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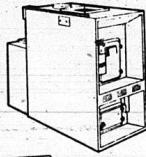

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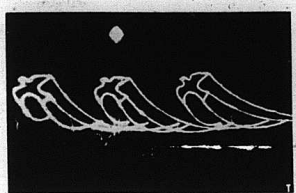

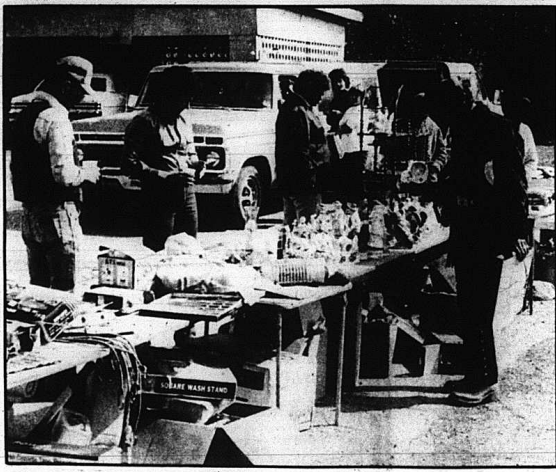
Payne said that the asbestos had been removed from two of the rooms in question and that two other rooms had been tested and the results showed that these rooms were "safe."

Budget will exceed 6 million

Local board approves budget for 1984-85 school year

The Rockcastle County school system's budget for the 1984-85 school year will exceed 6 million dollars.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Charles B. Parsons presented the working budget to the Board of Education during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

The board approved the rough draft of the budget with a unanimous vote.

Instruction in the schools will get the major part of the budget with almost 3 1/2 million dollars being spent in this area in 1984-85. This includes all teachers, principals, teachers and librarians, supervisors, substitute teachers and guidance counselors' salaries, as well as certain teaching materials.

Other highlights of the new budget include \$75,000 in money from interest bearing accounts in local banks as well as an estimated additional \$90,000 to be received from a higher school tax for 1984.

The state made all school systems across the state raise their school tax rate to 15c per \$100 assessed value of real estate and a raise to the same 15c on personal property. Last year's rates were 7.7c and 9.6c, respectively.

The local school board intends to spend money in the following areas next year: \$37,000 for attendance; \$34,750 for health services; \$588,000 for transportation; \$335,719.63 for operation of school facilities; \$190,165.20 for maintenance of school facilities and \$475,000 for school food service. Rockcastle County's total working budget for 1984-85 will be \$6,181,583.07. A complete rundown of the budget will appear in a future issue of the Signal.

Danny and Diane Taylor of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon appeared before the local board Tuesday night with questions about an incident where their third grade child at Mt. Vernon had been punished by a teacher.

Mrs. Taylor told the board members that she did not think the teacher in question followed board

policy when administering punishment to her child.

"I think 'spanking' should be the last resort of punishment in our schools," Mrs. Taylor said, "and your school board policy says the same thing."

However, a letter from the teacher, which was circulated at the meeting stated that the punishment was only a "mild swat" and came only after students in her class had been forewarned.

Mt. Vernon school principal Buford Parkerson, who was also present at the meeting, said that he did not think that the teacher had violated any board policy in her actions.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor were not satisfied with these answers and said they felt the teacher had used corporal punishment in their child's case.

School Board Chairman Dr. K.R. Burdette told the Taylors that he felt it was "a big misunderstanding" and that the board would instruct Mr. Parkerson to see that all of the teachers at Mt. Vernon followed board policy for administering corporal punishment in the future. This policy requires that another teacher, or school official, be present when a teacher intends to use corporal punishment.

In other business, the board voted to employ Barbara Owens, Leslie Mullins, Stephen Tebello, Rita M. Haves and Edna Fain as

County votes to place lights at Health dept. and courthouse

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to pay half of placing new street lights in front of the new Rockcastle County Health Department on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

The court also voted to place two new street lights in front of the Courthouse.

The lights will be just like the new lights put on Main Street in Mt. Vernon by the Local Development Corporation and the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The project will cost the county approximately \$1,000.

No action taken concerning county road at Red Hill

The question of whether or not the county should maintain a county road that no one lives on, and what the Fiscal Court should do about the county jail, were the main topics at Tuesday's meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

Two connecting roads, the Cole Road and Hall Road, in the Red Hill section of Rockcastle County lead to a farm that 5th District Magistrate Joe Clark owns the mineral rights to.

Clark told the rest of the members of the court that the roads had been in existence in the county for over 100 years. He also said that the two roads were on the county work schedule.

"I'm satisfied that these are county roads," Clark said, "and we are going to work them the next time they work in my district."

However, Leonard "Roge" Hammonds, who also owns land on the road in question, asked the court, in open meeting, why they would want to maintain a county road that no one lives on.

"There are other landowners on that road besides me and others that want to get coal out as well," Clark retorted. "We have done this much for everybody else."

At Clark's request, Fourth District Magistrate W.H. Wren made a motion to give Carl Clontz authority to take legal action on the matter, if necessary, in the name of the county at no cost to the county.

"I don't know if we are going to have any legal problems but if we do, we want to act in the county's name," Clark said. "I know it's a county road, it was accepted by the Fiscal Court in 1981," he added.

The Fifth District Magistrate then showed the rest of the court a copy of the minutes of the 1981 meeting at which the roads were accepted. However, while agreeing with Clark that the action had been taken (accepting the roads), they did not vote to give Clontz the authority to use the county's name

in a possible law suit.

"I would second Bill's (Wren) motion, but it would be a conflict of interest," Clark said. "We're going to use that road one way or the other."

Wren's motion died for lack of a second and county Road Supervisor Paul Hansel confirmed that the two roads were on his work list but that they had not been worked by the county for at least three years.

"We haven't been working this road but we are going to do it next time," Clark said. "I was just trying to keep down any trouble."

Before the Fiscal Court let Wren's motion die, Hammonds asked the members, "Is the county going to benefit from this or is Joe Clark going to benefit?" On a motion by Second District Magistrate Tom Denny, the Fiscal Court voted to look into the possibility of constructing a new jail.

"If we let the state close this jail down here, they will run us out of this county," Denny said.

The county has been, and still is, in violation of many state regulations concerning the county jail.

Although the county recently awarded a bid to New-Way Security to remodel the jail and help comply with some of the requirements.

County Jailer Henry Lee Abney told the court that the jail still had certain problems such as no indoor and outdoor recreation area for prisoners or no daily inspection by doctors or nurses.

"With the plan the state has drawn out for our jail, there would only be room for seven beds down there," Abney said.

The jail averages about 20 prisoners a day throughout the year and Abney said that if the present facility was to be used, more than half of the prisoners in the county jail would have to be transported elsewhere.

Abney told the court that he was aware of a Lexington-based firm that built county jails and leased them back to the county governments.

To the Editor,

Next to my involvement with my own family, the most important, exciting and rewarding involvement of my life has been with the Health Care Access Committee and the Kentucky Medical Association.

When the Health Care Access Committee began its public meetings in May of 1983, I knew ours was not just a cause, but a difficult task. As a member of the Chandler Medical Center Council of Supervisors I was appalled at the number of people who were being refused access to medical care because they had neither money nor insurance. Recognizing this as a problem which must be solved, we set out to find a solution.

After thirteen public meetings and many hours of testimony and debate, our committee agreed on a set of conclusions and recommendations. The cornerstone of our program is the creation of a statewide toll free hot line and referral system. With this in place, any person needing health care can call this number, be referred to determine eligibility and then be referred to a participating physician for free care. Emergency cases will, of course, continue to be treated at hospital emergency rooms.

Clearly, the key to this program is the participating physician and the cooperation of the Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources. This cooperation has been superb and the Collins administration deserves great praise for their commitment.

Without a doctor, there can be no comprehensive medical care. This is why the support that the Kentucky Medical Association House of Delegates has given to this program is so important. Many skeptics said that the Kentucky Medical Association would never support a program

such as this. The skeptics have been proven wrong. And they will continue to be proven wrong as Kentucky assumes a national leadership role in bringing health care access to all of her people.

The highlight of my involvement has been in working with people like Dr. James Holloway, Dr. Tom Heaven, Dr. Russell Travis, Dr. Nelson Rue, Dr. Peter Bosomworth, Dr. Preston Nunnally, Dr. Don Barton and others. Not only should the Kentucky Medical Association be proud of these people but the citizens of this Commonwealth owe them and the Kentucky Medical Association a great debt of gratitude.

There is no limit to our potential accomplishments if we all work together. It is the existence of this cooperative spirit that gives me great cause for excitement about the future.

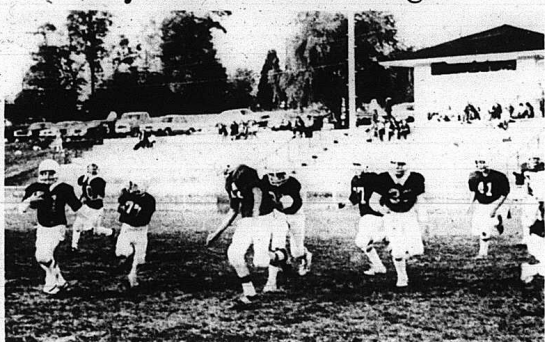

Good news in things from around Kentucky and beyond.

Sam Bowie
"I think it's great," a lady said the other day when I mentioned that Sam Bowie had signed an NBA contract for \$5.3 million.

"It couldn't happen to a nicer person," she added. "I'm tickled for him. We're really going to miss him."

Bowie holds a special place of endearment with Kentucky fans all right.

If there were such a thing as an all-time University of Kentucky Popularity Five, for the last 20 years, Bowie would be on it, along with Louie Dampier, Kyle Macy, Dan Issel and Jack "Goose" Givens.

Who are some of your favorites? When Bowie signed with Portland this week, his contract was reported at \$5.3 million for six years.

Before taxes and agent Larry Fleisher's commission, that means that Bowie would be making \$683,333 a year. \$73,611 a month. \$16,267 a week. \$2,420 a day.

Or, if Bowie were paid by the common man's wage scale he would get \$968 an hour.

Comment: A prediction. He will spend it wisely.

It is quite a tribute to UK coach Joe B. Hall and Kentucky's basketball program in general, the way "big men" prospects have proliferated from Lexington to the Big Leagues.

Certainly, NBA owners have shown little reluctance to shell out megabucks for Kentucky big men.

Sam Bowie's \$5.3 million contract last week reminded me of few other names.

Where else would Melvin Turpin have gotten the skill development, attention and reputation to land himself \$600,000 a year?

After the 1978 season 6-10 Rick Robey was drafted by the NBA Indiana Pacers and went on to play with the Boston Celtics and lately with the Phoenix Suns.

Robey's 6-11 "opposite" bookend, Mike Phillips, was also drafted by the professional league but didn't stick.

Last week another former UK Big man, Cliff Chuck Alexianis, returned from Italy to sign a pro NBA contract.

A list of less recent "centers" who used UK as a launching ramp to play for, includes Tom Payne in 1971, Dan Issel in 1970, Bob Burrow in 1966, Cliff Hagan in 1954 and Alex Guard in 1949.

Win List
My "unofficial" *Win List* for girls high school basketball coaches in Kentucky increased by one this week. Grant Talbott, coached Owensboro High's girls team from 1975-1981 and posted 153 wins (21 losses).

Unofficially then, Talbott ranks fifth among Kentucky (girls) coaches behind Roy Bowling of Laurel County (269), Beverly Roby of Marion County (192), Liz Trubandt of Russell (185), and David Young of Allen County (152).

Rugers?
By the time you've read this the Scarlet Knights (they call themselves Scarlets) will have played the Cincinnati Bearcats.

A tough defensive outfit, Rutgers, in three previous games the Scarlets allowed just one TD, losing to Penn State 15-7, Rutgers then beat Temple 10-9 and Syracuse 19-0.

The "big noise" is a 6-0, 215-pound junior tailback Albert Smith (222

yards on 46 carries, 4.5 per carry.)

Like Kentucky's Ransdell, Rutgers QB Rusty Hochberg likes to throw the football. In his first three games Hochberg completed 47 of 94 passes for 495 yards and two TDs. Ransdell has completed 33 of 50 for 449 yards and five TDs.

Louisville, as usual, will provide some of the finest football talent to next year's college rosters. However, there are a number of very good prep prospects around the

Commonwealth again this autumn.

Where will they go to college? Considering the primary criteria used by prep seniors choosing a college:

• Geography (school close to home).

An established conference.
• A highly respected coaching staff.
• A winning program.

The big winner next spring looks to be the University of Kentucky.

"UK is winning right now and Jerry Claiborne could be elected governor of your state," one (out of state) college recruiter said last week. "It's tough on the rest of us. What makes UK even more of a cinch is that Louisville is down. Indiana is way down, Eastern Kentucky is about average this season and Western Kentucky is down."

"The biggest competition Kentucky's going to get is going to come from Vanderbilt and Tennessee," he added. "When a kid considers that both schools are pretty far away, it makes UK look even better."

So, who are some of the top prospects in the Bluegrass state in 1984?

• If there were a Mr. Football in Kentucky the title might go to Mike Pfeifer of Louisville Trinity. He is a 6-7, 250 tackle and reports are that Kentucky wants him badly and that he will choose UK over Notre Dame and a host of other suitors.

• Carwell Gardner, a 6-3, 210-pound linebacker from Louisville Trinity is another prospect that Kentucky wants badly.

• Andy Murray, a 6-2, 220-pound tackle from Trinity, is another first line prep prospect.

may be one of the best high school defensive backs in the south this year.
• Somerset's prize running back James Fletcher (5-11, 195) leads the state in scoring and is near the top in rushing yards. He is Kentucky's top running back prospect for 1984.

What are effective schools like?

If we in Rockcastle County want top quality schools, we must first agree on what we mean by quality schools. I believe we need open discussion from parents, teachers, students, administrators and citizens as we decide on our goals.

In a survey of successful Kpt Kentucky schools in 1983, several characteristics were identified. It was found that effective schools:

- (1) emphasize academics
- (2) stress basic skills for all
- (3) concentrate on more than test scores
- (4) offer a choice of challenge or vocational training
- (5) demonstrate strong administrative leadership, high expectations for students, orderly work atmosphere, emphasis on instructional objectives, and frequent monitoring of student progress
- (6) It was also found that parents must value students' education before students will.

I believe the Rockcastle County Board of Education should look honestly and closely at its policies and priorities to see if these characteristics are being encouraged in our schools. We should build on any strong points and try to eliminate any weaknesses.

"I think the initial cost is \$3,000 for a preliminary study," Abney said.

"The state would have to give us some time before they closed our jail," County Judge Bob Jasper added.

Rowle also told the rest of the members of the court that he would like to see the county carry out some projects that they had already passed on and that had been put on the books. These projects include working prisoners, putting in gas tanks and purchasing their (the county's) own gas, building a bridge in his district and repaving a road in his district.

The Fiscal Court also voted to build a ramp for the handicapped to the first floor of the courthouse.

Purcell was both elected as Assistant Patrol Leaders. Their duties are the same as the Patrol Leader but in his absence and/or aide the Patrol Leaders.

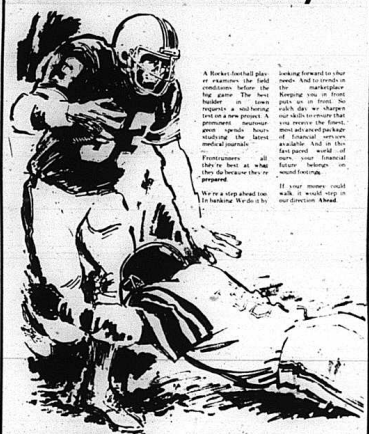
Chad Merritt was elected as scribe. His duties are to keep a log of patrol leaders' council decisions, keep records of attendance and dues payments and record advancement in troop records.

Official Fall fire hazard season began October 1st

The official Fall Fire Hazard Season began October 1 and runs through December 15. According to officials with the Kentucky Division of Forestry, the danger of forest fires during this period is tremendously greater than during the summer months. For this reason, it is against the law to burn anything within 150 feet of any woods or brushland before 4:30 p.m. during Fire Season. Other laws require that the burning area be carefully cleared around before lighting the fire, and that someone be with the fire at all times until it is completely extinguished.

One common material burned in the autumn is fallen leaves. Forestry officials encourage people to dispose of leaves by methods other than by burning. Other possible methods, depending on the amount of leaves, would include composting, shredding with a mulching type mower, or simply scattering the leaves among other leaves in the woods.

If a person must burn leaves or other materials, the Division of Forestry urges that a few safety measures be followed. First, be sure to know and obey the fire

laws, and check to be sure the burning does not violate Air Pollution laws or local ordinances. Next, do not burn when it is extremely dry or when there is any wind, and wait as late in the day as possible. If a large amount of material is to be burned, do not try to burn it all at once. Instead, burn only small amounts at a time so the fire is manageable and can be

quickly extinguished if necessary. Finally, be sure to have enough water, tools, and people on hand to control the fire.

By knowing and obeying a few simple fire laws, people can avoid having to go to court for violating these laws and possibly paying a heavy fine. In addition, by obeying the laws and following a few simple safety measures, people can avoid causing a wildfire which will damage our natural resources and possibly threaten their property or even lives.

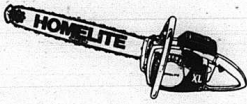

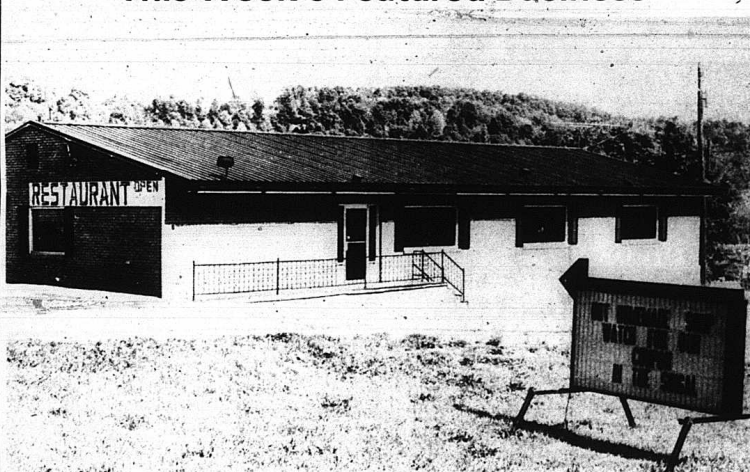

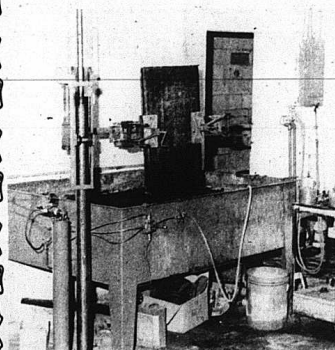
