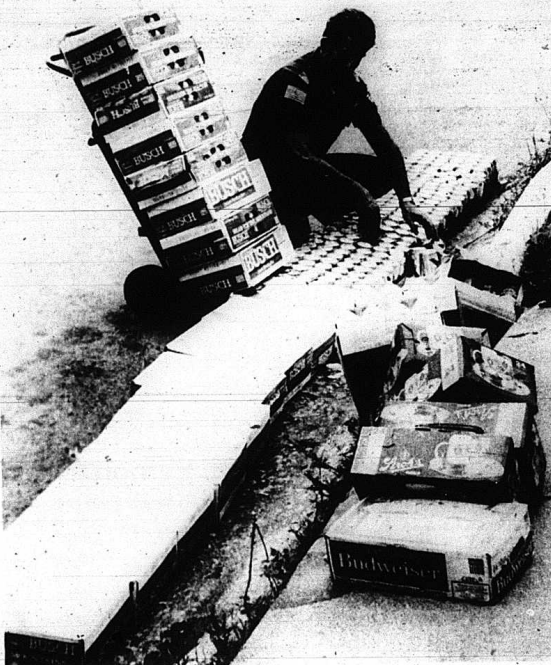

FLC to hold Open House Sept. 23

The Family Life Center (FLC) will hold an Open House this Sunday, September 23 from 2 to 5 p.m. for the residents of Rockcastle County and the Berea area. The FLC, operated by the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) is

located a mile north of Renfro Valley on U.S. 25. Tours of the FLC will begin every hour on the hour at the Retreat Center during the Open House.

"We are inviting everyone to tour our facilities and acquaint themselves with our

programs and progress and to meet our staff," said Rev. Jerry Cooper, director of the Family Life Retreat Center, and host for the Open House.

The total Family Life

Center complex includes a variety of programs to serve families in addition to the Family Life Retreat Center, directed by Rev. Cooper, there are two foster homes for handicapped children, a group home for boys, a school for boys, a special unit for handicapped children (operated by the Rockcastle County Schools), an adult learning center and recreational facilities.

Development of the FLC began in 1973 with CAP's purchase of a 110 acre farm, just north of Renfro Valley on Highway 25, belonging to the Parsons' family. The homes, educational programs and recreational facilities are located on this property. In 1978, CAP purchased the Scenic View Motel on Highway 25. It was extensively renovated and now serves as the Family Life Retreat Center.

In addition to the services provided at the FLC, CAP provides a number of other services in Rockcastle County.

In 1983, all CAP programs in the county served over 6,000 persons and employed 34 Rockcastle County residents (full and part-time). This employment provided an annual payroll in the county of \$193,700 and these programs generated \$65,100 in expenditures with local businesses.
